SACRAMENT OF BAPTISM

You must be registered in the Parish for six months. Arrangements for the Baptism must be arranged by the parents. All sponsors should be carefully selected and must be at least 16 years of age. Non-practicing, fallen away Catholics are not eligible for sponsorship, even if they are close relatives or friends. The Sponsors are required to bring a letter of eligibility from their Church.



SACRAMENT OF MATRIMONY

Couples planning a wedding must contact the rectory six to nine months before the date.

Couples are obligated to follow Parish Policy and are required to attend the Diocese Pre-Cana Program.

He told me, "We're friends - come as you are." This got me thinking. God is constantly telling us the very same thing, Come as you are. I love you regardless of anything. How many of us have thought about renewing or developing our relationship with God but we hold back for one reason or another. God's response is COME AS YOU ARE. God doesn't look for what might be wrong with us, he only sees and understands what's in our hearts. If our hearts don't want a relationship with him, he's much too polite too insist on one. But if we do, he'll be on our side quicker than my dog when I drop something from the table. And most of all, may we always remember God isn't interested in our checkbooks - he's interested in how we love one another. If God created it - God loves it. Now You Know.... From the PLC

What do we give and take?

If I offered you 168 one-dollar bills, as a gift, would you accept it? Then if I ask you for \$1 back, would you give it to me? How about \$2? How about 10%, \$16.80? These shouldn't be difficult decisions since the \$168 was a gift. Each week contains 168 hours. Each hour is a gift from God. The Catechism of the Catholic Church (para 2043) says, "the faithful are obliged to assist with the material needs of the Church, each according to his own ability." But how much is that? The Church has never stated a specific amount. But the standard in the Bible is the tithe, 10 percent of everything. "For every tenth part of herd or flock, whatever passes under the rod, the tenth one shall be holy to the Lord" (Leviticus 27:32). God challenges us. "Will a man rob God? Yet you are robbing Me! But you say, 'How have we robbed You?' In tithes and offerings" (Malachi 3:8). So, how can we cheerfully give nearly 17 hours each week to God? It's easy if we put God first by loving God and neighbor. Attend Mass, pray, especially the Rosary, go to Adoration, read Scripture and the Catechism. Perform corporal and spiritual works of mercy. And the list goes on. Think about giving. Pray about it. Come up with a plan that allows you to start with a daily effort that grows to 10% of your time, talent, and treasure given to God. With our desperate need of priests, it is especially important to pray for vocations and to contribute to the care and education of our priests and seminarians. Refusing means robbing God and, even more important, could lead to refusing the gift giver Himself. Now you know!
