Ashley Hutchings MBE, known as The Guv'nor, delighted the audience at Rolleston Village Hall on 27th April.



PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

The Annual Parish Meeting, held on 8 May, heard contributions from our County and District Councillors and from representatives of the Church and Village Hall Committee.

The Meeting was also the opportunity for the Parish Council to review what had proved to be an exceedingly busy year, and the following are just a few of the highlights:

- From an administrative viewpoint the Parish Council welcomed three new Councillors, Barbara Sale, Ian Beadles and Lucy Sole – all welcome –and outsourced some of the clerking functions to drive down costs.
- The services contracted to be provided by the Parish were delivered within budget with the result that the Parish Council had been able to maintain the annual parish precept at its previous level (£6,250) and carry forward a respectable surplus
- The Parish had been consulted on and made representations in respect of 8 planning applications involving 6 properties in the village
- Acquired ownership of the Corner Farm land on behalf of the Parish together with a substantial sum for ongoing maintenance
- Applied for and won a £2,000 grant from the Supporting Local Communities Fund towards the cost of essential improvements to the village play park thank you Christine for all your hard work with what was a complex application. Thank you also to all the many volunteers who gave up their time two Saturdays ago to help weed and tidy up the play area.
- Tendered and negotiated a new contract for the maintenance of all the Parish land and buildings assets – thank you to Tony for overseeing this and also for leading the Parish Council's initiative to support improvements in the appearance of the

village which are already starting to make a positive impact.

- The Parish Council has also been an effective voice in liaising with, and, where appropriate, lobbying, external agencies responsible for delivery of services to the village, and on focussing the attention of our important and valued neighbours on their duties of care to the village. These include:
- o Highways Agency/(now Via) on essential repairs to the village's roads. Works planned to go ahead this Summer
- o Improvements to road signage to deter unsuitable traffic from damaging our roads
- o Network Rail on their seemingly ongoing programme of automation and investment in the rail crossings around the village
- o Nottingham Police safety neighbourhood group co-ordinating actions throughout the Trent Valley villages minimising crime;
- o Nottinghamshire County Council on potential impact of quarry and landfill sites being designated in neighbouring areas; and finally
- o The impact of Southwell Racecourse's flood alleviation plans and the duty of care owed by the various agencies tasked with managing any impact Nottinghamshire County Council, Environmental Agency and Internal Drainage Board.

The Parish Council is grateful to all those members of the village who take the time to come along to the monthly meetings and make their voices heard. You are all an integral part of the operation of the Parish Council and your contributions are important to us. I would hope to extend a welcome to more member of the village attending in the future.

Wildlife in Rolleston

An earlier than expected arrival of Spring has brought a few surprises, including a Comma butterfly in flight late March. Possibly one of last year's adults survived the mild Winter and took advantage of a sunny morning.



Commas usually put in an appearance rather later and can be recognized by:

- 1) Their 'tatty' wings as if grabbed in flight by a bird
- 2) A white C on the underside of the hindwing

Others seen include the Brimstone (pale yellow), Peacock, Orange Tip, Small Tortoiseshell and Cabbage White (hopefully not as many of these as last year!).

No sighting in the village to date of a Red-tailed Kite, though there are reports of one or more at the Ice Cream Parlour, Caunton.

Closer to home, our Kingfisher can be seen (if you're lucky) near the Mill, so too can two or three Grey Wagtails showing off their acrobatic skills catching flies on the wing.

A little further up the Greet, looking across the field towards the racecourse, a pair of mating Oystercatchers will hopefully raise young before returning to coastal waters in Autumn.

So ... keep looking and listening... there are surprises awaiting the observant!

Writing this at the end of May, whether I remain your Member of Parliament by the next edition of Rolleston Junction is in your hands, dear voters! It goes without saying that it's a huge privilege to represent our area and to help it realise its ambitions.

The week of writing has not been dominated by the General Election, but by the very tragic events in Manchester and their ongoing aftermath. The deliberate loss of any human life deserves our attention, but as a father of three young girls there was something

particularly personal about this attack: like many others, I could easily imagine myself stood in that foyer, waiting for my daughters to come out and into my arms.

I've organised a moment of reflection for our community to come together and send our thoughts and prayers to the people of the great city of Manchester which I'm holding in Newark Market Square - it will have been held by the time you read this. It will be led by the vicar of the Parish Church of Newark, the Catholic priest of Holy Trinity and I've asked an Iman I know, Mr Pirzada from Eaton in the north of my constituency to join us. Islamic terrorism must force all of us to confront radicalisation in our society, those who do not share our values and those that turn a blind eye to it, but it should not make us less tolerant of fellow law abiding citizens and their religious choices.

Whatever your political persuasion, I hope you used your vote in the General Election. Exercising our democratic rights, enjoying free speech and our hard won liberties is after all, the best rebuke to the terrorists. Keep safe, be vigilant, but don't let them win - Life goes on uncowed, that's the beauty of living in a free society.

On Sunday 10 May my husband David and I were marshalls for an annual cycle



event in aid of the charity REACH Disability Living. REACH is a very important resource for people in this area who have some kind of disability, including our daughter Laura Jane.

This was a new position for us as we are usually on catering duty up at their sister company Flower Pod in Southwell, from where the riders depart and return for their well-earned tea and cakes.

The weather was beautiful and there was a wonderful buzz of excitement. We were based near Ferry Farm Park at Hoveringham along the longest route which was 37.2 miles.

We set up camp at 9.30 am in our high viz jackets armed with binoculars, camping chairs and a flask of coffee. When we pulled into the allotted hardstanding we were parked behind a couple of ladies who apparently go down every day to feed the birds (and also the resident rat who crept tentatively out of the hedgerow to hoover up any bits!). They told us that they never tire of the view of the river and fields, and apparently it is wonderful there in autumn when the trees change colour.

We didn't have to wait long for the first eager and very fast riders, and then realised it was a full-time job for two as one of us had to hold open the field gate as there was a herd of cows and calves in there, whilst the other kept an eye on the approach road to the bend in order to slow or stop any oncoming traffic.

Needless to say we struggled to get that coffee and the 'Tail Rider' finally went through at 11.45 am!

Despite the hard work, we thoroughly enjoyed our morning as this beautiful stretch of the river is very popular with walkers, birdwatchers and dog owners who all



stopped for a chat, and one very kind gent even offered us a comfort break at his home in the village. Unfortunately there was no time for that

In all 428 riders of all abilities took part over 4 different routes. The event has so far raised around £6,500 for REACH who hope this figure will rise further as sponsorship money comes in.

NEWS FROM OUR COUNTY COUNCILLOR

It has been a privilege to represent the Farndon and Muskham Division for 12 years. Now, following the Election on Thursday May 4th, I shall continue to represent you in the Farndon and Trent Division.

Thank you to all those residents who supported me, which gave me a very pleasing majority of 1568. To those who felt they couldn't support me, I will still represent your views and concerns at County Hall.

Just to be absolutely clear, the Farndon and Trent Division does now include a part of Newark.

For an easy explanation - if we imagine from the corner of Morrison's on Northgate, the Division extends across to Appleton Gate, Carter Gate, Albert Street, Victoria Street and along Farndon Road into Farndon, extending as far South as Syerston.

All the area within Appleton Gate, Cartergate and Northgate, including the Newark Market Place, is within the Division. Kelham Road, Kelham Lane, Tolney Lane and Mill Gate are also within the Division.

Across the River Trent, the Division takes in Averham, Kelham and Staythorpe, Rolleston, Fiskerton, Morton and Bleasby.

Clearly the Division stretches across many miles and several Parish Council meetings are held on the same night.

I will do my utmost to attend Parish Council meetings, but it is inevitable I will only be able to stay for a short time at each meeting.

My thanks to all Parish Councillors and volunteers who give their time to run the Parish for the benefit of all residents, organising events and undertaking projects within the village, without which the village would be much the poorer.

Thank you also to Christine who is acting as our Clerk, not always easy, but well done to you all.

I should have my County Council Divisional budget, although small these days, and although I am happy to assist with projects within the village, the amount I am able to contribute usually equates to one coffee morning.

I am also happy to attend and support village events, but if not invited, I do not know they are taking place. I have a young grandson, William, who is always happy to accompany me and take part in the various games on offer.

There are also some new themed racedays such as Ladies Evening on 13th June and Nottingham Post Sports Day on August 28th





JOHN CANNER



John Canner, a stalwart of Rolleston life for some 27 years (1975 to 2002) died on 20th March at 97 years old.

Those who knew him remember a considerate and charitable man always willing to help in any way, and a true gentleman. He was active in village life as a Churchwarden and Parish Councillor, and was always involved in Rolleston activities. He was also involved in other volunteering work such as Toc H* in Ypres, and scouting.

John had a very varied life. Born in Lincoln, he spent until age 18 in China where his parents were missionaries. This explains the name of his bungalow in Rolleston – Pa Li Chuang (5 mile village), now the site of Mulberry House.

John was in the Royal Artillery in France in WW2 as a dispatch rider and was one of those evacuated from Dunkirk.

Although John was at one time involved in farming in Cambridgeshire, his main interest was in all things mechanical and he worked at Ransome and Marles, at Hoveringham Gravels as a service engineer, at RMC, Ruston and Hornsby and elsewhere as well as 2 years in the merchant navy.

John married Winifred, a nurse in 1943; a really nice quiet lady, always willing to 'do good' in a non-showy way. She kept Rolleston Post Office for many years.

John and Winifred had 2 children (Jane and John), 4 grandchildren, 10 great grandchildren and 2 great-great grandchildren.

Leaving Rolleston in 2002, they moved to Barton on Humber living in bungalow almost up until John's death, Winifred having predeceased him.

Amongst the many happy memories I have of John are our trips to the National Mining Museum, the Cutty Sark, Jodrell Bank, and Chatham Dockyard. In retirement John's hobbies were woodcarving and wood turning and several superb examples of this work survive him.

You can always tell when spring has arrived on the allotment.

One weekend is spent digging in beautiful sunshine and you only notice the bright red sunburn when you get home. The following weekend's dig is experienced through three layers of clothing with you going home when you have run out of hot coffee or soup! The true meaning of spring!



The recent AGM was well supported, held as usual at the Moon in Morton, with new members being welcomed. The usual topics of conversation are Brian's Bridge, water supply with pump, Bob's Bees, banks, safe storage and the car park. These are just a few of our projects to be carried out this year.

Now that nearly all the plots have been taken, we are reconsidering the organization of the carpark. The plots have now taken on very different identities. One has a beautiful crop of rather unusual taraxacum. They have a stunningly deep yellow flower - you might know them by their common name of dandelions.

At the other end of the allotment we have such organization that local market gardeners would be impressed by - poly tunnel, proper raised beds and a

structure for beans to grow, that is not made out of canes!

In the middle we have a newly erected fence made totally out of recycled pallets. It is lovely to see the different plots coming to life.



Most of us have sown a few seeds already.

Within the next few weeks, we will be planting onions, potatoes, beetroot, carrot, and a variety of salad leaves.

As the soil warms up, the season gets busier and most of us will be down there most evenings, hoeing and watering.

CLAIRE'S COURGETTES

Courgettes are my theme for this edition as it is one of the vegetables that people have a lot of success with in their gardens and allotments - in fact, usually so much so that they don't know what to do with them all!

First tip is - pick them whilst small. This will encourage more to grow and they are delicious when little and tender.

To cook small ones: Just steam whole or halved lengthwise, or saute quickly in oil or butter, or as a special treat perhaps pick the flowers and stuff them.

Stuffing for 8-12 heads: 100g ricotta mixed with a good tablespoon of grated parmesan, a handful of chopped fresh herbs (such as parsley, chives and fennel), salt and pepper to taste.

Gently spoon the filling into the flowers and twist the tops to keep it in. Heat up a pan of rapeseed or corn oil, to deep fry them, whilst making the batter.

Batter - 100g plain flour, 40g cornflour, 1/2 tsp salt 1/2 tsp baking powder and 200-250 mls cold sparkling water. Mix to a thin cream consistency. Dip the heads in the batter one at a time. Try a flower in the oil. If it sizzles, immediately pop in 2 or 3 more and fry for 2 minutes until pale gold and crisp. Repeat with the other heads and serve straight away with a sprinkling of coarse sea salt. Delicious!

For bigger courgettes: Try them grated in salads with carrots, nuts, seeds and a dressing, or cut them into ribbons or spirals (if you got one of those spiralizers for Christmas!) and steam or stir fry and eat with your favourite pasta sauce.



If you have been away and come back to large, bulbous courgettes with tougher skin, then pick them and peel if necessary and roast with tomatoes, peppers, garlic and onions. This freezes well and makes a good accompaniment to grilled meats and fish. If you can't face this then still pick them and put them on the compost heap (they will at least be returning goodness to the soil for next year) and hopefully your plants will recover and produce more baby ones until the first frosts.

'APPS' FOR ARTISTS


I've always enjoyed drawing and photography. Recently, I've begun to dabble with some of the great 'apps' available for tablets/ laptops.

Worth a try are "Sketches", "Procreate" and "Paper 53", which simulate a huge range of different media. "Prisma" transforms your digital photos, allowing you to select from over 40 painting styles.

Apps such as 'Paper 53', 'Sketches Pro' & 'Procreate' are largely designed to enable the creation and transmission of images from scratch, providing a range of tools, colour palettes, backgrounds etc. Some lend themselves to illustration, diagrams, graphs and text.

'Procreate' is the most sophisticated art programme I've come across for developing original work. I've barely begun to learn the basics. The 'Autumn Walk' illustration is drawn and coloured freehand using 'Procreate'. It's one of four drawings depicting the seasons - if you look closely - you might spot Ross, me and the dog!





'Prisma' on the other hand, translates a digital image / photo, using a style selected from a specified menu. 'Slab Square' is a photo taken using a mobile phone, which I then cropped & resized, before letting 'Prisma' to do the rest. All the images were made using an Apple iPad Pro ...(other makes of tablet are available)!

Some programmes are free to download and user friendly. It's easy to get started, but beware, it can be addictive!

When we started our humble chilli farm five years ago, we would have never believed that so many people would travel so far to buy our plants and pods and attend the annual Chilli Festival here at the farm.

With over 40 varieties - from the very mild Mexican Poblano or Spanish Padron (the roulette chilli) to the contender for the 'World's hottest chilli' - Dragon's



breath (grown and developed in **Rolleston!**) – chilies are all about flavour

of a Habanero when using in your favourite spicy dish.

We love harvest time when people come to us for 'Pick Your Own' chillies, as there are always people that say 'No, I would never eat a raw chilli', that end up buying these great fruits.

Borne of an idea after numerous trips to India, enjoying the full flavour of North and South Indian dishes, I realised that chillies were not about heat, and decided to grow some of my own.

Imagine the surprise of tasting our first grown chillies and finding such depth of flavours with lemon, pineapple, sweet fruit and other flavours in the fresh pods to enhance any meal.

Not only that, but the range of colours and plant forms are also wonderful.

Yes, of course there are very hot ones but with careful cooking, and understanding of the varieties, you can enhance any meal and not make it inedible with heat. At the end of 2016, we embarked upon our own range of Posh Pickles and Preserves.



Currently, ten great products – three nonchilli, and seven from mild to hot – even children enjoy the fresh taste of this exciting range of chutneys and relishes.



Now stocked in our newly opened shop and local delis, the range from Tangy Braeburn to Cheeky Chilli, tickle most taste buds.

In 2013 we held our first Chilli Festival and in 2017 this is proving to be even more popular bringing campers and caravaners from as far afield as Falkirk to Falmouth.



Supporting local businesses like The Sauce Shop, Maxey Farm Shop, Dotty Birds and more, this event has chilli stalls, non – chilli stalls, food drink, free children's entertainment and of course some fantastic East Midlands bands all enjoyed by local day visitors and travellers from afar.

"This is the happiest day of my life!"

He spoke quietly, with emotion. He was with his family and friends on the top of a London tour bus.

Five years earlier, four Syrian families had to make a decision. Their villages were under attack. All



they wanted was to live normal family lives, just as we do. There was no place in their lives for bombs, bullets and the threat of gas.

The government forces, ISIS, the rebels, everybody was fighting everybody; just what could they do except leave? Certainly this was no place for families with young kids.

Houses, cars, possessions left behind, they escaped to the safety of a refugee camp in Lebanon. This is where they lived for nearly five years until their turn came to be granted asylum in the UK.

These families were settled in Newark – eight parents, eleven children. NSDC found private rented housing for them and provided the bare essentials of furniture. A group of us in Rolleston set up the "Support For Syrian Refugees" charity. We work with NSDC and the Refugee Forum to help them settle in.

The men are desperate to work to support their families. They want to contribute, not take.

The families have to learn the language. To be "work ready" usually takes a minimum of a year, but even now the men are doing some unpaid voluntary work in Newark.

The adults attend English conversation classes. Their conversation skills are developing really well. The kids are amazing. One of the five year old girls can count up to

a hundred and proudly recites the days of the week!

What does "Support For Syrian Refugees" do?

Firstly, we help the families settle in by providing the basics that are not provided when they arrive.



Secondly, help them understand and enjoy the UK.

In May, The Refugee Forum and ourselves took the families on a day coach trip to London. We went on an open top London tourist bus.

After five

desperate years in a camp perhaps we can understand why this felt like the happiest day of his life.
