

One of the greatest pleasures of my job is my ability to take visitors around the Palace of Westminster and the rest of the Parliamentary Estate down in London.

When I was first elected as your MP back in 2014. I was startled to find out that very few people from Newark had ever been down to visit Parliament, particularly when compared to other nearby constituencies. I thought that did not seem particularly transparent, and set myself the task of rectifying the situation.

I have now taken well over 4000 constituents on tours of Westminster, showing them some 'behind the scenes' areas as part of a regular series of Coach Trips which I have organised for different villages throughout the constituency.

In the last few weeks alone groups from Southwell and from Bingham have visited. and I was delighted to show them around and offer a Q and A session in a room traditionally used for select committees.

I am equally keen to give young people the chance to see Westminster, and recently set about organising a work experience day for students from Newark and the surrounding villages.

On Tuesday May 22nd, I held a day of work experience for students from schools within my constituency, and had sixth form

students attending from Tuxford Academy, Toot Hill, and Magnus Academy after a rigorous selection process.

The students were delightful and impressive, I have no doubt that they will all go on to do wonderful things. They were able to watch one of my Ministerial debates in the House of Commons chamber, sit in on a select committee, and were taken on guided tours of Westminster and of Whitehall.

In memory of Richard (Dick) Brettle

Richard (Dick) Brettle sadly passed away on the 16th May at the age of 98 – he was the oldest person in Rolleston.

Born in Nottingham, his family moved to Woodham Ferrers, Essex where he had to cross the creek to school in Burnham-on-Crouch at low tide by horse and cart - and at hightide by boat.

He then moved to Meonstoke, Hampshire and attended school until the age of fourteen spending many happy hours in his garden which went down to the River Meon.

Dick wished his ashes to be scattered in the River Meon.

He moved to Nottingham at the age of fourteen and encountered algebra, science and woodwork for the first time. An apprenticeship at Portsmouth at a joinery/timber merchants then followed.

During this time, he joined the Territorial Army lured by the promise of a 2-week holiday away from home.

The outbreak of World War 2 saw him enlist and his outstanding wartime activities were detailed in the Spring 2017 edition of the Rolleston Junction.



His parents had moved to Keyworth, Nottinghamshire and at the end of the war he moved to a farming career at his uncle's farm.

He met Eleanor at the Young Farmers club; they married in 1955. They came to Rolleston 60 years ago and started farming at The Croft with 6 cows, a milking machine and a second-hand tractor. He farmed for 30 years and was retired for the same length of time.

We send our sincere condolences to Eleanor and their three sons, Peter, David and Eddie.

Helen Boyd, Show Jumper – Businesswoman

Helen lives in the village with her parents Suzanne and David. Helen has been riding since she was five years old; her first experience being on Muffin, a Shetland pony, who still lives in Edingley!

At the age of fifteen, not being able to afford an expensive fully trained horse, she bought Fielisa, an unbacked untrained Dutch Warm Blood.

It took just six weeks with Mum, Suzanne's assistance to train Fielisa, and make her rideable. Fielisa was a good choice, she has turned out well, and has laid the foundations for Helen's show jumping career.

Helen explains, "I chose Fielisa because she was a Dutch Warm Blood. This breed is delicate, springy, lighter, smarter and friendly, even caring". She explained that for both to be successful there has to be an almost unique close and trusting relationship between rider and horse.

After she left The Minster School Helen followed her business ambitions and graduated after a two-year course with a Level 3 Diploma in Business. She is also qualified as a Level 2 BSJA Show jumping Coach.

Most weekends Helen is successfully competing in show jumping events across the UK at British Show Jumping Association events. One of her favourite events is our local Newark and Nottinghamshire Show.

Helen is starting her own business, schooling horses, coaching riders and bringing on the next generation of talented horses near Hickling, just off the A46!

Helen described what she looks for in a horse, "A good attitude to work, a kind temperament, good breeding and lots of potential. I usually go for the smaller horses, 15.2 to 16 hands".



She coaches riders throughout Nottinghamshire and as far as Lincoln. When asked what advice she gives to her riders, "Set your goals, focus on them, don't put too much pressure on yourself, focus on one thing at a time, find a good coach to develop your skills and give you confidence, learn from others and, very importantly, enjoy what you do!".

Helen and her Mum, Suzanne make a strong team. She describes Suzanne as the best 'unpaid groom ever' and that, "Without her supporting me, advising me, driving me to events and just being there I could never do what I do. We are both hugely competitive".

Helen was very impressive to talk to. An accomplished international show jumper and an enthusiastic, savvy but grounded young businesswoman – not bad for somebody who is just twenty!

We both love going to the club, and hope to be in the display team one day if we keep working hard and working as a team.

Unfortunately they had their trailer with all their equipment inside stolen in January (worth in excess of £10,000).



It's a grave matter!

The church and churchyard are an important part of the assets of any village fortunate enough to have them. Holy Trinity is a beautiful and ancient building with weekly worship. It is for the people of Rolleston. This might sound obvious but just as the Vicar is appointed to be available for all parishioners irrespective of church attendance, so the church is a community asset to share in. In the vernacular 'use or lose it'!

Although the number of burials at Rolleston is at present relatively small, its significance to people is large. This includes the burial of ashes for which there is a designated 'Garden of Remembrance'.

The churchyard is almost full but there are requests for reserving spaces and an expectation that the churchyard will be available. This is why the PCC feels it is important for them to continue to provide an open churchyard into the foreseeable future for the village community.


I've tried to explain why the portion of land next to the old Vicarage cannot be received as a 'freebie' (in the Tons Tatler). It belongs to the larger Church institution that has financial responsibilities in providing ministry on a wide front. So it is what it is.

For a relatively small sum (c.£4,000) the extension to the churchyard will provide Rolleston with an open churchyard for the next few hundred years! We want to do this for Rolleston. If you could help us raise the money we'd all be grateful.

Just let Peter Salter the Treasurer and Churchwarden know how you can help.

Just for interest, parishioners and those on the church electoral roll have a right to burial in an open churchyard. Otherwise spaces can be reserved by 'faculty' (church planning permission) for up to 20 years. The incumbent, with the help of the PCC, has a degree of discretion in granting permission for burials, for example those who have been parishioners most of their lives but latterly lived outside the parish. There are guidelines and a churchyard policy available at the church or online via the Diocesan website www.southwell.anglican.org I hope that helps to clarify things. I'd be happy to help further.

NEWS FROM CLLR ROGER BLANEY

A Call For Action! Late last year, Highways England – the public body responsible for the strategic road network – identified the improvement of the A46 Newark Northern Bypass as one of their Top 15 priorities nationally.



This is essential for the long-term success of the 'A46 Growth Corridor', the key east-west route that links the Humber ports through Lincoln, Newark and the East Midlands to Birmingham and beyond. This project has been accepted by central government, but the estimated cost is over £350m and the target completion date isn't until 2027, almost a decade away.

This is unacceptable. There has been chronic under-investment in transport infrastructure in the East Midlands for decades, under governments of all political colours. Indeed, we have the lowest level of public expenditure in total and per head of any of the 10 regions in England, not just on transport but on the wider definition of 'Economic Affairs'.

In November, I attended and spoke at a regional conference that brought together MPs, local authorities and business leaders from across the East Midlands. We agreed to speak – shout – with one voice that, on the government's own evidence, there will be a greater return in economic growth and productivity from investing in the East Midlands than in any other region.

In recent meetings with Robert Jenrick, now a minister at the Treasury, and with a senior civil servant, I have been assured that our message has been heard within Whitehall. Let us now see that turned into action. And an earlier completion of the A46 northern bypass would be a good place to start.

Richard's Skydive Challenge

Richard Thackeray, who turned 50 on the 15th March this year, will be marking his special birthday by completing a challenge in July for charities that are close to his heart.

Richard, who served 11 years in the RAF between 1984-95, said, "What better way to celebrate my 50th year and mark the 100th anniversary of the RAF, than to jump out of a perfectly serviceable (hopefully) aircraft and raise money at the same time? My wife, Sarah, who also served in the RAF for four years, thought The RAF100 Appeal was an amazing idea. We wanted to support the families and charitable trusts of the RAF."

Richard mentioned that his late father, John Thackeray, served in the RAF Regiment for 22 years. Clearly, the RAF100 Appeal resonates strongly within the Thackeray family. Richard continued, "I will be taking part in the event called 'I Weekend, 100 Tandems' on the 20th July 2018. We'll climb to 13,000 feet, take the jump, free fall for one minute before pulling the cord - and then it's a five minute parachute ride back to Farth."

Today, Richard is still very much involved in aviation in the UK and internationally. He



formed a company with a number of his ex-military colleagues and uses his specialist knowledge gained from his time in the Air Movements trade in the RAF.

The picture shows him in front of Air Force One, carefully taking care of the logistics, during a visit to the UK by the then US President. Barack Obama.

We wish Richard a safe and exhilarating descent; each minute of his actual parachute ride will represent a decade of his 50th year!

'Love all, trust a few, do wrong to none.' William Shakespeare



Dear All,

As a small boy I discovered my Dad's collection of old 78's including 'The Java Jive' by the Ink Spots...'I love coffee I love tea, I love the Java Jive and it loves me'...I still love that song, and it made me realise my Dad might be 'cooler' than I thought.

We all 'love' lots of things maybe its coffee, red wine, a favourite football team, winter evenings in front of a log fire or the dog (Leonard is doing fine), a long list. There again we could make a list of things we don't love, possibly including queues, gooseberries, particular relatives, a neighbour or two and certain politicians? An even longer list?

No one would deny the fundamental importance of real love to psycho-emotional health. Yet what we value so highly, is so hard to demonstrate consistently, or find or keep. We can tolerate, avoid, criticise from afar and more but to love people is strangely a problem.

Jesus of course is one of the exceptions 'love one another as I have loved you' he said. John in his Gospel says Jesus 'commanded' us to love. But can you be 'told' to love, it didn't work for me and my sisters! Jesus said we should be prepared to lay down one's life, put the good of others first, even forgive? In 1984 the totalitarian Big Brother frightens and oppresses his subjects and finally tells them to love him. The hero resists and is brainwashed, which is frighteningly successful. He ends up 'happy' because 'he loved Big Brother'. You know at this point our hero has ceased to be truly human.

Real love must involve choice. The 'command' is that we should make it a top priority. Should we think again about what love really is and isn't, and try it out in practice, especially with those who may not return it?

Gurkha One-The Story

There's quite a story behind Rolleston's national award winning restaurant, Gurkha One.

Thirty years ago, Jamil discovered his passion for food, peeling onions in the renowned Saagar Restaurant in Nottingham. For fourteen years he worked as a sous chef, developing, refining and perfecting his cooking skills. He then graduated from waiter to manager of an Indian restaurant in West Bridgford. Then Michaela and Jamil met and everything changed!



Michaela and Jamil are partners in life as well as at work. Michaela was a Special Educational Needs teacher before she met Jamil. They were friends for three years "before Jamil plucked up the courage to ask me out for a meal". That curry in a Leicester restaurant completely changed their lives.

After a year together they started their first business from home, catering for dinner parties and delivering freshly cooked food to customers' homes. This became so busy so quickly they decided to look for some small premises to open a restaurant. They had little money so everything they bought had to be paid for on a credit card! The first Gurkha One was opened on 29th October 2014 in a slightly run down hotel on Mansfield Rd, Carrington.

They had one simple principle that they still have today, to make home style food with high quality ingredients cooked freshly to order!

Michaela explains, "The first few weeks were nerve racking, having only a few customers some nights, sometimes none. We stuck at it, and over the next two months we got busier and busier as customers returned and told their friends about us".

Jamil was fully occupied in the kitchen. Neither Michaela nor her daughters Beth and Annie had any experience of running a busy front of house or waitressing; they had to learn as they went along – and that was scary! At weekends Beth came down from university at Newcastle to help and Annie worked most nights after she had done her homework.

Then something amazing happened – Gurkha One achieved first place, no 1 on Trip Advisor, voted top out of 1050 restaurants in Nottingham, including 89 Indian. (This is a popular web site that rates the popularity of restaurants from customer feedback).

The word spread quickly and Gurkha One completely outgrew its premises. Team Jamil, Michaela and the girls unanimously decided it was time to move! Beth found The Crown. The family fell in love with the idea of a village location. Gurkha One Rolleston was born.

Gurkha One quickly took off attracting many of its Nottingham customers together with an ever increasing number of locals. The gamble had paid off.

Jamil summarises their success, "Give a quality eating experience - fresh ingredients, cooked to order, friendly well trained staff, keep trying out new recipes, but above all, passion". He adds," We involve our staff in menu planning and encourage their ideas for change or innovation. They soon become as enthusiastic as we are".





Their journey has been a roller coaster. The lows were in the early days, a chronic shortage of money, finding and keeping the right staff. The highs were being no 1 on Trip Advisor, winning industry awards as the result of nominations from Gurkha 1 customers, meeting so many customers who have become their friends, growing a successful business and building the Gurkha One team – known as the G1 Family! Michaela is excited about the future, "The refurbished bed and breakfast has really taken off; our special theme evenings have been sell outs. We've started doing private functions and are planning to open a cookery school

Daughters Annie and Beth are really proud of Jamil and Michaela's achievement. Beth sums up her feelings, "I'm so proud of Mum and Jamil when I remember where they started; I love helping out whenever I can". Annie adds, "I feel so proud to be part of Gurkha One".

In September, Jamil and Michaela, are flying to Italy to tie the knot in one of the most romantic places ever, The Cloisters, a beautiful secret garden in Sorrento.

We wish them every happiness... but don't stay in Sorrento too long!





Lemon Posset

My recipe for this edition is really simple. A lovely Summery pudding, using only three ingredients. It is quick and easy to make.

Ingredients

- 300ml double cream
- 1 lemon, rind and juice
- 100g caster sugar or to taste

Method

- 1) Heat the cream and sugar in a large saucepan until the sugar has dissolved.
- 2) Bring to the boil and cook for a couple of minutes, careful it doesn't boil over.
- Take off the heat add the zest and gradually stir in the juice.
- 4) Pour into glasses or ramekins, 4-6 depending on size, chill.
- 5) Decorate as liked. Good served with shortbread biscuits and fresh fruit.

Mary Berry does a nice variation using Elderflower cordial - 300ml double cream, softly whipped, gradually pour in the cordial and whisk until combined, pour into glasses or ramekins and freeze for 4 hours or overnight. To serve take them out of the freezer for 15 minutes to soften slightly. You can make this with other flavoured cordials (not juice) you need the sugar content to make it smooth.



26 mile Moon Walk for breast cancer charity!



With a rodeo theme for the event this year, the 2018 London Moonwalk kicked off in a huge pink tent with a Dolly Parton look-a-like and possibly the biggest line dance ever.

22,000 women (and men), in their decorated bras then set off in the middle of the night to walk 26.2 miles around London, to raise money for research into breast cancer and to support those living with breast cancer or bereaved by it.

8-10 hours later they crossed the finishing line, tired, aching, and sore. Each one had their own story to tell and their own reasons for being there. For every walker, this was a very personal challenge but together they raised over 3 million pounds for the charity.

Our sincere thanks go to everyone who supported us; our small team of four contributed £4,000 to this total and it's still growing.



Hidden Histories

Since the last issue, I've had some interesting input from Frank Mitchell and Eric Ulyatt; both were very helpful in walking me around the village and showing me the location of other shops and services that used to be in Rolleston.

The previous two articles focused on Penny Lester's house as the former Co-op, and Mike and Jenny Edmond's cottage on Station Road which used to be a butcher's shop and part of a baker's, housing a large bread oven.

The house where Eric lives, (recognisable by the 'Budgies for Sale' sign), was previously the home of the Mitchell family, (in fact Frank was born there). It was also where the famous author and illustrator, Kate Greenaway, stayed with relatives during her early life. At the gable end of the cow shed, (to the left of the five-bar gate), there was an alteration to the brickwork. It looked like a previous opening, either a door or a window, has been bricked up. Frank's father used to say that the cowshed had been a **butcher's shop** in previous times, although this information may have been anecdotal and mentioned by other residents in Rolleston when the Mitchells first moved in.

Although there was no other evidence to support a butcher's shop here, Frank's brother, Gilbert, recalls seeing a tiled counter inside. It does seem feasible that farms or small holdings in the locality may have sold their own meat, when it was available.

During local history research by Frank, an article from the 1920's mentioned a grocery store and a butcher's shop, which had originally been placed in the hands of ex-service men, were running at a loss. Eventually the grocer's was taken over by the Southwell Industrial Cooperative Society, but it was decided the butcher's losses (at £117.12s.5d) were too great to take on and it ceased trading. Perhaps the butcher's shop referred to in the article was in fact the one in the cowshed at Eric's place, which now houses the budgies.



There were two other shops remembered in the village; "Mrs Facer's", now home to the Jennings family, on the right-hand side of the main road as you head out towards Staythorpe, just past Corner Farm Close. The shop operated from the front room of the house and sold Lyon's pies, sweets and other confectionery. Eric recalls that Mr Facer, (Archie), was a lorry driver collecting milk churns from the various farms.

Then there was Mrs Brittan's, the corner shop, now "The Corner House", home to Dan and Ali Blanshard and family. Eric remembers she sold sweets, crisps, cough medicines and other sundry items.

Another essential service was provided by the post office which has had various locations across the village. Of greater interest, are the people in the community who acted as postmistresses throughout the years. There was Lil' Pepper, she lived in the house to the right of the Crown and was the sister of Sam and Billy Pepper, Lil' also had a sister called Flo'. You may remember that both brothers featured in the black and white photograph in the Spring issue of the Rolleston Junction, showing the floods in Rolleston of 1921. Sam Pepper, (the postman) was posed in the picture, handing a letter to Mr Dudderidge, the Stationmaster, who was traveling in a horse and cart. All four Pepper siblings were all unmarried until Sam married quite late in life, after which he took the tenancy of the small holding where Abs, Thea and Sammi Chaaban now live, (Elmcroft), and which earlier had been farmed by Eric's grandparents.

Two other postmistresses were remembered by Eric and Frank; Ester Keal, when the **post office** was located at Pear Tree Cottage, and Mrs Canner, when the post office was a 'pre-fab' bungalow, before a house was built on the plot where Malcolm and Linda Mason now live. The post box is still situated outside their house on the road.

There was a **blacksmith** in the village, at one end of what used to be the village green. Frank recalls when he was ten years old learning some new words uttered by the blacksmith when the horses started kicking! The last "Smithie" was an Arthur Hall, who lived in Bleasby. Eric mentioned that before that it was a Mr Clark.

Regarding other trades and important services in the village, Eric worked as **carpenter**, for Bob Lee, who used to live in the house which now belongs to Brian and Kay Smith, near the church. The workshops were at the back of the property. As well as providing services for the building trade, they specialised in constructing the hurdles for racecourses around the country including Southwell. Eric mentioned that Bob Lee, (senior), did general maintenance for Southwell racecourse, including looking after the grounds and the jumps.

My thanks to Frank and Eric for their reminisces and factual information about the shops and services that used to be in Rolleston.

From clay to the cloud – The story of accounting

The earliest evidence for writing, that is an abstract, rather than pictorial representation, is from the ruins of Uruk (in modern Iraq)

Around 7,000 years ago this prototype city had, through necessity, to invent procedures for supplying the citizens with goods and arranging trade and contracts.

To enable this they invented writing. Instead of making tokens of clay or repeating pictorial representations to represent goods, wedge shaped marks were pressed into wet clay which was dried in the sun to produce a permanent record of the transaction. One combination of marks would represent "sheep" another set would mean "barley". Other combinations would stand for the quantity of goods. These small clay tablets, millions of which have been unearthed from desert ruins represent the earliest writings ever found - accounting documents.

It was the complexity of life in the city, compared to the simple lifestyles of hunters, herders and farmers, that drove the invention of writing, arithmetic and accounting records. These enabled the rulers, kings and priests, to control and protect the citizens and were the basis of the earliest forms of taxation.

Later, poetry, epic tales, laws and government documents copied this form of recording developed by our earliest accountants.

The invention of money, in the form of standardised weights of silver and/or gold, around the mid-sixth century BCE in Lydia (now part of Turkey) enabled trade, both locally and distant by providing a trusted, portable, enduring, reliable means of exchange and made exchange of goods and the provision of services far easier as these could now be priced in money rather than bartered (how much barley is needed to buy a sheep or a haircut?)

Accountants could now really get going, instead of recording numbers of livestock, volumes of

wine or bushels of wheat all transactions could be measured in standard units of money - denarii, ducats, crowns or pennies.

Trade, particularly over large distances was difficult, dangerous, and prone to catastrophic losses. To finance these ventures individuals who had acquired great wealth would invest in the hope of a share of the profit. Records of these investments, costs of the venture and revenue from the sale of these goods would be needed to divide the profits and to pay taxes.

These records were initially kept in journals, recording the day's transactions, but, as the trade grew larger it became more difficult to record and control so a new system of recording was devised. Instead of making a single entry for every transaction each entry was made twice, once as a debit (left hand side) and once as a credit (right hand side). Periodically a test, or trial was made to check the accuracy of the bookkeeping. The debit amounts were added together and compared to the total of the credits. If the totals were the same the accounts "balanced". This double entry system, developed in Renaissance Italy and popularised by Luca Pacioli in his "Summa Arithmetica" is still used today.

Seven thousand years on today's businesses are increasingly using the on-line miracle of Cloud Accounting. Businesses can now share information on-line with their accountants and some even hand over the day-to-day running of their book keeping.

Also, having been inspired by Harold's love of the game of Lawn Bowling, she was a reasonably active member of both the Barnston and Southwell Lawn Bowls Clubs.

Although her wide circle of friends in this area really blossomed with her's and Harold's arrival as Landlord and Lady at the French Horn in Upton - continuing for many more, very happy and significant years at the Bromley Arms - she enjoyed her earlier years in similarly sociable ways.

At 18 yrs she became a Red Cross Nurse with the cigarette firm of John Player and Sons, in Nottingham. At the age of 20, she ice danced with the White Heather Ice Dance Club, the highlight of which was her part in a televised demonstration by the Club. After hanging up her ice skates, she took up Scottish Country Dancing, in which she performed as part of a Birmingham based demonstration team, latterly becoming an instructor at schools in Birmingham, Nottingham and closer to home here at Upton.

Her school sports were netball, hockey and especially swimming at which she gained her Half-mile Certificate and the coveted Life-saving Award.

Since her passing on Easter Day this year 2018, at 91½ yrs, I have found losing her to be a far more significant emotional challenge than I had ever expected it could be. This to me, has reinforced the significance of the wise expression that says: 'One does not know how much you value someone or something until they are gone'.

God rest you Mum. And to all her friends and acquaintances, please feel free to visit her grave in Rolleston Church Yard whenever you feel like doing so. Any floral additions to the grave will always be gratefully accepted.
