

Julie and Andrew Stafford's LEJOG Challenge 2021 "The idea of running from



Land's End to John o' Groats first emerged in those lazy days between Christmas and New Year when your thoughts start to drift to your plans for next year and somethings pops up on your Facebook feed asking if you are up for an 874 mile running challenge. We weren't actually going to physically run between the two points, that would be crazy in a pandemic (or any other time to be fair), we were going to run the equivalent distance, tracking our progress on an App against the 10,000 or so other people who entered the challenge. We decided we'd give ourselves the full year to complete the challenge, we'd be supportive of each other's efforts, after all, it wasn't a race... well, that didn't last long!

Going the Distance

After 5 days Julie had already clocked 31 miles against my paltry 10 and the true nature of the challenge revealed itself as it became a race within a race.

Since then we've both enjoyed spells in the lead and we're currently in a 'truce' just short of the Scottish border having completed just short of 500 miles each. In the overall field we're hovering around 2000th place which isn't bad considering the vast majority is 'off-road' and the winner, somewhat incredibly, reached John o' Groats January 30th this year. We sometimes run together, but mainly we're out individually with our Labrador, Breagha, who will comfortably have completed the challenge already, so big thanks to her and any local residents who give us a wave along the way."

Chris Stanley explains her challenge to raise valuable funds for Parkinson's. For the months of January and February I have completed a personal challenge of completing an average of 22,000 steps daily, by running and walking with my wonderful supportive friends for Parkinson's awareness, for the 145,000 sufferers across Britain. There is no cure, and it is a progressive disease, but you can live well with the disease. For me, exercise is the best medicine. Having been diagnosed 3 years ago I have continued with a varied exercise program of; running, walking, ballet, cycling and yoga. I am extremely fit, and I am



enjoying life to the full.

One key message to take away about Parkinson's? It's really important that people with Parkinson's understand that exercise is something to be embraced – it's as important as medication, plus a great way to take control of their symptoms and their lives. Bowling Along

As restrictions start to lift during Summer, why not try something new?

Rolleston Indoor Bowls Club was founded in 1985. Equipment was first provided by Newark & Sherwood District Council on loan at first, and then we obtained a grant from "Awards For All" - a spin-off from the National Lottery.

We play weekly in the village hall on Tuesday nights. No previous experience is necessary. Numbers vary, but I would say about 14 is the 'norm'. We play 7 - 10pm with a break at half time for refreshments and a chat. Age is wholly unimportant, all are welcome.

Now the crunch - the cost. We pay £25 each half year and £1 each week for tea/coffee and biscuits. So, anyone who goes every week pays about £100 per year - works out at £2 per week - a cheap evening out.

This isn't really up to me, but we've always operated a system whereby anyone can come and give it a try for a few weeks for free - to see whether they like it.

We are planning to recommence sessions in September. Why not give it a whirl?


The Morton, Fiskerton and Rolleston WI always welcomes new members of all ages.

Rolleston Parish Council

At the time of writing, the timing of the last milestone in the Government's roadmap towards release of the national restrictions introduced to control the Covid-19 pandemic, remains in the balance. However, there is already an evident desire in the village to shake off the shackles imposed on so many aspects of daily life.

Since the last edition of The Junction was published, the financial year for Parish Councils has turned once again, and with it there is a fresh focus on the new priorities which the Parish Council has set itself for the year.

It is apparent from many of the valuable contributions made at Parish Council meetings, that the enforced regime of staying local and working from home this past year has caused many to reflect on several aspects of life in the village. This is especially true, perhaps, of those villagers whose work or other life commitments has meant they have previously enjoyed only limited time to fully experience the many amenities afforded by our village.

This increased awareness has resulted in a large increase in suggestions coming forward, not only from Councillors, but, increasingly from groups or individuals in the village keen to explore new ideas and initiatives.

Many of these suggestions have the common theme of "making Rolleston an even more attractive place to live for all" and I would like to share with you just a few of the ideas which have been suggested, in the hope that these might stimulate further thought and engagement:

- A campaign to deal with picking of litter
- Maintenance of grass verges by groups living adjacent

- Tree planting on Parish-owned land
- Improved appearance and better use of Jubilee Gardens
- A plan for the longer-term use of the Parishowned 2-acre field behind the Village Hall
- Improved dog control and use of bins
- Better village signage
- Better signposted and maintained footpaths and bridlepaths
- Enforcement of vehicle speed limits through the village
- Railway station improvements and connectivity for residents
- A longer term strategy for the children's playpark in the light of increasing costs of maintenance

Each of the above ideas has been brought forward from either an individual or group of individuals in the village and many are already well-advanced, with a small band of willing volunteers in place, but I know that in many cases more volunteers would be warmly welcomed, and if any of these capture your imagination and you would like to become more involved, please contact myself or a member of the Parish Council who can put you in touch.

Roasted Carrots with Harissa and Pomegranate

Ingredients

2lbs of carrots - as posh or simple as you like. Either the coloured heritage ones, these will just need scrubbing, topping and tailing or, use normal carrots, cut lengthways into quarters or batons depending on their size.

2tblsp melted Butter 2tblsp Rose Harissa paste 2tsp Cumin seeds (or 1tsp Ground Cumin) 2tsp Honey Salt and Pepper

Method

Toss all these together with the carrots and spread out in a roasting tin. Roast for about 15 minutes. Cool. When ready to serve - mix with the juice of half a lemon and some torn coriander leaves and scatter with pomegranate seeds.

You can miss out anything that you haven't got to hand - apart from the carrots and harissa paste.

NEWS FROM CLLR ROGER BLANEY



Homes where they are needed

On 11th May, Her Majesty the Queen opened Parliament and set out the Government's forthcoming legislative programme. This included a Planning Bill "to modernise the planning system, so that more homes can be built". Whilst the details are yet to be published, the Bill is expected to closely reflect the 'Planning for the Future' White Paper launched in August last year. Many of the proposals were widely welcomed, though others were equally criticised. However, the direction of travel is clear: delivering homes where they are needed is a key part of the Government's 'Levelling Up' agenda.

The need for new homes is undeniable. The UK population, barely 50 million in 1950, had grown to 59 million by 2001 and to an estimated 68 million this year. That's nearly a 40% increase in my lifetime — and it's still growing. However, whilst the need for new homes is generally recognised, where they should be built is often a source of considerable controversy and local opposition. This has given rise to a number of disparaging acronyms. The most widely-used, of course, is NIMBY, (Not In My Backyard), but another one I heard a few years ago is BANANA, (Build Absolutely Nothing Anywhere Near Anyone)!

Newark and Sherwood DC has long recognised the need to build new homes – as long as they are built in the right place. That is why we were one of the first local authorities to have a formally adopted Local Plan setting out our planning policies and identifying key sites for development.

This has helped us increase the delivery of new homes from around 400 annually a decade ago to 550 in the past year.

Two initiatives during my time as Leader of the Council are contributing to this success. Firstly, in 2018 we established Arkwood Developments Ltd, a company wholly-owned by the council, to deliver both social and market housing across the district. Construction is well underway at its first major development of 87 apartments, bungalows and houses off Bowbridge Road, Newark and adjacent to our recently-built Newark Sports and Fitness Centre.

Secondly, in 2017, we began an ambitious 5-year programme of building new social houses on small pockets of land owned by the council, usually within or adjacent to previous council housing developments. The target was to deliver 335 new homes over the first five years and I am proud to say we are on track and that, by the end of year 4, some 202 new homes have been built and a further 78 are under construction.

As we enter the fifth year, one of the last small-scale developments in the current programme is planned for Rolleston, on the land behind Greenaway adjacent to the village hall. Proposals have been drawn up and I have arranged for them to be shared publicly at the next Rolleston Parish Council meeting. A formal planning application will follow when there will be every opportunity for residents to comment on the proposals. I do hope as many of you as possible will do so.







Cllr Sue Saddington

Following a very different Election Campaign, I am very happy to say I have the pleasure of representing the Farndon and Trent Division at County Hall for the next 4 years. Thank you to those who have put their trust in me.

We have a new Leader. Ben Bradley MP, who has the added advantage of being able to be in direct contact with Government, when necessary, over various issues within Nottinghamshire. Cllr Bruce Laughton is the Deputy Leader.

I have been offered and accepted the position of Chairman of Health Scrutiny. I have a very able Vice Chairman, who was newly elected in May, his enthusiasm is to be admired.

This committee looks into all matters relating to Health concerns in Nottinghamshire. If the Committee is not satisfied with the CCG's and others' explanations brought before the Committee, we can refer them to Matt Hancock's department for further investigation. The work programme for the next two months was established by the former Committee prior to the Election, so we must honour this.

In June we will be looking at the Nottingham University Hospitals' Maternity Improvement Plan to see what measures they have put in place for improvements. We will be asking them to explain these and how they will sustain a fit for purpose service. The Clinical Commissioning Groups (CCG) will be providing an update on the diabetes service and public health services. The East Midlands Ambulance Service Performance will be looked at in July. We will be working, to a certain extent, alongside the Chairman of Health and Wellbeing Board who also happens to be a GP. We will decide on our

future plans and these will include a visit to the A & E department at QMC. Myself and my Vice Chairman will also be visiting the Ambulance HQ during the summer.

As to the future, I have suggested we look at Mental Health. Many, including young, middleaged and senior people, have been affected in various ways by the lockdown. Plus, there were those suffering stress and mental health issues long before lockdown. It is, I believe, a massive problem and I do not think it is fully understood. Patients need to be listened to and it is important they receive the help they require.

We now look forward to emerging from lockdown, but taking care, mindful of the increase in new variants of the virus.

The Administration are setting up a full review of the Council's approach to road maintenance, current policies, equipment and techniques etc. It will be a cross party review which will make recommendations as to how we might be able to improve outcomes for residents, who told us this was a key priority in the election.

Secondly, we will become proactive on the environment and climate change. Sustainability will be key to our strategy for growth and development and we will ensure residents are at the heart of our service and plans for the future.

I look forward as ever to joining you at future village events.





Special Things: NHS, Nature & Wild Cider

In the Spring issue, we announced the retirement of Andy Haynes, a well-known resident of Rolleston. We invited Andy to write a piece on his career and about his experiences in the NHS and his future plans, now he has more time on his hands.

"I have been very fortunate to have a career in medicine; I've had many different jobs over the years and never dull. To help someone at their most desperate and see them or their family years later is a real privilege. My specialism was Lymphoma, a type of blood cancer. It is amazing to think that when I qualified in 1984 the cure rate for Hodgkins lymphoma was less



than 50% and it is now over 90%; a measure of progress.

As Cancer Lead in the 2000's we established Nottingham as a national centre of excellence which I benefited from when my prostate cancer was diagnosed aged 48! Experiencing our healthcare services for myself as a "secret shopper" was fascinating, humbling and very helpful.

I became the Medical Director and deputy CEO at Sherwood Forest Hospital after it was in Special Measures. The following years were very busy, but it was amazing to help the hospital become one of the best in the Midlands

For my last move, at the end of 2019, I became the Executive Lead for the Nottinghamshire Integrated Care system. Little did I know that the Covid pandemic was around the corner and I apologise that you may have seen too much of me in the media as a result! How special the NHS is when we need it most.

Lockdown has reminded me how important it is to connect with nature and how lucky we are to live in Rolleston. We made wild cider with the apples from the orchard, so I eagerly await the outcome in July. More walks, birdwatching and cricket beckon."

Corner Farm Amenity Area

Like me you might be thinking this is a recreation area for those living in houses built on the former site of Corner Farm. It wasn't until I joined the Parish Council, I realised this was a gift to the whole village. Recently the Parish Council have been considering how to make the area more inviting to all villagers.

Under current plans, the first phase will see a bench seat being installed just to the left of the path as one enters from Staythorpe Road and a litter bin attached to the fence at the entrance. There will also be a picnic table on the right, near the Oak tree. Of course, the large area of grass will still be available for sport. One change, which hopefully will reassure people that it is a public space, is to rename the area, The Kate Greenaway Garden.

Volunteers from The Kate Greenaway Group will create a flower garden to the left of the path as one walks from Staythorpe Road. This will have to be maintained by volunteers as the money held by the Parish Council is purely for cutting grass and caring for the trees planted by the developers. The Kate Greenaway Action Group will be spoilt for choice, as Kate loved flowers.

"Flowers were always wonders to me - I can remember how I used to make the Snapdragons' mouths open and shut. I loved them intensely – so I did a pink Moss Rose that grew by the dairy." (Quote from Kate Greenaway's journal).

In her journal Kate also speaks of her memories of some of the wonderful gardens in Rolleston. Her favourite was at the property



now called Racecourse Farm. "We saw the delightful prospect through both windows the green church yard and old grey church and big walnut trees — in the Front beyond the little Garden with a big red Fuchsia in each bed — and at the back — my loved one of all gardens I have ever known — what a Paradise it was to me. Flowers and Fruit trees Roses everywhere." (Kate's journal page 60)

The Kate Greenaway Group will have fun deciding which of the many flowers mentioned in Kate's journal to plant. Many of those mentioned are still grown today, including Roses, Purple Phlox, Michaelmas Daisy, Columbines, Wallflowers and Narcissus to name but a few.

Julian Ellis

Julian Ellis, our Churchwarden and Village Hall Chairman, has had an interesting working and volunteering career. Julian spent 50 years in the textile industry mainly in research and development. He set up his own R&D business in 1985 specialising in the development of surgical implants and devices for the aerospace and automotive industries. Amongst the products the company developed include knee ligament repair system which was put into 120,000 patients, a spinal disc treatment, and novel shoulder devices. A device for mending abdominal aortic aneurysms potentially saves some 2000 lives a year.

Research having quiet periods, he has also been able to provide specialist technical evidence in textiles in many court cases throughout the country covering such areas as murder, rape and arson as well as commercial disputes. He also spent 22 years as an unpaid member of the Independent Monitoring Board Prison at Nottingham prison, and as a national chairman of their association, he was able to campaign successfully to stop unfair practices against prisoners. That work even took him to the Russian Parliament, the Duma, to talk to their Home Affairs Committee about how we monitor prisoner treatment in the UK.

In April this year Julian was installed as Master of the Worshipful Company of Framework Knitters of England and Wales, one of the London livery companies. Framework knitting was a very significant industry throughout the East Midlands, although there seems to be nobody in Rolleston who worked in the sector, although other nearby villages, such as Fiskerton had machines. The Livery Company

was formed in 1657 with a charter from Oliver Cromwell. It controlled the trade for many years but nowadays runs 26 almshouses in Oadby in Leicestershire and supports students of knitting through the UK with bursaries. Between them and the 109 other livery companies they support education in Britain to the tune of some £70 million each year. Julian is also Chairman of Trustees at the Framework Knitters' Museum at Ruddington near Nottingham (which is well worth a visit!).

He was awarded an OBE in 2004 for services to the technical textiles industry and for services to the welfare of prisoners. He clearly has many stories to tell, including about his time in Uganda as a teacher on VSO at the time of Idi Amin, some stories about trials he attended, his radio and TV work and his research work - which would probably fill a book! As Julian says, he has led an interesting and exciting life.
