You must be registered in the Parish for six months. Arrangements for the Baptism must be arranged by the parents. All sponsors should be carefully selected and must be at least 16 years of age. Non-practicing, fallen away Catholics are not eligible for sponsorship, even if they are close relatives or friends. The Sponsors are required to bring a letter of eligibility from their Church.

#### SACRAMENT OF MATRIMONY

Couples planning a wedding must con-tact the rectory six to nine months before the date Couples are obligated to follow Parish Policy and are required to attend the Diocese Pre-Cana Program.

The boy who had his books thrown to the ground blossomed in high school. He become an athletic star and exceptional student. His best friend who helped him was not athletic and an average student. Yet despite their different lives, they remained best friends. High school graduation approached and the athletic boy was named valedictorian. Staring right at his best friend, he thanked him with a pained expression and no one, not even his best friend knew why. Then he went on. The day he had his books knocked to the ground was very difficult for him. He had no friends, felt alone and was sad. That day, he had planned to take his own life. This is when his soon to be his best friend entered his life. Everything changed that day. A small act of kindness saved a life. The speaker and his friend both had tears n their eyes as the story was told and the magnitude of the one day become apparent. You never know what your kindness towards others can mean. Be that difference makes and be kind.
