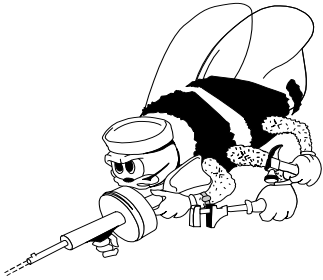

- July 26, 1944 Seabees land on Tinian.



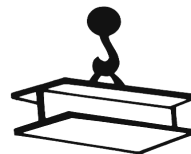
Notes from our members:

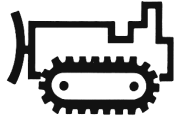


keep up the good work.....

Please bring your smiles, door prizes and lots of fun with you!

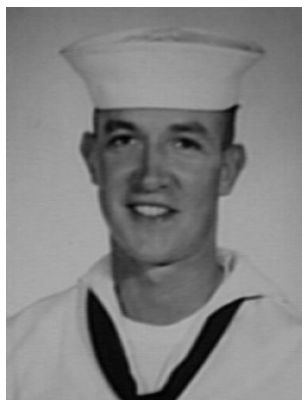

With all the sadness and trauma going on in the world at the moment, it is worth reflecting on the death of a very important person which almost went unnoticed. Larry LaPrise, the man who wrote "The Hokey Pokey", died peacefully at age 93. The most traumatic part for his family was getting him into the coffin. They put his left leg in and then the trouble started.

Marvin Glen Shields

Marvin Shields is the only member of the U.S. Navy Seabees to be awarded the Medal of Honor in history.



Awarded for actions during the Vietnam War

For conspicuous gallantry and intrepidity at the risk of his life above and beyond the call of duty while serving with Seabee Team 1104, Mobile Construction Battalion Eleven, near Dong Xoai, Republic of Vietnam, on 10 June 1965. Although wounded when the compound of Detachment A-342, 5th Special Forces Group (Airborne), 1st Special Forces, came under intense fire from an estimated reinforced Viet Cong regiment employing machineguns, heavy weapons and small arms, Construction Mechanic Third Class Shields continued to re-supply his fellow Americans who needed ammunition and to return the enemy fire for a period of approximately three hours, at which time the Viet Cong launched a massive attack at close range with flame-throwers, hand grenades and small-arms fire. Wounded a second time during this attack, Shields nevertheless assisted in carrying a more critically wounded man to safety, and then resumed firing at the enemy for four more hours. When the commander asked for a volunteer to accompany him in an attempt to knock out an enemy machinegun emplacement which was endangering the lives of all personnel in the compound because of the accuracy of its fire, Shields unhesitatingly volunteered for this extremely hazardous mission. Proceeding toward their objective with a 3.5-inch rocket launcher, they succeeded in destroying the enemy machinegun emplacement, thus undoubtedly saving the lives of many of their fellow servicemen in the compound. Construction Mechanic Third Class Shields was mortally wounded by hostile fire while returning to his defensive position. His heroic initiative and great personal valor in the face of intense enemy fire sustain and enhance the finest traditions of the U.S. Naval Service.

Myrtle Beach Review

Trudy and I just returned from a week at Myrtle Beach and wanted to pass on a few pointers. We didn't stay at the Sands Resorts but did take a quick look and found the check-in desk was a challenge. As you know the "Sands" is actually a complex of buildings with various names and we wandered all over the area before finally finding what we think was the right place. Our first problem was that we looked for 201 75th Avenue (re: the February Newsletter) and found that you can't get there from here. We finally parked at the "Ocean Dunes" parking lot entrance and after inquiring there and at a few other buildings, we finally came to 201 74th Avenue North, the Sand Dunes registration desk. The girl there looked up the MCB-2 reservation on her PC and assured me that this desk was the place to check in for that event. See the arrow pointing down 74th Ave from Ocean Blvd. on the hotel complex map (page 9). Another photo is actually the front entrance to the "Sand Dunes". As I already wrote, it ain't easy. By the way, you may have missed something yourself that you want to make a point of to all the reunion attendees. One of the hotel conference auditoriums is now dedicated as a war memorial, a copy of a traveling version of the Vietnam Wall Memorial. We looked for the names of people we knew.

For those who may want more things to do, "Broadway at the Beach" (Hwy 17 Bypass at 21st Ave North) is a destination in itself, a shopping, dining and entertainment complex around a lake. For a live stage show at another location we enjoyed the Alabama Theater (4750 Hwy 17 S.). Besides a great variety/musical show, their 'stagehand' comedian, Grant Turner, aka Ricky Mokel, is a riot.

For restaurants, there are so many but we recommend Thorny's (600 South Kings Hwy), the Captain's House (3002 No. Ocean Blvd) and Benjamin's Calabash Seafood (be very careful, there are a number of "Calabash" restaurants in town. We mean specifically Benjamin's at 9593 No. Kings Hwy, phone 1-800-288-8687). At the latter, pay close attention to the many ship models in the restaurant including the 30 foot long (yes, 30 foot!) intricate model of the Queen Elizabeth, and don't miss the large Viking model over the bar. The builder of all these models, Jimmy Frost, was gracious enough to give my brother and me a tour of his on-site work shop. I'm sure he would be happy to meet with you or your group there to describe his work or answer any questions. No charge, *it is just his passion*. When not in his workshop building boats, Mr. Frost travels around the world teaching sailing and racing.

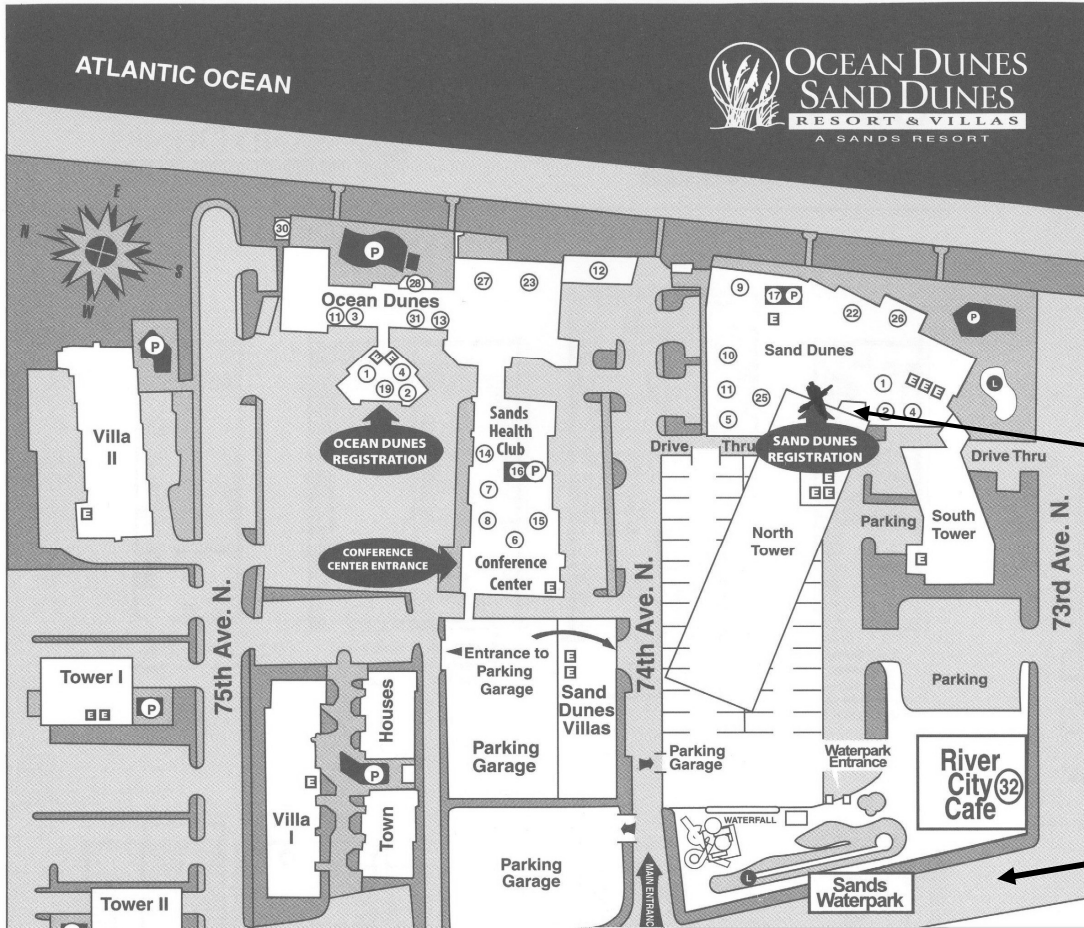
And, I want to pass on a couple of other suggestions from my brother Walt. Some of the reunion attendees may be interested in seeing the USS North Carolina in Wilmington, N.C., which is only about 65 miles from Myrtle Beach. I see on their web site there is a charge of \$12 for adults and \$10 for seniors (65+) but that doesn't seem too high for what is offered. Although quite a bit further at 125 miles in Fayetteville, N.C. another great take is the Ft. Bragg Airborne and Special Ops Museum (admission free but donations accepted). Walt and I did visit that Museum with our wives a couple of years ago and we can tell you, it is an impressive, moving experience, well worth the trip and I would do it again. Actually, as Walt points out those two visits could be combined in the same day from Myrtle Beach but it would be a full day.

Added notes from Walt Noetzel

My brother wrote you a couple of 'Day Trip' suggestions during the CB reunion in Myrtle Beach and I'd like to elaborate a little on the Airborne and Special Operations Museum in Fayetteville, NC. As John mentioned, we visited the museum a couple of years ago and were very impressed with all the displays including the original equipment and lifelike figures. One of the most comprehensive and very moving exhibits was the concentration camps and victims. All the displays/exhibits are in chronological order, starting in 1940, so as you progress through the museum you are walking through Military history.

As for planning a day trip from Myrtle Beach, I suggest it would be about a 2 hour drive and you would spend no less than 2 hours at the museum but upward to 4 hours. I believe that any and all veterans who take the opportunity to visit this museum, especially those who have traveled some distance to attend the reunion, will be very happy they did. # Civil Engineer Corps to Kick Off Year of the Seabees

WASHINGTON (NNS) -- A wood and plaster Seabee, longtime resident of the U.S. Navy Seabee Museum, was declared "fit for duty" for the Naval Heritage Center's "Year of the Seabees and Civil Engineer Corps: Can Do" exhibit that begins April 4, thanks to the dedication and hard work of fellow Seabees and friends.

In preparation for the year-long exhibit, the Naval Facilities Engineering Command (NAVFAC) developed a public display in coordination with the U.S. Navy Seabee Museum, 1st Naval Construction Division, and Construction Battalion Maintenance Unit-202, Detachment Washington, D.C.

The exhibit would not have been complete without the presence of the Seabee mascot – a fierce-looking bee complete with Tommy gun and tools, ready to build and fight. A five-foot tall, 50-year-old carved bee that had been on display for decades in the Seabee Museum in Port Hueneme, Calif., was discovered and chosen to stand watch at the entrance to the exhibit. Unfortunately he failed inspection prior to assuming his watch.

"We were all surprised to find that the bee was actually in need of substantial repair," said Seabee Museum Director Lara Godbille, who along with several Seabees, prepared the bee for the journey to Washington. She promised that after his makeover, he would not only pass muster but would be as debonair as the actor Sean Connery, and he has been known as "Sean Conner-Bee" ever since.

Sean Conner-Bee was accessioned into the museum's collection in 1959; however, little else is known about him. He is one of the focal points in the museum, and the only large Seabee carving in the museum's inventory, according to Godbille.

BU1 Wesley Johnson, 31st Seabee Readiness Group (31st SRG), saw firsthand the actual condition of the mascot as he and other Seabees examined him.

"The wings were damaged and splitting. Two of the shoulders were separated that were holding the wrench and hammer, plus there was some damage to several arms and missing and scratched paint," Johnson said.

With the deadline nearing for the assembly of the exhibit and the mascot planned as its centerpiece, Johnson volunteered to take on the project. Three others joined him -- his wife, Elizabeth Mueller-Johnson; BU1 Robert Mitchell, 31st SRG, and Seabee spouse Marcella Hinkle.

"My wife Elizabeth is into art as a hobby, and when she heard the bee needed painting, she wanted to help. Then a friend (Marcella Hinkle) heard about the project and volunteered," Johnson explained.

The team worked more than 90 hours, before and after work, and at lunch, repairing and painting the mascot. Johnson painted and made structural repairs; Mitchell built the pedestal, and Mueller-Johnson and Hinkle painted the bee in meticulous detail.

Johnson, a 14-year Seabee veteran, said that working on the historic bee prompted him to delve more into Seabee history, learn more about the individuals who served and the Seabee design and where it came from.

"Realizing the history of the insignias, seeing the original rating badges, it made me realize that I didn't know enough about the Seabees. I've been doing this for a while. I take a lot of pride in my Seabee heritage, but I found there is still much more to know," he said.

The "Year of the Seabees & Civil Engineer Corps: Can Do" kicks off at the Naval Heritage Center in Washington, D.C., April 4 in conjunction with the Navy Memorial's Annual Charging of the Fountains and Blessing of the Fleet. NAVFAC Commander and Chief of Civil Engineers Rear Adm. Greg Shear will be the guest speaker during the blessing.

Force Master Chief of the Seabees and Command Master Chief of NAVFAC Michael Holdcraft said, "Sean Conner-Bee symbolizes the "Can Do" spirit of the Seabees and is the perfect Seabee to showcase the "Year of the Seabees & Civil Engineer Corps: Can Do."

"Can Do" will run until March 2010 and will include book signings, films, awards ceremonies and youth activities designed to educate the public about the history and rich legacy of the Navy's Seabees and the civil engineer corps. Upon conclusion of the "Year of the Seabees & Civil Engineer Corps: Can Do," Sean Conner-Bee will make the journey back to Port Hueneme and will be displayed with honor in the new U.S. Navy Seabee Museum that is scheduled to open in the spring of 2011.

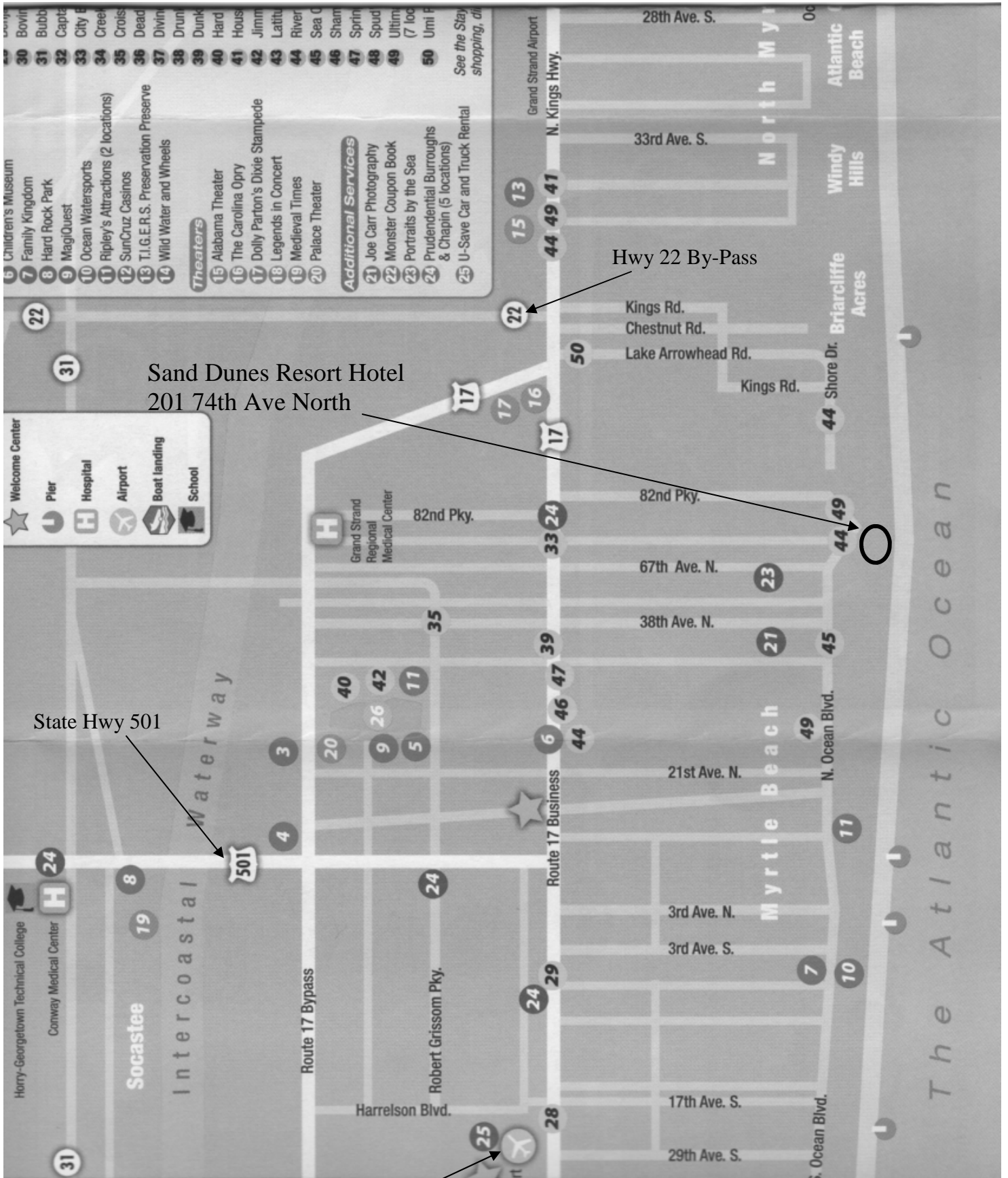
