You must be registered in the Parish for six months. Arrangements for the Baptism must be arranged by the parents. All sponsors should be carefully selected and must be at least 16 years of age. Non-practicing, fallen away Catholics are not eligible for sponsorship, even if they are close relatives or friends. The Sponsors are required to bring a letter of eligibility from their Church.



#### SACRAMENT OF MATRIMONY

Couples planning a wedding must con-tact the rectory six to nine months before the date Couples are obligated to follow Parish Policy and are required to attend the Diocese Pre-Cana Program.

## 16th Sunday in Ordinary Time

## **Scripture Reflection**

We do not know when, where, or how our Lord will come to us. He could appear as a stranger, as someone in need whom we have never met before. Or maybe we'll encounter Jesus in a dream, while in deep reflection, or in prayer. We are assured of encountering him here and now in a number of ways: as an assembly gathered in his name, in the priest celebrating Mass, in each other, and certainly in the Eucharist, when we receive his Body and Blood. Our readings today remind us that the Lord comes in many ways and we are called to always respond with attention and kindness.

## Martha in Charge

An ancient custom of hospitality in England told that when a sovereign came to your house, for the time the King and Queen are there, the house was no longer yours – but theirs. They were your hosts, even under your own roof.

That may be hard for us to understand, but it illustrates the point of today's gospel. Mary understood their hospitality was little compared to what Jesus had to give them. The Marthas of this world find it difficult to be receivers. While giving is often valued over receiving, accepting from others can be far more challenging. It makes one beholden to the giver, it cuts away autonomy, and it can make one feel dependent.

Try to give someone something and they will insist on returning something to you, not because they like you, but because they want things to be "even'. They don't want to be obligated. Giving is power; receiving implies need and weakness. You and I give not necessarily because we are generous, but because it gives us power.

The Marthas of the world are so busy doing good and necessary things, so occupied in giving that they do not have time to realize how frequently and deeply they themselves stand in need.

The story of Martha and Mary is a parable about the blessings of both giving and receiving, of realizing that others have much to give us and that we are blessed in their generosity. The "better part" that Jesus speaks of is the humility to receive, with gratitude and grace, the peace and healing that Jesus extends to us and others. Martha may be a model of hospitality—but Mary mirrors the Christ-like generosity of being able to receive, to surrender her own need to be in control, to put aside the work in which we often find our identity in order to be the "guest" of Christ the "host".



St. Ann's Novena is no doubt on of the most famous novenas in our area, attracting thousands of pilgrims each year, all seeking something through the intercession of the grandmother of Jesus – St. Ann. As a child, I remember going with my parents. It was such a solemn trip. In 1905, the Passionist Priests built their Monastery on a 10-acre site on the highest point of the city. They named it in honor of St. Ann, placing its care and destiny in her care. In August 1911, a sudden subsidence of the coal mines beneath the Monastery seriously damaged the building. The Passionists turned to St. Ann. Within a week the slide stopped. In 1913, another immense slide threatened. The mining engineers were powerless and were afraid the slide would carry away the entire hill. Again, they prayed. Miraculously, two huge boulders rolled beneath the Monastery and stopped the sliding. Never again did any subsidence reoccur. Interestingly, in the Middle Ages, Good St. Ann was known as the patroness of coal miners. In 1905, the laity asked the Passionists if they could join them in their devotions to St. Ann. By 1924, the St. Ann Monastery Church was built. Thousands express gratitude for the favors received. This is the  $100^{th}$  year – and it's just as strong as ever. Last year, over 50,000 attended. Some walked from Pittston for eight miles to go to confession, attend Mass, and pray. Many childless couples come to the novena, some for years, seeking St. Ann's help. I personally know a couple from Sugar Notch whose prayers were answered for their daughter. She was one of many "St. Ann's Babies". On the arch of the Basilica and National Shrine to St. Ann are these words: "Through the intercession of St. Ann, may God bless you in every way." This prayer has definitely been answered. St. Ann, pray for us.
