SACRAMENT OF BAPTISM

You must be registered in the Parish for six months. Arrangements for the Baptism must be arranged by the parents. All sponsors should be carefully selected and must be at least 16 years of age. Non-practicing, fallen away Catholics are not eligible for sponsorship, even if they are close relatives or friends. The Sponsors are required to bring a letter of eligibility from their Church.

Couples planning a wedding must con-tact the rectory six to nine months before the date Couples are obligated to follow Parish Policy and are required to attend the Diocese Pre-Cana Program.

OFFERTORY-PRESENTATION OF GIFTS AT MASS

If you would like to bring up the gifts of water and wine at the offertory at mass, please let us know beforehand. Come to the sacristy before mass so we can place the items on the table in the middle of the church. We are still taking some precautions because of the Pandemic.

PRIESTHOOD SUNDAY - In 1975 when our pastor was ordained, there were $\overline{400}$ active priests in the Diocese of Scranton. They would serve the Church communities in eleven counties that composed our Diocese. There were 350,000 Catholics then. Many large parishes had more than one priest. There were a number of small congregations that had a resident priest. The religious communities of priests (e.g. Franciscans, Holy Cross, Jesuits, Oblates of St. Joseph) were plentiful. Currently to address the shortage, priests from other countries are staffing many of our parishes today. They come from India, Vietnam, Cuba, Mexico and other South American countries. Today, there are 45 from other nations. Still more are anticipated. It is projected that in ten years, our Diocese may only have 22 active priests from the Diocese. It is hard to imagine the shape and form our Diocese will look like. Will the role of the laity be greater? Whatever the future, we pray that more vocations will happen. In the meantime, pray for our priests and for future priests.

MINISTRY MONTH - The month of September is Ministry Awareness Month. Ideally, every member of the parish should offer some type of service in the Church. We are particularly encouraged to participate in some liturgical ministry-cantor, choir/folk group, extraordinary minister of communion, lector (reader) and altar server (junior/adult). Since we haven't heard from those junior-we are asking for adults to consider to serve funerals and if possible, weekends. How about a family serving with their youngsters? Contact Fr. Terry if interested.

SOCIAL CONCERNS COMMITTEE - "Walk In Their Shoes." Social concerns ministry is having a new and slightly used sneaker collection. Men's and women's sneakers requested. There will be boxes set by St. Joseph's table throughout the month of October.

DIOCESAN ANNUAL APPEAL - Your gifts to the Diocesan Annual Appeal enables us to serve the poorest, weakest and the most vulnerable among us through Catholic Social Services. Staff who feed the hungry, clothe the naked and provide shelter, counseling and assistance for those most in need. Many more individuals in parish communities receive assistance through parish based Social Justice Programs funded by the Appeal. Grants were awarded to 33 parish programs including food and clothing pantries, monthly dinners for families in need and outreach to prison inmates. The Diocese allocated us \$3,000 to support our outreach for the hygienic needs of those young people 10-13 yrs. of age. It is a serious problem. To date, Fr. Terry has purchased about \$3,300 worth of items. It comes just in time for the school term. We will conduct an additional drive like this in time for Lent.

DAILY PRAYER FOR VOCATIONS - Heavenly Father, Your divine Son taught us to pray to the Lord of the harvest to send laborers into His vineyard. We earnestly beg You to bless our diocese and our world with many priests and religious men and women who will love You fervently, and gladly and courageously spend their lives in service to Your Son's Church under the guidance of the Holy Spirit. PROPER WAY TO SHOW REVERENCE BEFORE RECEIVING COMMUNION

In days past, everyone approached the altar, knelt at the altar rail and received the host on our tongues. That was prescribed as a posture of reverence to show respect and adoration for the Body and Blood of our Lord. The bishops in the US have decided that we may approach the altar and stand to receive Communion. When we approach, we are to bow as a gesture of reverence before we receive the consecrated host from the priest, deacon, or extraordinary minister of Holy Communion. Today we can receive the host either on the tongue or in the hand. To receive in the hand, we place one hand, palm, up, on top of the other to form a "throne." We can also receive Holy Communion in the form of precious Blood. When Holy Communion is offered under both kinds, we repeat the bow of our heads before receiving each one. Genuflection is appropriate at other times. For example, we genuflect before the tabernacle containing the Blessed Sacrament.

J<u>USTICE</u> helps us respect others' rights and give each his due. We owe God our worship. We are made in His image, so we owe each other respect.

FORTITUDE strengthens us to follow Christ in the world, even if it's unpopular and uncomfortable.

<u>TEMPERANCE</u> properly orders our desire for pleasure, so that we appreciate earthly goods in moderation and value heavenly goods most. Observing the one-hour fast from food before receiving the Eucharist is an act of temperance.
