

MP FOR NEWARK

Following on from my last column, I find it fitting that the Chancellor of the Exchequer and I finally confirmed at the end of September the muchneeded dulling of the A46 with an investment of £450 million.

This is an unprecedented amount of investment and the largest investment into Newark in a generation and could be the largest investment since the Victorian Railways arrived.

Since arriving in Newark over 6 years ago, when I was chosen to be the Parliamentary candidate, it was clear that a by-pass was desperately needed. Newark was, and remains, a terrible bottle-neck causing so much delay and inconvenience to residents and businesses around the constituency. In Rolleston especially this has been a problem as it can take a substantial amount of time to simply get into Newark for shopping, impairing quality of life.

I set myself the challenge of securing and delivering on this issue. Over the years I have lobbied each Transport Secretary, led delegations, held debates when I was a back bencher and then argued on the inside as a Minister - fortunately with the responsibility for infrastructure at the Treasury and most recently as the Midlands Champion. This has not been a sole effort and I would like to thank the Newark Advertiser, Newark and Sherwood District Council, Nottinghamshire County Council, Newark Business Club and all of you who filled out my petition earlier in the year.

Also, I am pleased that since my last article I have been able to secure further funding for Newark. In September I announced with the Prime Minister, the Towns Fund. This fund of £3.6 billion new investment across the country is targeted at towns to develop transport. skills, culture and digital technology. I am pleased that Newark is receiving £25 million of this fund, helping us to continue improving the town by raising living standards, skills, improving social mobility with career prospects and helping us future-proof the town, Newark and Sherwood District Council will take the lead on how the money will be spent, but Newark Town Council and Residents and Businesses of Newark will have the chance to get involved.

Newark is a great historic Market Town and I am keen to preserve the Historic Significance of Newark. In addition to the Towns Fund this September, I was able to secure a further £250,000 and potentially more funding for Newark through the Heritage Boost for High Streets. This fund is designed to help fund a new vision for the town centre. Recently the centre has been struggling with the increase of online shopping so I hope this investment can help draw more into the Town Centre and make it more attractive to shop and spend time in.

I hope all of these deals will provide the investment and the impetus for long-term renewal, ensuring Newark and the villages surrounding it, such as Rolleston, can look to the future with optimism.

Advent and the Christmas Season will soon be upon us and details of the services will be shown on the Church Notice Board and in the Tatler.



NEWS FROM CLLR ROGER BLANEY

An end in sight for traffic congestion around Newark?



The recent announcement that the Newark Northern by-pass upgrade is included in the Governments 2020-2025 Road Investment Strategy (RIS2) is tremendous news and something for which I have been campaigning for many years. I am grateful to our MP, Robert Jenrick, for inviting me to join him at meetings in Whitehall with a succession of Roads Ministers. In addition. I have been able to use my influence at East Midlands Councils - the representative body for all 46 city, district and county councils in the region - to argue that the bypass is of regional, indeed national, importance. Currently it is the key bottleneck of what is now widely called the "A46 Growth Corridor". Indeed, Lincolnshire County Council publicly describe the bypass as their single most important highway 'need' - even though it is not in their county!!

However, now is not the time to sit back. There is no room for complacency. Some £450 million has been allocated to the scheme, the largest ever single transport investment in this district's infrastructure. Yet this is unlikely to be sufficient given the scheme's complexity: crossing a river

twice, a railway line three times, grade separation (flyover to you and me!!) at the Cattle Market roundabout and a complete remodelling of junctions with the A1 and the A17 to the east of Newark. Indeed, mile for mile, the bypass upgrade is probably one of the most expensive schemes in the Government's whole programme. As a result, either the full scheme may not be affordable unless savings can be found or unless further monies are allocated in the 2025-2030 RIS programme.

Further, the current timetable does not have the by-pass open for traffic until 2027, some eight years hence. And, at the present time, who can predict what the political or economic environment will be like in eight months, even weeks, let alone eight years? So, we will have frequent congestion when we try to get into Newark for some time yet. However, there is light at the end of the tunnel. The recent announcement is very welcome but I – and I know our MP – will continue to argue for the full scheme and for its completion to be brought forward, not pushed back.

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The Kate Greenaway Action Group

A group of nine interested villagers met in September at Rolleston Villa with the aim of considering ways in which we might raise the profile of the artist Kate Greenaway and her connection with our village.

The idea had originally come from Pati Colman and Emma Burnett who were wondering whether it might be possible to have the equivalent of a blue plaque put on the side of the house. This was previously occupied by Eric Ullyatt and was the house in which Thomas ("dadad") and Mary ("mamam") Chappell, had lived and where Kate frequently stayed as a child. We have approached the Parish Council asking for their support in lobbying Nottinghamshire County Council as owners of the property and a further suggestion has been made that the proposed village sign might include reference to Kate Greenaway.

At the meeting it was decided to pursue several courses of action:

- Contact the Parish Council for their continued support regarding a 'blue plaque' and the village sign to recognise Kate Greenaway's significance to Rolleston.
- Contact the County Council for information on the registration documents relating to 18 The Holding, the home of Mr & Mrs Chappell.
- •To make contact with former villagers and others who may be able to assist in gathering additional information.
- To consider organising a village Kate Greenaway Day in March 2020 (to roughly coincide with her birthday on 17.03.1846)
- To catalogue what we have in the way of documents / artifacts that relate to Kate Greenaway and specifically to her childhood spent in Rolleston.

The meeting in September demonstrated we have a lot still to learn about Kate's time in Rolleston in the late 1840s and 1850s and that quite a few people in the village have already done some research and are in possession of some very interesting artifacts relating to her. We suspect that this may also be the case for others who may have left the village or were not able to come to the meeting.



With the purpose of establishing what we know and what we have in the way of source material and associated artifacts, there was a second meeting which took place on Wednesday 6th November at Manor Close. Station Road.

Kate Greenaway is our village's former inhabitant and the most popular children's book illustrator of her generation.

Although born in 1846 in the East End of London, she spent her early infancy and then many subsequent summers in Rolleston until she was twenty. As a child, she spent hours sketching scenes of rural life here.

Kate developed her talent at the Slade School of Art. Her drawings of children dressed in clothes of a bygone era charmed the public. Greenaway's books and greeting cards sold by the thousands during nineteenth-century Victorian Britain and had international appeal. Her work was acclaimed by art critics, including John Ruskin.

In 2018, she was inducted into the Society of Illustrators Hall of Fame in New York.



Engage with your Parish Council!

Parishes are the smallest areas of civil administration in England, and whilst the Parish Council is the lowest statutory tier of local government it is the closest to the people and has a unique ability to represent the views of parishioners and to listen to, and understand, the views and needs of different groups in the community.

Those views and needs can be communicated to the Parish Council in many different ways.

The monthly meetings of the Parish Council feature two "open sessions" where members of the public are encouraged to make points or observations or raise questions, including the opportunity to raise questions of representatives of District and County Councils, who are regularly present during the first open session.

A glance through the minutes of recent meetings reveals questions about highways maintenance, local authority house building, road markings and pot-holes, bus timetables and train crossing safety.

Those members of the Parish unable to attend meetings personally can send letters or emails to the Parish Council at any time, and comments or questions received are reported at the monthly meetings and recorded under the section devoted to "general correspondence". The authors of all correspondence are afforded anonymity, unless they express otherwise, and the Parish Council

will always try to provide answers to any questions, or direct the question to whoever might best be able to provide the answer.

Correspondence received and discussed at recent meetings includes such diverse topics as restricted footpaths, a request to re-stake trees on Corner Farm, report of alleged drug dealing in the village, notification of the 2020 race meeting programme at Southwell Racecourse, parking on verges, and a query on the maintenance regime for the village defibrillator. There is a wealth of knowledge within the village and often the answers to questions comes from members of the public present at meetings.

The Parish Council is also an ideal way for groups within the village, both formal and informal, to let others know about projects or initiatives of interest to the community. In recent months this has included Holy Trinity Church seeking support for its successful acquisition of additional land to extend the graveyard, the launch of the Kate Greenaway Action Group, and the village signs project.

However you choose to engage with the Parish Council, all communications received are welcome, whatever their level of importance, as it is only through these contributions that the Parish Council is able to truly fulfil its role of representing the views of parishioners.

Below is an account which gives a glimpse of what life was like during the period of 1943 to the early 1950s on her Grandfather Sharpe's farm, (Holly Farm). This was where her father, Lesley, grew up with his six other siblings.

Thanks to Eileen for sharing these reminiscences which are rather special. Carole Chandler.



Eileen - Age 7

"My earliest memory is traveling in Uncle Bill's van, one of my dad's brothers, delivering milk round the village. It was dispensed, by gills and pints, into household jugs using his metal measures.

One day, during his milk round, he told me that my Grandpa Goodwin had died, and it was very sudden. He was my maternal Grandfather. I was so shocked as I really loved him. I remember praying between the tears that he would be brought back to life.

My paternal grandfather, John Thomas Sharpe (known as "Tom"), was quite a different character. He was a tenant farmer at Holly Farm and believed children should be 'seen and not heard'. My dad (Lesley) was brought up at Holly House along with his six other siblings; there were six boys and one girl.

Uncle Verdun was the youngest of the seven children. He also worked on the farm with Uncle Bill and my dad, Lesley. The three sons were paid, but the rest of the family pitched in. It was always clear who was in charge – Grandpa Sharpe even had his own motorcar and petrol pump, but no one else was allowed to drive it!

I often played there, sometimes with my friend, Maureen Savage. I went in the summer holidays and the days always seemed to be hot and long. At harvest time, we'd deliver packed lunches (meat or jam pasties and cans of hot sweet tea) to the men who stoked and loaded the corn onto horse and cart.

Threshing Day and the arrival of Bob Hough and his chugging threshing machine caused great excitement for us children. We'd do handstands up to the haystacks and climbed the many steps up to the granary into the huge pile of grain. I can remember being almost unable to breathe after rolling about in the dusty grain. My dad's trouser bottoms would be tied with string to prevent the mice, which hid in the haystacks, from running up the inside of his trousers!

The many cats and kittens which roamed the farmyard helped to keep the rodent population down. The animals on the farm

held a fascination for me. The paddock was full of work horses. I found them quite scary; to my five-year-old self they were towering giants.

Farming in Rolleston was 'mixed'. There was a little of many things: pigs, poultry and sheep. Dairy and beef cattle were also farmed - the breed was 'Lincoln Reds'. One day, Grandpa Sharpe and Uncle Bill went to check the beef cattle in the fields near the River Trent. We travelled by horse and cart down the lane, (where Chilli Bobs is today). I'd be about six and was warned not to go wandering off as they wouldn't wait. I picked violets from underneath the hedgerows. When I turned round, Grandpa had gone! They were already in the distance and they didn't stop for me. I ran in some distress all the way back to the farm.

I recall that he told me not to



pick flowers from his garden or fruit from the orchard. Today, I don't pick flowers from my own borders or have cut flowers in the house. Funny how things that are said in childhood form a lasting impression.

When calves were born in the crew yard they sometimes struggled to survive. One year, I remember seeing my father's suffering when the newly born calves all succumbed to some dreadful disease. The sad side of farming stayed with me. I remember thinking I definitely don't want to marry a farmer!

Grandpa kept poultry. The henhouses were towed into the cornfields after harvest for the hens to glean the fallen grain. Inevitably, Mr Fox would come along to behead a few prize chickens. I also remember fluffy chicks in the brooder and white ducks swimming in the murky duckpond in the stack yard.

I loved to collect the newly laid eggs. There was plenty for boiled eggs and soldiers for breakfast. However, during WWII, some had to be preserved for the war effort. A preservative powder called 'isinglass', made from the swim bladders of fish, was dissolved in water and the fresh eggs were submerged in the solution.

Sheep also featured at Holly Farm. One year, my dad's sheepdog, Jess, broke loose from her tether in the cowshed. Unseen, she raced into the nearby flock, severely injuring several sheep. Dad was so upset. He knew Jess could never again be trusted. For six weeks, he kept her tied up, unable to bring himself to "do the deed". I would creep into the byre each day. praying she was still there, giving her a stroke, and hoping that Dad would relent. He couldn't - but it broke both his and my heart to see her demise.

The farmhouse was quite imposing to a young child; large rooms and two staircases. There was a wide, sweeping one and

some backstairs used by servants in previous times. The grandfather clock in the drawing room had a moon-faced image that would rise above the dial of the clock face. It used to terrify me. It seemed so sinister, yet now it's comforting to have the same clock chiming in our lounge today at Holly Cottage on Staythorpe Road. (Incidentally this was my childhood home, my dad moved out of the farmhouse at Holly Farm and moved here when he married my mum, Margaret).

The farmhouse boasted an indoor bath and a toilet, but there was an outdoor 'privy' which housed seven woodenseated toilets. These tapered from adult-sized to five smaller ones. I often wondered, did they all sit down together?

The kitchen had a roaring fire. Grandma Sharpe, my mother and Winnie, (an employee) would be gathered round the big table either baking or preparing meals.

The butcher would come on pig-slaughtering day. He would tell the children – "I've come to talk to piggy." A freshly killed pig on the table caused more commotion - jointing the meat, preparing pork pies, hams and processing other

parts - certainly not appealing to my eyes.

Mum often worked in the diary. My dad would milk the cows, sitting on his three-legged stool, his capped head pressing into their flank. Then the bucketful of warm milk was tipped into the cooling machine in the dairy by the back door of the house. I can picture my mother with the wooden butter pats, making our butter.

As I grew older, things changed. The milk lorry called daily to collect the churns to take to the local dairy for processing. Uncle Bill's days of delivering the milk round the village were over. Grandpa Sharpe died in 1946; the sons continued the farming and a tractor replaced the workhorses. The Power Station opened in Staythorpe in 1950 and provided alternative employment. A number of farmworkers went to work there and eventually, so did my dad.

I have many memories of the farm, happy and sad. But certainly, as a child, I had a lot of freedom and a rich playground to explore and develop the imagination."

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Claire's Kitchen

Beetroot and Shallot Tarte Tatin

Hi Everyone,

I like this recipe as it makes an impressive vegetarian main course but could just as easily be served as a side dish for everyone to enjoy. It can also be made gluten-free if you use the Jus-Rol gluten free pastry. With Christmas approaching a very useful recipe to have to hand.

Ingredients

- 1 sheet ready rolled puff pastry or 1/2 a block or make it yourself! 300g approx.
- · 300g shallots
- 1 tblsp. olive oil
- · 2 tblsp. balsamic vinegar
- · 2 tblsp. light brown sugar
- 300g cooked beetroot, the vacuum packed or home cooked sort, not pickled.

Dressing:

- · 25g blanched hazelnuts
- 1 tblsp capers, drained
- 1 tblsp red wine vinegar
- 5 tblsp olive oil
- a small bunch of parsley and a few mint leaves

Method

1) Heat the oven to 200C. (fan) or 220C. Roll out the pastry to a rough 30cm circle. Lay it on a sheet of greaseproof paper on a baking sheet. Chill.

- 2) Put the shallots in a heatproof bowl and pour over boiling water to cover.
- 3) Leave for 10 minutes then drain and peel.
 Cut any larger shallots in half so that
 they are all roughly the same size.
- 4) Heat the oil in an ovenproof frying pan (approx. 25cm) over a medium heat. Add the shallots and cook for 10 minutes then add the vinegar and sugar and cook for 5 minutes more until thick and syrupy.
- 5) Halve the beetroot and nestle among the shallots.
- 6) Lay the pastry over the vegetables and tuck in the edges.
- 7) Bake in the oven for 35-40 minutes until crisp and golden (it needs longer than you might think to cook through)
- 8) Meanwhile make the dressing. Finely chop the hazelnuts and herbs, stir in the capers, vinegar and oil.
- After leaving the tarte to rest for 5 minutes invert onto a serving plate or board and drizzle with the herb dressing handing around the rest separately. Enjoy.
