SACRAMENT OF BAPTISM

You must be registered in the Parish for six months. Arrangements for the Baptism must be arranged by the parents. All sponsors should be carefully selected and must be at least 16 years of age. Non-practicing, fallen away Catholics are not eligible for sponsorship, even if they are close relatives or friends. The Sponsors are required to bring a letter of eligibility from their Church.



SACRAMENT OF MATRIMONY

Couples planning a wedding must contact the rectory six to nine months before the date.

Couples are obligated to follow Parish Policy and are required to attend the Diocese Pre-Cana Program.

Scripture Reflection

Anyone who has driven often on highways can recall times in which traffic has slowed to a standstill because of a bottleneck, when multiple lanes of traffic must funnel down to a single open lane. This contemporary phenomenon is analogous to Jesus' words today about getting into heaven. Jesus says people will come from every direction but must pass through a narrow gate to enter. Let us accept this challenge, patiently following that narrow path.

What I hope you'll THINK ABOUT

In my opinion, today's is one of the gospel's most challenging passages. The Jesus who wants to set fire to the earth and divide families does not seem to mesh with the Jesus who offers us an easy yoke and rest in him. But remember, two things can be true at once. It is true that the gospel is a source of joy and rest, but it's also true that it places a burden on us. As we journey through this life, we will encounter trials BECAUSE of our faith in Jesus. We will have to make a choice between what is EASY and what is RIGHT. Jesus does not promise that following him will come without cost - but he does promise that it will be worth it.

<u>Deacon's Corner:</u> In preparation for our vacation with our son and his family, I washed and waxed our car. My father used to say he washed his car once each year - whether or not it actually needed it. Our car



looks brand new now, and I honestly think it even runs better. This got me thinking about some things - like why we wait for special occasions before we do something we should be doing regularly. And that question is about much more than keeping a clean car. Sometimes our lives become a bit "cluttered," too. When I washed the car, I used my old familiar cleaning liquid. The wax was a favorite, also. When we think about our hearts and our souls, we don't have to go shopping first. We just have to go to God. We can talk things over with him - and allow him to wash our lives clean through prayer and the sacrament of Reconciliation. Remember, any day is a good day to tell God we love him and say we're sorry if we offended him. We NEVER have to wait for a special occasion. Our God is patiently waiting for US.



One of the faithful from our area who attends the St. Anthony of Padua Novena emailed me this kind of informal Ten Commandments. They are filled with a lot of wisdom. They are:

- 1. Prayer is not a "spare wheel" that you pull out when in trouble, but it is a "steering wheel" that directs the right path throughout.
- 2. So why is a car's windshield so large and the rear mirror so small? Because our past is not as important as our future. So look ahead and move on.
- **3**. Friendship is like a book. It takes a few seconds to burn, but it takes years to write.
- **4**. All things in life are temporary. If it's going well, enjoy it, that won't last long. If it's going badly, don't worry, that won't last long either.
- **5**.Old friends are gold? New friends are diamond? If you get a diamond, you always need a base of gold!
- **6**. Often when we lose hope and think this is the end God smiles from up above and says, "Relax, sweetheart, it's just a bend, not the end!"
- 7. When God solves our problems, you have faith in His abilities; when God doesn't solve our problems, He has faith in your abilities.
- **8**. A blind person asked St. Anthony, "Can there be anything worse than losing eye sight?" He replied, "Yes, losing your vision!"
- **9**. When you pray for others, God listens to you and blesses them; sometimes, when you are safe and happy, remember that someone has prayed for you.
- 10. Worrying does not take away tomorrow's troubles, it takes away today's peace.
