## The Politics of Insecurity: A Needs-Based Theory of Democratic Decline

I develop a needs-based account of democratic fragility. Affluent liberal democracies satisfy material needs while eroding institutional pathways to esteem and purpose, producing ontological insecurity that populist movements exploit. The project reconstructs Maslow through a Nietzschean lens of self-mastery and links the result to Giddens's ontological security; it then applies a Needs-Based Discourse Analysis to the US and UK (2015–2025).
