I noticed there were pictures of the Seabee Supply and CBD 1804 Administration Buildings and the huts we lived in. It brought back a lot of memories. Gladys seems to be doing a little better each day. As for myself, I am doing okay for an 81-year-old codger. I am enclosing some information about my good friend Charley Neugent. His first duty station with the Seabees was as a student at the Naval Construction Center at Port Hueneme. His last duty station was as Commanding Officer at the Naval Schools Construction Center at Port Hueneme. Charley completed thirty years in the Navy as a Seabee in January 1978. In 1947, after Charley completed the Class "A" Electricians School at Port Hueneme, he was the top man in his class and was offered a school at the Army Signal Corps school at Fort Monmouth, New Jersey. He completed that school and was ordered to NCB 103 on Guam. I first met Charley when he was a Construction Electrician striker at Truk in the Caroline Islands. Charley came down from NCB 103 to rebuild the telephone system on the island and completed that project with flying colors. He was appointed to Warrant Officer in 1956 and received his commission as Chief Warrant Officer Two in 1959. He was promoted to Commander in 1970. **Charley** passed away in December 2004. He always enjoyed coming to the MCB 2 reunions and was very proud of his



association with MCB 2. 

Subic bay 1953: Stan Dauer on right, (Looks like Rudy Rios on left but may not be.)




Mel Lattain, Subic Bay, 1953. From Stan Dauer


U.S. Navy Releases Al Qaeda Terrorist - I can't believe it!!!!!

The USPS has a program for military family members and friends to supply them with packaging materials to send packages to troops overseas. If you call 1-800-610-8734 and select option # 1, Ask them for the "Military pack" they will send you boxes, tape, packaging materials and labels. They will also give you an I.D. number so if your supply runs low, you just call them up and they'll send you more supplies. The materials take about four to ten days to receive. I Don't know if any of you have mailed any packages lately, but if you go to mail box etc., they will charge you for the box, tape, peanuts, labels and everything else the can think After a while, those charges of! start to add up!

I remember the time in Haversack I found a big pocket of clay in an earth cut and nearby was a 20' length of a 2" pipe. I jammed one end of the pipe into the clay, solidly plugging that end. Then, I found a saw horse and propped the pipe across it pointing it toward the unoccupied jungle. Next, I got a fivegallon bucket of gas and poured it into the pipe, took a ball of the clay and pushed it in the other, upper end of the pipe that is now full of gas. When I put the clay plug in the upper end, I also put in a string which I pulled out after the ball of clay was firmly in place, which made a tiny breathing hole. Now, I found some wood that was lying around and put it all around the lower end of the pipe and poured some of the remaining gas on it and lit the fire. The gas-soaked wood just exploded and started roaring, getting hotter and hotter. Soon, the gas inside the pipe started getting hot and fumes were coming out of the breathing hole and I lit those fumes and kept stoking the fire at the other end of the pipe getting the gas boiling inside the pipe. In just a few minutes, the gas inside the pipe was almost boiling and in an instant the pressure inside the pipe blew the clay plug out of the upper end of the pipe. The breathing hole had been spewing a flame of fumes about 12" long before the plug blew out, but when the plug blew, it lit the gas in the pipe on fire as it exited the pipe and the 2" by 20' stream of gas came blowing out like a 20' hose of fire that arced about 100 yards off into the jungle. What a sight! No explosion but the roar of gas blowing out the end of the pipe was pretty loud and made a sight to see! I don't know if anyone else saw it or knew what had happened but it was better than any flame thrower you have ever seen! John Wayne would have been proud.....

An Interview of Commander Charles L. Neugent by the staff of the Seabee Coverall newspaper, January 13, 1978, as Cdr. Neugent was retiring

Commander Charles L. Neugent, a real Seabee "mustang," will end his naval career here on January 31, 1978. A 30-year career that virtually started and ended at the same command.

Cdr. Neugent started his career here in 1947 as an enlisted man. He advanced through the ranks and was later promoted to warrant, then to limited duty officer. He was promoted to his present rank in 1970, coming to the Naval Construction Training Center, Port Hueneme, as commanding officer in May 1976. Following is an interview with Commander Neugent:

Q: Did you have intentions of getting into the Seabees when you enlisted in the Navy?

A: No. I joined the Navy as an SA (Seaman Apprentice). When I received my orders from Boot Camp, I found that I was to report to NAVSCON (Naval Schools of Construction) at Port Hueneme.

Q: Was it this same location that you reported to, that is, was it this building (the Administrative building of NCTC, better known as the White House) or was it at another location?

A: The White House was being built at about that time. Of course, the young "A" students at that time never got to go to the White House. We had OinC's (Officers in Charge) at the schools and the chain of command was very strong in those days.

Q: Did you ever suspect, at that time, that you'd go as far and stay as long as you did in the Navy?

A: I never had any idea when I was standing in ranks on the grinder looking up at the vast, inflexible, unreachable, staid hierarchy, that I'd ever be on the other side facing the men.

Q: Did you ever think of the irony of it that 30 years ago you checked into the Administration Building and now you are the man in charge and retiring from the same place where it all started? A: Well, yes. I thought about it when I got orders to relieve Captain Filbry—the idea that to spend 30

years in the Navy, all of my adult life, and to come

back and close the loop after being around the

world at various commands . . . I do think it's ironic.

Q: Could you elaborate on the differences between the Navy as you saw it then and as you feel about it now?

A: I don't think that going into the Navy in those days was much different than it is now; but in those days it was easier and you had only one choice, and that was to put complete trust and confidence in the Navy, its officers, its systems and so forth. In those days you didn't question things the way people do today. And in some ways I think that's easier because many young men really don't know what they want to be. I know that I had a few misgivings when I was assigned to the CE rating. I wasn't sure that's what I wanted to do, but in looking back on it, a better choice couldn't have been made.

Q: Were there any times when you doubted whether you wanted to stay in the Navy or not?

A: Yes. When I came in, it was on a three year enlistment. I left high school to come in the Navy, but my intention at that time was to come in the Navy and see some of the world and get out and start college. I finished high school during my first year in the Navy. At the end of the three years, I had every intention of getting out, but President Truman extended everybody on active duty for another year when the Korean business started. I got out of the Navy at four years and I stayed out for a couple of months. Then I began to recognize that as a second class petty officer. I had been given more responsibility and had developed more technical skills and knowledge than I had going for me in the civilian community. The Navy was a way of allowing you to progress faster in a technical field than you can on the outside, if you really apply yourself.

Q: Do you think there are any highs and lows in your career . . . Disasters, super accomplishments?

A: No. As I look back on it, I don't see any lows—it's all been highs.

Q: What are your plans now that you are retiring?

A: Well, I don't have any firm plans but I know where I'm going to settle down. We bought a place near Atlanta and it will provide a new interest, security for my family and give my children the opportunity of putting down roots.

Q: If you could establish a position outside of yourself, how would you describe yourself? What would you think of Commander Neugent?

A: I'd probably be a little concerned. Recalling the reaction of my secretary to the picture that came here from Rota, Spain, with my biography. I remember her describing it as "frightening."

Q: How do you view yourself as an individual? How would you describe your personality?


A: I would view myself as a classic Navy person. I'm not the kind of man to mash people when they make mistakes. A pound of flesh means nothing to me.

Q: Do you have any parting statements that you would like the members of this command to have . . . any advice?

A: Yes. I would like this command to know that this has been the most pleasant tour of my entire life. This has been the finest concentration of people that I've ever served with, and I mean the students as well, because without their interest and enthusiasm, we wouldn't have a purpose here. I love the Seabees. I grew up in the Seabees and spent all my adult life with them, but we shouldn't forget that as Seabees, we are a part of a bigger Navy. We are an important part of the Navy, but we are not independent.

Q: Do you have anything that you would like to say in closing?

A: What's on my mind right now and has been for several months is an intense satisfaction blended with nostalgia and gratitude for the opportunities offered by this nation of ours.

Verle Williams, S1/c, who sent a number of articles from a South Pacific island which are on display in the window of Dick's Haberdashery, sent the following letter to his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Ralph Williams, 123 East Harrison avenue:

"Just mailed you a letter this morning, but thought I would write another tonight. You'll never guess who I saw today! and in person, too! Bob Hope—Jerry Colonna, Frances Langford, Patty Thomas and a couple of others, I forget their names. They stopped through here this morning and put on a show for us guys.

"We had been expecting them for a few days now and they finally came. They came in about 10:15 and the show started at 10:30. It lasted for about an hour and a quarter as they put on a pretty long show for

"Boy! it sure was a good show. Just as crazy as ever. Got several pictures of the troup with my new large camera. Took the film down to get it developed today.

TWhen they drove up back of the stage the B. N. V. photographer and I had our cameras ready for action. We were standing there about four feet apart, just standing there looking for Bob Hope to pile out of a jeep and while we were looking for him he went right between us. He had on a khaki outfit with the legs cut off and wore a sun helmet and was unshaven.

"The program was broadcast to the rest of the fellows out in the central Pacific He was on his way back to the U.S., I believe.

"While he was cracking some jokes a small rat took to the light wire from the projector booth and ran all the way across it to the stage. Bob looked at it, looked again and the silliest look came across his face, like he was seeing things. He brought it to the attention of the other stars and called them out to see it. He made several wisecracks before the rat got across the wire and said, "Well, maybe you're getting ready to have a Mickey Mouse show after I'm done.

"Got their autographs and will send them home for you to keep for me.

"Well, there is not much more to write about. Went to the show last night and saw. "Miracle of Morgan's Creek" and "Yank at Eaton," with Mickey Rooney.
