## A Note From Pete Elliott

After visiting several hotels and several weeks of negotiation with the Sheraton and with Armed Forces Reunions, a contract was signed and arrangements have been made at the Four Points Sheraton in San Antonio for our reunion which will be held from September 13 – 15, 2001. Armed Forces Reunions, Inc., will again handle our reunion and forms will be published in this Newsletter early next year to make your reservations. The hotel room rate is \$92 per night, single or double, plus tax. If the tax rate is as today, the daily rate will be \$107.41 per night. Hotel parking will be \$5 per day for self-parking and airport transportation is currently

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offered for \$8 per person each way. There are a number of excellent tours available and these will be announced in a future Newsletter.

One of my fondest memories is a little poem that someone wrote to commemorate Christmas in Korea for us to send to our loved ones back home: Christmas Greetings from Korea/Land of Lice and Diarrhea/From the Murky Shores That we've Half Mastered/Merry Christmas, You Lucky Bastard..... from **Ron Landrum**: Thanks for sending the copy of the Seabee

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Newsletter. I had wondered if there was some support needed by some of the info **Pat Morris** sent me when I contacted him on the Internet. I am enclosing dues

[thank you] plus some extra for a copy of the membership roster..... from John Wilborn: Enclosed is a check for two cruise books and some extra for whatever. [thanks] Best regards and thanks for all you do for the men..... received dues from Albert Rubinich, R.F. Sonnen, Ordean Johnson, Alexander Bishop, Robert Schanbron, Conrad Lawlor, and Glenn Sisco [thanks, guys]...... from Antonio Yri**zarry**: I am writing just to say hello and at the same time I am sending my dues. By May 16, my son-inlaw and I are going to Las Vegas to visit an elderly sister living there and at the same time having some fun playing the One-Arm Bandit. [great! From there to MCB 62 and two tours in Vietnam where we adopted two girls in 1968 and 1969. They are all grown now and we have 17 grandchildren. I retired in 1973 and finished college. I taught high school for a while then entered the Christian ministry. Last summer a few of us from the Good News Gang in Cubi Point got together in Colorado. We hadn't seen each other in 46 years. Not sure if we can make it to San Antonio or not. [sure hope so. You'll see a lot more old buddies.] ...... from **Joe Zeren**: Here is a check for dues and a roster [thanks]. He had such a good time with all of you. I am sorry we will


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include most or all of the notes you send. Keep those cards and letters coming.


Subic Bay Naval Base in the Philippines is a major facility for the US 7th Fleet in the western Pacific




'Jungle Skippers' Debark at Atsugi Airport

















Subic Bay – 1952 – 1954





## Frank J. Iafrate, 81, Died. Designed Seabee Logo And Coined the Name

It was Mr. Iafrate who coined the name "Seabee" for a corps of Navy engineers and laborers who built the bunkers, docks and airports crucial to the defeat of Japan in World War II. And it was Mr. Iafrate who created the Seabee insignia – a fierce-looking bee toting a machine gun and a slew of construction tools.


The Seabee mascot would travel all the way to the Mediterranean, the invasion of Normandy, and the Pacific Ocean, which became a symbol of the pride of the Marine builders, and it would earn a prominent post at the entrance to Davisville, RI, the North Kingstown base where the Seabees were born.

Mr. Iafrate, 81, died Thursday, March 30, 2000, at his home in North Providence, RI.


It took Mr. Iafrate just a few hours in January 1942 to design a logo that would outlast him. At age 22, he dropped out of the Rhode Island School of Design, failed to get a job with the Walt Disney Company and had grown tired of drawing caricatures at area nightclubs, so he took a job as an engineering clerk at Camp Endicott in Davisville. There, his drawing skills caught the attention of an officer who had taken charge of 250 men handpicked to form what was originally given the uninspiring name "Construction Battalion of the Navy." The officer asked him to rename the group and create a logo. "About a day later," he said in an interview, "I thought of a bee. It works all day, it doesn't bother you but if you bother it, it has a way of stinging you. I put a Navy hat on him, gave him a submachine gun to show fighting ability, and some tools in his other arms to show construction ability."

Mr. Iafrate never made a dime off his creation but, as a civilian, he received the Distinguished Service Award from the Navy. He later enlisted and served in the Seabees.






