

Cllr Keith Melton

It has been two years since Storm Babet brought us the first of two supposedly "one in one hundred year" floods and we hope the dry period earlier in the year will have lowered the water table far enough to have given us some leeway in avoiding floods for the time being at least.

However, the underlying conditions leading to global overheating continue unabated as we approach the COP30 Climate Change global conference taking place in Brazil in mid-November. Research has shown that there has been more carbon dioxide released into the atmosphere in 2024 than in any years since those records began.

When I was born in 1947 there were 310 parts per million (ppm) of CO2 in the atmosphere and now that figure is 424 ppm which is the highest it has been for between three to five million years. As I am sure you know by now this means we are facing more extremes of temperature, more extremes of weather systems and so on, leading to the floods we saw with storms Babet and Henk so recently.

We can only hope that the global COP conference in Brazil will really begin to bring the political will needed to make urgent changes and move away from using fossil fuels, which is simply super-charging global over-heating.

Optimism rules

Being optimistic, however, there is some evidence that businesses are beginning to overtake politicians in realising that change is necessary, but that evidence is very fragile and the current administration in the USA is definitely not helping the situation.

On a different note it looks as though we may be having a very colourful Autumn this year with our trees – but this may be a result of the leaves accumulating more sugars than usual due to a hotter, drier summer, which causes a greater variety of coloration.

One of my biggest heroes, Jane Goodall, sadly died just recently, at the grand old age of 91, and although she was concerned over our future, she always retained an optimistic view of the world – provided we made sure we recognised that everything we do has an impact on the world, and choose to have the most beneficial, and least harmful, impact we possibly can as individuals.

Trees and The Plan are coming

Well, the long dry summer is now a distant memory and here we are again with the winter looming ahead. Let's hope that this year is flood free, but if it isn't at least we have equipment and flood wardens to help deal with it. Fingers crossed.

A date for your diary is Saturday, 6th December, when we plan to plant the trees provided by funds from the 'Trees for Climate Small Grant Scheme' run by Nottingham County Council. Time: 10am - 2pm (meet at Village Hall). Bring along your favourite spade and trowel, some shared tools will also be available.

The 21 trees will be in the form of 'feathers', about 1.5 metres high and will require planting on the day. We are looking for volunteers to come along and help with the planting. We hope to also have a variety of spring bulbs to plant around the trees, which should make the village look a lot more attractive place.

You are invited to come along to the village hall where we will be based for the day. Toilets and tea/coffee and biscuits will be provided. Children welcome.

The planting will take place in the 2-acre field adjacent to the village hall and the Kate Greenaway field at Corner Farm. We will be accompanied by Lynn Preece from NSDC, so we will have professional support on the day.

By the way, 'feathers' are the recommended size for planting new trees because there is less leaf and trunk for the plant to maintain in the early stages of growth. A more substantial rooting system will grow, which means there is a greater chance of plants growing successfully if we have a hot summer next year. (This tip from our excellent advisor and supporter at NSDC Lynn Preece).

We also plan to include an option for village members to dedicate a tree to someone or a special event in their lives. If you dedicate a tree, you may be more inclined to look after 'your' tree during its early life. If you wish to dedicate one of the trees, please email Steve Bailey: **bramleybaily@outlook.com**

Thanks to Michael Gemson, Steve Bailey, Sally John and Lynn Preece for their efforts in getting this project underway.

Look out for a village email with full details of the day.

The other main activity of the recent period is the development of the Neighbourhood Plan. Gill Rowles, Peter Garrood, Michael Gemson, David Chandler and myself have been busy with the development of the Neighbourhood Plan.

We have established the geographical area of interest to the plan and will be notifying NSDC after the coming PC meeting on the 3rd November. The next stage will be to include the history of Rolleston and to distribute questionnaires to residents in the village asking for your views on aspects of the plan as it is developed. We are also planning a village get together to discuss the plan and get the views of villagers. Watch out for emails and the questionnaire in the near future. It is important that we get your views as the plan will be taken into account in future decisions made by the Planning Committee ay NSDC. Completing the questionnaires and attending public meetings will make a significant contribution to getting your important feedback, so we sincerely hope that you will engage in this activity.

Another point of interest is traffic management and the racecourse. I recently looked at what directions are given to drivers wanting to get to the racecourse. It turns out Google Maps, which I think is used by a significant number of drivers gives a route which, you've guessed it, comes through Rolleston. This seems to be true when starting from cities such as Nottingham, Birmingham, Manchester, Sheffield, London etc. I have told the management at the racecourse about this, with no real response.

A bit of a surprise, especially when in conversation with Alec Jesowski I discovered that he had told them about the same problem back in 2015! I will keep going with this and let you know what happens next. Changing the given directions in Google maps should reduce the amount of racecourse traffic through the village.

Finally, as many will know, Pati Colman left the village in early October and is a big loss to the Parish Council.

The Parish Council meeting on the 6th October was cancelled because we weren't quorate. Please consider joining; it is interesting and can be quite fun.

One meeting a month is not too much to ask is it? If you want to know more, please contact me or one one of your Parish Councillors.

In touch with Council news

As I write this report, the leaves are turning. the days are cooler, and the nights appear to be getting darker earlier and certainly will do once we change the clocks.

Well! We have the Christmas events to look forward to and will endeavour to keep ourselves healthy and cosy throughout the winter months.

I had a meeting with the Highways District Manager recently, I have requested that the Rolleston to Fiskerton road is improved in the next financial year. I doubt it will be completely resurfaced due to cost, but it will be most likely be hot boxed in the bad parts.

Occupation Lane. I have received several reports regarding the condition of this road.

It appears that the road is rising in the centre and starting to crack. The Preventative Maintenance Manager has said he will see if the Mastic treatment is suitable, in the meantime, NCC will keep it under inspection.

Staythorpe Road apparently has a trench at the side of the road. I have asked for this to be inspected and repaired.

Staythorpe Power Station. I recently had a meeting with the Managers and raised the safety of the BESS site.

I asked if they had plans should there be a fire in the future. Clearly this was not on their radar, so I have asked them to set up a meeting with myself and those who would need to be involved and prepare a safe plan.

The reorganisation of Local Government is still under review. Recently the Reform Administration asked us to meet with them to make decisions.

They have already made their decision. The Conservatives maintain that any discussions about the biggest shake-up within Nottinghamshire's boundaries for 50 years should be made in public. We will engage fully in the democratic transparent process, debate

in the open and not try to fix the outcome in private.

The problem is, if we lose Districts with large properties to Nottingham City, for example Broxtowe and Gedling, they currently bring in high Council tax, so we could all be asked to pay more to keep the services which we currently enjoy. For example, Nottinghamshire's Highways, Schools, Social Services, Libraries etc.

We will continue to make our point.

If there is a Christmas lunch this year cooked and served by our wonderful volunteers. I will be happy to contribute some of my Divisional funding as usual. Also, always happy to pop in and see everyone. Any other event I would be happy to contribute towards.

In the meantime, I hope you do not catch the flu or the two Covid Viruses which appear to be affecting many. Keep warm and safe.

Claire's Recipe

One Ingredient Banana Ice Cream

We are on a bit of a healthier eating kick at Field Farm. Dinners are no problem, but we do love a pudding!

I couldn't quite believe that this recipe would work, but it does, so add it to your repertoire.

Ingredients:

• 2 ripe bananas (the fruit needs to be ripe for this recipe)

Method:

Peel bananas, cut into chunks, pop in a bag or lidded container and freeze for at least 2 hours or overnight.

Tip the frozen banana pieces into your

food processor and pulse until the mixture becomes first lumpy then crumbly then smooth, pulse for a few seconds more to aerate a little.

Add any flavours now if you like: choc chips, a drizzle of honey, peanut butter or half a teaspoon of cinnamon or leave as it is.

Scrape out the 'ice cream' and eat straight away, (note: it will be quite soft), or put into an airtight container and freeze until needed.


Use an ice cream scoop to serve portions as you want them.

Nurturing Nature in Our Village

Winter: A Season of Challenge and Care for Local Wildlife

As the village landscape transforms under a veil of frost and the days grow shorter, winter becomes a time of survival for our local wildlife. While we may take shelter indoors, the birds, mammals and insects of our region rely on us more than ever for support.

This season let's focus our efforts on making our village a safe haven for all creatures, great and small.

Supporting Birds and Small Mammals

Winter is a harsh time for birds and small mammals. Natural food sources dwindle, water freezes, and shelter can be scarce. You can help in simple but meaningful ways:

- Put out feeders stocked with seeds, nuts, and fat balls to provide high-energy food.
- Offer fresh, unfrozen water in shallow dishes or bird baths.

- Leave out fruit for thrushes, blackbirds, and other fruit-loving species.
- Place nesting boxes for birds and small mammals, or leave an undisturbed pile of logs or leaves in a quiet part of your garden to serve as a refuge.

Creating Garden Havens

Your garden, no matter its size, can be a critical sanctuary for local wildlife. Resist the urge to tidy every corner - piles of leaves, dead wood, and tall grasses offer warmth and shelter for hedgehogs, frogs, insects, and even overwintering butterflies. Native plants with berries provide much-needed nutrition, while dense shrubbery shields small creatures from the cold and predators.

Reducing Harmful Impacts

Seasonal festivities can sometimes inadvertently harm wildlife. Avoid tinsel and plastic decorations outdoors, as these can be hazardous to birds and mammals. Instead, opt for natural ornaments - pinecones, holly, and dried fruit are beautiful and safe. Be mindful with garden bonfires and compost heaps; always check for hibernating hedgehogs or frogs before lighting or turning piles.

Community Efforts for Wildlife Protection

Our village thrives when we work together, and wildlife protection is no exception. If anyone has some useful skills and knowledge, then reach out and we can look to organise community conservation events such as winter wildlife walks, or hedgehog house workshops. And wouldn't it be great if we could create connectivity between our gardens for the wildlife to wander – like hedgehog holes in fence. Can we outdo the success of a street in Keyworth village?

In 2022, Dale Road in Keyworth, Nottinghamshire, was named as Britain's Biggest Hedgehog Street by two wildlife charities: www.bbc.co.uk/news/uk-englandnottinghamshire-63096303

Planning Ahead for Spring

Winter is also a time to prepare for the coming year. Order native plants and seeds, plan wildlife-friendly gardens, or even start crafting insect hotels and birdhouses for spring installation. The care we show now will ensure our local wildlife emerges strong and resilient when the weather warms.

This winter let's champion the wellbeing of our wild neighbours. By making small changes at home and coming together as a community, we can create a landscape that allows wildlife to thrive all year round.

You can report any dog fouling to NSDC if it is in a public area either by phone or via their web site. For any dog related issues you can also contact the local dog warden on **01636 650000**.


