

# Albert Rhoades Marschall Navy Rear Admiral

Albert Rhoades Marschall, 87, a retired rear admiral who was chief of the civil engineers in the Navy, died of pancreatic cancer Nov. 18 at his home in Alexandria.

Adm. Marschall, a native of New Orleans and a U.S. Naval Academy graduate in the accelerated Class of 1945, began his service aboard the destroyer USS Ross and participated in the invasion of Leyte during World War II and the subsequent occupation of Japan. By 1948, he joined the civil engineering corps known as the Seabees, where he rose through the ranks.

He served two tours in Vietnam and one in the office of the chief of naval operations. Ultimately, he became commander of the Naval Facilities Engineering Command and chief of civil engineers, which made him responsible for construction operations in support of U.S. Navy operations worldwide.

Adm. Marschall retired from the Navy in 1977 and worked briefly for the George Hyman Construction Co. in Washington as vice president. He then served two years with the General Services Administration as commissioner of the Public Buildings Service. He retired a second time in 1981.

He served on the boards of Parsons Brincker-hoff Inc. and the National Press Building Corp. He was national president of the Society of American Military Engineers and a member of the Moles, a fraternal organization of the heavy construction industry.

His military awards include two awards of the Distinguished Service Medal, the Legion of Merit and the Meritorious Service Medal.

Survivors include his wife of 64 years, Marie Gamard Marschall of Alexandria; five children, Thomas Rhoades Marschall of Atlanta, David Gamard Marschall and Laurel Marie Patterson, both of Baton Rouge, Pamela Joan Lemoine of Midland, Mich., and Albert Louis Marschall of Richmond; two sisters; 13 grandchildren; and two great-grandchildren.

I saw the old gentleman pull out his hand-kerchief and mop his brow as he went back to his car and again looked at the engine. He then went to his wife and spoke with her and appeared to tell her it would be okay. I had seen enough and I approached the old man. He saw me coming and stood straight and as I got near him I said, 'Looks like you're having a problem.'

He smiled sheepishly and quietly nodded his head. I looked under the hood myself and knew that whatever the problem was, it was beyond me. Looking around I saw a gas station up the road and told the old man that I would be right back. I drove to the station and went inside and saw three attendants working on cars. I approached one of them and related the problem the old man had with his car and offered to pay them if they could follow me back down and help him.

He was an old man all right, but it felt good to have stood next to greatness and courage and an honor to have been in his presence.

# Two Interesting Stories

#### STORY NUMBER ONE

#### STORY NUMBER TWO

World War II produced many heroes. One such man was Lieutenant Commander Butch O'Hare. He was a fighter pilot assigned to the aircraft carrier Lexington in the South Pacific. One day his entire squadron was sent on a mission. After he was airborne, he looked at his fuel gauge and realized that someone had forgotten to top off his fuel tank. He would not have enough fuel to complete his mission and get back to his ship. His flight leader told him to return to the carrier. Reluctantly, he dropped out of formation and headed back to the fleet.

As he was returning to the mother ship he saw something that turned his blood cold: a squadron of Japanese aircraft was speeding its way toward the American fleet. The American fighters were gone on a sortie, and the fleet was all but defenseless. He couldn't reach his squadron and bring them back in time to save the fleet. Nor could he warn the fleet of the approaching danger. There was only one thing to do. He must somehow divert them from the fleet.

Laying aside all thoughts of personal safety, he dove into the formation of Japanese planes. Wingmounted 50 calibers blazed as he charged in, attacking one surprised enemy plane and then another. Butch wove in and out of the now broken formation and fired at as many planes as possible until all his ammunition was finally spent.

Undaunted, he continued the assault. He dove at the planes, trying to clip a wing or tail in hopes of damaging as many enemy planes as possible and rendering them unfit to fly. Finally, the exasperated Japanese squadron took off in another direction. Deeply relieved, Butch O'Hare and his tattered fighter limped back to the carrier.

Upon arrival, he reported in and related the event surrounding his return. The film from the guncamera mounted on his plane told the tale. It showed the extent of Butch's daring attempt to protect his fleet. He had, in fact, destroyed five enemy aircraft. This took place on February 20, 1942, and for that action Butch became the Navy's first Ace of WW II, and the first Naval Aviator to win the Congressional Medal of Honor.

A year later Butch was killed in aerial combat at the age of 29. His home town would not allow the memory of this WW II hero to fade, and today, O'Hare Airport in Chicago is named in tribute to the courage of this great man. So, the next time you find yourself at O'Hare International, give some thought to visiting Butch's memorial displaying his statue and his Medal of Honor. It's located between Terminals 1 and 2.
