

Dispatcher: Nine-one-one. What is your emergency? Caller: Someone broke into my house and took a bite out of my ham and cheese sandwich.


Dispatcher: Excuse me?

If you lived in Nevada like me, you could have a license plate like this [Of course, this picture is black and white but the actual plate is in full true color]. Our local Seabee veterans tried to get a separate Seabee license plate but we needed 250 signatures of Seabees that would purchase these special plates. Well, of course, there aren't that many Seabees in Nevada let alone that many that would buy the special plate. So, one of our members contacted a friend that was a leader in the State Legislature and got a bill passed that would allow unit designation on the right side of the plate. (The left side of the plate is the branch seal: Army, Navy, Air Force, Marine.) I then contacted the Nevada Department of Motor Vehicles to get the Seabee logo on the veteran plate. After much correspondence and emails, they said they would consider our logo if Nevada DMV was given permission to use it by the Secretary of the Navy. I contacted Bill Hilderbrand in Gulfport and the next day I was contacted by the Nevada DMV that they had received permission for the Seabee logo to be used on the license plate. It took another few months for the plate to go through design and approval stages and, finally, in 2001 the plate was approved. Since I had worked with the DMV to get the plate approved, they sent me the first one, number 1600. Since then, there have been over 100 Seabee license plates issued and recently I have seen an Army Airborne plate that has been issued. Way to go, Nevada! Maybe you can get a special Seabee veteran plate in your state. It's a lot of effort but the rewards are great! Scott Williams




