

The Village Hall continues to be successful. Its finances are in good health, mainly because of hard work by Peter Salter to develop and encourage weekday bookings.

It is used by a wide range of organisations, who like the quiet location and the facilities of the hall. It is very popular for business meetings. These events help pay for the running costs of the hall, without limiting its use by our community.

Your Hall Committee is busy organising and planning a number of events, which, together with Village Ventures (aka Live and Local) provide a good number of activities this autumn. 












### We're fortunate that eight years of economic growth, although slower than I would wish today, has led to unprecedented levels of employment in our area.

In fact, unemployment in the Newark constituency is now just 1%, amongst the lowest in the country. Living standards are starting to rise as real wages grow nationally, but we need to sustain that growth. My task as a Minister in the Treasury is to help us build a country not only of working people, but of well paid people.

These opportunities are not available to all in equal measure. Individuals with disabilities are often wrongly undervalued, despite the enormous contributions they make to British society and to the economy.

In the workplace, they can be discriminated against, as employers are either unable to accommodate their needs, or are unable to see the clear benefits that such employment can offer.

On July 13th, I organised an event in conjunction with Newark Jobs Centre and the Department for Work and Pensions, to inform local businesses about the Government's 'Disability Confident' scheme. The event was an opportunity for local businesses to engage in challenging negative attitudes towards employing disabled people, and hear about the importance of promoting equal employment opportunities and how being disability confident can change attitudes for the better.

The morning featured talks by a local law firm, Lincolnshire Sensory Services, and an interactive session in which participants learnt about workplace disabilities. There was also a networking session where locals with disabilities had the opportunity to meet with potential future employees.

The feedback I have received has been hugely positive, and I hope this goes some way to remove barriers that disabled people and those with long term health conditions have in employment locally. This ensures that disabled people are able to realise their professional aspirations.


Made for an audience of adults (which older children 10+ can enjoy) the show will have a real community feel and will feature live music and song to conjure

It is right in the middle of Southwell's summer programme of meetings and at the time of writing, the big summer showpieces will all have been and gone for 2018.

Family Fun Day took place on July 15th, with various different bits of children's entertainment going on throughout, including appearances by Mr Chirrups Curious Bug Farm alongside a vast array of children's rides and inflatables. Pony rides were also available, and speaking of ponies, fourteen Shetland's lined up in a three furlong race, with the first pony crossing the line, Hykos Bees Nees, ridden by Isabella Evans. There was also a seven race jumps card for people to enjoy, which produced three winners for champion jockey Richard Johnson!

As the racecourse now heads towards the final quarter of the year, it is time to really start

planning and get ready to go racing in 2019, which of course will be the first year that the course races under floodlights. 68 fixtures are scheduled to take place at the course in 2019, with 18 jumps fixtures and 50 all-weather meetings, including 20 floodlit fixtures.

### Rolleston ramblings

Scenic routes to walk or run, right on your doorstep!



This Summer we put our walking boots on and headed out across the fields to Fiskerton, then looped back to Rolleston. We clocked it at about 2.6 miles, but you can take a break halfway at the river.

We've chosen the phone box as our starting point... and we're off! Head down station road to the Holy Trinity Church....



Climb over the stile at the back of the church yard. Cross the next two fields, hopping over another stile on the way.





You'll come to a couple of small bridges that cross the River Greet and Marlock Dyke. Walk over these, and traverse the next field until you arrive at a gate that

opens out into Fiskerton.



The path bears right, then left at a gate, and brings you out at the main road. Turn left and follow the road around the corner and you'll be back where you started - at Rolleston's iconic red phone box.

Opposite the sign, there is a fairly well hidden, raised footpath. This can get quite overgrown so tread carefully. Follow this path over the field and head through a small wooded area, keeping Fiskerton Mill on your left. When you exit the wood, follow the path over the fields for some way and you will reach a path flanked with hedges.



At the Bromley, turn left and follow the river path until you reach the car park. Carry on besides the river railings until you reach the hump-back bridge. Cross the bridge (carefully, there's no pavement!) and walk a short distance on the right hand side of the road until you reach a hump in the road and a sign for the 'Fiskerton Piscatorial society'.



Turn left and head down Fiskerton Road, until you reach the T-junction. From here you can turn left, or go straight on to the River Trent. We decided to go right, as you can stop at Fiskerton shop for a newspaper and ice cream, or the Bromley for a cold drink and a pub lunch!





### NEWS FROM CLLR SUE SADDINGTON

I'm sure we all are losing patience with the A46 traffic fiasco and Network Rail's ongoing problems with their automatic barriers. Here are extracts from Cllr Sue Saddington's latest email to Nick Sandham, Network Rail:



### Dear Mr Sandham.

"You may already be aware that once again the barriers at the Newark Castle Station would not open yesterday and drivers were stuck one side of the crossing or the other.

Traffic built up from the North, South, East and West, totally blocking the town on one of the busiest days of the week, market day.

There are more trains on the Nottingham line, which one could consider is an improvement, however, little consideration appears to have been given to the impact more frequent barrier closures would have on our Communities and Businesses, not to mention those going to work and shop in Newark.

At least there should be a contingency plan that can be brought into action quickly when this problem occurs. When Network Rail decided to upgrade the Nottingham line with automated barriers, we were told it would be an improvement. I think drivers in and around Newark may be of a different opinion.

As you are aware, I represent residents North, South and West of the Newark Castle crossing. They are truly in disbelief that you are still having problems with these barriers opening and closing. Correct me please if I am wrong, but I was

once advised that you were aware these barriers had caused problems elsewhere. If this is the case, why were they ever fitted in Newark and Sherwood?

At the Communities and Place Committee on April 19th, 2018, one of the recommendations were that "Network Rail are urged to ensure the improvements to the level crossing operation form part of your future works to reduce operational closure times." Although you may not have been working on the line a closure such as happened yesterday is TOTALLY unacceptable.

I would like a reply to the following questions please Nick.

- Where are the apologies and explanations to the General Public and businesses?
- What actions are Network Rail taking to ensure this does not happen again?

There is a growing belief, I am told from emails I receive, that we as Councillors and apparently our MP, are not effectively challenging Network Rail.

I for one over the last two years have constantly challenged you over the shoddy workmanship and delays to our residents, as did the then Leader of Newark and Sherwood District Council, Councillor Roger Blaney. We are at the sharp end but have no control over dysfunctional barriers.

I know too that our MP has had meetings in London with the Secretary of State and Network Rail.

I have been asked by my Parishes that a public meeting is held in order that explanations can be given by yourselves and questions may be asked of you.

I would suggest possibly in early September. I await your comments."

She was very small when we took her and after a little illness she was well enough to





### History of Rolleston Exhibition

Our village is rich in history, with records going back for 1000 years, and baptisms, marriages and burials since the 16th century. A selection of historical information was displayed in the Church over a weekend in June, visited by not only villagers, but from a wider area, including a gentleman who had cycled from Sheffield!

Envelope addressed to William Holden Pepper - probably the husband of old Mrs Pepper. The display included photographs of the church and village covering some 130 years from the church archives, and some lent by Frank Mitchell from his collection. Some long standing residents were able to look through copies of the baptism and marriage certificates for themselves. Fortunately, nobody found themselves in the burial records, but they looked up information about relatives! These registers are always available in the church for visitors and parishioners.

David Parker brought copies of maps over the last centuries, including one from the Duke of Devonshire's collection covering

The uniquely important Rolleston Pewter was not on display this time as it is currently at the Civil War Museum, although we can retrieve it at any time for our own use. However, information about it was available for consultation.


this area in 1627.


Extracts from the diaries of the vicar from 1585, Robert LeBand are always of interest, and examination shows that the summer of 1590 seems to have been as hot and dry as the summer of 2018. In the sixteenth century, however, there was real concern about potential starvation over the coming months, because of all the dried up crops. No imports from abroad then!


LeBand was clearly a great character, and

recorded comments about parishioners in Latin in his diary. He drowned one night when he fell in the dyke on his way back from a drinking session with the vicar of Upton in 1625. His diary is on display in the Nottinghamshire Archives, but is difficult to read, but a printed copy of a transcript is in the church all year round. We are lucky to have important records which have survived the years. There is guite a lot to be found on the church web site rollestonchurch.org.uk and more is available for those who wish to dig deeper in the records held by Julian Ellis and Frank Mitchell and in the Nottinghamshire Archives. Nottingham University Archives also hold some records, a few of which are on-line.

### NEWS FROM CLLR ROGER BLANEY

AS TIERS GO BY? Last month, county councillors voted to support a proposal that the seven district councils in Nottinghamshire – including Newark and Sherwood – should be abolished and replaced with a single county-wide authority.

There had been no prior consultation with the councils themselves or with the public. I believe the proposal is an untimely distraction but on

one thing I am in total agreement: if we had a clean sheet of paper, we would not structure

local government as it exists today.

The proposal was also counter-intuitive. We already have the most centralised governance in Western Europe. So, at a time when the Government is about to take back powers from Brussels, when its commitment to 'localism' is in turn leading to the devolution of significant powers from Whitehall to the regions and when district councils are themselves devolving powers and responsibilities to their principal town and parish councils – as we have done recently in both Southwell and Newark – it is illogical for local services currently being delivered locally to be centralised upwards.

Already, Nottinghamshire County Council is the 11th largest authority in the country. It is an unwieldy, multi-layered bureaucracy with 18,000 employees - 1 for every 44 residents in the county. Why would we want to make such a leviathan even bigger? Indeed, some have made the case for the abolition of county councils and the devolution of all its responsibilities to district and parish councils. That would certainly be more consistent with the direction of government policy but I do not argue for that.

However, this is the wrong debate – and it is seeking to start with the answer not the question. Counties are big and can feel impersonal. Nottinghamshire has very different communities - Mansfield and Newark, Southwell and Worksop - as well as very distant communities; it is nearly 60 miles from Misterton to East Leake. Instead, we should be asking how we deliver efficient and good quality public services that are locally responsive. We are more likely to achieve far better outcomes and far greater savings through the county and districts working closer together, focussing on the needs of our residents and enabling more decisions to be taken locally. Collaboration not confrontation!

Changing structures will always carry risks as well as offering benefits. Evidence from elsewhere shows that moving to a single authority takes over two years, with significant upfront costs and interim damage to service delivery because of a focus on reorganisation rather than on service improvement.

Newark and Sherwood District Council has risen to financial challenges in recent years. We have restructured ourselves, redesigned our services, relocated our offices and become much more efficient. That is why our council tax has risen by just 4% in the last decade compared to the County Council's increase of 15%. A county-wide authority cannot be so fleet of foot and, inevitably, will be more bureaucratic and inefficient. But, if there is to be a debate, let us ensure that we have the widest possible debate, fully consulting our residents and communities, asking their views but not becoming distracted from the many other challenges and opportunities that lie ahead.

# From Double Entry to Cloud Accounting

This is the second half of Tom's history of accounting. It started with clay tablets 7,000 years ago - now read on...

Quills, made from goose feathers, and ink, from oak galls (no plastic to pollute the seas in those days) were all that was needed to record a merchant's transactions, oh and a sheet of vellum (tanned calf hide) on which to write. All organic, locally sourced and bio-degradable.

The merchant would keep a journal, a diary recording all amounts paid and received and all invoices for sales and expenses. This was his book of prime entry, his contemporary record of his business affairs. A good start but not enough. He needed to know if his venture was profitable, or was making a loss. To find out he would summarise all of his income and all of his costs in a secondary ledger, the nominal ledger. This showed all of the individual transactions, sorted by type e.g. purchases, carriage, insurance. His income was recorded as credits, his costs as debits. Assets were debits, and liabilities were credits. Deducting his expenditure from his income gave him a single number (much easier

to deal with one number than thousands), his profit or loss. Deducting his liabilities from his assets showed the value of his business reported in his Balance Sheet. This would increase if he made a profit and decrease if he made a loss.

This 'double entry' system, recording each transaction twice, once as a debit and once as a credit ensured that the books always balanced.

Five hundred years later this system is still in use, but with a difference. Cloud accounting systems allow instant access to all ledgers from anywhere in the world, with just a computer, or smart phone. Anyone with appropriate authority can access and make entries into the ledgers. No updating, no backups, these are automatic. As long as the records are up to date instant profit and loss accounts and balance sheets can be examined at any time.

Businesses are slowly changing to this platform. As yet few smaller enterprises have adopted cloud accounting but with the imminent arrival of MTD (the requirement for all VAT registered businesses to file accounts on-line every quarter) by April 2019 accountancy firms are expecting to be very busy next year!



So ends a mother's lament in letting go, And many before me have sang: Farewell to the student and hello to the man.





### **Apple & Cinnamon cake**

A nice everyday cake using any variety of apples you have, the more flavoursome the better and a good way to use up any 'past their best' fruit as they don't need to be crunchy just tasty.

- · 300g self-raising flour
- 11/2 tsp ground cinnamon
- 1/2 tsp salt
- · 250g demerara sugar
- 50g raisins
- 125g melted butter
- 175ml milk
- · 2 large eggs, beaten
- 250g apples, peeled, cored and chopped
- · icing sugar
- 1) Sift the flour, cinnamon and salt into a bowl. Stir in the sugar and raisins.
- 2) Mix in the melted butter, eggs, milk and apples and beat until smooth.
- 3) Turn into a lined and greased 20cm tin, round or square.
- Bake in a moderate oven for approx.
   hour until the cake springs back when lightly pressed.
- 5) Turn out onto a wire rack to cool.
- 6) Dust with icing sugar to serve.

### Parish Council News

I am writing this report during the brief respite between the early Summer heatwave which the village has enjoyed, and the return of glorious weather which has been forecast.

The formal work of the Parish Council also takes a temporary break, there being no meeting in August, but normal service is resumed on the evening of the first Monday in September.

Before breaking up for the Summer, the Parish Council slipped in an extra meeting to sign-off the Parish's Annual Return and accounts for the 2017/18 financial year, and these, together with the Governance Statements, have been available for inspection by all parishioners both on the Parish Council's website or on the village notice board on Corner Farm. From an accounting perspective, services were delivered on-budget, and actual income exceeded expenditure, assisted in no small measure by our success in securing grants, and overall the Parish Council ended the year in a healthy financial position, with an increased levels of capital brought forward.

One important role of the Parish Council is that of long-term custodian of land within the village held for the benefit of parishioners and their families, and other visiting members of the public.

With custodianship comes responsibility, in several forms. There is the inevitable financial cost of maintaining, insuring and securing the land and those structures standing on it, and the responsibility for the health and safety of people of all ages using the land, or living next to it. Much time and effort is expended by members of the Parish Council and many other individuals in the village towards meeting those responsibilities.

Perhaps the most important responsibility, however, is the care and judgment which need to be made regarding the use of the land, with the clear objective of optimising the benefits which the villagers derive from it. Ownership of the land, in itself, is not the objective, but rather the enjoyment or other benefits which can be gained from its ownership by an interested and committed local body.

Sometimes the Parish Council has to address conflicting views forcefully expressed by parishioners about the use of the land, notably the very understandable wish of some dog owners to be free to walk their dogs over the land which can conflict with the wishes of parents of young children to have dog-free spaces in which their children can play. Another example is whether to use the land to generate income for the Parish, perhaps from leasing space for holidaymakers to park caravans, but where such use could create a potential nuisance for nearby householders.

For the Parish Council to be able to make balanced judgments on matters such as these, it is important that we hear the opinions of as many members of the village as possible, and even if you are personally unable to come along to meetings of the Parish Council, I would encourage you to let us know your views by writing or emailing, as it is only by gauging the broad views of parishioners that the Councillors can best optimise the use of these important elements of village life.

### **Hidden Histories**

### Our guest contributor this issue is Liz Garrood, who shares some lovely family memories of Croft Farm in Rolleston.

Although I am a recent arrival in Rolleston, having moved into Holly Court last November, my connections with the village go back a good deal further. My grandfather, George Henry Crilly, came to the 'Homes for Heroes' in Rolleston with his wife and child (my Mum) on his return from fighting in WW1. Some time after, the family moved into Croft Farm.

My mother grew up in the village and attended the village school. Her first job was at Webb Woollies - a factory in Newark making knitted baby clothes. She travelled there by train from Rolleston Junction. She spoke of the Station Master in his top hat and, according to my mother, he had inflated ideas of his own importance! My father, Ernest Baxter, was also travelling by train to work in Newark (at Porter's grocers), coming into Rolleston on the Southwell Paddy and this is how my parents met. So Rolleston Junction has a special significance for me – without it I probably wouldn't be here!

My parents were married in Rolleston church in February 1940, in the snow (see photo), and their first home was in Southwell. My mother's younger sister Jean was also married in Rolleston church to a German POW, Adam Sonnenberg, who was working on Mitchell's farm I think. I was a bridesmaid at their wedding in 1956.





When I was growing up we lived in various places not far afield - Newark, Mansfield, Derby - and every weekend we visited my grandparents on the farm. The original farmhouse was an interesting building - see photo. All the farm buildings were behind, and a long narrow garden ran to the left parallel to the road - see photo. My brother and I used to go with Grandad to fetch the cows in for milking - this meant crossing the railway line but the cows generally responded to Grandad's cries of "Hup, hup" - even though he always carried a big stick! All the cows had names (Coral and Bluebell are the only two I remember) and it was a great occasion when a milking machine was purchased so Grandad no longer had to milk

by hand sitting on a three-legged stool with his head firmly into the side of the animal. Some crops were grown in the fields around the farm and also at "The Plots" – an area on the other side of the road down towards Staythorpe. It was a hard life. I don't think my grandparents ever took holidays. My Grandmother used to say: "the cows don't know it is Christmas!"

My grandparents retired from the farm in 1959 or 1960 and they moved to Farndon for a short time but came back to Rolleston having built a 'pre-fab' bungalow just opposite what is now the entrance to Holly Court. They lived there until their deaths in 1972 and 1973 and are now buried in the churchyard.



### Chris and Hannah Visit the Rosie May Foundation, Sri Lanka



On 28th May, 2003, at a Christmas party, 10 year old Rosie May was brutally murdered by a 17 year old boy. In her memory her devastated parents set up the Rosie May Foundation.

On the fateful 25th December 2004, the day of the Tsunami the family was on holiday in Sri Lanka, trying to recover from the pain of Rosie's death. The deadly Tsunami hit. They narrowly escaped, very lucky to survive. They felt it was as if Rosie had protected them, but for a reason. This tragedy inspired them to use the resources of The Rosie May Foundation to set up a home in Sri Lanka for children who had been orphaned by the tsunami that they had escaped.

#### Chris tells her story...

In June, my daughter Hannah and I fulfilled our dream of visiting the Rosie May Foundation orphanage in Sri Lanka. For over 12 years we have supported the fundraising activities for the Rosie May Home and more recently Project Hope helping pre school children and their parents to train In sustainable careers. Over 10 years, many of our local communities have donated by pledging money when supporting the many Dance leader showcases at the Minster school, Having helped to raise in excess of £12,000 with the support of the Minster over this period for such an incredible local charity based in Bingham, I vowed I

would visit the Rosie May Home when I retired.

This opportunity came a little sooner than I anticipated when I retired after 34 years of teaching, Hannah and I spent our first week volunteering in 2 pre schools by teaching them English and Dance. We also helped at Project Hope. teaching English to children from single parent families. Our experience was Incredibly humbling and rewarding. After a week we were fortunate in travelling round Sri Lanka in a bespoke tour. I would like to thank all those in the village who kindly sponsored Hannah in order for her to engage in her volunteering activities. Hannah is presently studying Anthropology at university.



The trip gave her a unique opportunity to experience the diverse culture and unique typography of such a beautiful country.






### Signs of a Return to Normality?

Our insect life: Finally, the butterflies put in an appearance (lots of Cabbage Whites) but far fewer Peacocks, Small tortoises and just one Comma. Seemingly always on a

mission to be elsewhere and not seen to stop and feed. Perhaps of greater interest; a hornet (very impressive yellow) then later one Hummingbird Hawk Moth. These migrate from Europe in warm summers so keep your eyes open, you may see one or better still hear one. Look out for a very long proboscis (the tubular mouth part it uses for feeding).

#### WELL DONE




