went well as usual. I didn't know if you had made a note that **Jon Ericson** had passed away. I would appreciate it very much if he would be in the next Newslet-



A Boot Camp Story

from Rex Roark

At Great Lakes Recruit Training Center, we were a special unit: The State Flag Unit and our sister company was the Band and Choir. Although dress uniforms were done at a real laundry, you were expected to wash your utility uniforms by hand each day using two of the four sets you were issued, one which you would wear and the other would be drying. Each floor had a laundry room that served two recruit companies. To wash the clothes, you were issued a scrub brush, a box of detergent, and a bucket when you joined. You filled your bucket with soapy water, soaked your clothes and then scrubbed them on a long sink, rinsed them out, wrung them by hand and hung them in a steam drying room or outside in good weather.


Of all the groups assigned to special units like the drill team, academy prep, and musicians, the State Flag unit seemed to lack the esteem that the others had and we were considered instigators. We were popular and spent every weekend in Chicago or Green Bay marching in parades.

Staying true to form in our tenth week of boot camp, as we were doing laundry someone filled a bucket and went down to the next floor and soaked several of the Academy Prep recruits as they did their laundry. Several of their people retaliated and soaked some people in our laundry room. Things escalated quickly and we filled every bucket in the laundry room with warm soapy water. Five of our people ran down the stairs and soaked their people again as the rest of us waited at the top of the stairs. Ten people or so ran up the stairs and they were met with a deluge of water from 50 pails and literally washed down the stairway. We refilled the buckets and stood by for another attack and, when we heard more footsteps running up the stairs, we threw the water down the stairs. Unfortunately, it was not the company below. It was the Officer of the Deck, several Company Commanders and the barracks Master at Arms force. These were not happy people. They were wet, their quarterdeck was wet, and they were not used to being treated in this manner.


The company commanders were called in from home and the Chief's club and we were read the riot act. In our favor was the fact there were 250 people involved in the melee and, rather than tie up the Navy's Judicial system for a month, we cleaned, we exercised, we were yelled at and, worst of all, threatened with being sent back all the way to day one to start all over again. We convinced everyone that we were truly repentant and avoided becoming a six month boot camp company. We were probably legends well into the 1980's. heh heh.

Minutes

of the

General Membership Meeting October 12, 2005

Palace Station Hotel, Meeting Room A Las Vegas, NV

Meeting brought to order by Cdr. Pete Elliott at 9:07 a.m. Pledge of Allegiance led by Cdr. Elliott Opening prayer led by Chaplain Scott Williams

Cdr. Elliott welcomed all members and guests.

Cdr. Elliott recognized all Staff members present. Joe DeFranco, David Haines and Malcolm Pearson were not present.

Cdr. Elliott asked for a financial report from the treasurer, Scott Williams.

Scott Williams told all that we are solvent and all bills have been paid except for this reunion. We will close after the reunion with over \$3,000 in the black. We have met and exceeded our museum pledge of \$10,000. As of September 30, our total accounted for the Museum is \$11,090.41. Scott asked if there were any questions regarding the current financial affairs of the MCB 2 Reunion Association and there were none.

Cdr. Elliott announced that the Executive Committee recommends St. Louis, MO, as our next meeting in 2007 and asked if there were any motions from the floor. There was some discussion about Oklahoma City, OK, and Branson, MO. Branson is very difficult to get to unless you drive there. One member suggested we meet in Niagara Falls, NY. A question was asked about Port Hueneme but access is currently a problem. Comments made suggested that either Port Hueneme or Portland be considered in four years. A motion was made to make St. Louis, MO, our next reunion by Mike Piro, seconded by John Petronka. The vote to hold our next reunion in St. Louis was unanimous in favor. Motion carried.

Cdr. Elliott announced that all present officers are willing to continue serving in office and asked for nominations from the floor or a motion. A motion was made by Mike Piro to continue with the present officers, seconded by John Petronka. The vote was unanimous in favor. Motion carried. The officers for 2005/2007 are Pete Elliott, Commander; Roy Peak, Vice-Commander; Scott Williams, Secretary/Treasurer/Newsletter Editor and Publisher.

John Petronka noted that our dues are currently set at \$20 per year but that, when the pledge to the museum has been met, all of the dues will stay within the MCB 2 Association. This is correct as that was the original motion in Charleston, SC. John also made a motion that the Reunion Association should cover any expenses necessary for the committee to hold our next meeting in St. Louis. All members agreed but there was no second to the motion

A question was asked about money being given to the NSVA Scholarship Fund should the MCB 2 Reunion Association dissolve. Scott Williams replied that when MCB 2 filed papers to incorporate, one of the requirements is that, upon dissolution of the corporation, a distribution of remaining funds must be designated to be given to a non-profit organization. Discussion followed to change our final distribution to the Museum Project. Roy Peak made a motion that our Articles of Incorporation be changed to reflect this change, seconded by Amos Phillips. The vote to make this change was unanimous in favor. Motion carried; however, some members requested this matter be brought to the table at our General Business Meeting in St. Louis, which will be done. The change to our Articles of Incorporation will be postponed until after the meeting vote in St. Louis.

Rex Roark asked the membership for a showing of support in recognition of the work for our organization by Scott Williams. All members present gave a standing ovation. Pete Elliott noted that he had made an effort to have a plaque made by the person that has made our plaques in the past but he has moved and no forwarding address is available. Rex Roark made a motion that an award plaque be presented to Scott by the Association and all members present approved.

Amos Phillips noted that telephone calls are very reasonable using calling cards and suggested that we call our buddies as often as possible, especially those that are having medical problems.

Scott Williams announced that there will be a professional photographer set up at the banquet.

Cdr. Elliott asked if there were any additional comments or suggestions from the membership. No additional comments were made.

Meeting adjourned at 10:01 a.m.
