

I put quite a few miles on myself and my pickup. The last two months I have attended six funerals scattered from California to Kansas to Arkansas and here in Texas. All but one was old folks., so I guess we have to expect that. I was reading your schedule for the reunion in September and, for me, it doesn't offer too much. Being 70 years old and Rock and Roll isn't my music [you don't have to dance, Arky! Just be there! And football wasn't played where I went to school, then me going in the military at barely seventeen, I never got interested in football. And a 120 mile round trip bus ride just doesn't turn me on. So, that only leaves the Saturday banquet and the evening dinner and dance on a boat. Leaving the hotel at 7:00 p.m. and back at the hotel at 10:00 p.m. doesn't sound like much of a boat ride. I will wait until I hear from my CBMU #1 buddies before I decide, but I may not attend. We are helping to raise funds for the Salvation Army's Children's Home. I'm 79 now, but still doing some construction work at home in Rockford, IL. Since the winters are tough, this is a good project for some wonderful children. I was a member of the 74th Seabees from the beginning at Tarawa in the Marshall Islands, then to Okinawa. I remember working on the Yonabru Air Field. It was a huge job, combining four battalions. But in November or December 1945, we left for Seattle. I was never sure if Yonabru Field was ever completed. Since my notice in the Legion Magazine, I have received many wonderful letters detailing the Yonabru story. Did you know that the B29 that bombed Nagasaki came back and landed at Yonabru Field? Also, a Seabee sent me a map of Okinawa showing the location of over 30 Seabee Battalions [I have located 47!]. We were building supply bases all over the Island, plus constructing this huge airport. I can remember during the Spring or Summer of 1945 and going to the top of a large mountain to help build a temporary wooden platform, then listening to a group of Seabee commanders discussing the construction of Yonabru Field. They said, "We'll have to work 24 hours a day, move thousands of yards of dirt down into the valley, and get this airport ready for some new, large airplanes now being built in the US." I also remember listening to the World Series on the radio where Detroit beat the Cubs in 7 games. After that, in a month or so, we left Okinawa. Many of you have been wonderful to fill in the gaps. If President Truman had not given permission for the atomic bomb, Okinawa would



have been the main base for bombing runs to Japan, and Yonabru Field would have been a very busy and critical airport. Several Seabees have told me that the airport

is still very active. I was just 19 years old when joining the 74th NCB and worked my way up to Carpenter's Mate II, but being in the Seabees was a great experience. Most of the older men in our battalion had been construction foremen, superintendents, and engineers. They were very kind and supportive to us younger fellows. It was a great 3-year experience and I will always treasure it. After the war, I came home and married my high school sweetheart. We have six children (all married to their same mates) and 27 grandchildren. I attended Bradley University for two years and became acquainted with R.G. LeTourneau. His life and strong faith in God has inspired me ever since. Wayne Heple suggested I write to you re: Yonabru Field. I'm receiving info from many old timers and maybe some of your members can help also. Thank you...... from John Wilborn: [sent a check to help offset expenses. Thanks, John.]...... from Ben Balog: Please send me three US flags [on the way, Ben]..... from Ivan Majetic: Here's a check for my dues [thanks] plus extra for a current roster [on the way, Ivan]..... from Robert Coley: Enclosed is my check for dues [thanks] and please send me a CBMU 101 roster [on the way]. Keep the extra for postage or whatever [thanks again].... from Fred Cozad: Hope I'm not too late to stay on the Good Guy List [never! You're still a Good Guy and thanks]. I enjoy the Newsletter too much to not get it, even one time.
