

Chairman Elliott welcomed all members and guests.

Chairman Elliott asked the treasurer, Scott Williams, for a financial report:

- We are solvent, but barely. Since we did not have adequate room nights, we have to pay for our hospitality room. The banquet and meeting room is paid for but all other expenses will have to come out of our treasury. Which bring up another point:
- This will have to be our last reunion. We cannot command any special accommodations such as a large hospitality room or the room free, we cannot sustain the association by having future reunions.
- We can continue with a printed Newsletter but we can continue with an electronic Newsletter.
- We need to continue with our dues as the web site would be lost if we do not pay the web site host, Go Daddy. All of the Seabee history, all of the MCB 2 history, all of what is left of the Korean Seabee history would be lost if the web site is deleted or not paid.

Ambassador for Peace Medal

The picture on the right is of a new South Korean-issued medal for those veterans that were in Korea during the Korean War. It is the Ambassador for Peace medal issued by the South Korean government. The application form for the medal is on page 4. Make a copy of that page and fill it out, then mail it to the Chicago Embassy

There are no legal agreements that need to be met. nor any documents to be signed. This is an appreciation in the form of the Korean Ambassador Peace Medal from the Republic of South Korea for the sacrifices, service and friendship of our veterans.



Ambassador for Peace Medal Application Form

According to Young Ji Park, apply for this Distinguished Award through the South Korean Consulate in Chicago. To apply for the medal, wartime veterans who served in Korea during the war can fill out an application and mail it to the consulate and she will mail or email the application directly to the veteran. The award is currently out of stock, but the Consulate will send the medal to eligible veterans who apply once they receive new stock (likely May or June). The veteran should include documentation of their war-time service in Korea (DD-214) if possible. — or call her at 312-822-9878 at the South Korean Consulate in Chicago, IL.





Gunshot Wound

About the Purple Heart

George Washington established the original Purple Heart, designated as the Badge of Military Merit, by order from his Newburgh, New York headquarters on Aug. 7, 1782. Gen. Washington himself only awarded the Badge of Military Merit to three Revolutionary War soldiers. He authorized his subordinate officers to issue the Badges as appropriate.

Although never abolished, the award of the badge was not proposed again officially until after World War I. Gen. Douglas MacArthur confidentially reopened work on a new design, and by Executive Order of the President of the United States the Purple Heart was revived on the 200th Anniversary of George Washington's birth out of respect to his memory and military achievements by War Department General Order No. 3, dated Feb. 22, 1932.

Today, the Purple Heart is a United States military decoration awarded in the name of the President to those wounded or killed while serving, on or after April 5, 1917. An estimated 1.8 million Purple Hearts have been awarded in our nation's history. In addition to being awarded to those who fight overseas, the Purple Heart is also given to military personal that display bravery and valor as prisoners of war and while fighting certain types of domestic terrorism.


