It is situated on the edge of the Great Northern Shopping Center, which is one of the largest in this area. There are many restaurants, shops, etc., within walking distance. Price-wise, we are looking at a rate of \$79.00 to \$83.00 per day, plus a 14% bed tax. Shuttle service is available to and from the airport (10 minutes) and the shopping center.

Their banquet facility can not hold more than 150 persons. No problem!! I have been in contact with The Springvale Country Club and Golf Course for the banquet, which is 1 mile from the Radisson. It can hold 375 max and our price range is about \$25.00 per person. WE WILL GET YOU THERE AND BACK.

I will be setting up the tours thru a contact I have.

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They will be announced at a later date, along with dates, times, prices etc.

I do need to know if you are planning to come to the reunion, how many you are bringing with you and if you are driving.

At the present time, the Radisson can only hold 110 to 120 rooms for us. If there is an overflow, you will be booked into a motel within walking distance. All rooms at the Radisson will be on a first come basis. PLEASE DO NOT MAKE ANY RESERVATIONS NOW. I will let you know when to make them.

History of CBMU 577 From Verle Williams MM 3/C

October 1, 1943:

Arrived at Camp Peary, VA, for boot training in platoon 9318, Area D-11, Barracks No. 121. Our instructor, C. F. Wilkinson, GM 1/C was a Marine combat veteran from the South Pacific.

November 1, 1943:

Our advanced training began in the newly formed 21st Super Battalion at Camp Peary. I was in Co. D, Platoon 3.

November 30-December 9, 1943: Our ten days leave home.

December 10, 1943:

Arrived back at Camp Peary, VA, and moved to Area B-6. This 21st Super Battalion was separated into four companies as follows:

> CBMU 574, Co. A CBMU 575, Co. B CBMU 576, Co. C CBMU 577, Co. D

December 20, 1943:

CBMU 574, CBMU 575, CBMU 576, and CBMU 577 departed together by troop train from Camp Peary, VA.

December 27, 1943:

CBMU 574, CBMU 575, CBMU 576, and CBMU 577 arrived at Camp Rousseau, Port Hueneme, CA, for further advanced training.

January 23, 1944:

CBMU 576 departed Camp Rousseau to serve at Attu, AK, and merged with NCB 138.

February 24, 1944:

CBMU 575, CBMU 577 and CBMU 549 departed Camp Rousseau, Port Hueneme, CA, together on a new troop transport, *USS General Brooks*, and arrived at Pearl Harbor, HI, on March 1, 1944. (Note: CBMU 549 helped in the making of the movie *The Fighting Sea*- bees prior to leaving Camp Rousseau.)

March 1, 1944:

CBMU 575 was assigned to the Naval Air Station at Puunene, Maui, HI.

March 2, 1944:

CBMU 577 and CBMU 549 departed Pearl Harbor in a convoy of three Liberty ships along with two destroyer escorts. Our ship, the USS Kenmore, was the flagship.

March 11, 1944:

CBMU 577 and CBMU 549 arrived at Tarawa atoll in the Gilbert Islands.

(Approximately two days before arrival, The USS Kenmore came close to being torpedoed by a Jap sub off our port side with one of our destroyer escorts in pursuit.) CBMU 549 was assigned to serve at *Hawkins Field* on Betio Island. CBMU 577 was assigned to serve at *Mullinnix Field* on Bota Island twenty miles distant. From here, the Seventh US Air Force B-25 Billy Mitchell bombers were making bomber raids in the Marshall Islands as well as on Truk and Ponape in the Central Pacific.

March 13, 1944:

CBMU 574 departed Camp Rousseau, Port Hueneme, CA. Arrived at Pearl Harbor on March 21, 1944. Assigned to the Naval Air Station at Pearl Harbor.

October 28, 1944:

The main group of CBMU 577 departed Tarawa for Enewetak in the Marshall Islands. I was one of approximately 75 under the direction of our Ensign, John H. Stewart, to remain at *Mullinnix Field* to dismantle certain facilities for shipment. We were temporarily assigned to CBMU 549 on Betio Island.

February 1, 1945:

Having finished our assignment, all remaining 75 men of CBMU 577, along with our heavy equipment, boarded the Liberty ship

USS John H. McClintok and departed Tarawa to rejoin CBMU 577 at Enewetak, arriving there on February 8, 1945.

February 24, 1945:

The officers of CBMU 577 held an anniversary party with a large decorated cake for CBMU 577, celebrating one year of duty outside the United States. A photo was taken of our commander, Lt. Arrasmith, cutting the cake.

October 27, 1945:

Being one of the group eligible to leave CBMU 577 to return to the US, we boarded the USS Hollandia, a small aircraft carrier, and departed Enewetak for the thirteen-day trip to San Francisco, CA. CBMU 577 was still on duty at Enewetak at this date.
