

CLAIRE'S KITCHEN

White Chocolate and Strawberry Tart

Bake or buy an 8"- 10" sweet pastry tart case. Make the filling - Heat 200ml crème fraiche and 100ml double cream in a pan over gentle heat until just starting to bubble.

Break 180g of white chocolate into a

Break 180g of white chocolate into a heatproof bowl, pour over the hot cream mixture, leave for a minute then stir until the chocolate melts.

Cover with cling film, pierce a few holes in it, cool in fridge for 2-3 hours or overnight.

Cut up about 200g strawberries and put in a single layer in the tart case.

Whisk the other 150ml cream until it just holds its shape then fold into the chocolate mixture.

Spread this over the strawberries and smooth with a spatula. Pop in the fridge for at least another hour or until needed. Decorate the top with more strawberries or curls of white chocolate, made by dragging a vegetable peeler down a bar of chocolate. Use raspberries for a change, or vary the pastry by adding a spoon of cocoa or some chopped nuts to it.

Hope this hits the spot!

News from

ROBERT JENRICK

- our local MP ...

Although the nature of crime is changing, our rural areas face specific challenges - in particular, the targeted theft of high value machinery.

Prime targets include Land Rovers and other vehicles, trailers, tools and fuels, as well as anti-social behaviour, criminal damage, livestock theft and burglary.

To combat this, the Local Police and Crime Needs Assessment report has identified a need for more preventive action to be taken by the police and local communities, including an alert system and a neighbourhood policing presence, but in the face of cuts, I am concerned as to the viability of this local presence.

Nottinghamshire's Policing Budget has fallen from £200.765m in 2010/11 to £193.8m in 2014/15 with 177 fewer Police Officers. In the face of proposed forthcoming cuts I am concerned that we do not lose out in favour of policing the nightlife in Nottingham As budgets tighten there is a need for innovative approaches so I am extremely encouraged by Mark Holland's. Nottinghamshire's Chief Superintendent, initiation of a new Rural Crime Strategy.

A key element is to tackle rural crime at the grassroots



level through the proposed appointment of Rural Special Constables who will be responsible for getting to know the local community and identifying specific local issues.

I would like to see a more open dialogue between members of communities and the police force, seeking to combat crime and its root causes. Community-led early intervention messages and specially trained rural police Officers signal a welcomed move to a more localised approach to policing.

Although things are moving slowly, I am still chasing public access to Race Course Road.

Evidence forms have been completed by residents, and County Councillor, Bruce Laughton, who represents Southwell, says he understands they would like a restricted bridleway so they can cycle.

I have enquired about the weight limit which we would like to see reduced in

Rolleston, to prevent lorries now coming through the village, owing to the wider weight limit around Southwell.

I understand from the Parish Council, that it may not have been a race day when the numbers of vehicles using the road were monitored, so have asked them to check this, and, if they had comments, to contact the Highways dept.

The proposed new County Boundaries are now out for consultation. Rolleston will stay with the Trent villages as you are now, with the addition of Bleasby and



Upton. Although this is still out for consultation, I don't see a problem with the Boundary Commission's proposal.

I was also delighted to be able to help the Village Fun Day with a donation of £150 that came from my County Divisional fund.

KATE GREENAWAY:

Part 2 - Adulthood and her success as an artist

During Kate's youth, there were few openings for female artists, but the introduction of the postcard in 1870. together with the perfecting of colour printing, created a boom in the production of Christmas cards, and the Education Act of 1870 produced a demand for children's books. The now famous Slade school of Art opened in 1871, pioneering equal opportunities for women. and Kate enrolled for classes. She went on to exhibit at a London gallery, helped by her father's contacts in the publishing world. She won commissions to design Christmas and Valentines cards, and below is an image of one of her cards.



Her big break came in 1879, with the publication of her first book, Under The Window. This soon had a print run of 90,000, despite costing 6 shillings, a high price for a children's book, and became a resounding success. Here are two of her illustrations from this book, one being of the severe flood of 1852.





A number of best-sellers followed, including her Birthday Book, Mother Goose, and a series of popular almanacs.

Her connection with Rolleston declined with the death of members of the Chappell family, and she instead visited friends in Surrey. The fame and wealth her success brought her enabled her to have a house built in Hampstead.

What were the ingredients of her success? She drew beautiful children and maidens who wore charming clothes, her colour were vibrant, and the new colour printing techniques raised children's books to works of art. She was also a first-rate botanical artist continuing to inspiration from her memories Rolleston, and Victorians were drawn to the rose-tinted nostalgia for an idealized country life. The picture below, "Bubbles", encapsulates the Greenaway look and style.

What of her private life? Her printer, Edmund Evans, described her as dowdy with a matronly figure, frightened of most men. She never married but, in her late thirties, fell in love with John Ruskin, a polymath, a very accomplished artist, and the most famous art critic of the day. He was hugely influential on the world cultural stage as well as in Kate's life.

Kate perceived Ruskin as her Master. He began to supervise her work and to dominate her. They corresponded with each other frequently and she visited him several times at his home at Coniston Water. He encouraged her to concentrate on watercolour painting, probably to the detriment of her subsequent career.

It is thought that Kate had hoped they would marry, despite their 28 year age difference, but her love was unrequited: he exploited her emotional neediness, while she naively believed he was emotionally attracted to her.

It has been suggested that Kate's pictures of "girlies," as Ruskin called them, were her main passport to his affection because he was attracted to her child models rather than to herself. (He even requested her to draw her children without clothes, which she refused to do.)

Her popularity and success waned, partly because her work was widely imitated and partly because fashions in art changed. She died in 1901, of breast cancer, just one year after Ruskin's death.

Kate's memory lives on however – not only within our village: in 1955 the Kate Greenaway medal was established, awarded annually to the most distinguished contributor to British

illustrators of children's books. This year the award went, unusually, to an illustrator of a non-fiction book, William Grill's "Shackleton's Journey".

"Growing" Success at ChilliBobs

Rolleston's own Chilli Farm, ChilliBobs, is a business that has grown significantly over the past 3 years, since Bob Price decided to leave the IT industry and start growing and selling chilli plants, and, when in season, allow the public to PYO chilli pods.



Having spent a number of years flying backwards and forwards to India, Bob

understood not just the range of heat, but importantly, the flavour that fresh chillies could bring to home cooking. This he has proven introducing by many new people to tastes, ranging from sweet pepper to lemon and pineapple. that these pods can give.

Now a Father and Son business, with

Neal joining full time in March, the team have just successfully run the first East Midlands Chilli, Beer and Artisan Festival at the farm, with over 2000 visitors from as far and wide as Hampshire, Shropshire

and Cumberland – many camping on-site and visiting the local area.

Bob has also put his love of IT to use by successfully using Social Media – Twitter and Facebook - to its full potential, as can be seen looking at ChilliBobs in both of these media. It is also expected, that by the end of this year, ChilliBobs will be selling plants, seeds and sauces online via a dedicated website.

ChilliBobs is diversifying further - working with

Nottingham Trent University and Doff Portland Limited on a range of plant feed trials, becoming the "East Midlands Centre of Excellence" for both.

With a new range of Keder Greenhouses, ChilliBobs is also expected to introduce fresh herbs and other produce to sell directly to the public and local restaurants. Significantly, all of this activity is expected to bring direct employment opportunities for the local community.





MY JOB

My name is Gill Rowles. Ilive in Holly Court and work for the British Red Cross. The Red Cross is a humanitarian organisation with no religious or political affiliation and 80% of its workforce are volunteers.

People are usually aware of our international work but not the work we do here in the UK. We are called upon to help out in emergencies here too. This may involve setting up rest centres for flood victims, going out with the fire brigade, visiting vulnerable people during power cuts, transporting district nurses to their patients during bad weather, or supporting the NHS ambulance service.

We also works to support asylum seekers and helps trace families separated by war or disaster, and we provide first aid training to communities and first aid cover at many events.

Our biggest work in Nottinghamshire, however, is in the area of Health and Social care which is where I fit in. We provide support for people leaving hospital to help them re-settle into home life, and also support those in crisis to prevent a hospital admission until Social Services can be organised.

We also provide wheelchairs and other small items of equipment to people being discharged from hospital, or who are terminally ill, or who are just frail, or just needing help to go on holiday, or attend a hospital appointment.



Congratulations !!

Dick and Brettle recently celebrated their Diamond Wedding Anniversary with a small group of friends at the village coffee morning.

Dick (who was 96 in July) is our oldest resident. He and Eleanor came to Rolleston 57 years ago and farmed at "The Croft" for 30 years. There were about 15 smallholdings back then, in 1958. These had originally been set up by the Ministry Agriculture for exservicemen from the First World War who wanted to try their hand at farming. By 1958, most of these men had died or retired. and priority of tenancy was given to exservicemen from World Warll

Dick had been in the Royal Artillery from the

very beginning of the War and took part in the D-Day landings, serving through France, Belgium and Holland up to North Germany, where the armistice was signed on Luneberg Heath. Along the way, he was awarded the Military Medal for an act of bravery.

Eleanor had worked for the Ministry of agriculture for 10 years as a veterinary assistant.

By the time this goes to press, two intrepid ladies from Rolleston will have reached the final stages of a charity bike ride across one of the most scenic routes in Britain.
