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Grammar in a Nutshell

The definition of "grammar" is the whole system and structure of a language or of languages in general, usually taken as consisting of syntax and morphology (including inflections) and sometimes also phonology and semantics. In today's world, it seems to be better described as a set of actual or presumed prescriptive notions about correct use of a language.

The baby boomers were taught grammar every day of their lives in all twelve grades of school. Lessons included not only the parts of speech, spelling, punctuation, and capitalization, but also "funner" things like conjugating verbs and diagramming sentences. With the prevalence of technology and the speed with which communication happens today, we see trends to shorten the time it takes to write something by disregarding many grammar rules. While capitalization and punctuation are two areas that are falling by the wayside, texting is building a whole new dictionary for spelling and vocabulary.

There are several writing style guides, including AP (public journalism), Oxford (academic publication), and MLA (classroom instruction). NALS follows The Gregg Reference Manual for its certification examinations. Some day-to-day writing style differences between Gregg and AP are the use of commas in a series and the use of words or numerals for numbers. Gregg dictates a comma be placed after the last noun that comes before the conjunction in a series of three or more nouns (bacon, eggs, and grits), while AP omits that comma (bacon, eggs and grits). When using words for numbers, Gregg's rule is to spell out the numbers one through ten, while AP uses numerals beginning with the number 10.

We have all heard of synonyms, antonyms, homonyms, and homophones. The last two can be confusing. Homonyms are words with the same spelling and the same pronunciation but a different meaning (set your watch and watch the game). Homophones are words with the same pronunciation but a different meaning and a different spelling (dear and deer). Then there are homographs, which are words with

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the same spelling but a different pronunciation and a different meaning (a cold wind and wind the clock). Beware of some common usage errors with the following words:

- 1. their (possessive) they're (contraction) there (place)
- 2. your (possessive) you're (contraction)
- principal (head of school, adjective for main, or loan money) principle (standard, law, or stated truth)
- 4. accept (to receive) except (to exclude)
- 5. complement (to supplement or complete) compliment (to be nice)
- 6. i.e. (that is Latin id est)e.g. (for example Latin exempli gratia)
- 7. assure (to promise)
 insure (to protect from loss)
 ensure (to make certain)
- 8. further (intangible distance e.g., took the argument further than necessary) farther (physical distance e.g., drove down the road farther than necessary)
- who (subjective, like he or she) whom (objective, like him or her)
- 10. affect (verb to impact)
 effect (noun the result; verb to bring about)

- 11. fewer (quantifiable number) less (not quantifiable amount)
- 12. I (subjective)
 me (objective)
 myself (reflexive e.g., as I myself have done)
- 13. because (reason why) since / as (refer to time)

Our English language also has such "animals" as infinitives, gerunds, participles, and conjunctions. An infinitive is a verb with an introductory "to" that is used as a noun, adjective, or adverb (decided to take another job). Avoid splitting an infinitive with an adverb (impossible to even see a foot ahead), so that it reads stronger and with more clarity (impossible to see even a foot ahead). A famous exception to the split-infinitive rule is "To boldly go where no man has gone before." This statement would have lacked strength and emphasis if it had read "To go boldly where no man has gone before." Then there are gerunds, which are verbs with an "ing" ending used as nouns (the singing of angels). Since a gerund is used as a noun, be sure to use an adjective to modify it (the success of your singing, not the success of you singing). Participles are formed from verbs and may be used as adjectives (the coming year). Participles may also take an object and be modified by an adverb to form participial phrases (aggressively seizing the opportunity, we

acquired . . .). Do not leave the phrase dangling (stashed away in the attic, the owner of the painting . . .), but attach it to the correct word it is modifying (stashed away in the attic, the painting showed signs of . . .). If these terms aren't confusing enough, we have several kinds **Coordinating conjunctions** of conjunctions. (and, but, or, nor) connect two independent clauses (each with a subject and a predicate verb) to form a sentence. **Subordinating** conjunctions (such as although, because, if, unless, when) join a dependent clause to an independent clause. Correlative conjunctions consist of two elements used in pairs (neither/ nor, either/or, both/and, not only/but also). The tricky part with conjunctions is properly using the dreaded, but sometimes totally necessary, comma. Avoid ambiguity in the sentence by clearly expressing your intent of the clause as either essential or nonessential.

Let's discuss a few other facets of grammar, like parallel structure. So often we see a series of ideas that are not in parallel form (program was stimulating and a challenge). Remember to use the same part of speech (stimulating and challenging), especially in lists (the following



actions: 1. Dealing 2. Coping 3. Functioning, not 1. Dealing 2. To cope 3. The function). Then we have the arguable preposition at the end of a Such placement depends on the sentence. emphasis needed or the awkwardness created. In formal writing, it is best to place the preposition within the sentence structure (saw in which magazine it appeared, not saw which magazine it appeared in). It is considered acceptable, however, to end short or informal sentences with a preposition (what this is made of, rather than of what this is made). Placement of words is important in many areas of the English language, such as with adjectives (the gold man's watch or the man's gold Placement of punctuation is also important, as in transitional phrases and hyphenated words. Commas and semicolons are used with transitional words, depending on the position in the sentence. Hyphens are needed in some compound words and most definitely in compound adjectives placed before nouns as single modifiers (long-term loan, it's not a long loan or a term loan).

Of course, the rules of grammar are filled with fun tidbits. Always be sure that a sentence is neither a fragment nor a run-on. The subject and verb of a sentence must agree in number and person. A pronoun must agree in number, person, and gender with its antecedent (the noun for which the pronoun stands). The pronoun for a collective noun, such as a firm or team, is it and not they (possessive its, not theirs) when referencing the unit as a whole and not the individual members. Use active voice rather than passive voice (I hit the ball rather than the ball was hit) in most writing for simplicity and strength. The objective form of a pronoun is used after a preposition (give to her and me, not give to she and I). If unsure which is correct, just mentally omit one of the pronouns for clarity (give to her and give to me). When it comes to double negatives, remember that two wrongs don't make a right but two negatives do make a positive. Only Shakespeare got by with using double negatives; for the rest of us, it's a "no-no."

The English language must surely be the most exceptional language in the world! However, improper grammar can kill your writing credibility, make you look silly or stupid, or even cost you millions of dollars. Just check out U.S. Court of Appeals Opinion No. 16-1901 in the 2017 case of O'Connor vs. Oakhurst Dairy. For want for a comma, the case was lost . . . by the dairy company to the tune of \$10 million owed to its drivers. When in doubt, tear it up, rewrite it, and turn to Gregg!

My personal pet peeve is someone using it's for its. On my way home every day, I used to pass a billboard that advertised "lake living at

it's finest." I would shout out loud in my car, "Lake living at IT IS finest – really, people?" After about a year of having to look at this obscenity, I road by one day to see it had been changed to "lake living at it s finest"; so, it still had incorrect punctuation! It's laughable that a company actually had its employee "white out" the apostrophe and then leave the space.

The subject of grammar can go on ad nauseam over such aspects as capitalization, numbers, abbreviations, plurals, possessives, punctuation, and spelling. As you can see, there isn't a nutshell large enough for all the rules of grammar, or at least not for this nut.

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B. Annual Meeting and Educational Conference:

- 1. The voting power is the total number of voting members in good standing on the date of the meeting as set out in Article V, Sections 4, LSPSC Bylaws.
- 2. The president's vote is reserved to break a tie.
- C. **Member Participation.** Any member may participate in a meeting by offering a motion or resolution, making a nomination, or entering into discussion as set out in Section 2.7(A) or (B), LSPSC Standing Rules.

2.8 **MEETINGS**

A. Membership Meetings:

- . See Article V, Sections 1 and 2, LSPSC Bylaws.
 - a. Meetings shall be held three (3) times each year as follows:
 - i. Spring Membership Meeting: Immediately following Annual Meeting and Educational Conference at site of Annual Meeting and Educational Conference ("spring membership meeting"):
 - (a) The Board of Directors shall set the registration fee for the spring membership meeting at a reasonable amount to be approved by the president, such amount shall be no more than \$15.
 - (b) All profits derived from the spring membership meeting shall be divided one-half (½) to the hosting chapter of the annual meeting and one-half (½) to this Association.
 - ii. Summer Membership Meeting: A Saturday in July or August ("summer membership meeting"). This meeting will be held each year at a time and place approved by the Board of Directors.
 - (a) The Board of Directors shall set the registration fee for the summer membership meeting at a reasonable amount to be approved by the president, such amount shall be no more than \$15.
 - (b) All profits derived from the summer membership meeting shall go to this Association.
 - iii. Winter Membership Meeting: A Saturday in January ("winter membership meeting"). This meeting will be held each year at a time and place approved by the Board of Directors.
 - (a) The Board of Directors shall set the registration fee for the winter membership meeting at a reasonable amount to be approved by the president, such amount shall be no more than \$15.
 - (b) All profits derived from the winter membership meeting shall go to this Association.
- 2. All registration forms for activities and official programs shall be approved by the president prior to publication or distribution.

-5-Adopted July 25, 2004 (last amended August 19, 2017)

- F. This Association shall send the president-elect to the NALS annual education conference and national forum. This Association shall fund the president-elect's early-bird registration; transportation expenses (not to exceed normal airfare) and ground transportation expenses; and lodging expenses to cover the cost of a single room, or if room is shared, not to exceed one-half of the room rate.
- G. Remind each local chapter to forward rosters of names and addresses of their newly elected officers to the NALS resource center immediately after election.
- H. Encourage each local chapter to become familiar with candidates running for NALS resource center.
- I. Assist chapters and members in understanding their relationship in the tri-level association; encourage active participation in NALS and its programs such as seminars, court observance week, award of excellence, certification courses and exams, and the legal training course.

3.3 FUNCTIONAL DIRECTOR OF MEMBERSHIP

- A. Act as membership chair: See Section 4.13, LSPSC Standing Rules.
- B. This Association shall fund the Functional Director of Membership's registration and material expenses in his/her capacity as State Membership Chairman with regard to any available NALS Leadership Course and Education Series and/or Professional Development online program.
- C. Chair committee for the organization of additional chapters in the state.

- A. Serve as continuing education committee chair. <u>See</u> Section 4.6, LSPSC Standing Rules.
- B. Perform other duties as may be assigned by the president or board of directors.

3.5 FUNCTIONAL DIRECTOR OF PUBLIC AWARENESS/MARKETING

- A. Edit, approve and handle all manual and digital media publications and such other publicity releases in connection with this Association and work with all committees to send out appropriate publicity, including coverage in manual and digital publications, including but not limited to newspaper and bar association publications, as well as radio and television coverage of state activities such as the annual meeting and educational conference, membership meetings, CLE seminars, and workshops.
- B. Contact the public awareness/marketing chair and/or each local chapter president to request that copies of all publicity for their local chapter be submitted to this Association
- C. Coordinate releases with the continuing education committee, local publicity Chair, and each local chapter president hosting the membership meetings, the annual meeting and educational conference, and educational seminars. Chapters are encouraged to handle publicity for better coverage by local newspapers.


