The 4th Commandment

Honor Your Father and Your Mother

Honor is a great word that we've lessened in our day and age. I mean, we rarely talk about honor, or if we do we treat it as just a bit of respect or praise that gets heaped upon us. But "honor" as an idea used to be so much bigger. It's the closing idea of the Declaration of Independence - "we mutually pledge to each other our Lives, our Fortunes, and our sacred Honor." 250 years ago they understood that honor was of more value than even life or wealth.



Honor your father and your mother. So what is honor, what does it mean to honor them? The Hebrew word for honor is "Kabad" - and it is the word for something being heavy, something being glorious. Something being of great value. To honor someone or something is to treat them as being of the highest value and importance. It is to prioritize someone or something and act accordingly.

Hence Luther's lovely explanation of the 4th commandment: We should fear and love God so that we do not despise or anger our parents and other authorities, but honor them, serve and obey them, love and cherish them. Your parents, as well as the other authorities that God has placed in your life, they aren't to be disdained or disrespected. They aren't to be callously blown off or ignored? Why? Because they are valuable? They do good things for you. They provide order and stability – the framework within which you can actually live. If you undercut that order and stability, it will not go well with you.

To honor someone really means that you will serve them and obey them. You'll actually listen to them and conform your actions to what they have told you they want and need you to do. You'll actually understand that this is for your good – and you will love and cherish them. You'll see the value, the heavy value they bring. Faithful parents, devout spouses, devout and faithful rulers – these are all unimaginably valuable things that God gives us. So we should remember that they are a good thing, an incredibly valuable thing – and then act accordingly.

The world tells us to treat so many things, so many people, as cheap and worthless. That's not how God views them, that's not how God views you. In fact, He honors you so much that He Himself becomes man and suffers, dies, and rises to redeem you – to restore your value and honor and worth for all eternity. The 4th Commandment is a wonderful thing.

Kantor's Korner

October Hymn of the Month: "Our Father, Who From Heav'n Above" (LSB 766)

Hymns can easily be taken for granted. We sing at least six every weekend service and we can often forget the hymns we just sang by the time we pull out onto Park Street after a service! Every month, I would like to spotlight a specific hymn to bring it off the hymnal page, providing insight that goes beyond the few stanzas we get to sing it.

Ah, Reformation Day - The time we Lutherans take extra pride in our church's history. No matter how you celebrate it, whether as big as the 500th Anniversary Celebration back in 2017 or as small as a bunch of college kids duct-taping 95 Reese's Peanut Butter Cups to the doors of the Catholic school across the street (NOT saying *I* would EVER do ANYTHING like that... *wink*), you can be sure the church will pick only the best hymns for the day. Proud beltings of "Mighty Fortress" will certainly dominate most Lutheran sanctuaries on the observed weekend services. Who doesn't enjoy a rousing rendition of Luther's most famous hymn? And it certainly is his most famous hymn - even the Catholics have it in their hymnals! But Luther wrote SO many other hymns. Some well known, and some, not so much. This month, I'd like to spotlight one of his hymns you might not be very familiar with... even though you recite its lyrics on a regular basis.

Martin Luther wrote a series of hymns to supplement the teaching of his Small Catechism. Besides his deep study of theology, Luther was something of a musician as well. Okay, okay, that's a massive understatement: He sang, played the lute, and wrote 24 of the hymns we use in LSB! Six of these hymns are referred to as his "Catechetical Hymns", or the Small Catechism set to music. Peter Reske wrote a great introductory article on the LCMS Blog that touches briefly on each of these hymns. We are focusing on his hymn for the Lord's Prayer, "Our Father Who From Heav'n Above" (LSB 766). Reske says:

"Having completed at least one hymn for each section of the catechism, Luther set out to write a versification of the Lord's Prayer. Unique to his paraphrase is that almost every stanza is catechetical in form: first, a literal statement of the petition; second, an explanation and application. Though Luther himself wrote a tune for the text, it was never well received. Rather, Schumann's 1539 hymnal uses a revised tune from the Bohemian Brethren. It is uncertain how much Luther was involved in revising the tune."

The tune for "Our Father..." isn't familiar to most. It's a tune that you may have to think hard to recall or even look up in the hymnal to check. I had the privilege of performing a piece called "Give Us This Day" by composer David Maslanka (I'd highly recommend looking up a recording of this piece if you haven't heard it!) with the CUC Wind Symphony. Truth be told, that was the first time I remember hearing the tune. I mean, *really hearing* the music. I'm sure I sang the hymn before that point, but the melody didn't stick with me until after playing that piece in college.

I like to think about the shape of the melody line as a wave: it rises and falls in different lines of the stanzas. The first line is DESCENDING - God charges us to pray, to bring our petitions and needs to Him directly, by coming down TO US, just as He came down to us in humanity during the time of His earthly ministry. The next two lines are ASCENDING, with line two starting to climb slowly, but line three leaping up, as if to show our petitions being raised up to God. Similarly, the fourth and fifth lines begin a slower DESCENT again, with the final sixth line coming all the way back down to rest on "Do" (A deer! A female deer!), or the "fundamental pitch" of the key we're singing in. The descent of the melody back down to us is His answer to our prayers, and this "down-up-down" flow to the music beautifully illustrates Luther's words of the Introduction to the Lord's Prayer in the Small Catechism:

Our Father who art in heaven...

What does this mean?

With these words God tenderly invites us to believe that He is our true Father and that we are His true children, so that with all boldness and confidence we may ask Him as dear children ask their dear father.

Hymns are so much more than service "fillers". They highlight Scripture, elicit real emotions from us, and in many cases (like this particular hymn) teach us something in the process. As you sing in church, pay attention to these connections to the Catechism. Let these types of hymns get stuck in your head, hum them through the week, sing them at home with your families! This is an extremely simple way to deepen our faith and understanding of God's Word in our daily lives.

Little Lambs Preschool



With the start of preschool comes so many firsts: first time in a classroom, perhaps, or first time learning to sit criss-cross-applesauce. The Pre-K 4 class learns to pour their own drinks and carefully carry their cups to their seats. October's curriculum starts by covering safety. With that, another first is quickly approaching: our first field trip. Weather permitting, both classes will walk down to the Herscher Fire Department to learn about fire safety. The firefighters also show the children their gear and how they put it on, demonstrating that underneath the odd-looking mask and bulky jacket is a person they can trust. They may sound funny when they talk and breathe, but in an emergency, the kids

don't need to hide from them; instead, they should listen for that voice calling out and yell back for help. The kids also get to see the inside of an ambulance and sit on a gurney. In the event of an emergency, it helps to have some prior exposure to these things in a setting that is friendly and fun! Many thanks to our fire department for giving us this great opportunity to emphasize fire safety.

Another first will be our first special visitors. The Herscher Police will visit with both classes and speak with them about safety: crossing streets, strangers, helmets, and calling 911 in an emergency are all important concepts at this age. While we teachers certainly can and do speak with them about these things, it is different hearing it come from a police officer. And once again, meeting a police officer when they can be warm and friendly is a lot different from meeting them for the first time in an emergency. Thank you to our police department for taking the time to be present for our students and teach them that the police are our friends!

Our two weeks covering safety also bring our first safety drills of the season. We teach them to line up and leave quickly without running, which is a tough task for preschoolers. For fire drills, we walk to our meeting spot at the corner of Maple and 3rd and show how it is right across the street from Pastor and Mrs. Brown's house. Tornado drills have us proceed carefully down the basement stairs and sit on the floor in the circle of couches. We practice the safety position, bending over and covering the backs of our necks. This is the drill that some preschoolers may find to be scary, so we always remind them that it is just for practice and finish the drill with some basement play time.

If that seems like a heavy start to the month, don't worry; our Bible lessons about Jacob, Joseph, and Moses remind the students that God is always taking care of us, even when things seem scary. He can make the bad things work for our good! We also have plenty of light, fun units for October, like fall, leaves, pumpkins, and Halloween. We finish the month with trick-or-treating at State Bank of Herscher and a Halloween party. Thank you to the kind folks at SBH for inviting us back again! The students love seeing the grown-ups in costume, and the bank always has a beautiful display in the lobby that parents enjoy using for a photo opportunity.

October is a month full of community blessings. Thanks be to God for Herscher and all the people that make is such a special place!



LCMS Stewardship Ministry – lcms.org/stewardship Newsletter Article – Newsletter Article — October 2025 Harmonious Stewardship

"For as in one body we have many members, and the members do not all have the same function, so we, though many, are one body in Christ, and individually members one of another" (Romans 12:4-5).

One of the most forgotten concepts in stewardship is the interdependent nature that makes up the Body of Christ and the way that body supports the shared work of the Gospel of Jesus Christ. This is experienced in the local congregation, as well as in broader mission and ministry efforts at the district and Synod levels. Yet in these words, St. Paul reminds the Romans and us that we are indeed members of one another. This is true in our worship. It is also true in our stewardship of the Gospel. Stewards of all shapes and sizes, ages and abilities,



Part of this forgetting lies in what the eyes see and how our human mind operates. Our eyes and our minds are quick to come to the erroneous conclusion that the person who writes the biggest check is the more important steward. Human logic, flawed by sin as it is, could make a claim that the youngest child or the most infirm, aged member of the congregation would certainly be considered something less than important when it comes to the stewardship of the Gospel.

Paul makes it clear in these words that this is not how stewardship of the Gospel is measured in the Body of Christ. Rather, it would be better to view local stewardship like the lost art of harmony in congregational singing. This has been lost not only due to the performative nature of the lead singers of the local praise team, but also because modern hymnals are written to almost force the novice hymn-singer into unison voice. Creative harmonization by talented organists is beautiful to listen to, but does not always support the people in the pews in singing in parts. This is a loss in demonstrating a very practical aspect of whole-body stewardship.

The sound that builds when choral and congregational singers settle into their voice parts is nothing short of heavenly! Yet when altos, tenors and bass sing their individual parts without any concept of how they fit together, the music doesn't sound as powerful. The narrow range of the typical alto line almost sounds monotonous. The tenor line can get painfully high, and the base line can get uncomfortably low. But, when interdependently entwined, along with the melody that is so often carried by the sopranos, the music becomes a tremendously powerful tool in communicating the Gospel.

The same is true of individual stewards. Certainly, stewards with more financial means are in a unique place to "carry the tune" for ministry in a local congregation. But that doesn't rule out the faithful stewardship of the saint-like 94-year-old Hulda, who prayed for her young pastor in German every night while the aches and pains of arthritis and the grief of losing a daughter to cancer kept her awake. This does not rule out Jimmy, the profoundly developmentally disabled confirmand whose basic but dramatically eloquent confession of the faith left an impression on a congregation long after he went to be with Jesus. It doesn't rule out the single parent, the recovering addict, the family coming out of bankruptcy, the elderly widow and everyone in between.

The Lord has entrusted all the baptized with stewardship of the one thing needful: the Gospel of Jesus Christ. No one member of any congregation is more important than another when it comes to this stewardship. The biggest check isn't always the best way to communicate the Gospel. In fact, it is almost always better communicated with the widow's mite, the tenacious stewardship of the talents and so much more.

In the local congregation and beyond, our corporate stewardship of the Gospel needs each other to fill out our great confession. It is not about equal amount. It is about interdependence that only the Holy Spirit can work! Each of us has a role to play, a harmony to sing. The standard for that role is faithfulness. We do not have the same function, but we have the same Jesus! As we sing the parts entrusted to us by the Holy Spirit, the sweet music of the Gospel goes out!
