2	THE COURT: Good morning, everyone. We're
3	here via Zoom conference in the matter of
4	Department of Health versus Heidi Marjaana
5	Lahteenmaa. Is that how you pronounce your name,
6	ma'am? Doctor?
7	DR. LAHTEENMAA: Yeah, that's pretty good.
8	Yeah, that's close enough.
9	THE COURT: Why don't you pronounce it, and
10	I'll try to get it your way.
11	DR. LAHTEENMAA: Heidi Marjaana Lahteenmaa.
12	THE COURT: Lahteenmaa?
13	DR. LAHTEENMAA: Yeah.
14	THE COURT: I'm Bob Cohen. I'm the
15	Administrative Law Judge assigned to the case.
16	The Division of Administrative Hearings Case
17	Number is 24-4162PL for a professional licensure.
18	The case concerns the issue of whether the
19	Department's administrative complaint alleging
20	that Dr. Lahteenmaa is unable to practice as an
21	osteopathic physician with reasonable skill and
22	safety to patients due to unspecified psychosis
23	and whether that's supported by the law and facts
24	applicable to this proceeding.

- R. MORKIS: Yes.
- 3 THE COURT: Thank you.
- 4 As the procedural rules of the hearing are governed by the rules of administrative procedure, 5
- which is Rule Chapter 28-106 of the Florida 6
- Administrative Code, as well as Chapter 120 7
- Florida Statutes, the Administrative Procedure 8
- Act. 9
- At the conclusion of the hearing, it's my 10 11 responsibility to issue a recommended order to the 12 Board of Osteopathic Medicine setting forth findings of fact, conclusions of law, and a 13 recommended disposition of the case. The parties 14
- will have the opportunity, if they desire, to 15
- submit proposed recommended orders, and we'll talk 16
- about the timing of that when we get towards the 17
- 18 end of the hearing.
- 19 Let me ask the parties to identify yourselves
- 20 for the record, beginning with the Department
- Counsel. 21
- 22 MR. MORRIS: Michael Morris for the
- 23 Petitioner, Department of Health.
- 24 THE COURT: Okay. And do you have a
- designated representative with you here today? 25

MR. MORRIS: I don't know if -- she is not on 1 2 yet. It would be Niaah Ellis. THE COURT: Okay. 3 4 MR. MORRIS: N-T-A-A-H $E-I_1-I_2-T-S$. THE COURT: Okay. So, we'll get back to that 5 in just a minute. 6 Doctor, would you identify yourself for the 7 record, please? 8 9 DR. LAHTEENMAA: Heidi Marjaana Lahteenmaa. Do you need my driver's license number? I think 10 11 it said something about it. 12 THE COURT: I do not. You're the respondent 13 in this case, so I believe you are who you are, and you've certainly communicated a lot with the 14 15 division through your filings. So unless there is 16 a question from Mr. Morris or the Department, I 17 will not need any further identification from you. MR. MORRIS: No question, Your Honor. 18 19 THE COURT: Okay, good. 2.0 Are there any preliminary matters we need to discuss before we get started? 21 MR. MORRIS: Your Honor, as far as exhibits, 22 23 we're not going to be objecting to any of the Respondent's proposed exhibits. I do believe she 24

has an objection to all of ours, but we're not

1	objecting	to	hers.
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2 THE COURT: Okay. Doctor, do you have an objection to the Department's exhibits?

DR. LAHTEENMAA: Well, being that all my devices, like pretty much every single one, are hacked, I mean, how do you know what is valid and what is not? They have been hacked ever since my whistleblowing, but I guess we'll get into that.

THE COURT: Well, we're going to talk about that. I don't know that we're going to get much into that, because in my capacity as an administrative law judge in this type of proceeding, I am bound by the allegations within the four corners of the administrative complaint filed by the Department and Board of Osteopathic Medicine against your license.

There's a lot of other information that I've seen, as you know, as you filed a couple of motions to dismiss, and I've dealt with those, that relate to matters that are not only outside the scope of what an administrative law judge does, but are not related to what's in the complaint against you.

And I'll start with anything regarding your former attorney, there's a lot of information that

was submitted in this case that has to do with actions of your attorney and potential grievances against your attorney. But that's -- grievances against attorneys in the state of Florida are handled by the Florida Bar and ultimately by the Florida Supreme Court, not by the Division of Administrative Hearings. I have absolutely no jurisdiction to take any evidence regarding that and to do anything with that evidence.

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If you have an issue with your former attorney or with any attorneys, you have to file a grievance with the Florida Bar, and they're in no way connected with us. They're independent of the executive branch of government in Florida. It's part of the judicial branch, actually part of the Supreme Court.

DR. LAHTEENMAA: Yes, I did file a complaint with the Florida Bar.

However, as far as the cyber attack evidence, I feel that is pertinent to this case. That is at the core of the allegations, so I think it should be covered. Without that, no diagnosis can be made.

THE COURT: Okay. Well, when you testify, you'll be able to submit that, because in this

case, the Department has the burden of proving that by clear and convincing evidence, which is a pretty high standard, that you -- in the words of the administrative complaint, that you're unable to practice your profession with reasonable skill and safety. And it's based upon a specific --well, I shouldn't say that, use that word --unspecified psychosis, or a psychosis of unspecified origin.

So, anyway, the Department has the burden of proof. That means they'll be putting their case on first. You'll have the opportunity to cross-examine any of their witnesses that they call.

And I noticed that you filed a document entitled Notice of No Witnesses, and I reviewed that document. It's something I've never seen before. I mean, of course, if you're not calling any witnesses, that's okay. I mean, I've had plenty of people testify on their own behalf and not call additional witnesses.

DR. LAHTEENMAA: May I say something about that?

THE COURT: In just one minute, please. I want to ask a question, and then I think your

1 response would cover this.

And you -- the reason you gave in the second

paragraph is due to credible, you're not

calling -- you don't intend to call any witnesses

at the hearing due to credible concerns of witness

intimidation, potentially involving mafia,

Teladoc, and cyber gang elements tied to a sealed

Teladoc investigation.

DR. LAHTEENMAA: Yes.

THE COURT: I don't know what any of that's about, but I am not in the business of intimidating or harassing witnesses. Any witness that testifies in this proceeding will be sworn in, and they will have the opportunity to give full and complete testimony.

If I hear anything that I've never heard from Mr. Morris, but if Mr. Morris were to, other than a legal objection, if Mr. Morris were to try to intimidate a witness who's on the stand, I would have something to say about that at the time. I don't expect that to happen today or ever. So, and I will say that I've had some attorneys in the past who have been, let's say, aggressive towards witnesses who are on the stand, and I shut that down pretty quickly. I don't expect to see that

And I really don't see -- I'm sorry you

thought you couldn't call other witnesses if you

wanted to call witnesses, but it's not because of

anything that's going to happen in this proceeding

today or in any order that I issue concerning this

proceeding. So if you want to comment on that,

please do.

DR. LAHTEENMAA: Yes. It's not that I don't want to have witnesses. I would love to. But they do not want to be here. Reason being, all of this started after I was on Teladoc, which is a global organization. It's the biggest telemedicine company in the world. They have 80,000 clients in the United States alone. They're in over 130 countries. And this is open court, right? It's open to public.

I have been harassed ever since my whistleblowing. So when my friends found out about that, they don't feel comfortable coming to open court on Zoom where Teladoc, personnel from Teladoc, or Mafia, the cybergangsters, could possibly be present. They told me that. And I'm not going to push them to do that. I don't think that's fair.

So that's why. I don't mean I'm intimidated 1 2 by you guys, no. But organized crime. And Teladoc is a big company. Whistleblowers die all 3 the time. What happened to Boeing whistleblower? 4 I mean, it's not like you can just ignore it. 5 It's a fact. So, no, I don't have the -- I'm not 6 allowed to have witnesses for that reason. I'm 7 not going to force them. 8 9 THE COURT: Well, you do have the opportunity to have subpoenas issued by me that could be 10 certain witnesses that would command them to 11 12 appear in court. DR. LAHTEENMAA: Yes, I understand, but I 13 14 don't think it's ethical. It's not right. they don't want to do it, and it could be 15 16 dangerous for them, I don't want to do it. 17 don't think it's right. THE COURT: Okay. Well, that's your choice. 18 19 I mean, it's --2.0 DR. LAHTEENMAA: Well, it's not really my choice. I have to do it. I'm not going to force 21 22 them. It's the situation, it's absurd. 23 THE COURT: Well, I can only consider the evidence that I hear during this proceeding, so --24

DR. LAHTEENMAA: Yeah, it's very unfair.

THE COURT: Okay. All right. So, any other

preliminary -- I guess, Mr. Morris, we'll take up

your exhibits as you offer them into evidence, and

I'll make rulings at the time. There aren't that

many exhibits. I think there are a total of,

6 what, 12?

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MR. MORRIS: Twelve. We have 12 exhibits. I believe she had some 30-something, but we have no objection to her exhibits coming in.

THE COURT: Okay. Then I will admit Respondent's Exhibits without objection.

I'm going to reserve ruling on whether I believe the exhibits are all relevant because I have not read the exhibits. I don't read the exhibits until they're accepted into evidence, but I will certainly take them into evidence, and we'll see if, to the extent that they're relevant to the issues in this case, I will use them in reaching my decision.

All right. If there's nothing further as preliminary matters, let me ask first if you want the rule invoked? And, Doctor, invoking the rule means that only the witness who is testifying at the time is allowed to be present on the Zoom in the hearing room. Of course, you are allowed to

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THE COURT: Okay. All right, then. We'll

deal with that if another witness comes on, but

let me ask if the parties would like to make brief

opening statements, beginning with the Petitioner,

6 the Department?

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7 MR. MORRIS: Yes. Well, just very briefly, 8 Your Honor.

This is, we think, a very clear case, unfortunately, of impairment, and we do believe that the evidence put on by our expert, who has evaluated Dr. -- and I'm going to try to say it correctly -- Lahteenmaa, he's evaluated her. He's reviewed her Baker Act records. He's reviewed her filings. He's going to have the chance to view her behavior and her exhibits today.

So we believe that we're going to be able to prove this case with clear and convincing evidence. Thank you.

THE COURT: Thank you.

Doctor, would you like to make an opening statement at this time?

DR. LAHTEENMAA: Yes.

I think this whole entire procedure, it is going to be known as extremely unfair. I whistleblower in the biggest telemedicine company in the world, and the way I have been treated, it is so unfair by everybody. It's absolutely horrid, and when this comes to public, they're not going to like it. This is absolutely horrible what has been done to me, on top of everything

And what happened to whistleblowing laws?
Whistleblower protection laws? I suppose they
don't matter in my case, I suppose. But, yeah, so
basically that's what I wanted to let you guys
know. I don't think there's anything fair about
this case.

THE COURT: Okay.

else.

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DR. LAHTEENMAA: Right from the beginning until today, including the initial complaint, which doesn't exist, by Dr. Dahlin, that I'm supposed to have legally and signed and dated. It doesn't exist. There's so many different things.

But it's just absurd that the state of
Florida sales failed whistleblowers so badly. So
badly. It is absolutely awful. All of you should
be ashamed. Every single one of you.

THE COURT: Well, we are not here today on a whistleblower case. We're here today on a

- 1 licensure case from the Department of Health,
- Board of Osteopathic Medicine.
- And a whistleblower case is something that we
- 4 see here when it comes referred here by the
- 5 Florida Commission on Human Relations, which is
- 6 the state version of the Equal Employment
- 7 Opportunity Commission. And then there are
- 8 whistleblower cases in the state of Florida.
- 9 There's a Florida Whistleblower Act where
- 10 whistleblowers can take their cases to circuit
- 11 court in Florida. But that's not what we're here
- 12 with today. Today is just the case that was
- 13 brought against your license by the Department of
- 14 Health.
- 15 DR. LAHTEENMAA: It caused some
- whistleblowing. It's all connected.
- 17 THE COURT: That's something when you're
- 18 putting on your case or cross-examining witnesses,
- 19 you may certainly inquire as to the motivation for
- the filing of the complaint.
- 21 But at this point, it is the Petitioner's
- burden to prove the complaint against you. And
- so, Mr. Morris, I would like to ask you to call
- your first witness. I believe you said it's Dr.
- 25 Dahlin?

- 1 MR. MORRIS: Yes, Dr. Dahlin.
- THE COURT: Doctor, would you raise your
- 3 right hand to be sworn.
- 4 Do you swear or affirm the testimony you'll
- 5 give in this proceeding will be the truth, the
- 6 whole truth and nothing but the truth?
- 7 THE WITNESS: I do.
- 8 THE COURT: Please state your name for the
- 9 record.
- 10 THE WITNESS: My name is Robert Dahlin.
- 11 THE COURT: You may inquire, counsel.
- MR. MORRIS: Yes.
- 13 DIRECT EXAMINATION
- 14 BY MR. MORRIS:
- Q. And can you state your work address?
- 16 A. Yes. 1012 East 2nd Street, Duluth,
- 17 Minnesota.
- 18 Q. And can you tell me just a little bit about
- 19 yourself, a little bit about you professionally?
- 20 A. I work here as a neurosurgeon on staff,
- 21 pretty much practicing general neurosurgery.
- 22 O. And can you tell me, is Exhibit 6 a true and
- 23 correct copy of your resume?
- 24 A. Yes.
- MR. MORRIS: I can share that, Judge, if you

want me to, but we previously marked it as Exhibit

- 2 6.
- 3 THE COURT: I have all the exhibits here on
- 4 my screen. I have it in front of me.
- 5 BY MR. MORRIS:
- 6 Q. Okay. So that is a true and correct copy of
- 7 your resume, Doctor?
- 8 A. I don't see what you have in front of you,
- 9 but if it's what I sent you, then yes.
- 10 O. It is, it is.
- 11 And can you tell me just briefly, how do you
- 12 know Dr. Lahteenmaa?
- 13 A. We met in medical school.
- Q. And when was that approximately?
- 15 A. Oh, gosh. Did we start in 2009? I think,
- 16 yeah. It's been long enough now, I'll need to look at
- my diploma to when I started. Yeah, I want to say it
- 18 was 2009-ish. 2013, I think.
- 19 Q. And can you tell me, what is your
- 20 relationship like with Dr. Lahteenmaa?
- 21 A. Prior to these events, our relationship was
- that of very good friends. We, in med school, we
- 23 studied a lot, pretty much most days for a few hours
- 24 at a time. We would go out and hang out, have fun.
- 25 After med school, we continued to talk and

to, you know, hang out and go visit from time to time.

- to, you know, hang out and go visit from time to time.
- 2 Me and my wife flew down to Florida one time and hung
- 3 out with her. She was the best man at my wedding.
- 4 So, yeah, that's been our relationship up until the
- 5 last two years.
- 6 Q. Okay. And you said, "until the last two
- 7 years." How often would you say before that last two
- 8 years you were in contact with Dr. Lahteenmaa?
- 9 A. A couple times a year, at least by phone.
- 10 There was a time, when I first moved up here, she was
- 11 actually practicing as a locums physician at Essentia,
- which is the neighboring hospital. And during that
- time, we would spend some more -- we would actually
- hang out more.
- Q. And can you tell me, did you ever see any
- 16 problems that were concerning for you about her mental
- 17 health during that time up until two years ago?
- 18 A. No.
- 19 Q. And was there an event or something that
- 20 changed your relationship?
- 21 A. Yeah, me providing this complaint to the
- 22 board.
- Q. And what was it specifically that caused you
- 24 concern about Dr. Lahteenmaa about two years ago?
- 25 A. She had these persistent delusions. I think

- delusion is probably the best description of it, where 1
- 2 she consistently felt like people were out to get her.
- She felt that everyone -- when we went outside for a 3
- 4 walk one time, she basically thought that everyone
- 5 that passed us by was watching us. A helicopter flew
- by, they were spying on us, things of that nature. 6
- And was that different from how she behaved 7 Ο.
- before? 8
- 9 Α. Dramatically.
- And can you tell me, what did you do as a 10 0.
- result of that kind of behavior? 11
- 12 I discussed getting help, being referred to Α.
- 13 PRN, and trying to get her just as much psychological
- assistance as possible, and being there for her. 14
- Did she agree to any of that help? 15 Ο.
- She did not. 16 Α.
- 17 And what sorts of help were you asking for? Ο.
- 18 I would assume probably two types that she Α.
- 19 was going to need. One was going to be from a
- 2.0 professional standpoint, being able to maintain her
- 21 license through a service like PRN, and also
- 22 psychiatric help to help diagnose and treat.
- 23 Did you contact PRN?
- 24 Α. I'm trying to remember the website that I
- provided the complaint on. I can't remember if that 25

- was their website or not.
- Q. But you do believe that you started the
- 3 events in question going, correct?
- A. Correct, yes.
- 5 Q. Okay. And have you kept in contact with Dr.
- 6 Lahteenmaa?
- 7 A. Not really. So she does occasionally send me
- 8 texts. And the last time, and I think I told you, I
- 9 think it was March, that we had kind of a brief
- 10 conversation over text. And for the most part, I just
- 11 chose not to engage.
- 12 Q. And I'm going to show you what we've marked
- 13 as Exhibit 10. Just one second. I want to make sure
- 14 I've got it up.
- THE COURT: Mr. Morris, it appears that
- 16 you're muted right now.
- 17 MR. MORRIS: Let me stop sharing. Can you
- 18 hear me now?
- 19 THE COURT: Yes, yes. When you had the
- document on the screen, I just saw your audio icon
- 21 with the slash through it.
- MR. MORRIS: Yeah, I think it's unfortunate
- because it doesn't show as mute on my Zoom.
- THE COURT: Oh.
- 25 BY MR. MORRIS:

Q. All right. So I'm going to show you again.

- Or did you see those texts?
- A. I did see it.
- Q. Okay. Well, are those texts a true and
- 5 correct copy of what you and Dr. Lahteenmaa had shared
- 6 by text?
- 7 A. Yes.
- Q. And in those texts, did she share a letter to
- 9 President Trump that she had sent?
- 10 A. To be fair, what I sent you, I maybe read
- 11 half of it at best. I did not feel like -- to be
- 12 honest with you, there's no point in reading any of
- 13 those.
- 14 Q. And why is there no point in reading any of
- 15 those?
- 16 A. I would say there's no substance to it. You
- and I are having a conversation. We're talking about
- 18 our day, how things are going, meaningful things, but
- 19 they feel more equivalent to a rant. And I just --
- 20 I've heard enough of it that there's -- I don't think
- 21 I need to read or hear another one, to be honest.
- 22 THE COURT: Doctor, do you have an objection?
- DR. LAHTEENMAA: When can I ask a question
- from Bobby?
- 25 THE COURT: Not until Mr. Morris has

- 1 completed his direct examination. Then you'll
- 2 have all the time you need for cross-examination.
- 3 BY MR. MORRIS:
- 4 Q. You can go ahead and finish, Doctor. What
- 5 were you saying?
- 6 A. Basically, just I've -- we've talked enough,
- 7 me and her, and I've seen enough of her texts. And
- 8 some time ago, too, I think she sent some e-mails
- 9 similar, where it's just they're all the same. It's
- 10 just some new twist on the conspiracy that I just
- don't have any interest in engaging or reading it.
- 12 Q. Does it make you sad?
- 13 A. It did, less so now. I think I have accepted
- 14 what's going on.
- 15 O. And within those texts that she sent you, she
- 16 did include a letter that she sent to President Trump
- 17 about various conspiracies, correct?
- 18 A. If it's documented in the text, then yes.
- 19 Yeah, like I said, I didn't read through most of it.
- Q. And they were all from Heidi, correct?
- 21 A. Correct.
- 22 MR. MORRIS: At this point, we'd introduce
- our Exhibit 10, Your Honor.
- 24 THE COURT: And do you want to introduce
- 25 Exhibit 6, the Doctor's CV?

- 1 MR. MORRIS: Yes.
- THE COURT: Dr. Lahteenmaa, any objection to
- 3 the Doctor's CV?
- 4 DR. LAHTEENMAA: Are you talking about the
- 5 texts?
- 6 THE COURT: No. First of all, Exhibit 6 was
- 7 his resume or CV.
- 8 DR. LAHTEENMAA: No.
- 9 THE COURT: Okay. Then 6 is admitted without
- 10 objection.
- Now, do you have an objection to the texts
- that are Exhibit 10?
- 13 (Petitioner's Exhibit No. 6 was admitted into
- 14 evidence.)
- DR. LAHTEENMAA: I haven't read them. I
- 16 glanced at them. But yeah, I'm sure I talked
- about the letter to Trump. And by the way, we met
- 18 in 2008, not 2009.
- But as far as texts, yeah, probably.
- 20 THE COURT: Do you have an objection to their
- 21 authenticity in being admitted into evidence?
- DR. LAHTEENMAA: No.
- 23 THE COURT: Okay. Exhibit 10 is admitted
- 24 without objection.
- 25 (Petitioner's Exhibit No. 10 was admitted

- into evidence.)
- 2 BY MR. MORRIS:
- 3 Q. And did Dr. Lahteenmaa ever talk to you, Dr.
- 4 Dahlin, about people trying to kill her?
- 5 A. Yes.
- 6 Q. And how often did that happen? Did you hear
- 7 my question, Dr. Dahlin?
- 8 A. Yes, you asked -- I'll repeat. You asked if
- 9 she had ever mentioned that people were threatening
- 10 her life; is that correct?
- 11 Q. Yes. And how often did that happen? I think
- 12 you froze for a second.
- 13 A. Yes. So she would talk about that, I would
- say, probably every time we spoke.
- 15 O. And did she ever talk about a Miami mafia?
- 16 A. She talked about multiple mafias.
- 17 Q. And did she ever talk about people trying to
- 18 torture her?
- 19 A. Yes.
- Q. Are you familiar with the term unspecified
- 21 psychosis?
- 22 A. Loosely. I understand what it probably means
- just because in medicine, using the term unspecified
- is a pretty common term. And I understand what
- 25 psychosis is.

1 Q. Is it essentially a psychosis of unknown

- 2 origin?
- 3 A. As I understand it, yes.
- 4 Q. And do you believe that that is what Dr.
- 5 Lahteenmaa has right now, or do you know?
- A. I wouldn't report to be a psychiatrist, but I
- 7 would say that she expresses delusions that would be
- 8 consistent with psychosis.
- 9 Q. And would you believe that she would be safe
- 10 to practice as a physician right now? An osteopathic
- 11 physician?
- 12 A. I do not.
- 13 Q. Have you viewed any other materials from this
- 14 case?
- 15 A. You sent me a copy of, I think, some filings
- 16 as well. I read through those.
- 17 Q. And are those the types of concerns that she
- 18 continually brings up to you?
- 19 A. Correct.
- Q. And just give me a summary of what those
- 21 concerns are.
- 22 A. She feels that Taladoc and various other
- entities are listening in on her. They are basically,
- she uses the word torture, but essentially persecuting
- 25 her and keeping her from voicing her complaints and

- 1 making them known. And, yeah, just giving her
- 2 psychological distress through constant monitoring.
- 3 Q. And just to double check, this behavior the
- 4 last two years has been very different from her
- 5 behavior prior to that; is that correct?
- 6 A. Correct.
- 7 MR. MORRIS: Okay. No further questions.
- THE WITNESS: Thank you. Dr. Lahteenmaa?
- 9 DR. LAHTEENMAA: Yes. So I can ask questions
- for Bobby now?
- 11 THE COURT: Yes, you may.
- DR. LAHTEENMAA: Okay. Thank you.
- 13 CROSS-EXAMINATION
- 14 BY DR. LAHTEENMAA:
- Q. So, Bobby, how are you?
- 16 A. I'm okay. How are you?
- 17 Q. I don't know. Did you look at any of the
- 18 evidence that I posted?
- 19 A. No.
- Q. Okay. So, are you familiar with the term of
- 21 willful blindness, or reckless disregard, or perjury?
- MR. MORRIS: Objection; relevance.
- THE COURT: What's the relevance? Are you
- saying that he's being untruthful today?
- DR. LAHTEENMAA: Well, I'm saying it's a big,

major accusation, right, to say somebody's psychotic. And I posted tons of evidence on the public court website, supposedly. And I think it's only fair that Dr. Dahlin should have went through it so he can come here and make educated charges. And not just accuse me without looking through any of my evidence. I have tons. And that's just only a small drop. I mean, I have so much evidence. So, if you don't look at it, it could be reckless disregard to say, oh, you're psychotic, but I'm not going to look at it.

THE COURT: Let me just, excuse me, interrupt for just a second. Dr. Dahlin told us what he looked at and what he didn't look at. And he based a lot of what he said on his personal friendship with you prior to two years ago and then what he's observed and what he had. So you may explore what he reviewed. And you may have ultimately an opinion when you testify as to whether you think that's sufficient for him to reach the conclusion that he has.

But as far as accusing him of reckless disregard or whatever else, that's something for me to find if I were to have evidence of that.

So, this is really about you testing his knowledge

of what he said about you today. Which is, I know

2 he gave some pretty straightforward opinions as to

- 3 what he believes. And you can test his knowledge
- 4 as to whether he reviewed any documentation. But
- 5 I'll be the one to draw the conclusions from what
- 6 the evidence brings out today as to what happens
- 7 here.
- We're not going to have -- this is kind of
- 9 getting in that area of argumentative where you're
- 10 going to argue now with a witness. And you really
- just get to question him and to test the knowledge
- and information that is behind what he has
- 13 testified about on direct examination.
- 14 DR. LAHTEENMAA: Well, I'll ask him more
- 15 questions then.
- 16 BY DR. LAHTEENMAA:
- Q. So, Dr. Dahlin, you said, I have delusions.
- 18 What is a delusion?
- 19 A. It's an untrue belief.
- Q. Okay. So, false beliefs despite what
- 21 everybody else believes, right?
- 22 A. That's correct.
- Q. How do you know my beliefs are false if you
- haven't looked at the evidence, except what you saw
- 25 when you came to visit me? Did you see the Teladoc

- 1 subpoena?
- 2 A. No, I did not see the Teladoc subpoena.
- 3 Q. I showed it to you. You asked -- you asked
- 4 to see it.
- 5 A. Did I?
- 6 O. I said, "Here it is."
- 7 A. Back in, when I was there in, whenever that
- 8 was, November?
- 9 Q. In my place, yes. You said, "I want to see
- 10 the subpoena." I said, "Here it is."
- 11 A. Okay.
- 12 Q. So now you're saying, no?
- 13 A. I guess that I don't remember it.
- Q. And did you see any of the other hacking
- 15 evidence? Like the patients, problems on Teladoc
- systems, that has been to -- tons of people
- 17 have. I have tons of evidence.
- 18 A. I have that --
- 19 Q. You came with your dad's cell phone.
- 20 Government cell phone.
- 21 A. No, I came with my cell phone.
- Q. You came with your dad's cell phone. What
- 23 does your dad do?
- A. My dad is retired now.
- 25 Q. Yeah, what does he do? What did he do for

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- 1 work?
- 2 A. He worked with Northrop Grumman.
- 3 Q. Did he work for government?
- 4 A. No, but his company was contracted with the
- 5 government.
- 6 Q. Okay. But you came in using a cell phone.
- 7 And you saw some of the evidence.
- 8 MR. MORRIS: Objection; argumentative.
- 9 BY DR. LAHTEENMAA:
- 10 O. I have screenshots of --
- 11 THE COURT: You have to ask questions. I'm
- 12 sorry, Doctor. You have to ask him questions and
- allow him to answer. You don't get to then argue
- 14 about what he says. You can just ask him some
- more questions and get the answers. I mean,
- 16 that's what argumentative means. When you start
- 17 saying, you know, you've done this without looking
- 18 at that. And that's the argumentative part.
- 19 That's your testimony, not his testimony. And
- 20 he's the witness right now. I need to get his
- 21 testimony related to accusations he's made against
- you.
- So I will get your testimony when it's your
- turn, and you can talk about all this and your
- 25 impressions of what others said. But this is the

time for you to ask him questions, not to testify 1

- 2. at the same time as you're trying to ask
- questions. 3
- BY DR. LAHTEENMAA: 4
- Q. So, Bobby? 5
- A. Yes. 6
- 7 Q. I have copies of your texts.
- 8 A. Okay.
- 9 Exhibit 6D under Morris Burch PDF. 6D and Ο.
- also 6F. 10
- 11 THE COURT: Are you going to show him those?
- 12 DR. LAHTEENMAA: Well, I don't know how to do
- it. It's on the court website. 13
- 14 THE COURT: Well, let's do it.
- DR. LAHTEENMAA: I have no idea how to do 15
- 16 that. Do you want me to read what it says?
- THE COURT: You said it was Exhibit 6? 17
- DR. LAHTEENMAA: Yeah, it's under Morris 18
- Burch PDF. It was on the -- when I did the motion 19
- to dismiss the first one. 2.0
- 21 THE COURT: Well, the only exhibits that have
- 22 been introduced into evidence are the ones that
- you filed for purposes of the hearing. So, do you 23
- know -- is this in those exhibits? There are a 2.4
- lot of exhibits here. 25

DR. LAHTEENMAA: So these are not included in

- 2 the final evidence?
- 3 THE COURT: No, nothing attached to those
- 4 motions to dismiss are included in the final
- 5 evidence unless you offer it here today.
- DR. LAHTEENMAA: Well, I put a lot to those
- 7 last statements, but can I talk about this then or
- 8 no?

- 9 THE COURT: Well, you can ask him questions
- about his text messages.
- DR. LAHTEENMAA: Okay.
- 12 BY DR. LAHTEENMAA:
- Q. So, this Exhibit 6D, it shows, it has a
- 14 screenshot of my phone, my phone number that I have
- 15 had for 20 years, 702-755-6142. It shows that it
- belongs to P. C. (phonetic). And I said,
- 17 you got that text message. You said, yeah, I don't
- 18 care. Why is my phone number -- I wonder -- and I
- 19 know it's not a question for you, but obviously --
- MR. MORRIS: Objection; that's not a question
- 21 for him.
- 22 THE COURT: Doctor, if it's not a question
- for him, then you're --
- 24 DR. LAHTEENMAA: I'm leading to the question
- with that.

- 1 BY DR. LAHTEENMAA:
- Q. So, obviously, there's something wrong if my
- 3 personal cell phone belongs to somebody else. And
- 4 then also in another text, you say, yeah, that looks
- 5 like a phishing scam.
- 6 THE COURT: Are you asking him this question?
- 7 DR. LAHTEENMAA: So, now I'm going to ask him
- 8 a question.
- 9 BY DR. LAHTEENMAA:
- 10 Q. So, then, how can you say that these are
- 11 false beliefs when I'm showing you hacking evidence?
- 12 How can you say I'm delusional regarding being hacked
- when you have this evidence that you yourself said
- that looks like a phishing scam?
- 15 A. I don't see how any of that shows that you
- 16 were being hacked or that people are coming after you.
- 17 Q. So, it's normal that my cell phone number
- shows up as owned by somebody else?
- 19 MR. MORRIS: Objection; argumentative.
- THE COURT: Overruled.
- 21 Can you answer the question, Dr. Dahlin?
- 22 THE WITNESS: Yeah. I think that you showing
- me a picture of your phone being owned by someone
- 24 else does not demonstrate that you are being
- 25 tracked or persecuted because you don't know how

- 1 that data was compiled.
- 2 BY DR. LAHTEENMAA:
- Q. I'm not saying persecuted. I'm saying
- 4 hacked. You don't see that there's anything abnormal
- 5 about that?
- 6 A. The Internet gets stuff wrong all the time.
- 7 When is that abnormal?
- 8 Q. Yes, thank you. Most doctors and most people
- 9 in the United States actually have been hacked. So,
- 10 yeah, there are problems all the time. For some
- 11 reason, I'm the only one, when I record it, when I --
- 12 THE COURT: Doctor, we need a question.
- 13 You're testifying now. You can say something when
- it's your time to testify, but the record makes it
- appear that the doctor is either testifying about
- this or that you're testifying when you haven't
- been sworn. Actually, this is the Department
- 18 putting on its case. So your cross-examination is
- 19 limited to questions of the doctor based upon what
- 20 he testified on direct examination.
- 21 BY DR. LAHTEENMAA:
- 22 O. So, Robert, just so I understand --
- 23 THE COURT: Just a second. What he testified
- about on direct examination did not go into
- 25 hacking and this other stuff and cyber conspiracy

- 1 and whatever else. It went directly into his
- 2 recommendations that you seek PRN or psychiatric
- 3 help, including diagnosis and treatment of any
- 4 condition that is determined to require such. His
- 5 testimony was pretty limited to that.
- DR. LAHTEENMAA: So may I clarify then?
- 7 THE COURT: Yes.
- 8 BY DR. LAHTEENMAA:
- 9 Q. So, Bobby, you say I'm delusional; regarding
- 10 what? Regarding what exactly? Because you can be
- 11 delusional about a lot of things.
- 12 A. You were convinced that other people were
- monitoring you and following you, for instance --
- Q. Do you know that? Do you know if they are or
- 15 they are not?
- 16 A. I guess technically, no.
- 17 O. Okay. So what am I delusional about?
- 18 A. A number of things.
- 19 Q. You say I'm delusional.
- 20 MR. MORRIS: Objection. She's not letting
- 21 the witness answer the question.
- 22 THE COURT: I think he understood the
- 23 question, Doctor.
- So go ahead and answer, Dr. Dahlin.
- 25 THE WITNESS: So when I went and visited you

in Florida, there were examples where if you would

- 2 hear something from outside, you would hear
- 3 something on the roof, you would immediately
- 4 attribute that to someone who was going to either
- 5 be hacking you, listening to you, or involved in
- 6 this conspiracy.
- 7 BY DR. LAHTEENMAA:
- 8 Q. Now, do you know that for a fact?
- 9 A. That when you heard that, when you heard
- 10 those sounds, you would tell me --
- 11 O. You --
- 12 THE COURT: Doctor --
- MR. MORRIS: She's arguing with the witness.
- 14 BY DR. LAHTEENMAA:
- Q. What sounds?
- 16 THE COURT: Dr. Lahteenmaa, you have to let
- 17 him finish his answer. Okay? He gets to complete
- his answer, and then you can ask more questions.
- 19 But the court reporter can only get down one
- 20 person speaking at a time.
- Go ahead, Dr. Dahlin.
- THE WITNESS: Yeah, so essentially, I guess
- to reiterate, whenever you would hear sounds, like
- I said, from the roof or outside, you would
- 25 attribute it to these bad actors. And when it


- 1 would happen, you would say, Hey, did you hear
- that? That's them upstairs on the roof, or that's
- 3 them outside. You would bring attention of those
- 4 things to me.
- 5 And similarly, like I said, when we walked
- 6 outside, you would want us to be quiet because you
- 7 would say that person right over there is
- listening in to us. So, you know, those are the
- 9 types of delusions I witnessed.
- 10 BY DR. LAHTEENMAA:
- 11 Q. Okay. Now, again, you say, "delusion."
- 12 A. Yes.
- Q. How do you know it's not true? Do you know
- 14 either way, whether it's true or whether it's not?
- 15 A. That you are being followed?
- 16 Q. Yeah. How do you know?
- 17 A. I don't know.
- 18 Q. Okay. What about the sounds on the roof?
- 19 A. So, can I give --
- Q. How do you know that?
- 21 A. If I can give --
- Q. No, no. But do you know that? Yes or no?
- MR. MORRIS: Actually, he was trying to
- answer the question, Your Honor.
- THE COURT: Okay. Go ahead, Dr. Dahlin,

- 1 answer the question.
- THE WITNESS: So --
- 3 THE COURT: Do you know about the sounds on
- 4 the roof?
- 5 THE WITNESS: So, the average person, when
- 6 you're in your house, you hear the creaking door,
- 7 you hear the wind outside, the sounds on your
- 8 roof.
- 9 DR. LAHTEENMAA: Objection.
- 10 THE WITNESS: The average person --
- 11 THE COURT: Let him answer the question.
- 12 Okay. Go ahead.
- 13 THE WITNESS: The average person will
- 14 attribute those to just the house being old. You
- 15 know, the tree being close to the house. You
- 16 know, something more normal as opposed to
- 17 attributing it to, you know, that I am being
- 18 watched or that there are people outside.
- 19 And so, it is very atypical for someone to
- 20 assume that all of those sounds and all of those
- 21 activities are focused solely upon yourself.
- 22 BY DR. LAHTEENMAA:
- Q. Now, do you consider me being an average
- 24 person after I whistleblow on the biggest telemedicine
- company in the world? Is that an average person?

- 1 A. I don't think you're average anymore.
- Q. Yes or no? Okay.
- So, I'm not average. So, now, when I hear
- 4 these voices or whatever you say, these sounds on the
- 5 roof, do you know for sure that it's only a delusion
- or a false belief or there's something else, perhaps,
- 7 going on?
- 8 A. Not with 100% certainty.
- 9 Q. Okay? So, then, next thing about delusions,
- 10 false beliefs, right, which you just said you don't
- 11 know. You do not know. It could be true, what I'm
- 12 saying, right? It could be. It's a possibility.
- MR. MORRIS: Objection. The witness is
- 14 testifying, not asking questions. I mean, the
- 15 attorney is testifying.
- 16 THE COURT: Dr. Dahlin answered the question.
- 17 He says, "Not with 100% certainty." That was his
- 18 answer.
- 19 BY DR. LAHTEENMAA:
- Q. And then, now, these beliefs, for them to be
- 21 delusions, would have to be that other people, they
- don't believe those either, right? Correct?
- A. Yeah.
- Q. Okay. So, I sent you a while back a letter
- 25 from my friend, Anna.

- 1 A. Yeah.
- Q. Okay. That's on the first motion.
- 3 MR. MORRIS: Objection; relevance.
- 4 THE COURT: What's the purpose of talking
- 5 about this?
- DR. LAHTEENMAA: Well, the purpose is --
- 7 THE COURT: Because Dr. Dahlin said, when you
- 8 asked him if he remembers this, he said, maybe.
- 9 That's not really --
- DR. LAHTEENMAA: Well, it's on his phone.
- Bobby, you can open it. It's on your phone. I
- 12 sent it.
- 13 BY DR. LAHTEENMAA:
- Q. So, basically, he agrees with me. Anna works
- 15 for Nokia in Finland and --
- MR. MORRIS: Objection.
- 17 THE COURT: Okay. You have to ask him
- 18 questions.
- DR. LAHTEENMAA: Okay.
- THE COURT: If you want to try to establish
- 21 whether he knows this, and you're going to need to
- tell me how this is relevant to --
- DR. LAHTEENMAA: I'm trying to get to it.
- THE COURT: Okay.
- 25 BY DR. LAHTEENMAA:

Q. So, there's all these people,



- I have tons of friends. Interpol --
- 4 MR. MORRIS: Objection.
- 5 BY DR. LAHTEENMAA:
- 6 Q. Interpol, I went in Lisbon. I went to talk
- 7 to them.

- THE COURT: There's an objection. Mr.
- 9 Morris?
- 10 MR. MORRIS: This is all the --
- DR. LAHTEENMAA: It's --
- 12 MR. MORRIS: -- witness trying to testify
- right now instead of asking a question.
- 14 DR. LAHTEENMAA: It's leading to a question.
- 15 THE COURT: Well, I have a different reason
- for asking you to get to the question, and that
- is, when you list people who aren't going to be
- 18 testifying here, and you say, this one knows
- 19 something, that one knows something, that's all
- hearsay. It's an out-of-court statement or
- 21 something within their personal knowledge offered
- 22 for the truth of the matter asserted that they
- know this, and they're not here under oath to
- testify today.
- DR. LAHTEENMAA: No, but it is --

- 1 THE COURT: It doesn't matter what reason
- they're not here, but I cannot base findings of
- fact on out-of-court statements from people who
- 4 aren't going to be here testifying.
- DR. LAHTEENMAA: And I'm not asking you to.
- It's leading to my question, which if I'm allowed
- 7 to ask.
- 8 THE COURT: Well, but you just need to ask
- 9 the question.
- 10 BY DR. LAHTEENMAA:
- 11 Q. So then, is it a delusion if all these people
- that I mentioned, believe me, they say, oh my God,
- Heidi, that is a horrible situation. What a mess?
- 14 You literally whistleblow on Teladoc. They attacked
- 15 you and cyber gangs. And two and a half years they
- 16 torment. Torment and torture me for two and a half
- 17 years. And all these people, believe me, is it then a
- delusion? When you're literally the only one, pretty
- much the only one who doesn't believe me, who don't
- 20 want to look at the evidence. All these other people
- 21 have. And they're like, yeah, that's a really tough
- 22 situation. Then is it a delusion?
- 23 A. Uh, I --
- Q. (Indiscernible) --
- MR. MORRIS: She's not letting him answer.

THE COURT You have to lot him angues now

1 THE COURT: You have to let him answer now.

- 2 You asked whether this is a delusion, but it's
- 3 based upon a lot of hearsay that I'm not going to
- 4 have corroborated by those individuals --
- DR. LAHTEENMAA: You don't have to; it's
- 6 posted. The evidence is posted on court website.
- 7 THE COURT: That doesn't mean anything.
- 8 Somebody can write a letter and post it. It does
- 9 not become evidence unless it gets past the
- 10 hearsay rule, and it's -- and there's somebody
- 11 here to authenticate it, that they wrote it; that
- they said it; that they published it; or that they
- some way made that statement. I can't rely just
- on you saying what other people told you because
- 15 counsel cannot cross-examine you about what other
- 16 people told you because they're not here to
- 17 corroborate that.
- 18 BY DR. LAHTEENMAA:
- 19 Q. The letter is posted on the public court
- 20 website. My evidence is posted supporting all this.
- 21 So is it still a delusion, Bobby?
- 22 A. I think you believe that other people are
- 23 supporting you when they may not be. I don't know if
- 24 that classifies as the medical definition of delusion.
- 25 Q. Okay. Well, again, it's a big accusation to

- 1 make, Bobby without looking at the evidence. You
- 2 know, if you're the only one and everybody else says,
- 3 yes, I believe you and it's posted, then I don't
- 4 think (indiscernible) --
- 5 MR. MORRIS: Argumentative.
- 6 THE COURT: Again, Dr. Lahteenmaa --
- 7 BY DR. LAHTEENMAA:
- 8 Q. -- so now you're saying I have delusions.
- 9 THE COURT: -- you have -- what was that last
- 10 part?
- 11 BY DR. LAHTEENMAA:
- 12 Q. So, you know, you're basically then accusing
- me without having evidence. You don't have hardcore
- evidence that what I'm saying is true or it isn't. Is
- 15 that true?
- 16 A. Repeat your question, please.
- 17 O. You don't have hard core evidence that I am
- delusional, whether I am or whether I'm not. Whether
- 19 what I'm saying what is happening is true. You don't
- 20 have -- it's just your belief, right?
- 21 A. My perception of your actions as delusional
- 22 are consistent with my clinical experience -- limited
- 23 clinical experience with --
- Q. But you don't answer the question.
- 25 A. -- patients who (indiscernible) --

- 1 Q. You didn't answer the question.
- 2 Do you know for a fact --
- 3 MR. MORRIS: She's not letting the witness
- 4 answer.
- 5 THE COURT: Did you --
- 6 BY DR. LAHTEENMAA:
- 7 Q. Do you know for a fact --
- 8 THE COURT: Hold on. Dr. Dahlin, did you
- 9 complete your answer?
- 10 THE WITNESS: I did.
- THE COURT: Okay.
- 12 BY DR. LAHTEENMAA:
- 13 O. You didn't answer it.
- Do you know for a fact --
- 15 THE COURT: He said it was based upon his --
- 16 sorry. It's based upon his -- his perceptions.
- 17 Based upon when you said, did you hear those
- 18 noises, and he said --
- DR. LAHTEENMAA: So it's not a fact. It's a
- 20 perception.
- 21 THE COURT: Well, then, Doctor, I'm not going
- to argue with you either. So, but you don't get
- to argue with the witness. You can ask the
- 24 witness questions. And if you disagree with the
- answers, you can ask him another question or when

1	you're testifying, you can say that didn't happen
2	or that's not true or here's why it's not true.
3	It's just you you don't get to have an argument
4	with the witness.
5	You only get to ask questions. And just like
6	Mr. Morris asked questions and just like Mr.
7	Morris, when if you take the stand, Mr. Morris
8	will ask you questions and he's not going to argue
9	with you either because that's not how the
10	rules don't provide for that.
11	DR. LAHTEENMAA: Judge Cohen, I don't think
12	I'm allowed to do a lot of things. I'm not
13	allowed to have a lawyer. I'm not allowed to show
14	the evidence.
15	THE COURT: No, no, no. We're not
16	DR. LAHTEENMAA: Nobody cares.
17	THE COURT: We're not going to go there;
18	you're not allowed to have a lawyer. If you can
19	afford an attorney, you certainly can have a
20	lawyer. So that
21	DR. LAHTEENMAA: Just so happens that they
22	happen to have child porn (indiscernible) on
23	their website. What are the odds?
24	THE COURT: Okay. That I'm going to

DR. LAHTEENMAA: So --

- 1 THE COURT: Excuse me. Court reporter,
- 2 please strike that last comment from the record,
- 3 please.
- DR. LAHTEENMAA: Well, it's true.
- 5 THE COURT: Well, if it's true or false, it's
- 6 not related to the issues here. And it certainly
- 7 isn't related to the direct examination given by
- 8 Mr. Morris. So let's stick to Dr. Dahlin and his
- 9 knowledge and information to provide here.
- 10 BY DR. LAHTEENMAA:
- 11 Q. Dr. Dahlin, where is the initial complaint by
- 12 you signed and dated that I'm legally supposed to
- 13 have? Did you make one?
- 14 A. I --
- 15 MR. MORRIS: Objection; relevance.
- 16 THE COURT: Well, I'm going to strike the
- 17 part about legally supposed to have. But I'm not
- 18 going to strike the question.
- MR. MORRIS: Okay.
- THE COURT: The question was, where is the
- original complaint against Dr. Lahteenmaa?
- 22 THE WITNESS: I submitted an e-mail complaint
- on a website approximately two years ago. I
- 24 believe it was that PRN website.
- 25 BY DR. LAHTEENMAA:

Did you gign it?

- Q. Did you sign it?
- 2 A. No.
- 3 Q. Then it's not legal.
- 4 THE COURT: Okay. That's argumentative, and
- 5 that's making a legal conclusion, which is my job.
- 6 So please, Doctor, unless you want to put on the
- 7 robe and be the judge here --
- DR. LAHTEENMAA: Yes, please.
- 9 THE COURT: -- and ask your questions, but I
- 10 will answer the questions that you ask and not
- 11 comment on them because I know how this works. So
- let's try -- let's try to just -- when you're
- testifying, you can say whatever you want subject
- to objection by Mr. Morris. But I think he'll
- give you a lot of leeway in testifying.
- 16 But Dr. Dahlin -- I mean, you know, that's
- for you to argue to me in your proposed order and
- for me to make a decision on whether something's
- 19 legal or not legal. So please ask your question
- if you have one.
- 21 BY DR. LAHTEENMAA:
- Q. Dr. Dahlin, what part of the job can I not do
- 23 exactly? I mean, I can write complex motions. But
- 24 you're saying I cannot click and put an order in?
- 25 A. I don't think that I would trust your

- 1 reasoning skills in the setting of psychiatry. You
- 2 clearly are intelligent. You clearly can do many
- 3 things. But I don't think that. Performing complex
- 4 reasoning is something that you can do safely.
- I would also bring one other thing up is you
- 6 did at one point tell me that you thought some of your
- 7 patients were some of these bad actors. And I don't
- 8 believe that as a psychiatrist that you are allowed to
- 9 have that belief and be able to treat --
- 10 Q. That's funny. That's funny because that's
- 11 what my dad said. He said, Heidi, of course they're
- going to be there. That's the first place where
- organized crime is going to do and go is act like
- 14 they're our patients.
- THE COURT: Please, Doctor, questions --
- 16 BY DR. LAHTEENMAA:
- 17 Q. I mean, they are not stupid, Bobby.
- 18 THE COURT: -- questions and answers, please.
- 19 BY DR. LAHTEENMAA:
- 20 Q. So what part can I not do?
- 21 A. I don't believe you should be practicing
- 22 medicine at all.
- Q. Because of Teladoc is attacking me, right,
- and all these cyber gangs? Yeah, it makes it pretty
- dangerous. Especially when the FBI does not help.

- 1 They're complete worthless.
- 2 THE COURT: Okay. Again --
- 3 BY DR. LAHTEENMAA:
- Q. I must be the only doctor in the whole United
- 5 States who calls the FBI, please help me. I just did
- 6 whistleblower on the biggest telemedicine company in
- 7 the world, and it's just nothing but crickets.
- 8 THE COURT: Okay. Doctor, there's not a
- 9 question there for Dr. Dahlin.
- 10 BY DR. LAHTEENMAA:
- 11 Q. So you said I cannot do any part of medicine?
- 12 Or maybe I could be a lawyer. I do pretty good
- 13 motions.
- 14 A. Sure.
- 15 Q. So you can't tell me what part of medicine?
- 16 A. I don't -- Yes, I do not believe that you
- 17 should be practicing medicine at all.
- 18 Q. Okay. Once again, I belief. But you can't
- 19 tell me specifically what part.
- 20 A. Seeing patients, writing prescriptions,
- 21 writing notation. Anything involved in the critical
- 22 process of being a physician.
- Q. So I can't do that? I cannot put a med-order
- in? Or is it perhaps the massive problems that
- 25 Teladoc has on their website or on their --

1 MR. MORRIS: Objection, Your Honor.

- 2 BY DR. LAHTEENMAA:
- Q. -- on their platform, which is a complete
- 4 disaster?
- 5 THE COURT: Okay. Doctor, what does that
- 6 have to do with what Dr. Dahlin believes is your
- 7 ability to practice medicine? He's not -- you
- 8 didn't call him as a witness from Teladoc. He's a
- 9 -- he's a physician who filed an initial complaint
- 10 against you through the PRN website, which, by the
- 11 way, it takes online complaints from people who
- want to issue complaints. We're in the digital
- age. You don't have to write it out and have --
- DR. LAHTEENMAA: Sadly.
- 15 THE COURT: (Indiscernible) and send it in.
- 16 You file it with them, they review it and they
- 17 talk to the person who filed it, they talk to the
- 18 subject of the complaint, and they make a
- determination if there's something they can offer
- to help you.
- 21 BY DR. LAHTEENMAA:
- Q. Dr. Dahlin, so if the med order doesn't go
- in, how do you know it's me or it's a Teladoc system?
- MR. MORRIS: Objection.
- 25 THE COURT: Overruled. I don't think I

- 1 understand the question.
- 2 BY DR. LAHTEENMAA:
- 3 Q. If the med order doesn't go in, because I saw
- 4 you wrote somewhere that, oh, you know, a patient was
- 5 complaining they were not getting their meds? You
- 6 wrote that somewhere, one of the papers.
- 7 How do you know that it's me versus a Teladoc
- 8 system malfunctioning? Or do you know for sure?
- 9 A. I don't think I would trust your ability to
- 10 troubleshoot the problem and find out where the actual
- 11 failure of the system is.
- 12 Q. I didn't ask you that. I said, how do you
- 13 know for sure? Is it the Teladoc system problem when
- 14 the med doesn't go in? Or is it me because I just
- can't click the mouse button a couple of times?
- 16 MR. MORRIS: Objection; asked and answered.
- 17 THE COURT: I'm sorry, what was the
- 18 objection? Asked and answered?
- MR. MORRIS: Yes.
- 20 BY DR. LAHTEENMAA:
- Q. How do you know?
- THE COURT: I'll overrule it. Go ahead, Dr.
- Dahlin.
- 24 THE WITNESS: So sure. If it were the
- Teladoc system that were having issues,

the count is a like your goveld to could be about the governor beautiful.

1 theoretically you could troubleshoot the problem.

- 2 You could speak with their department. You could
- 3 speak with the pharmacy. You could call in a
- 4 prescription on your own. There are multiple ways
- 5 that you could troubleshoot the problem to get the
- 6 medication sent in. Whereas, if it's someone who
- 7 has a delusional disorder or problems with
- 8 cognition, they may not be able to figure out how
- 9 to actually get that prescription in.
- 10 BY DR. LAHTEENMAA:
- 11 Q. How do you know? In my specific case, is it
- the Teladoc system problem? Did you actually
- investigate the Teladoc system? Or is it me? How do
- 14 you know? Can you testify and say, yeah, I know 100%
- sure, you know, it's her and Teladoc system is working
- 16 just fine, no problem?
- 17 A. No, I can't do that.
- 18 O. Okay. Further, which I'm sure I'm not
- 19 allowed to say anything about this --
- THE COURT: Well, if it's a question, you're
- allowed to ask the question. If you're going to
- testify -- if you're about to testify, then let's
- 23 try not to do that.
- 24 BY DR. LAHTEENMAA:
- 25 Q. If I'm delusional, then why is it that Dr.

- 1 and Dr. (phonetic) all were
- 2 having issues on that website? Putting orders in,
- 3 things not working well. Are they delusional also?
- 4 A. I don't know how I can testify to their
- 5 experiences.
- 6 Q. No, but would it make sense? If you take
- 7 what I'm saying as fact, then wouldn't it be odd
- 8 they're having problems also?
- 9 A. I would concede that from time to time there
- 10 will always be problems e-prescribing, even as I at
- 11 times will have issues.
- 12 Q. Consistency. Not randomly. Consistently
- 13 having issues.
- MR. MORRIS: Objection. She's not letting
- the witness answer.
- 16 THE COURT: Okay. Let Dr. Dahlin finish his
- answer.
- 18 THE WITNESS: I don't know if I had anything
- 19 else meaningful to say, to be honest with you.
- THE COURT: Okay.
- 21 BY DR. LAHTEENMAA:
- Q. Dr. Dahlin, if they're having problems on
- 23 Teladoc's system, consistently, not just one thing,
- 24 like you suggested, which how would you know? You
- don't use that system. But if they're consistently

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1 having problems --
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- MR. MORRIS: Objection to relevance.
- 3 BY DR. LAHTEENMAA:
- 4 Q. -- then --
- THE COURT: If he doesn't use the system, how
- 6 would he know about problems with the system?
- 7 BY DR. LAHTEENMAA:
- 8 Q. Well, that, and how does that make me
- 9 delusional? If they're also having problems, aren't
- they delusional based on your indication?
- 11 THE COURT: Again, there's no evidence in the
- 12 record today as to these other people, physicians,
- I'm assuming, but I don't know --
- 14 DR. LAHTEENMAA: Yes, there is. It was
- posted.
- 16 THE COURT: Again, anything that you don't
- offer into evidence today, you're talking about it
- 18 was posted as -- again, it was posted as
- 19 statements about people who are not here to
- testify, to verify. Why they made those
- 21 statements, whether they suffered those same
- 22 problems, or that they in any way can verify that
- what you said is correct.
- That's the problem with hearsay. When you
- 25 take a statement from somebody who's not here in

this proceeding, and you offer it into evidence, it either has to be an exception to the hearsay rule, which are limited exceptions to the hearsay rule, or it has to be verified by the person making the statement if you want to rely on the truth of what is in that statement.

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DR. LAHTEENMAA: Okay. So I'm going to look.

THE COURT: One person can just come and testify and say, look, I have all this information, it's all written up by these people, but they're not here, and opposing counsel cannot cross-examination, just examine those witnesses.

Just as if Mr. Morris started saying, this person said this, or this person said that, or this witness said this person said this, this person said that, you don't have the opportunity to cross-examine them, so I could not be able to accept those statements from the people, except in the limited exceptions to the hearsay rule.

I know you may not understand all that specifically legally, but you have a pretty good working knowledge of how this process works, just from everything that you've filed on your own behalf, and all I can take when I have a witness on the stand is that witness's testimony, based

- 1 upon questions asked of that witness that are
- 2 somehow related to the complaint here, which is a
- 3 complaint saying you can't practice your
- 4 profession with a reasonable degree of skill and
- safety.
- DR. LAHTEENMAA: I'm looking.
- 7 THE COURT: Okay.
- 8 BY DR. LAHTEENMAA:
- 9 Q. So, and by the way, Bobby, didn't you talk to
- 10 them? I mean, you talked to tons of them, tried to
- 11 recruit them, saying that I'm delusional. So you know
- Dr. (phonetic), you know Dr. (phonetic),
- they never told you, oh, yeah, we're having problems
- with the Teladoc system too, did they?
- 15 A. I've never spoken with any of those people
- 16 before.
- 17 O. You have never talked to them?
- 18 A. No.
- 19 Q. That's not what they said.
- 20 THE COURT: Again, you're giving a statement
- 21 of what someone said who's not here to verify that
- 22 statement.
- DR. LAHTEENMAA: No, I'm asking Dr. -- I'm
- asking Bobby.
- THE COURT: He did not talk to those people.

- 1 So you can't respond to that with, they said they
- 2 talked to you, unless they come here and say, I
- 3 talked to Dr. Dahlin on such and such a date and
- time, and here's what we talked about. You can't
- 5 put those words into the record as the truth of
- 6 the matter asserted, which is that Dr. Dahlin is
- 7 not being forthright in his responses. You can't
- 8 do that for these other witnesses.
- 9 BY DR. LAHTEENMAA:
- 10 Q. So Bobby, then, can you say after all this
- 11 that I'm still delusional, based on what you just
- 12 said, you don't know for sure what is going on, as far
- 13 as the hacking goes?
- 14 A. Yes, I still do think you experience
- 15 delusions.
- 16 Q. I didn't ask that. I didn't ask what you
- 17 think. I said, for a fact. Can you say I'm
- delusional for a fact? I don't care about your
- 19 opinions. I'm talking about facts.
- 20 A. I don't think it's possible to ever prove
- 21 with 100% certainty that anyone ever has a delusion.
- O. Well, actually it is?
- 23 A. Unless you can (indiscernible) --
- 24 O. You --
- 25 MR. MORRIS: Objection; arguing.

THE COURT: Again, you're arguing and you're

- ind cooker ligatin, you're drydring and you're
- 2 testifying. You'll have your opportunity to
- 3 testify, but this is not it, Doctor. I just need
- 4 you to ask him questions, and if you don't agree
- 5 with his answers, ask another question, but you
- don't get to argue with him about his answers.
- 7 It's not how we do this, and this is all part of
- 8 the respect for the witness and allowing the
- 9 witness to testify and get the information into
- 10 the record so that it's in a form that I can do
- something with, and I have to write a detailed
- order here.
- 13 BY DR. LAHTEENMAA:
- 14 Q. Okay. Notice discovery file, PDF. Do you
- 15 have that up?
- MR. MORRIS: I'm sorry, what is she asking?
- 17 DR. LAHTEENMAA: Oh, the notice discovery
- file, PDF.
- 19 MR. MORRIS: I'm not sure what you're
- 20 referencing.
- 21 DR. LAHTEENMAA: That's what it's called, the
- evidence, Notice discovery file, PDF.
- BY DR. LAHTEENMAA:
- Q. Bobby, I would recommend you read this before
- 25 you commit perjury.

THE COURT: Oh, please, Doctor. Let's not 1 2 make criminal accusations against anybody, okay? I mean, Dr. Dahlin has his impressions and 3 4 opinions, and he has given them, and, you know, where's the perjury? I mean, come on. 5 DR. LAHTEENMAA: Well, the evidence is right 6 here. 7 MR. MORRIS: Your Honor --8 9 THE COURT: No, the evidence is not right The only evidence I can consider is the 10 evidence that's given to me. So, if you exchange 11 the evidence with, you know, the opposing counsel, 12 13 and it's not offered into the record today, I can't consider it. It's not evidence until I have 14 15 it, can touch it -- not really touch it, but look 16 at it on my screen, and do something with it. 17 DR. LAHTEENMAA: Can you pull this up? MR. MORRIS: I'm not sure what she's 18 referring to, Your Honor. I have a notice of 19 2.0 filing evidence, evidence of hacking and whistleblower retaliation, and lawyers barred were 21 22 the three sections we were given, so I'm not sure 23 what she's referring to. 24 DR. LAHTEENMAA: Do you have the PDF file

that is attached to the motion for discovery?

- 1 MR. MORRIS: It's the motion. We don't have
- 2 that. That's not part of the evidence.
- 3 DR. LAHTEENMAA: Okay. Even though it's
- filed on the court website?
- 5 THE COURT: Well, the notice was filed, but
- 6 the documents were not filed.
- 7 DR. LAHTEENMAA: Well, yeah, the documents,
- 8 I'm looking at them. The notice and the
- 9 documents.
- 10 THE COURT: Then why don't you tell me what
- 11 notice you're talking about. Give me a date, give
- me something. I have the docket right here in
- front of me.
- DR. LAHTEENMAA: Okay.
- THE COURT: Give me a date, give me something
- 16 that I can look at, and at least then I can make a
- 17 ruling based on something I can see.
- 18 DR. LAHTEENMAA: Notice of discovery, let me
- 19 see.
- MR. MORRIS: I'm able to pull up the docket,
- Your Honor, so I'm looking now as well.
- 22 THE COURT: Yeah, I just don't know what --
- DR. LAHTEENMAA: It's under the motion to
- 24 compel discovery. I believe it was filed on the
- 25 16th of July.

- 1 THE COURT: July 16, okay.
- MR. MORRIS: I'm sorry, Your Honor.
- THE COURT: Motion to compel discovery, okay.
- DR. LAHTEENMAA: And the evidence that's
- 5 attached to that, the PDF file. There's the
- 6 motion, and then --
- 7 MR. MORRIS: There are Exhibits A through N.
- DR. LAHTEENMAA: Let me see.
- 9 THE COURT: What exhibit are you referring
- 10 to?
- DR. LAHTEENMAA: Okay, I have to scroll back
- down.
- THE COURT: It's 41 pages.
- DR. LAHTEENMAA: Yes, okay. So notice of
- discovery, page 20. It's starting right there,
- 16 page 20.
- 17 THE COURT: Page 20? Exhibit K, Teladoc
- 18 systems malfunctions?
- DR. LAHTEENMAA: Uh-huh, yeah. 41 pages,
- that's a very small drop.
- 21 THE COURT: Okay. Again, how is Dr. Dahlin
- 22 supposed to know anything about these exhibits?
- DR. LAHTEENMAA: Well, if I were to make a
- 24 complaint against another doctor's license, I
- 25 would definitely look at the evidence.

65 THE COURT: No, that's -- you're assuming he 1 had this information in front of him at the time 2 he made the complaint. You can ask him questions 3 4 about that. DR. LAHTEENMAA: Yeah, okay. 5 THE COURT: You can't impeach him today with 6 evidence from other people who aren't here to 7 testify about it, which makes it hearsay. 8 9 DR. LAHTEENMAA: I am not trying to, but to avoid --10 11 THE COURT: Well, but you're putting out 12 words like perjury and not --13 DR. - 7 Q. Okay. Bobby, can you hear me?
- 8 A. Yes.
- 9 Q. I don't have the screen open. I'm looking at
- 10 the letter right now. So, this is e-mails between me
- and Funke Agbasi from Teladoc. She says, "Thank you
- for these examples, Dr. Lahteenmaa. I will share this
- with the engineering team. It might be best for
- 14 you --"
- MR. MORRIS: Objection. She's just reading
- this into the record.
- 17 THE COURT: That's all right. I'm going to
- let her read it into the record, and then I'm
- 19 going to --
- MR. MORRIS: Okay.
- 21 THE COURT: -- hear what the question is.
- 22 BY DR. LAHTEENMAA:
- Q. So, there is tons of e-mails here, like you
- said earlier, 40-something pages, which is just a
- 25 small, little drop in the bucket, about Teladoc system

- 1 problems, and then asking me to send them these
- 2 issues. And then there's medication refill issues,
- 3 patient access care issues, all in examples, extremely
- 4 detailed. Unable to find a provider.
- 5 THE COURT: What is your question for Dr.
- 6 Dahlin?
- 7 BY DR. LAHTEENMAA:
- 8 Q. So, my question is, with all this evidence --
- 9 THE COURT: Wait. Well, wait. I think the
- 10 first question -- I'll ask him the first question
- 11 for you.
- 12 Dr. Dahlin, have you ever seen this
- information before? Do you know what Dr.
- 14 Lahteenmaa is talking about?
- 15 THE WITNESS: No.
- 16 THE COURT: Okay. Now ask your question.
- 17 You're saying with all this information, but you
- haven't established that he's ever seen this --
- DR. LAHTEENMAA: How shameful of him.
- 20 THE COURT: -- or especially that he has seen
- 21 it at the time that he filed his complaint online
- 22 with PRN.
- DR. LAHTEENMAA: Horrible.
- 24 THE COURT: You're asking him to put
- 25 knowledge into his brain ex post facto, after the

1 time that he was --

DR. LAHTEENMAA: It's not like this happened

3 last week. He has had one and a half years to

4 look at this. Or is it just make statements?

5 THE COURT: Doctor, that's not his job. He's

6 called as a witness to say, I filed a complaint.

Here's what I've based it upon, and that's that.

- DR. LAHTEENMAA: Okay.
- 9 THE COURT: He's not here --
- 10 BY DR. LAHTEENMAA:
- 11 Q. So, Bobby, you didn't feel like looking at
- 12 any of this?
- 13 THE COURT: He was not retained by the
- 14 Department, as far as I know, because I haven't
- heard anything about that. But he wasn't retained
- 16 by the Department to review all the records that
- 17 you submitted into this proceeding over the last
- 18 several months. So how do you know about -- if
- 19 you're asking him if he knew about this, that's a
- 20 good question to ask him. Did he know about all
- 21 this information that you had, that you gave to
- 22 people that you did not give to him?
- 23 BY DR. LAHTEENMAA:
- Q. Do you have this pulled up, Bobby?
- THE COURT: He doesn't have it pulled up,

because why would he? He's not -- he's testifying 1

- 2. from Minnesota about his role in this case.
- BY DR. LAHTEENMAA: 3
- 4 Q. Okay. So, Bobby, now that you haven't looked
- at this, and you have been just making baseless 5
- 6 accusations for one and a half years, here it is.
- Tons of evidence, 42 pages. 7
- THE COURT: Hang on a second, Doctor, please. 8
- 9 To the court reporter, please strike all that
- 10 argument right there about baseless accusations
- for one and a half years. And I want to hear a 11
- question, please. 12
- 13 DR. LAHTEENMAA: Okay.
- THE COURT: Who, what, when, where --14
- BY DR. LAHTEENMAA: 15
- 16 Q. So there's evidence of Teladoc glitches, tons
- of them, different types. 17
- 18 THE COURT: Who, what, when, where, why?
- BY DR. LAHTEENMAA: 19
- 2.0 0. So, how can you still state knowing of this
- evidence, even though you can't read it, but 21
- 22 regardless it's there --
- THE COURT: Doctor, please. He's never seen 23
- this evidence. He said he has not seen this 2.4
- evidence. I want you to start a question with 25

- who, what, when, where, or why? Why did you do
- this? When did you do this? What did you do?
- Who did this?
- DR. LAHTEENMAA: Can I say how?
- 5 THE COURT: You're starting the question with
- 6 testimony.
- 7 DR. LAHTEENMAA: So I can ask him how can he
- 8 make a diagnosis of delusions of knowing that all
- 9 this evidence exists?
- 10 THE COURT: First you have to ask him if he
- 11 knows that all this exists before you told him
- 12 about it five minutes ago.
- 13 BY DR. LAHTEENMAA:
- 14 Q. Well, Bobby, do you know this evidence exists
- 15 that I told you about when you came to visit me in
- 16 Palm Beach?
- 17 A. I did not have any evidence, no.
- 18 Q. Okay. How about the subpoena?
- 19 A. I don't think so.
- Q. Are you going to lie about that too, the
- 21 subpoena?
- 22 A. Like the subpoena for me to appear?
- Q. From Teladoc that I showed you. Actually,
- you asked about it. You said, "Show that to me."
- 25 A. I don't recall if it was a subpoena, but I do

71 recall asking you to show me any legitimate evidence

2 in the interest of giving you a fair shot at believing

3 you.

- Q. Okay. And you don't remember the subpoena?
- 5 A. I don't remember any of the details, no. I
- 6 do remember you -- me asking you for what evidence
- 7 that you have that this is really going on and not
- 8 seeing anything that was more than, to be frank,
- 9 fantasy.
- 10 Q. Okay. So you never -- what about all the
- 11 texts that I sent you? How about the hackings?
- 12 A. They seemed most consistent with a delusional
- 13 rant than anything.
- 14 Q. Okay. So I suppose you would consider this
- as a delusional rant also of these 42 pages of
- 16 evidence?
- 17 THE COURT: What is this? When you say,
- "consider this"?
- DR. LAHTEENMAA: Well, it's hard because he
- 20 cannot see what I see. He cannot pull it up. I'm
- just saying, I'm looking at 42 pages of evidence
- 22 right here. You cannot see it, so, you know, it's
- hard to ask questions based on that. I didn't
- 24 realize --
- MR. MORRIS: I'm going to object based on

1 relevance. He said he hasn't seen it and he can't

- 2 testify to it.
- THE COURT: He hasn't seen it and he can't
- 4 testify to it, so you have to go on to something
- 5 else. You can make this argument when you're
- 6 testifying, you can -- but he said he has not seen
- 7 this.
- 8 BY DR. LAHTEENMAA:
- 9 Q. So you don't have any evidence to prove that
- 10 I'm delusional? You don't have any hardcore evidence,
- it's just your opinion, essentially?
- 12 A. My clinical opinion, yes.
- Q. No, facts. Because to diagnose somebody with
- 14 delusions, you always rule out evidence. You always
- go through the evidence. You haven't done any of
- 16 this. You haven't looked at any of the evidence.
- 17 MR. MORRIS: Objection; argumentative.
- 18 BY DR. LAHTEENMAA:
- 19 Q. You actually texted me and you said, "I don't
- 20 care." We looked at that text message together, as a
- 21 group.
- THE COURT: Dr. Lahteenmaa, this has been
- asked and answered. You've asked him what he
- based his belief that you're delusional on. He
- told you, and there's nothing more for him to say.

- 1 He told you what it was based on. It was not
- 2 based on this information that you have us talking
- 3 about.
- 4 BY DR. LAHTEENMAA:
- 5 Q. One more question. Dr. Dahlin, do you care
- about the evidence that I have?
- A. No, I don't.
- 8 Q. Okay. That's what I thought. And you said
- 9 that on that evidence also, "Yeah, I don't care."
- 10 THE COURT: Is there a question?
- DR. LAHTEENMAA: No. He said he doesn't
- 12 care. He doesn't care how much evidence I have.
- 13 THE COURT: Okay. Do you have another
- 14 question for Dr. Dahlin?
- DR. LAHTEENMAA: I don't think so.
- 16 THE COURT: Mr. Morris, any redirect?
- 17 MR. MORRIS: Just briefly.
- 18 REDIRECT EXAMINATION
- 19 BY MR. MORRIS:
- Q. Dr. Dahlin, you indicated you didn't see any
- 21 credible evidence of hacking. But you were shown
- 22 evidence allegedly by Dr. Lahteenmaa, correct?
- 23 A. Yes.
- Q. And do you remember what she showed you?
- 25 A. I don't remember any specifics, no.

- 1 Q. Okay. And you indicated that you wouldn't
- trust Dr. Lahteenmaa's reasoning skills, correct?
- A. Correct.
- 4 Q. And why is that?
- 5 A. Because she comes -- I'm trying to think of a
- 6 good way to describe this. The way that she comes to
- 7 her conclusions is through faulty logic. And that
- 8 type of reasoning has no place in medicine. So, you
- 9 know, when you -- you know, the evidence she sees and
- 10 the evidence she presents, she reads it and perceives
- it as evidence where the average person would look at
- it and not perceive it as such.
- 13 O. So --
- DR. LAHTEENMAA: (Indiscernible).
- THE COURT: Go ahead, Doctor. Have you
- 16 completed your answer?
- 17 THE WITNESS: Yes.
- 18 BY MR. MORRIS:
- 19 Q. Now, you indicated -- and I realize we have
- 20 not called you as an expert witness, but you indicated
- 21 it was your clinical opinion that what? That she
- 22 still has delusions or has psychosis or what?
- 23 A. I would feel confident with the level of
- 24 knowledge I possess to state that she is currently
- 25 experiencing delusions.

- 1 Q. And what is that based upon?
- THE COURT: Do you have an objection, Doctor?
- 3 DR. LAHTEENMAA: I have one more question for
- 4 Bobby.
- 5 THE COURT: Well, we're not -- it's not your
- 6 turn. Mr. Morris, go ahead.
- 7 BY MR. MORRIS:
- Q. And what is that based upon, your clinical
- 9 opinion then, based upon?
- 10 A. That she's currently experiencing delusions?
- 11 Q. Yes.
- 12 A. Listening to her describe her current level
- of persecution is itself a delusion.
- 14 MR. MORRIS: No further questions.
- 15 THE COURT: Thank you.
- Doctor, I'm going to let you ask one or two
- more questions.
- DR. LAHTEENMAA: Very brief.
- 19 RECROSS-EXAMINATION
- 20 BY DR. LAHTEENMAA:
- Q. Dr. Dahlin, when you take your neurosurgery
- 22 boards and you get your certificate, was it listed as
- 23 M.D. or D.O.?
- A. For my boards?
- 25 Q. Uh-huh.

- 1 A. D.O.
- Q. Okay. Mine is M.D.
- 3 How many social security numbers do you have?
- 4 MR. MORRIS: Objection; relevance.
- 5 BY DR. LAHTEENMAA:
- 6 Q. How many?
- 7 THE COURT: What's the relevance of that?
- DR. LAHTEENMAA: Because I have two.
- 9 THE COURT: Okay. And what's the relevance
- of that; how many social security numbers Dr.
- 11 Dahlin has?
- DR. LAHTEENMAA: Well, and that I'm listed as
- M.D., not as a D.O. That is a big problem.
- 14 Because basically, I have a board certification
- for something, but I'm not qualified. It's a
- 16 completely different thing. I mean, my board
- 17 certification is actually M.D. certification 2016.
- 18 THE COURT: Okay. What --
- 19 DR. LAHTEENMAA: I have two social security
- 20 numbers.
- THE COURT: That's all. That's all. You're
- not asking a question, you're testifying. So --
- DR. LAHTEENMAA: So I suppose I have been
- hacked.
- THE COURT: Well, no, you get to ask him

questions, you don't get to testify. You're going 1 2 to have your time to testify, and I suspect you'll take plenty of time to say whatever you want in 3 the record. So, I'm not going to cut you off, but 4 I am going to cut you off when you're not asking a 5 witness questions, because you're just telling the 6 witness something. 7 BY DR. LAHTEENMAA: 8 9 Q. One social, Bobby? Or two? THE COURT: I'm not going to -- he's not 10 11 required to answer that question. DR. LAHTEENMAA: Uh-huh. 12 13 THE COURT: Okay. Dr. Dahlin, thank you very much. And you're free to go about your business, 14 and I hope you have a good rest of your day. 15 16 THE WITNESS: Thank you. 17 THE COURT: Okay. It's 10.35. Why don't we take a 10-minute break before the next witness? 18 And, Mr. Morris, your next witness is going 19 to be Dr. Treese? 20 MR. MORRIS: Actually, it's going to be Dr. 21 22 23 THE COURT: Okay. 24 MR. MORRIS: I'm calling him right now over the break.

- 1 THE WITNESS: Yes. It's Niaah, N-I-A-A-H
- 2 Ellis, E-L-L-I-S.
- THE COURT: You may inquire, counsel.
- 4 DIRECT EXAMINATION
- 5 BY MR. MORRIS:
- Q. Yes. Can you state your work address, ma'am?
- 7 A. Yes. I work at 14101 North 140 -- I'm sorry.
- 8 I need to clear my throat. One moment. Okay. Yes.
- 9 I work at 14101 Northwest Highway 441, Suite 700,
- 10 Alachua, Florida, 32615.
- 11 Q. And can you tell me who is your employer?
- 12 A. I work for the Florida Department of Health,
- 13 Medical Quality Assurance.
- 14 Q. Okay. And are you nervous today?
- 15 A. Just a little. This will be my first
- 16 hearing, but I'm fine. Thank you.
- 17 Q. All right. And can you tell me what is your
- 18 position with the Department of Health?
- 19 A. So, I am an investigations manager.
- Q. And how long have you been an investigations
- 21 manager?
- 22 A. So, I've been a manager for almost one year
- 23 now.
- Q. And which office do you work at now?
- 25 A. Currently, I work in the Alachua field

- 1 office.
- Q. And did you have occasion to work down at the
- 3 Jupiter office?
- A. Yes, I did. I worked there for two years as
- 5 a supervisor, yes.
- 6 Q. Okay. And was Alice Richardson one of your
- 7 employees that you supervised?
- 8 A. Yes, she was.
- 9 Q. Okay. And are you appearing today as a
- 10 custodian of records for the Department of Health?
- 11 A. Yes, I am.
- 12 Q. And when were you the supervisor of Alice
- 13 Richardson?
- 14 A. This was in 2022 to 2024.
- 15 O. And what do you do as an investigative
- 16 supervisor?
- 17 A. So, what I do there is I oversee the
- investigative staff. So, I review their records. I
- 19 basically answer any questions that they have. I
- 20 assist them with scheduling appointments. I review
- 21 their investigative material before it's sent up to
- 22 prosecution services unit for review.
- Q. And can you tell me generally, what does the
- Department do when a complaint comes in?
- 25 A. So, when a complaint comes in, what we do is

we will gather the evidence and the material to either

we will gather the evidence and the material to either

- 2 interview the subject. We send out subpoenas so that
- 3 we can gather records. We go out and sometimes do
- 4 in-person services. So, it's just a combination of
- 5 things.
- 6 Q. And can you tell me specifically in this
- 7 case, in the Dr. Lahteenmaa case, do you know where
- 8 the original complaint came from?
- 9 A. The original complaint came from -- yes, one
- 10 moment. Let me --
- 11 Q. Are you looking at your computer?
- 12 A. I am.
- Q. Okay. Are you looking at Exhibit 3, which is
- 14 something we had compiled with the final investigative
- 15 report and summaries in this case?
- 16 A. Yes, I am.
- 17 O. And is Exhibit 3 a true and correct copy of
- 18 the final investigative report and summaries in this
- 19 case?
- A. Yes, it is.
- 21 MR. MORRIS: At this point, Your Honor, we
- would submit that as our Exhibit 3.
- THE COURT: It's in two parts, correct? I
- had it broken into two parts.
- 25 MR. MORRIS: Yeah, I believe it is in two

- parts. I think it was just too big a file. 1 2. THE COURT: Okay. Dr. Lahteenmaa, with the verification -- not for the details contained 3 within this, but for the authentication of these 4 records, do you have an objection to their 5 authenticity, admissibility into evidence? 6 DR. LAHTEENMAA: So, which ones are we 7 talking about now? 8 9 THE COURT: This is the -- I assume this is 10 the entire investigative file? 11 MR. MORRIS: Yes, it is. DR. LAHTEENMAA: Yeah, I object to the whole 12 13 thing. I don't agree with any of it. THE COURT: You don't have to agree with it. 14 This witness is the custodian of records and has 15 authenticated it. If you have an objection to 16 authentication, do you want to ask her how she 17 knows it? 18 DR. LAHTEENMAA: To her authentic- -- no, no. 19

THE COURT: Okay. All right. I'm going to

- admit them into evidence. It doesn't mean you 21
- 22 have to agree with everything that's in there.
- 23 You can certainly question anything that's in
- 24 there.

20

25 (Petitioner's Exhibit No. 3, Parts 1 & 2,

- were admitted into evidence.)
- DR. LAHTEENMAA: I have, just popped in my
- 3 head, one question if I can ask?
- THE COURT: About the document's
- 5 authenticity?
- DR. LAHTEENMAA: Well, no, not really.
- 7 THE COURT: Okay. Then we'll wait until the
- 8 witness has given some testimony and you may then
- 9 ask some questions based upon that.
- Go ahead, Mr. Morris.
- 11 BY MR. MORRIS:
- 12 Q. Okay. And so, Ms. Ellis --
- 13 THE COURT: So the record's clear, Exhibit 3,
- 14 Part 1 and Exhibit 3 -- Petitioner Exhibit 3, Part
- 15 2 are admitted into evidence without objection.
- 16 BY MR. MORRIS:
- 17 Q. Ms. Ellis, the complaint you said on this
- case initially came from PRN; is that correct?
- 19 A. That's correct.
- Q. And when was that, that complaint came in
- 21 from PRN?
- 22 A. That complaint came in -- give me one moment.
- 23 I'm having a little technical difficulties here.
- 24 O. Sure.
- DR. LAHTEENMAA: Ellis, you don't want to say

- 1 that. Bad things will happen.
- THE WITNESS: One moment here. Sorry, give
- 3 me one moment.
- DR. LAHTEENMAA: Judge Cohen?
- 5 THE COURT: Yes.
- 6 DR. LAHTEENMAA: Can I ask that quick
- 7 question when Ellis is trying to find whatever?
- 8 THE COURT: Well, why don't we hold the
- 9 question, jot it down or hold it until we have
- 10 something -- the question. I mean, are you
- 11 questioning whether these documents -- I thought
- 12 you said you didn't question the authenticity of
- the documents.
- 14 DR. LAHTEENMAA: No, because Ellis was sworn
- in but Bobby wasn't, so that's why I was thinking.
- 16 THE COURT: No, he was sworn in. Every
- 17 witness will be sworn in.
- 18 THE WITNESS: Okay. I'm sorry. I'm having
- 19 some technical difficulties pulling this file.
- MR. MORRIS: Your Honor, I can send her the
- 21 file on our inter-office teams.
- 22 THE WITNESS: Please do, Attorney. I'm so
- sorry.
- 24 THE COURT: Sure.
- MR. MORRIS: Actually, I'm going to send it

- 1 by e-mail. Sorry. It's easier and quicker.
- THE COURT: Is there a specific page you're
- going to reference? I can get to that page if I
- 4 --
- 5 MR. MORRIS: Well, I was going to reference
- 6 the entire file first, unfortunately.
- 7 THE COURT: Okay.
- 8 THE WITNESS: Attorney, I actually have it
- 9 here.
- MR. MORRIS: Okay, good.
- 11 THE WITNESS: Sorry about that. I'm looking
- 12 at Exhibit Number 3.
- 13 BY MR. MORRIS:
- 0. Can you tell me --
- 15 A. Sorry, Supplemental Number 3.
- Q. Okay. And can you tell me, when did the
- 17 matter first come to the attention of DOH again?
- 18 A. So, it came in -- let's see, the supplemental
- 19 that I'm looking at, or the date of complaint, was
- 20 December 27, 2023.
- 21 Q. Okay. And at that time, do you know who was
- assigned to investigate the case?
- 23 A. Yes, that would be Allison Richardson.
- Q. And what steps did Ms. Richardson take to
- investigate the complaint?

- 1 A. So, the supplemental -- as far as the
- 2 supplemental, she -- what she did was she reached out
- 3 to the subject, Ms. Lahteenmaa, just to advise her
- 4 that she was overseeing her case. And she requested
- 5 for her to reply in letting her know that she received
- 6 the documents that were sent to her.
- 7 Q. And were any investigative steps taken after
- 8 that?
- 9 A. Yes. So looking at the supplemental, right?
- 10 I just want to make sure I'm looking at the
- 11 supplemental.
- 12 Q. You can look at what we call -- first of all,
- 13 let me explain to the Court. What is a final
- 14 investigative report?
- 15 A. A final investigative report is a collective
- 16 collaboration of evidence received from the subject,
- 17 it's received from the source, whoever made the
- 18 complaint. It's also -- so it's put together in a
- 19 package, so any evidence that's received, so we send
- out a subject notification letter, we send out the
- 21 case summary and the initiating documents to the
- 22 subject, letting them know that there is an open
- investigation. We also correspond with the source, so
- 24 whoever made the complaint, we notify them that the
- 25 complaint is open and being investigated. We request

records supporting documents that support the initial

- 2 complaint. And then we try to get a response from the
- 3 subject.
- Q. Okay. So it's the way the Department does
- 5 it, a final report, but then they supplement the final
- 6 report; is that correct?
- 7 A. That's correct.
- 8 O. Okay. So when was the first final
- 9 investigative report done in this case?
- 10 A. That was done January 10th of 2024.
- 11 Q. And who had been interviewed as part of that
- 12 investigation?
- 13 A. So for this complaint, we did not have any
- 14 interviews other than PRN, and it's really not an
- interview, we just request the follow-up records. So
- 16 we weren't able to get in contact with Lahteenmaa at
- 17 this time.
- 18 Q. And the PRN records, how many records were
- 19 with the PRN? How many pages?
- 20 A. So there were three -- let's see, there were
- 21 14 of 20, so there were six pages.
- 22 O. And were there any other records that were
- sent as part of the final investigation?
- 24 A. No, sir.
- Q. Okay. And when was there a supplemental

- 1 filed on this?
- 2 A. Let's see.
- 3 Q. A supplemental one?
- A. Okay, I can tell you that. Okay.
- 5 Supplemental number one, that was done on, it was
- 6 February 7th, 2024.
- 7 Q. And had anybody been interviewed as part of
- 8 that supplemental?
- 9 A. No, sir.
- 10 Q. And were there more records generated?
- 11 A. No, sir. No, sir, there were no more records
- 12 generated from this.
- Q. Okay, why was there a supplemental one? Do
- 14 you know?
- 15 A. So this was a self-generated supplemental
- 16 predicated upon a telephone call and e-mail
- 17 correspondence from Lahteenmaa. So yes, we did get a
- 18 telephone correspondence call received advising that
- 19 the complainant that the subject notification letter
- 20 and the attached documents was e-mailed to her.
- 21 And so, yes, we did receive a telephone call
- from Lahteenmaa on January 30th of 2024 where the
- investigator received a call from Lahteenmaa and she
- 24 advised that her phones and computers -- should I read
- 25 through this entire --

Q. Well, what was her -- what was the subject?

2 Why did she call?

- 3 A. She stated that her phones had been -- her
- 4 computers and phones were hacked and she was dealing
- 5 with some issues for a long time. She stated that she
- 6 was not in the United States during the holidays and
- 7 is attempting to address the concerns at this time.
- 8 She wanted to ensure that she was within the allotted
- 9 45-day time frame.
- 10 Q. And was there a supplemental two generated?
- 11 A. Yes, there was.
- 12 O. And when was that?
- 13 A. One moment. More technical difficulties.
- 14 It's not letting me download it. One moment, I'll try
- it another way. One moment. I do apologize,
- 16 Attorney, we've been having some technical
- 17 difficulties with Axiom today.
- 18 Q. Let me ask you this while you're looking that
- 19 up: What was the -- did Dr. Dahlin file a complaint
- 20 with PRN? And if so, when?
- 21 A. Okay. Give me one second, Attorney.
- 22 O. Sure, sure.
- A. One moment.
- Q. Sure. Do you want me to move on to another
- 25 question?

- 1 A. Yes. I'm sorry, I'm still -- yes.
- Q. All right. What is an order compelling an
- 3 examination?
- 4 A. So, the order compelling examination is a
- 5 document that's scheduled for the subject to be able
- 6 to get an examination done by a professional, someone
- 7 within her practice, someone within her state of
- 8 practice. So, you know, depending on what her
- 9 position is, that is an examination that's done by
- 10 someone, maybe a peer or someone in her group or
- 11 practice.
- 12 Q. And what is it looking for, do you know?
- 13 A. It's looking to see if she's fit to practice
- in her field.
- 15 Q. And was there an order to compel examination
- scheduled in this case?
- 17 A. Yes, it was.
- Q. And when was that scheduled and with whom?
- 19 A. Let's see. One moment. Okay. All right. I
- 20 do apologize. I'm really much more prepared than I am
- 21 right now. Give me one moment.
- 22 O. Okay.
- THE COURT: Mr. Morris, is there a particular
- page that's on you can point to?
- MR. MORRIS: I believe -- let's see, my

- 1 Exhibit 3. Where is it?
- THE COURT: Also, just to make sure, if you
- haven't noticed, Dr. De is in the waiting
- 4 room.
- 5 MR. MORRIS: Oh, okay. We will call him
- 6 next.
- 7 THE WITNESS: So I can tell you, Attorney,
- 8 that the request came down on 3-18 for the order
- 9 to compel examination. And let me see -- let me
- see.
- 11 BY MR. MORRIS:
- 12 Q. And in the order to compel examination, was
- that based mainly on the information from PRN and Dr.
- 14 Dahlin?
- 15 A. Yes.
- 16 Q. And when we send people, are we determining
- whether they're safe to practice?
- 18 A. No, when we send someone out to -- oh, yes,
- 19 yes, yes.
- 20 O. For the OCE?
- 21 A. Yes.
- Q. Okay. And did we have problems communicating
- with Dr. Lahteenmaa in this case?
- A. Yes, sir.
- Q. And in what way?

- 1 A. Well, there were several e-mails that were
- 2 sent, several phone calls that were made. The
- 3 investigator attempted to hand serve the document,
- 4 left a note on her door, left a document at the door.
- 5 Several e-mail attempts were made and was not able to
- 6 get in contact with her.
- 7 Q. And did Dr. Lahteenmaa accuse the Department
- 8 of overreaching or heavy-handed tactics often?
- 9 A. Yes.
- 10 O. In what way?
- 11 A. She would basically reply to the e-mails
- 12 stating that we're harassing her, that we're hacking
- her systems, and that she would seek legal counsel if
- 14 we did not -- if we didn't stop. She reached out to,
- 15 you know, the Department heads and, you know, she
- 16 really went above and beyond to try to get in contact
- 17 with the people that weren't even part of this case.
- 18 So, yes.
- 19 MR. MORRIS: Okay. No further questions,
- 20 Your Honor.
- 21 THE COURT: All right. Dr. Lahteenmaa?
- DR. LAHTEENMAA: So, I get to ask questions
- from Ellis regarding the beginning, I guess --
- 24 beginning parts.
- 25 CROSS-EXAMINATION

- 1 BY DR. LAHTEENMAA:
- Q. So, Ellis, where was my file sent? The
- 3 initial notification package? On January 4th?
- 4 A. Yes.
- 5 Q. Because for Mr. Morris, it went to a
- 6 different address. And per Ellis' e-mail, it was sent
- 7 to me, but per tracking, it was returned to sender, so
- 8 I never got it. So, where did it go?
- 9 A. So, the address of record that we have on
- 10 file, which is the address that you signed up with the
- 11 Department under your license. Can I say the address
- 12 out loud?
- 13 O. Uh-huh.
- 14 A. Okay. So the address is 3540 South Ocean
- 15 Boulevard, Number 805. That's Palm Beach, Florida,
- 16 33480. That's the address that you have on record,
- 17 and that's the attempted address multiple times. You
- 18 also have an e-mail address on file as well, and I can
- 19 tell you what that e-mail address is.
- Q. That's okay.
- 21 A. We have -- uh-huh.
- Q. Now, the mailing address?
- 23 A. Yes.
- Q. Mr. Morris said it was sent to the wrong
- 25 address, but --

- 1 MR. MORRIS: Objection.
- 2 BY DR. LAHTEENMAA:
- 3 Q. If they track it, it was returned to sender.
- THE COURT: Wait a second, there's an
- 5 objection. What's the objection?
- 6 MR. MORRIS: The objection is number one,
- 7 relevance, and number two, I mean, she's basically
- 8 saying I have said things and I'm certainly not
- 9 testifying in this matter.
- 10 DR. LAHTEENMAA: It's an e-mail. I have a
- 11 copy of it. It's listed on the Court website. It
- has a tracking number.
- 13 THE COURT: What are you asking of this
- 14 witness?
- DR. LAHTEENMAA: I'm saying I never got the
- 16 package that was mailed.
- 17 THE COURT: Okay.
- DR. LAHTEENMAA: It was my confidential
- information. Where did it end up? Because Ellis
- said it was mailed to my address. I never got it,
- 21 but if you actually track it, the tracking number,
- it says, "Returned to sender," so I never got it.
- MR. MORRIS: I think she answered the wrong
- 24 question, Your Honor.
- 25 THE COURT: Okay. So are you asking a

1 question? You just testified that you never got

- 2 it.
- 3 DR. LAHTEENMAA: Well, I'm asking where did
- 4 it go, and how is it legal not to provide me this
- 5 information? They sent my confidential
- 6 information all over the neighborhood. I never
- 7 got it. Where did it go?
- 8 THE COURT: That's not a question. Ask the
- 9 witness a question, please.
- 10 BY DR. LAHTEENMAA:
- 11 Q. Where did it go? Was it returned to sender
- 12 as per USPS?
- 13 A. I can't answer that question. I do know that
- it was mailed to you and your address of record, so I
- 15 can't answer that question. If it was returned to
- 16 sender, it would have came back to the Department as
- 17 returned to sender, but it was mailed to the address
- 18 that you have on file.
- 19 Q. Why would the USPS say it's returned to
- 20 sender? I have a photo of it, and it's posted.
- 21 MR. MORRIS: Objection; outside the scope.
- 22 THE COURT: Overruled.
- Ms. Ellis, do you know if it was returned to
- sender, meaning the Department?
- THE WITNESS: I can check and see, Your

- 1 Honor.
- 2 BY DR. LAHTEENMAA:
- 3 Q. Do you need the tracking number?
- A. No, ma'am. If it was returned to sender --
- 5 THE COURT: That's from the post office. She
- 6 has to find the document. If it was returned,
- 7 then there will be a sticker on it that says,
- 8 "Returned to sender," for whatever reason, no
- 9 address or no such person or whatever.
- 10 THE WITNESS: One moment.
- 11 BY DR. LAHTEENMAA:
- Q. USPS, still to date, shows this as returned
- 13 to sender if you punch in that number.
- 14 THE COURT: She's on her computer looking at
- documents, not surfing the web and punching in
- 16 numbers. This isn't like you sent discovery out.
- 17 This is the hearing. So, if her answer is I don't
- 18 know, then that's the answer and that's how the
- 19 record will reflect it. If you have something
- 20 different to show, then you need to include that
- 21 in your testimony.
- DR. LAHTEENMAA: Okay, well, it is there.
- I'll show you.
- 24 THE WITNESS: Yeah, because I don't know. I
- don't see where it was returned to sender, so I

1	don't know. I can't answer that question.
2	DR. LAHTEENMAA: Let me find that.
3	MR. MORRIS: This was not in any of her
4	exhibits, Your Honor, that were filed.
5	THE COURT: Well, I understand, but if it's
6	subject to her proving its relevance at some
7	point, she has that, she can show it to the
8	witness for impeachment or whatever. I mean, I
9	don't know. It's not
10	MR. MORRIS: Okay. And I just I would
11	point out that the witness did already testify
12	that she talked to that the Department of
13	Health talked to Dr. Lahteenmaa, so she was aware
14	of this.
15	THE COURT: Doctor, are you saying that you
16	never received a complaint here?
17	DR. LAHTEENMAA: Yes, that's what I'm saying.
18	The written statement, they kept e-mailing to my
19	hacked e-mail address. And also
20	THE COURT: Well, that was no, no, no. I

25	DR. LAHTEENMAA: The

THE COURT: One second. Please answer my 1 2 question. DR. LAHTEENMAA: I'm trying to. 3 THE COURT: When did you receive the 4 complaint? 5 6 DR. LAHTEENMAA: This physical package that was mailed, a USPS, that I never got. 7 THE COURT: Okay. When --8 9 DR. LAHTEENMAA: And then they also e-mailed 10 the copy of the same thing to my hacked e-mail, 11 where I got it from. 12 THE COURT: I don't want to hear any more hacked. Hacked is not evidence in this case. 13 14 Teladoc is not a party to this case. And I'm not 15 going to deal with Teladoc. They're not a party. 16 They're not subject to the jurisdiction of DOAH. 17 And I just want to hear, did you receive it by e-mail? 18 19 DR. LAHTEENMAA: E-mail, yes. 20 THE COURT: The package? And when was that? 21 DR. LAHTEENMAA: Supposedly. Because what do 22 I know what was in the physical one, so I can't 23 compare it to --24 THE COURT: (Indiscernible) the e-mail?

DR. LAHTEENMAA: I don't know. I would have

1 to log on to that e-mail. I don't even know if I

- 2 can log on to it.
- 3 THE COURT: Okay.
- DR. LAHTEENMAA: I have a million e-mails.
- 5 THE COURT: All right. Do you have another
- 6 question for Ms. Ellis?
- 7 BY DR. LAHTEENMAA:
- 8 Q. So, do you have a copy of Dr. Dahlin's
- 9 initial complaint with his signature?
- 10 MR. MORRIS: Objection; relevance. The
- initial complaint came from PRN.
- 12 THE COURT: Well, then the answer would be,
- can you answer that yes or no?
- 14 THE WITNESS: No.
- THE COURT: Okay.
- 16 BY DR. LAHTEENMAA:
- 17 Q. Did you find the date for the exam by Dr.
- 18 Treese?
- 19 A. I am still looking for that.
- Q. Okay. Why was I not told about the PCP
- 21 hearing and that information was withheld?
- 22 MR. MORRIS: Objection, Your Honor. PCP
- initial probable cause hearings are confidential
- and aren't noticed to the public.
- 25 DR. LAHTEENMAA: Shouldn't you still include

- it to the complete case file?
- THE COURT: No.
- 3 DR. LAHTEENMAA: Okay.
- 4 BY DR. LAHTEENMAA:
- Q. Why do I have two medical licenses? Well,
- one license, but two different dates of issuance?
- 7 A. I can't answer that question.
- Q. I don't think anybody can, because I have
- 9 e-mailed Florida Osteopathic Medicine and they will
- 10 not e-mail me back. I have yet to get one e-mail from
- 11 them.
- 12 MR. MORRIS: Objection, Your Honor. She has
- two copies of one license.
- 14 DR. LAHTEENMAA: Which makes no sense.
- Nobody else has two copies of one license, two
- 16 active copies of one license.
- 17 THE COURT: Well, is there a question for Ms.
- 18 Ellis?
- 19 Ms. Ellis said she can't answer, she doesn't
- 20 know.
- 21 BY DR. LAHTEENMAA:
- Q. You don't know, Ellis?
- A. No, I don't.
- Q. Isn't that unusual? Have you ever seen
- 25 anybody else have duplicates of a license with two

- different dates of issuance and two control numbers?
- A. I can't answer that.
- Q. Okay. So you can't or you haven't seen
- anybody else have that?
- A. I can't answer yes or no to that.
- 6 Q. Why?
- 7 THE COURT: Do you mean you've never seen
- 8 that?
- 9 BY DR. LAHTEENMAA:
- 10 Q. Why can't you answer?
- 11 A. I can't say that I have or have not seen
- 12 that.
- 14 A. I can't say that I have not seen that, but I
- 15 can't give you a time where I have seen it. So I
- 16 can't answer that.
- 17 MR. MORRIS: Your Honor, I'd just like to
- point out that this witness is not part of our
- 19 licensure file. She is an investigator.
- 20 THE COURT: I understand. So the answer is
- 21 she doesn't know.
- 22 BY DR. LAHTEENMAA:
- Q. Ellis, is that a common problem?
- A. Is what a common problem?
- Q. Having a duplicate of your license with two

- dates of issuance and two different control numbers.
- 2 A. I can't answer that because I don't issue
- 3 licenses, so I can't answer that question.
- 4 THE COURT: The answer is you don't know.
- 5 When you say you can't answer, it almost sounds
- 6 like you won't answer.
- 7 THE WITNESS: Oh, okay. I understand.
- 8 THE COURT: So either yes, no, or you don't
- 9 know.
- 10 THE WITNESS: I don't know.
- 11 THE COURT: Okay, thank you.
- 12 THE WITNESS: Sorry.
- 13 THE COURT: It just comes out clearer that
- 14 way.
- 15 THE WITNESS: Okay.
- 16 THE COURT: I didn't think you were hiding
- 17 anything. I just was getting that you don't know.
- 18 THE WITNESS: Yes, I don't know.
- 19 THE COURT: Okay.
- 20 BY DR. LAHTEENMAA:
- 21 Q. So Ellis, when Florida Department of Health,
- when they send out these packages, whatever legal
- 23 paperwork, right?
- A. Uh-huh.
- Q. Do they send them out willy-nilly, or do they

- 1 send them so they can be tracked?
- A. So we do hand-serve a lot of our documents.
- 3 Well, we hand-serve the documents to the address that
- 4 you provide when you sign up for your license. So
- 5 whatever license you report to the board, that's the
- 6 license that we serve your important documents to
- 7 because that's the license that you provided -- that's
- 8 the address that you provided.
- 9 Q. So hand-serve meaning there is no tracking,
- there is no signing for legal paperwork?
- 11 A. Well, we do our due diligence to make sure
- 12 that we are hand-serving the appropriate party. So we
- 13 do --
- Q. But is there signing? Do you sign for it?
- 15 A. It's not necessary. No, because we're
- 16 hand-serving.
- 17 Q. Are you required tracking?
- A. It's not necessary.
- 19 MR. MORRIS: Objection; arguing with the
- 20 witness.
- THE COURT: Okay. No, no, not arguing,
- 22 but let the witness finish her answer because
- you're asking the next question while she's still
- answering, and that's hard for the court reporter
- 25 to get.

- 1 BY DR. LAHTEENMAA:
- Q. Well, how do you know then that the right
- 3 person gets it or gets it at all or what happens to it
- 4 if you cannot track it and there is no signing? How
- 5 do you know for sure?
- 6 A. Because we're hand-serving it to the person
- 7 that it belongs to. So if a document came down from
- 8 the Prosecution Services Unit to hand-serve the
- 9 subject, meaning you, we would hand-serve that
- 10 document to you personally. So there's no need for a
- 11 signature because we're serving it to the actual party
- 12 who it belongs to.
- Q. How do you know who that party is if they
- don't sign for it legally? It could be anybody.
- 15 MR. MORRIS: Objection; asked to answer.
- 16 THE COURT: Overruled. Go ahead, Ms. Ellis,
- 17 to the extent you can answer that question.
- 18 THE WITNESS: Yes. So we know -- okay, so
- 19 you have a photo in the system. We can match your
- 20 photo up to make sure that we're serving the
- 21 correct person. So when you sign up for your
- license, we have a photo on file to be able to
- look up any individual that we're serving to make
- sure that it's the accurate, appropriate person.
- 25 BY DR. LAHTEENMAA:

- Q. Okay. So why was my legal paperwork then
- delivered and served to somebody downstairs and not
- 3 me?
- 4 A. I can't -- I don't know about -- I don't know
- 5 if that actually happened.
- 6 Q. Well, it's on the paperwork. I didn't sign
- 7 for it.
- 8 A. Yeah, if it was -- it's supposed to be
- 9 hand-served to you. So if you didn't --
- 10 Q. It's supposed to be in the ideal world. But
- if you don't have to sign, there is no tracking, how
- do you prove in a court of law this person actually
- did receive this paperwork? Prove it, not just --
- 14 MR. MORRIS: Objection, Your Honor;
- 15 relevance.
- 16 BY DR. LAHTEENMAA:
- 17 Q. -- a photo.
- MR. MORRIS: We're talking about an order to
- 19 compel examination, I believe we're talking about
- that, that she showed up for.
- 21 DR. LAHTEENMAA: No, no, all the paperwork.
- 22 THE COURT: (Indiscernible) initial packet.
- And my only question is, because we're here today,
- 24 did you receive notice of this and an opportunity
- 25 to file a petition for an administrative hearing?

I know the answer to that is yes, because there is 106 1 2 a petition for an administrative hearing filed in the case, within the -- timely filed within the 3 time after service of the administrative 4 complaint. 5 So, the question on relevance is, what does 6 this matter? I mean, you're here today, you knew 7 about this, you didn't just find out about this 8 9 yesterday, in which case I'd say, whoa, we're 10 stopping this hearing and giving you time. This 11 case has been here for quite some time. DR. LAHTEENMAA: Oh, you mean this case? 12 13 Well, it was actually supposed to be taken care by Mr. Burch, who dropped me at the last minute. 14 THE COURT: Well, that's -- again, that's not 15 16 relevant to Ms. Ellis, her testimony, or to anybody who's testifying now. 17 DR. LAHTEENMAA: Well, most of --18 THE COURT: There's nothing I can do about 19 20 Mr. Burch dropping your case. DR. LAHTEENMAA: No, I understand that. 21 But 22 it's relevant. 23 THE COURT: And you said you filed something

with the Florida Bar. But this case --

DR. LAHTEENMAA: Basically --

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THE COURT: -- came in November, so you've --1 2. at least as far as DOAH is concerned, you've known about this at least since November. 3 DR. LAHTEENMAA: Basically, all the paperwork 4 I got from Florida Department of Health, none of 5 it was delivered to me in a legal manner that can 6 be tracked or signed. It was just literally just 7 dropped somewhere or mailed all over the 8 9 neighborhood, like that letter. BY DR. LAHTEENMAA: 10 11 Ellis, you cannot -- did you find where it Was it returned to sender? 12 went? 13 THE COURT: But again, Dr. Lahteenmaa, I'm finding there was both actual and constructive 14 notice here. You know about this case. You've 15 16 filed a lot of documents in this case, as has your previous attorney. So, there's no relevance to 17 whether that was -- you received that initial 18 19 packet properly, because you're here and you know 2.0 about it. You're subjected to the jurisdiction of DOAH because of your filing a petition for 21 22 administrative hearing. 23 DR. LAHTEENMAA: Well, I think it's a big 24 deal because this is supposed to be a confidential 25 case.

1	THE COURT: You might think it's a big deal,
2	but it's not relevant to the issue of whether
3	you're able to practice your profession with
4	reasonable skill and safety.
5	DR. LAHTEENMAA: But it's supposed to be a
6	confidential case, right? My paperwork is
7	supposed to be confidential, at least that's what
8	it says in the beginning
9	THE COURT: Yes.
10	DR. LAHTEENMAA: like when I started this
11	case.
12	THE COURT: Your paperwork is, but that's
13	DR. LAHTEENMAA: It was mailed to somebody
14	else. It's not confidential. They opened it,
15	probably.
16	THE COURT: You know what? They're not on
17	trial.
18	DR. LAHTEENMAA: No, I am, and my paperwork
19	is somewhere who knows where.
20	THE COURT: Okay. We're going to move on, or
21	we're going to do you have any more questions

- 6 says that, uh, that -- remember that was month number
- 7 three. And she said her boards are due in month
- 8 number nine after graduation in month number six. So
- 9 that appears to me that she was still in her residency
- 10 and had three months to go when I first saw her.
- 11 Q. Okay. And when she first saw you, what
- 12 medicines was she taking at that time?
- 13 A.
- 14
- Q. And those were the only medicines she told
- 16 you she was taking at that time, correct?
- 17 A. That's correct. That's what she wrote down
- 18 on her intake form. I assume that's to be accurate.
- 19 Q. Now, since, um -- have you seen her
- 20 continuously since 2016 up until at least 2024?
- 21 A. Uh, I typically see patients who are taking
- 22 controlled substances every three months. And, uh, I
- 23 did not see her every three months. There were breaks
- in between. I can count the number of visits if you'd
- 25 like. I'll give you the exact dates of every visit

- 1 that she's made.
- Q. Well, can you approximate how many visits?
- If you want, you can count it. It's either way.
- A. I'll have to count them. One, two, three,
- 5 four, five, six, seven, eight, nine, 10, 11, 12, 13,
- 6 14, 15, 16, 17, 18, 19, 20, 21, 22, 23, 24 -- uh, 23
- 7 actually. Last visit would being 5-6-2024.
- 8 Q. Okay. So about 23 visits in eight years. So
- 9 every -- every few months, correct?
- 10 A. Correct.
- 11 Q. And what medicines did you prescribe for Dr.
- 12 Lahteenmaa?
- 13 A. I prescribed, uh, Adderall for her. She fit
- the criteria for a trial of the medication. And, uh,
- she successfully responded to the medication. She had
- 16 no complaints. And, uh, we continued, uh, the same
- 17 dose for the most part. There was one change where we
- 18 switched to Adderall. That could have been because
- 19 the pharmacy was -- I mean, we switched to Ritalin for
- one month. That was common, uh, if the pharmacy
- 21 doesn't have Adderall. She occasionally took
- 22 something to sleep, which was Ativan, most recently
- 23 Trazodone.
- Q. Okay. So what was her ending dose or the
- 25 last dose you know of as far as Adderall?

1 A. Her Adderall dose has pretty much been stable

- 2 the whole, uh -- the whole time at 20 milligrams three
- 3 times a day.
- 4 Q. Is that a relatively high dose?
- 5 A. That is a relatively high dose.
- 6 Q. And can you tell me, um, was she tolerating
- 7 it well to your knowledge?
- 8 A. Yes, that was the purpose of the follow-up
- 9 visits to see how well she was tolerating it.
- 10 Q. Okay. And have you seen her since May of
- 11 2024?
- 12 A. Uh, the last visit was a telephone visit and
- 13 that was 5-6-24.
- 14 Q. Okay. And since 5-6-24, you haven't seen her
- 15 at all, correct?
- 16 A. That's right.
- 17 Q. Has any medicine been prescribed from your
- 18 office since then?
- 19 A. Uh, no. The last prescription was 5-May-2024
- 20 for Adderall, 20 milligrams, one tab, three times a
- 21 day, and Trazodone, 50 milligrams at night.
- Q. Okay. Did Adderall cause any kind of cytosis
- or delirium syndrome symptoms?
- 24 A. Your question is, can Adderall cause delirium
- 25 and psychotic symptoms?

- 1 Q. Yes.
- A. Uh, it would be unusual, if that were the
- 3 case, at that dose, 60 milligrams. I personally have
- 4 never seen a patient become psychotic on 60
- 5 milligrams. The reason we --
- 6 Q. Is it -- go ahead. Go ahead and finish.
- 7 A. The common dose is 20 milligrams twice a day,
- 8 40 milligrams. But some patients need more than that,
- 9 need 60 milligrams. There are some costings with
- 10 taking 60 milligrams. Again, those are --
- 11 O. Now --
- 12 A. -- reviewed in the follow-up appointments.
- 13 Q. Okay. Sorry, I didn't mean to cut you off.
- 14 Now, when -- does your records indicate a
- 15 hospitalization for a Baker Act for Dr. Lahteenmaa?
- 16 A. My record on, uh, 8-15-2024 shows a
- 17 handwritten note from my office manager that says,
- 18 "Dr. De took a phone call from a social worker.
- 19 Patient is hospitalized in Delray Beach." I don't, I
- 20 don't know if she was Baker Acted.
- 21 Q. Okay. Do you -- have you had any follow-up
- with Dr. Lahteenmaa since that notation?
- 23 A. No.
- Q. And do you know why that is?
- 25 A. No.

- 1 Q. Okay. And you've gotten no notifications
- 2 she's changing doctors?
- 3 A. No.
- Q. Did she ever disclose any medications to you
- 5 other than the property or the property of the state of
- 6 been prescribed by another doctor?
- 7 A. No.
- Q. Had you ever done any, um, toxicology testing
- 9 on Dr. Lahteenmaa?
- 10 A. No.
- 11 Q. Okay. And Dr. Lahteenmaa never shared any
- 12 concerns about any kind of mental health symptoms to
- 13 you, did she, in 2024?
- 14 A. Uh, in 2024, there was, uh, no change from
- 15 the previous visits. And, uh, she said she was having
- 16 no trouble getting the medication filled. And she
- 17 asked for Trazodone, 50 milligrams at bedtime. And
- that's -- that was prescribed to help her sleep.
- 19 Q. Okay. And can Trazodone cause any kind of
- 20 psychotic symptoms?
- 21 A. I've never seen a standard dose of Trazodone
- 22 cause psychosis.
- MR. MORRIS: No further questions.
- 24 THE COURT: Thanks, Mr. Morris.
- 25 Dr. Lahteenmaa?

2 BY DR. LAHTEENMAA:

- 3 Q. Hi, Dr. D
- 4 A. Hey, good to see you.
- 5 Q. Sorry -- sorry to see you under these
- 6 circumstances.
- 7 A. Yeah, yeah, I understand.
- 8 Q. I do have a couple of questions if they, um,
- 9 let me, um, cause I get interrupted a lot.
- So, throughout the whole time I was seeing
- 11 you, was there ever any concerns about psychosis?
- 12 A. There was no concerns about psychosis during
- the whole time of treating you.
- 14 Q. And wouldn't it be unusual that somebody gets
- 15 psychotic at my age, 47, at the same time, or around
- 16 the same time, after they have whistleblown on the
- 17 biggest --
- MR. MORRIS: Objection; relevance and beyond
- 19 the scope.
- DR. LAHTEENMAA: That's what I'm talking
- 21 about. I'm not allowed to finish.
- 22 THE COURT: Go ahead, Doctor, I want you to
- finish your question, and then I'll -- I heard the
- objection. I want you to finish the question. Go
- ahead.

1 BY DR. LAHTEENMAA:

- 2 Wouldn't it be unusual that somebody gets psychotic around the same time when they whistleblow 3 on the biggest telemedicine company, Teladoc, biggest 4 5 telemedicine company in the world, with 80 million 6 clients in the United States, and get cyberattacked 7 after that, and no one looks at the evidence I have, yet, I'm just left with the psychosis? Wouldn't that 8 9 be unethical and relatively unusual for those things 10 to actually happen at the same time? Like, oh, my 11 gosh, you know, she takes Adderall for years with no problems, then whistleblowing, cyberattacks, and now 12 she's psychotic and no one looks at the evidence. 13
- THE COURT: Okay. Dr. D. please don't

answer.

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That question is just filled with facts that are not in evidence. Do you plan to put on testimony in this case that's going to establish those facts in evidence?

That's the problem. Remember, we're not here on a hacking by Teladoc. We're not here on the, um, you're describing the cyberattacks on your technology, your computers. None of those are issues in front of me today. The only issue in front of me today is whether you're able to

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1 practice your profession with reasonable skill and
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- 2 safety.
- 3 DR. LAHTEENMAA: I'm trying to establish --
- 4 THE COURT: I understand, but there's one

- 21 unusual, but it's certainly possible.

- 23 tell you, I actually whistleblowed on the biggest
