

I played in the Cubi Point band and was with the group that put on the road show at Clark Air Force Base, at Cubi Point,



Sangley Point, and Subic Bay. We played in the club many nights and traveled to Manila to play with the big band known as the Glenn Miller Orchestra of the

Philippines. I was the one that cracked the paymaster's safe when the locking mechanism rusted shut and they couldn't get the money out for payday. Oh, the stories we can tell of the old days in Cubi Point. I think I have some pic-



tures of the road show cast, but for the life of me, I can't remember any of their names. I don't know if anyone remembers when MCB 2 came back to the states in '54 and we were given the task of tearing down the old elephant building that sat on the northwest corner of the parade ground, kitty-corner from the Administration Building. I had the crew that tore that building down. We had a Seabee dance band that year that played at the Officer's Club for the Seabee Ball that year. Again, I think I have some pictures of that band while they were doing that gig. Also, after I did a tour at Coronado following my time with MCB 2, I went to Class B Steelworkers' School on base and lead the Seabee Military Band on parade during Saturday pass-in-reviews. there are many stories to be told of the good ol' days..... from Henrietta Leavell: Thank you for continuing to send the Newsletter, but my husband, Max Leavell, died on January 3, 2007. The Seabees and his Navy meant so much to him. They did allow us to see where the small contingent of U.S. Marine advisers are located, but we were not allowed to talk to them. Kind of disappointing after traveling so far, but what can you do



And once I dared to sit there—'twas all too wide I found.


