You must be registered in the Parish for six months. Arrangements for the Baptism must be arranged by the parents. All sponsors should be carefully selected and must be at least 16 years of age. Non-practicing, fallen away Catholics are not eligible for sponsorship, even if they are close relatives or friends. The Sponsors are required to bring a letter of eligibility from their Church.



SACRAMENT OF MATRIMONY

Couples planning a wedding must contact the rectory six to nine months before the date.

Couples are obligated to follow Parish Policy and are required to attend the Diocese Pre-Cana Program.

Dedication of the Lateran Basilica

Scripture Reflection

The Lateran Basilica in Rome, the only church building whose dedication is celebrated as a feast, is an enduring symbol of the universal church. Inscribed on its façade is "omnium Urbis et orbis ecclasiarum mater et caput," meaning, "mother and head of all the churches of the city and the world." Originally completed in 324 CE, soon after Emperor Constantine legalized Christianity, the Lateran Basilica is a sign of the triumph of the faithful who survive underground for generations when Christians were persecuted. Although we likely are gathered in a much humbler setting today, we are nonetheless inextricably linked to this historic church—our mother church.

What I would like you to PRAY ABOUT:

Jesus helps us to understand the meaning of the word of God. So often, we think we should have faith tat what Scripture reveals is true. In today's gospel, we see that the disciples come to believe in the Scriptures because they see, in Jesus, the meaning and fulfillment of God's word. It can be so with us. We can believe in what we hear and read in God's word because we know the Word of God in Christ.

Thoughts from Deacon Bill:

Let's assume you were just told you have 24 hours to live. What would you do? How might your priorities change? Would you call anyone to tell them how much you love them? How would the next 24 hours differ from



your earlier life? You might start with a prayer, but I'll bet you then hug your mother and father if you were blessed to still have them. You'd probably tell your spouse you love them, and you would want to be with your children and grandchildren. All good and proper things, right? But what if you haven't spoken to your former best friend in years, would you call him or her? What if you saw someone in desperate need? Would you try to help? Would you offer help to someone struggling? Would you change whatever was left of your life? I'm only asking because none of us will ever know when we will leave this world. If you know of things you would change if the end was near, change them right now. Call your parents. Tell your spouse you are still in love. Give someone in need your ear and your smile. Now listen, you probably won't die tomorrow, but death is inevitable. Be the kind of person God created you to be... and don't wait until tomorrow. BEGIN TODAY!

Now You Know.... From the PLC

<u>During the Consecration at Mass the priest says, "do this in memory of me." What does that mean?</u>

Each Mass is not a separate sacrifice. The once-for-all and perfect sacrifice of Christ on the Cross is made present each and every Mass. The sacrifice on Calvary reaches through time and touches us with its grace and power. While the crucifixion occurred at a point in history, it transcends time. It reaches back to those born centuries before, who awaited the savior. It also reaches forward in time to us. A more literal translation of "do this in memory of me," is "do this as a remembrance of me." The Greek word, anamnesis, is used here to mean memory, remembrance, or memorial. Theologians emphasize that this word does not refer to the mere recollection of an event that happened to other people. Rather, it refers to entering into past events that are made present to us. We are not recalling past events such as the Last Supper or Christ's Death and Resurrection. Instead, these events, that took place once, are made present to us. When Jesus says, "This is my body, which will be given for you. ... This is my blood, that will be poured out for you," (cf. Luke 22:19-20), the Greek verbs are present passive participles. So, these actions are literally being done now; they are not repeated. We are drawn into that once-for-all moment, the eternal now of God, where these acts of Christ are made present. His body is being given now, His blood is being poured out now. We need to be active participants. Now you know!
