SACRAMENT OF BAPTISM

You must be registered in the Parish for six months. Arrangements for the Baptism must be arranged by the parents. All sponsors should be carefully selected and must be at least 16 years of age. Non-practicing, fallen away Catholics are not eligible for sponsorship, even if they are close relatives or friends. The Sponsors are required to bring a letter of eligibility from their Church.



SACRAMENT OF MATRIMONY

Couples planning a wedding must contact the rectory six to nine months before the date.

Couples are obligated to follow Parish Policy and are required to attend the Diocese Pre-Cana Program.

Scripture Reflection

The Kingship of Jesus Christ has been affirmed going back to when Jesus was called the Messiah, but the actual feast was only added to the liturgical calendar one hundred years ago, in 1925. In the wake of World War I, history's first truly global war, Pope Pius XI created the feast as the antithesis of the divisive nationalism that led men to take up arms against their brothers, as well as an antidote to the growing secularism that denied the world's unity under God. One hundred years later and nearly two thousand years after Jesus began his public ministry, we still recognize his kingship over all the earth.

What I would like you to PRAY ABOUT:

Today's Gospel definitively contrasts the power of imperial Rome, which allowed no challenges to its rule, and the "kingly" ways of Jesus that rest on **forgiveness** and **love**. Even as it appears the former may win out, the Gospel makes it very clear that Jesus' merciful rule cannot be extinguished by death. Even as he is mocked and taunted in his dying moments, Jesus continues to exercise the power of forgiveness both toward his executioners and toward one of the criminals who acknowledges his form of power and asks to be welcomed into Jesus' heavenly Kingdom.

Thoughts from Deacon Bill:

When my now college student grand-daughter was a little girl, she was visiting with us during the Christmas Season. We were playing Christmas carols and "Feliz Navidad" was a frequent flyer. After she returned home,



her mom (and our daughter) called to ask if we could think of any reason why our granddaughter was singing "Fleas on the Dog" over and over again. I lied. I never told her I just might have had "something to do with it." Sometimes we THINK we hear things and never question anything. In my younger days, I learned to question EVERYTHING. It wasn't because I disagreed with something - it was because I wanted to UNDERSTAND everything I could. Please don't ever think you are a less a follower of Jesus if you have doubts or just don't understand something. My first spiritual director was the late MSGR. Bill Ward. He told me if I was distracted in prayer to pursue the distraction because it just might be God leading you to a spiritual surprise. So too with doubt. Pyrsue your questions and concerns. They just might lead you to a deeper understanding of what it really mreans to be a Catholic Christian. Your Fleas on the Dog just might become Feliz Navidad.

Now You Know.... From the PLC

Why do we do that?

After the Gospel introduction, "A reading from the Holy Gospel according to (Name), we respond, "Glory to you, O Lord". After that response, not during it, we make the sign of the cross on our forehead, lips, and heart, saying quietly, "May the Lord be on my mind, on my lips, and in my heart."

Why do we do that?

A bow is a sign of reverence. There are two kinds, a bow of the head and a bow of the body (profound bow at the waist). A head bow is made just prior to receiving Holy Communion. It is also made when the Three Divine Persons are named together, and at the names of Jesus, of the Blessed Virgin Mary, and of the Saint in whose honor Mass is being celebrated. A profound bow is made by Lectors entering and leaving the Sanctuary, by the Deacon when obtaining the blessing before the Gospel, and by all during the Creed at the words of the Incarnation.

Why do we do that?

A genuflection (right knee) is a greater sign of reverence. We genuflect to the tabernacle as we enter pews. If the tabernacle is in the Sanctuary, the priest and ministers genuflect (if able) when they approach the Altar and when they depart from it. If the tabernacle is not in the Sanctuary, then all ministers make a profound bow. In either case, the ministers carrying items such as the cross, candles, etc., make a head bow only. There are no genuflections to the tabernacle during Mass, except the minister genuflects upon opening and again prior to closing it. While celebrating Mass, the priest does make several profound bows and genuflections, but all are to the Altar. Now you know!
