I have been very busy 'piping'. On May 14 & 15, our pipe band, the Cleveland Police Pipes & Drums, took part in the National Police memorial Services in Washington, D.C. On the 18th & 19th, we held our Memorial Service and annual tattoo in Cleveland. We had bands from New York, New Jersey, Chicago, and Canada. Over 200 pipers in one place! On May 28, I soloed at the tomb of President Garfield at Lakeview Cemetery in Cleveland for a Veterans Memorial Service held by a joint group of veterans from all armed services and representatives from all wars and conflicts, from the Revolutionary War to the present.

I see that Danny Terry is the only one who has been found with an address. I think Warren G. Price was from Kake, Alaska, and Wayne Lampshire was from Nebraska. Really not much help. nois, North (Fox Lake, Ill), and retired from the Post Office as Postmaster after 34 years.... from **William (Bill) Alwine**: I want to thank you for the back issues of the

Newsletters. I didn't know of these units getting together for a reunion. It was a surprise to me. I saw some names that I think I remember. It has been a long time and age is telling on me. [ha! Aren't we all!] Hoping to make it to San Antonio this September. I'll do my best. Sending some dues to help [thanks].... from Erv Lampe: First of all, I want to let you know that my wife and I are reserved at the hotel in San Antonio and we have our reservations at the various events. Secondly, I have really been remiss in not letting you know how much I truly enjoy receiving your e-mail messages, comments, cartoons, etc. They really are great. Please keep them coming. I received my copy of the MCB 2 Newsletter today and, as always, enjoyed reading it from cover to cover. However, I must clarify some comments made by Mr. Bill Ganske. I was never his boss. I may have offered some directions, but he couldn't follow them if you hung a sign around his neck. (my apologies, Bill.) If I had Bill's e-mail address I would send this to him direct. [sorry, but no e-mail address] Lastly, I ordered and received a Seabee mug from **Bud Smith** and it is really great. I urge everyone who might want a really nice Seabee remembrance to get one, too. I will have my name etched in the bottom at the reunion. "Hands off."..... from William (Bill) Alwine: I enlisted in the Navy in 1944 and spent my boot camp at The Great lakes, only 6 weeks, a young country boy wanting to see the world. I was sent to Opalocka, Florida, to the crash crew, driving an ambulance. Something new to me. After a short time, I was sent TAD to Fort Pierce, Florida, for



training as a Frogman. Then to Jacksonville FFT to 104th NCB, Coronado, California, and some more training on the beach in the sand. I really liked that. The war was ending and men were going



home. Some time in 1946, the battalion broke up and some other men and I had orders to CBD 1509 at Kwajalein, Marshall Islands. I drove truck and equipment and worked on

some of the other islands in the Marshalls and the Marianas on the bomb tests. In November 1948, my enlistment was up and I re-enlisted and received orders to the 103rd NCB on Guam. Worked in transportation, drove bus and manhaul for some time. In late 1950 or early 1951, I was sent to 124th NCB, Adak, Alaska. I did everything I could to get out of Adak except go over the hill. I hated that station. I finally got orders out of there to CBD 1804 in Korea. I rode an ammo ship to Pusan and then to CBMU 1 at K-3 in Pohang. I operated a dozer and Super C scrapers in the river bottom. We called them Widow Makers. I was there for a long time. In 1952 or 1953, I went to Atsugi, Japan. I believe it was CBMU 101. After that job was complete, I went to Iwakuni with CBMU 101. I operated a Northwest 6 shovel off the base loading fill for the air field and filling the hopper for the asphalt plant. I got married in 1954 to a lady I met a long time before. I had a daughter born in the hospital there. Late in 1955, I received orders to Subic, either MCB 3 or MCB 5, I don't remember. I operated a scraper and was only there for a short time. I went on shore duty at Port Hueneme with the Operation Division and spent two years there. Then, I received orders to MCB 5. Guess where we went?! Adak, Alaska. I love that place! I was only there about three or four months and then received orders to Beachmaster Unit 1, West Pac, Camp McGill, Japan. I was able to take my family with me. I think this was in 1956. I spent $3\frac{1}{2}$ years there. My son was born in Yokuska, Japan, in 1957. I was on Operation all of the time with Marine shore party.



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We were in Viet Nam, Cambodia, Thailand, Korea, and Taiwan. I think I rode every LST and LSD in the Pacific Fleet, living out of a seabag and on the beach on sea rations. In 1958 or 1959, I went back to Port Hueneme where my

(Continued from page 4) youngest daughter was born in 1960. In 1961, I went back to MCB 5 and on to Okinawa for some time. This has been so many years ago, I think I'm get-

ting old. Next, I went to Navscon to B school. Then I received orders to Davisville, Rhode Island, to the re-commissioning of MCB 71. I think this was in 1965. We went to Chu Lai and Da Nang and worked in the rock quarry. After one deployment to Port Hueneme on the Battalion SOAP TEAM, then to Viet Nam again to Chu Lai and TET '68, went up north to Hue for a short time and we got run out of there. After two trips to Viet Nam, I stayed in Davisville in MCB 71 Det. Zulu, to help build a dry dock. In 1969, I went to IT school at San Diego FFT to Port Hueneme Navscon A school as an Instructor. I was no classroom instructor, as I soon found out. In March 1971, I took my retirement. What a change this was for me. I was very happy to get out, but sad to leave all the friends I had served with. I have met and served with some great men in my life and will never forget them. I made my home in eastern Oregon and worked out of the union hall Local 701 in construction and in the winter worked in the woods loading logs. In 1991, I retired and took my Social Security and relaxed making furniture in my shop. My wife became ill in 1993 and I took care of her until she passed away in 1998. I just travel some now, spending my winters in Southern Texas in the Rio Grande Valley like all the other snowbirds. I spend the summers with my children in Idaho and Oregon and visiting friends. 

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

WHERE BEES SWARM is a novel about the Seabees in Vietnam, whose motto is, "We Build, We Fight." The setting is the I Corps of South Vietnam, where, Marines are the primary fighting force and Navy Seabees are the construction force who build what

the combat forces need.

The central character, Bill Dawson, is a Navy Civil Engineer Corps lieutenant. The story highlights problems Seabees have building forward combat bases for the Marines and Green Berets, which entails building all of the living and working facilities found in a small city. The Seabees accomplish their work with fighting as a constant backdrop. Snipers, constant shelling, and mined roads take their toll of minds and men. They accomplish great feats of construction, and at times fail because of the exigencies of war, lack of materiel, or a change in tactical situation. Descriptive beauty of the countryside is interwoven with war and construction work as scenes flow from sea to rice paddies, from jungle to mountain terrain.

Dawson learns about battle fatigue, he finds out that it's not just a "chicken way out." He experiences the uncontrollable fear war can instill in a man. For a while fear makes it almost impossible for him to do his job. He has to force himself to go back into the "hot" areas time after time. Then, with the help of Lati, a Vietnamese woman, he discovers a hidden reservoir of courage and faith that helps him overcome the pervasive fear and enables him to keep going
