Church News

We have a magnificent church which belongs to Rolleston. It is Grade 1 listed. The church is open every day between 9am and 5pm so everybody has the opportunity to come and sit in a peaceful space. It is there for those who have any religion or none - it is a somewhere just to sit and think, even if not to pray or give thanks for the wonderful place where we live.

Our church has been there for a thousand years, and during that time has provided a centre for celebrations at times of great joy and comfort at times of great sorrow.

We might not have a vicar, but it doesn't mean that we stop caring for parishioners. If you need a home visit, let me or Peter Salter know, and we can even arrange home communion, should you wish it. We have regular contact with clergy from the surrounding area. The organising of special services like weddings and funerals is straightforward and doesn't stop during a vacancy.

A space in the extended churchyard is available to all who live in the village, whether of any religion, or none. (But it makes it easier to bury you if you are dead!). There is a special area set aside for cremated remains. Every used space can be marked with a stone. We have room for burials for at least 200 years; we plan well ahead.

There are on-line services in the benefice (the group of local churches to which we belong) held every Sunday at 9am, and a short (12 minute) service of night prayers at 7pm every Wednesday. The latter is a calm session called Compline - meaning completion - giving a peaceful session after a busy day.



Of special interest is the diary of Robert LeBand, our vicar from 1589. it is one of the most important parish documents in the country, and is nearly always shown to groups visiting the archives.

Marathon Man - 'Mr Bee'

First of all, a big thank you to everyone who sponsored me with my fundraising for LINKS, that's always a big encouragement and much appreciated.

So, another London marathon in the bag, my third one to date and another amazing experience. It's hard to describe the feelings as you enter the starting pen and prepare for the klaxon to sound. A mixture of extreme excitement and intense butterflies in the stomach comes closest.

The day was very cold but dry and bright, perfect conditions for a marathon if it wasn't for the stiff breeze early on too. I managed not to freeze waiting for the start knowing that I would soon warm up!

Training hadn't gone entirely to plan with some niggly injuries and a couple of colds knocking me back (I never get colds, haven't had one since before Covid, but marathon training puts a huge strain on the body and can weaken the immune system). Also, the weather has been miserable right up to press which is an additional challenge.

Off we go, soon settled into the pace I thought I could maintain for 26.2 miles and then just concentrated on good form and keeping the hydration and energy gels on schedule.

Whizzed past the Cutty Sark (6 miles approximately) and before I knew it over Tower Bridge at 13 miles, just about halfway.

The next few miles felt quite hard for some reason, but my pace didn't drop really until around mile 18 which is always the twilight zone in a marathon, you start to realise just how far you've come already and there's still a long way to go!

Never mind, I've been here before I thought to myself, I know what to do.

The crowds were deafening at this point, made even more intense by the fatigue I was now feeling. Digging deep.

All too soon I'm on the Embankment and Big Ben is looming into sight, nearly there!

My Garmin running watch beeps furiously to tell me I've completed the marathon distance in 4hrs 20mins... but wait, there's still another half a mile or so to go!


The problem is that you can't follow the 'racing line' (because you can't see it for all of the other runners), and you end up going much further than the official distance.

Onto Birdcage walk, Buckingham Palace ahead... gentle sweep to the right and a final burst of energy over the line in 4hrs 27 mins. Phew.

Absolutely thrilled and absolutely exhausted I collect my medal and hobble off down the Mall to find Mrs B who was waiting to guide me back to our caravan at Abbey Wood. Bless her.

I've got the marathon bug again and already entered the ballot for next year's race where I hope to be able to prepare better and smash my previous 3 hour, 58 minutes personal best





Rolleston to Cologne - By Train in a Day

Rolleston may rank 2433 out of 2578 when it comes to station usage and the train service poor, but the rails connect the village without a break to far flung corners and allow some interesting journey possibilities.

One of these is to Cologne in a day with just three changes, and a little bit of walking. I tried this out in April this year, setting off at 8am to catch the 8.24 train to Newark Castle and then walking across to Northgate to catch the 9.22 to London.

The Eurostar took me to Brussels and another Eurostar took me on to Cologne. I arrived at my hotel near the Cathedral 10 and a half hours after leaving home, having covered just over 700km by train and about 2km on foot. I spent about 4 hours waiting for trains, half at St Pancras.

Over the whole 7-day trip, I used 17 trains, most in Germany. LNER to London was the best – on time and good on-board service. Next was Eurostar between London and Brussels. Eurostar between Brussels and Cologne was a long way behind, especially as the journey length is roughly the same as Newark to London, but the journey time is half an hour longer and on a high speed train – to boot!

The less said about German trains, the better. Mostly very late and poor on-board service. The best of a poor bunch were two steam trains, both on time, although admittedly the seats were a bit spartan.

Overall the experience was a better one than flying, and marginally cheaper, especially comparing airline on-board service with LNER and Eurostar.

If you are thinking of trains to Europe, an excellent website for information is The Man in Seat 61, and if you want to plan a journey anywhere in Europe then use the German or Austrian railways websites:db.com or oebb.at


In fact, I use DB and OBB to plan UK journeys: you often get more sensible and less expensive journey suggestions than those offered by Trainline or National Rail, both quite poor in my experience. I avoid these sites altogether and book through the train operators' own sites after first planning the journey with DB.

Claire's Recipe

Gluten free

Chocolate Courgette Cake

I'm thinking that a lot of people will have a glut of courgettes over the summer, so this recipe is based on one overgrown fruit, peeled with the seeds taken out, by cutting in half lengthwise and using a dessert spoon scrape out the core, before grating the flesh.

Alternatively, if smaller courgettes are used there is no need to peel or core, you can simply grate the whole thing.

In the ingredients list below the courgette flesh is measured by volume (you can use a measuring jug for this). This recipe is gluten free as it uses gluten free self-raising flour.

Ingredients: (For the cake)

250g gluten free self-raising flour

100g ground almonds

50g cocoa powder

1tsp mixed spice

1tsp salt

175ml olive oil

375g golden caster sugar

3 large eggs

2tsp vanilla essence

500ml grated courgette (use a measuring jug)

140g toasted hazelnuts, roughly chopped

Ingredients: (For the icing)

200g dark chocolate, chopped

100ml double cream

Method:

- Heat oven to 180° C/160° C (fan)/gas 4 and line a 24cm cake tin with baking parchment. In a large bowl, combine the flour, ground almonds, cocoa powder, mixed spice and 1 tsp salt.
- 2. In another bowl, combine the olive oil, sugar, eggs, vanilla essence and grated courgette. Mix the dry and wet mixtures until just combined, then fold in the toasted hazelnuts and scrape into the tin.
- 3. Bake for about 40-50 minutes, or until a knife inserted into the middle comes out clean. Cool in the tin for 10 minutes, then turn out on to a wire rack and leave to cool.
- 4. To make the icing, put the chocolate in a bowl and bring the cream to the boil in a pan. Pour the hot cream over the chocolate and stir until melted. Cool to thicken slightly, then spread over the cake

Leave out the hazelnuts if you like. Enjoy!

Rolleston Parish Council News

Summer is on the way! We hope so... Well, let's hope that the storms and floods are behind us for this year at least.

As I write this, it is a lovely day; I heard a cuckoo this morning and saw swallows flying over the river - it really feels that summer is on its way. And the pub is up and running again - welcome to Tom and Gail Dandy.

A number of villagers attended the Rolleston Annual Parish Meeting, 25th April and we used The Crown as the venue. Thanks to Tom and Gail for letting us use the pub for this event; it worked perfectly.

As the title suggests, this is a once a year event and it was a great success with presentations by our District and County Councillors and our Finance Director Michael Gemson.

But it was also an opportunity to hear from local representatives of active groups in our community who also gave informative talks, including the Book Club, the Kate Greenaway Action Group, the Rolleston Junction Magazine, the Rolleston Village Hall Committee, the Flood Action Group, the Village Allotments Group and the Bee Keeping Group.

A presentation of particular note was one on bees by Michael Coombs (who happens to be

the Chair of Bleasby Parish Council). Apparently, we have some beehives at our allotments in Rolleston and his presentation was about the threat to bees as an incredibly useful species.

There has been a lot of recent publicity about bees and their plight - as well as our relationship with nature in lots of other ways. My view is that although we quite rightly expect governments and large corporations to act in proper ways on our behalf, it is equally important that we act properly as individuals.

Small communities such as ours can make a fantastic contribution to preserving and improving our natural surroundings and Rolleston should try to do this. For instance, we have plans in association with the District Council to plant more trees in the village and one consideration is the right trees for encouraging bees. I am inviting Michael Coombs to give a presentation about bees at the village hall hopefully around September – watch out for more details.

With regard to the floods and the prevention of a repeat of last year, we have a promise from Severn Trent to investigate and repair a broken main drain underneath Staythorpe Road as well as a plan for clearing the drainage sump at the corner of Station Road.

Undertaking these tasks should reduce at least two significant flooding concerns in the village.

We continue to fight N&SDC over their plans to demolish two bungalows and build five new houses on the land next to the village hall. We are receiving great support from Sue Saddington, our Nottinghamshire County Councillor on this issue.

I sincerely hope that we will stop the Council getting planning permission for going ahead with this ridiculous idea. Please see the new website: **rollestonvillage.uk** for the latest information on this.

The burying of High Tension electricity cables by National Grid late last year left a mess of some significant grassed areas in the village. We are liaising with them to come back to carry out landscaping of the areas to improve these spaces now that the weather has improved.


Denise Bryant, our clerk, has put in a great deal of work into getting our formal documentation such as the yearly audit and council procedure statements into a complete and professional state.

In touch with Council news

Once again, we have arrived at the end of the Parish Year and I believe summer may be on its wav!

Here, in Rolleston, we have one or two new Members sitting on this Parish Council and a new Chairman. I would like to take this opportunity again to offer my thanks to the previous Chairman and former members of this Parish Council, it was my pleasure working with you.

The one word I would use to describe this year is STORMS, one after the other, resulting in severe flooding, leaving homes ruined and roads damaged.

I fully understand residents' concerns and their fear of flooding. The flooding has left roads in disrepair throughout the county, which will cost hundreds of thousands to repair.

We have to appeal to the new Mayor who will now have the money and roads will be repaired as soon as we have funds available to do them.

NCC as the lead flood authority have written and produced Section 19 relating to for Storm Babette, but Section 19 has yet to be written for Storm Henk. Evidence is still being gathered.

A few weeks ago. I. and the Chairman, and Parish Councillors, did meet in Rolleston with the drainage Manager to discuss issues in the village.

At time of writing, in a week or two, they plan to dig out the ditch on Station Road and make it deeper and repair the broken drain on Staythorpe Road.

Flood wardens find that motorists move cones and road closure signs. Drivers go through the flooded road, causing a wave of water which pours into properties flooding them and causing danger to other motorists. I understand moulded interconnecting plastic barriers may be used in the future; they are not so easy to disconnect.

I have a modest budget available this year. I am happy to give a contribution in the year to a project or event and will support your event if invited.

When you request funding, payment is delayed if all details aren't given, i.e. name, address, name of group, telephone number, email address, bank details.

There is strict scrutiny regarding these payments. During the course of the year. I gave to the Seniors' Christmas lunch which is always lovely, and the village Festive Gig in December.

We will continue to work together to keep the Rolleston as the lovely village it is.

Thank you everyone, Parish Councillors, our Clerk, Denise, and volunteers who play such a large part in providing and working for the village.

Enjoy the summer.

Community Spirit

It is now over a year since I was elected to Newark and Sherwood District Council and an interesting year it has been.

It has proved to be a rather steep learning curve at times, being projected from 'ordinary citizen' to 'Councillor' and then to 'Cabinet Member' all in the space of a few weeks after May 4th 2023.

As well as your local Councillor and a Portfolio Holder, I have also become a member of the Planning Committee and it is remarkable how different the three hats are, in terms of how one has to think in order to do justice to each role.

As local Councillor I can 'take a position' and push it for our residents. As a Portfolio Holder

I can take decisions, but have to balance the needs of all residents in the District. And as a member of the Planning Committee, I have, legally to remain as neutral as possible weighing various aspects of 'material planning issues' in the balance, to be able to come to a fair result without predetermination.

Sometimes the three 'hats' don't fit comfortably together, but one has to do one's best to keep them in balance.

One of my pleasant discoveries in the last 12 months has been the way community members can – and often do – come together in the interests of the community as a whole and vulnerable people in particular.

On more than one occasion I have been reminded of a story my Brazilian wife tells of the little hummingbird. In Brazil the bird is called 'uma Beija-Flor', (a Kiss Flower) - a rather more romantic name than hummingbird (which comes from the noise their wings make when hovering to drink nectar; they beat remarkably fast just to stay still.)

The story is about a serious forest fire. Most of the animals and birds stick around grumbling that the fire is going to rob them of their homes and food sources, but NOT the hummingbird.

The hummingbird flies to the nearest stream and picks up a couple of drops of water in its beak and then flies over the burning forest and drops the water on the flames. All the other animals and birds look on in fascination. After a while they ask the hummingbird, "Whatever are you doing? – you're never going to make a difference with such small amounts of water against those terrible flames!"

The hummingbird scoffs, "Sure, I may not be able to put the fire out by myself – I know that! But if we all did what we could do, according to our size and capabilities, we could make a difference by working together in a common cause!"

What I have seen, with all the flooding events we have been having, is a great willingness for people to play their part in helping the community effort - and taking on the wisdom of the 'Beija-Flor'.

If we all did our little bit to help, all sorts of things can be achieved. I certainly like being part of this kind of community. Thank you to all the volunteers across all the villages in this lovely Trent Ward.





MP FOR NEWARK

I have raised these concerns with the Prime Minister and other government ministers, and discussed the community's stance in a recent parliamentary debate on solar farms with my colleagues.

I am proud of Newark's rich history and vibrant community life and will always put the constituency first, working to preserve the beauty and safety of our area.

I am also thrilled to report the positive impact of the £45 million government investment from the Towns Fund, which I initiated as the Secretary of State for Housing, Communities and Local Government. This funding is making a significant difference in Newark and the surrounding areas, driving economic and educational advancements, particularly at the newly opened Air and Space Institute (ASI) in Newark, ASI offers exceptional vocational and technical education in engineering, providing students with valuable and alternative pathways to careers in aerospace and beyond.

Tom Dandy and his mother, Gail, are excited to take on the challenge having spent many years catering for big events including weddings at Norwood Park in Southwell and The Pumping House on the edge of Sherwood Forest. Their awardwinning food has been much appreciated and they are bringing the same high standards to their new venture.

We caught up with them both in early May to get the low down on their ambitious plans.

The pub has been renamed The Crown at Rolleston to put it on the map and attract customers from outside our immediate locality - which of course is vital for its ongoing success.

At time of writing, Tom and his team currently provide evening meals only - with the exception of an extended lunch time service on Sundays. However, it is planned that from 12th June, the Crown will also provide a lunch time menu from Wednesdays to Saturdays.

Currently the opening times are:

6pm - 11pm Wednesday to Saturday, (evening menu available: 6pm - 9pm).

12 noon - 9pm Sunday, (lunch menu available: 12pm - 6pm).

All food is homemade by Chef Tom and Chef Luka and the menu will change with the seasons. Regular main dishes featuring on the menu are pub favourites such as: Fish and Chips, Steak with various sauces, Steak and Ale Pie and a Classic Burger. The menu also features vegetarian options.

Two of the items that appeared to 'hit the spot' with locals recently were some starter dishes specially created by Tom called Crispy Buttermilk Chicken and a Spiced Parsnip Soup. Don't be fooled by their simple titles, the focus here is on flavour, and then it's the finesse and the finishing touches that make these stand out dishes.

The Crown has undergone an extensive and thoughtful refurbishment to broaden its appeal. There are cosy seating areas to satisfy regular patrons who pop in for a drink, as well as a bright, clean cut restaurant area filled with light. This provides a lovely environment to spend time with friends and family who enjoy meals out. There are nice touches, like the eye-catching display of black and white photos on the walls showcasing our village in previous times; images provided by our very own local historian, Frank Mitchell. There is no doubt you are in a pub with history, yet it has a modern contemporary feel.

Then of course we are looking forward to warmer days where locals and new customers can take advantage of the covered Mediterranean style terrace outdoors. Here's hoping we get a good summer! The pub has dog friendly areas; well behaved pooches are allowed in the main bar and also outdoors.
