
## APO Arizona Events and Activities

The APO CVCAA has been very active in APO Services here in our Community, and elsewhere. We have four distinctions of the services approved for fulfilling on an annual basis, and we always joyfully, with a servants heart, fulfill these

four (4) Services each year, on schedule. We are defined as being a small APO CVCAA membership category, yet we always come together and do a great job. We complete each and every task with excellence and joy. Our community is very grateful for our Service to them. And because of that we are very happy to continue the Services to our community.

The four (yearly) Services of our APO CVCAA are the following, which includes a listing of those who participated in the Services:

1. APRIL 2024: SACRAMENTO, CALIFORNIA RIVERBANK CLEAN-UP - This riverbank clean-up is named in tribute to our Brod Egay Brosas, to commemorate and to remember his legacy. This Service, performed on the Sacramento River (riverbank and vicinity near the area), is located at 8301 Freeport Blvd Sacramento, CA 95832. It was completed on April 20, 2024, and started at 7:00 am and concluded around 11:00 am. This Riverbank is now a very clean area, free of trash, waste, and other unsightly refuse. We just go there every year (rain or shine, cold or temperate) to maintain the cleanliness of the area. For each Service, year to year, The APO CVCAA coordinates well in advance with the Sacramento Parks and Recreation Division. The day of the Service, we meet with the Sacramento Park Manager before we



start our Service, and then again when we conclude our Service. The Park Manager is always very impressed with our commitment, cheerfulness, excellence, and desire to continue to Serve our community each year.



- 2. OCTOBER 2023: IRONMAN, SACRAMENTO, CALIFORNIA Ironman is a nationwide endeavor, and is held in Sacramento, California in October each year. The APO CVCAA supports this event by volunteering on an annual basis. Each year the APO CVCAA coordinates well in advance with the Ironman Event Organizer on the Service to be performed, location of Service, and the number of Volunteers who will be assisting. This year 2023, we folded 1000 T-Shirts, placing 50 T-Shirts in 20 boxes each, arranging from 4 different sizes. This was important to the Ironman Event Organizer, as we were located at the Finish Line of the Running Event, and the T-Shirts were given to those runners who completed the event.
- 3. NOVEMBER 2024: THANKSGIVING SERVICE This is a new Service we will be performing on an annual basis. We are starting this month, and it still needs follow-up. We will be serving Senior Citizens in the local area and will make a schedule soon.



**4. DECEMBER 2023: WREATHS ACROSS AMERICA** - This is a nationwide event across the United States, and locally held in Tracy, California. This activity is one where monetary donation are provided to Wreaths Across America, where this organization then purchase wreaths to lay on the graves of those who served in the Armed Forces of the United States, as an honor to their sacrifice. In addition to donating funds to purchase wreaths, the APO CVCAA also joined community volunteers in laying wreaths on the grave sites of those who served in the military, to honor and remember every American fallen service member and recognize the enduring sacrifice of every family member. With mixed emotions, one being sadness for the family who still grieve, yet one being joy to honor each military member, we performed this Service of laying wreaths on the graves of the fallen.

ten others when their van collided with a parked wing van along the national highway in Malungon, Sarangani province, on the morning of Sunday, June 9. The group was enroute to Kidapawan City after participating in a Rover Scout Vigil organized by APO General Santos in Glan, Sarangani. A fraternity brother informed Newsline about their return journey when the tragic incident occurred."

APOAAT took the initiative to pass the hat among members and raised PHP 50,000.00. The contributed amount has been extended to the 10 injured brothers of Alpha Tau last June 12<sup>th</sup>, through the Kidapawan APO RAD.



### PABAHAY PROJECT

In 2008, thru the initiative of brothers Rudy

Magsalin, Ding Gomez and Di Aquino, APODCAA volunteered for the Feed the Homeless Program. This feeding program is held twice annually during the Saturday before Easter and the Saturday before Thanksgiving to feed the homeless population in Washington, DC. It was started in 1993 by a 76 year old Filipina who lives in Fairfax, Virginia by the name of Ms. Thelma Billy whose dedication has helped motivate countless other volunteers in the community, including APODCAA who has since adopted this

# SIARGAO HOUSING PROJECT FOR FLOOD VICTIMS

This feeding program was only one of the many projects of Ms. Thelma Billy. One of which is a FREE HOUSING PROJECT specifically aimed at helping out calamity victims in the Philippines. Most recovery program are expert-led and victims who were generally displaced from their community are given emergency shelters. But this self-recovery program is community-led funded through donations from the local community church in Fairfax, Virginia and the victims themselves become essential partners and key stakeholders in rebuilding their own homes.

This program aims to improve the lives and homes of calamity victims after the typhoon hit by providing teaching instructions to make their homes more resilient to typhoons. It also provides tools, cash grants,

technical and professional support. By using locally available materials and debris from destroyed houses combined with new construction materials they have helped families avoid getting uprooted from their own homes and get displaced to other location. Victims are able to retain the rights to their homes and land and maintain their social ties to their community. To date, this program has already constructed a total of 68 homes that housed 350 plus people situated in Iloilo and Cotabato. The latest Free Housing Project is in Pilar, Siargao where APODCAA donated more than \$1,700 that financed at least 2 homes which served 2 families.

The positive impact to these beneficiaries were meaningful and lifetime as it will assuredly assist them attain health, financial and inter-family relationship stability. APODCAA for its part hopes to raise not only funds but awareness to the plight of many of our less fortunate Kababayans in some of the most rural and far-flung communities devastated by natural disasters.



### A Tribute to Brod Toti Ayo, the Epitome of a Great APOGLA Leader

I'm privileged to pay my tribute to our fraternity Brother, Thomas "Toti" Ayo with whom I've worked very closely, with some brods and sis when we revived our organization known then as Alpha Phi Omega Alumni Association of Southern California until it shifted to APOGLA. I became his secretary general after our election held on August 25, 1984 at Heritage Park in the City of Cerritos.

During his incumbency, part of my role was to send out notices for our GMM by mail. *Wala pang personal computer, Microsoft Word, internet or social media nuon*. Our theme then was: The Renaissance Period. The literal translation is Rebirth.

I also became the National PRO of ACNA under the presidency of Brod Toti from 1990 to 1994. We are also fellow cursillistas. *So marami kaming pinagsamahan o common denominator ni* Bro. Toti. We also share the same philosophy imparted by our Jesuit mentors as "men and women for others"

Bro. Toti is the epitome of a great leader. He was humble, a decent person, refined gentleman, a pacifier and peacemaker. *Hindi siya mayabang* or flamboyant. He exuded an aura of grace under pressure and never lost his cool. Because of his sterling wisdom and cool demeanor and most of all not belligerent amid heated discussions - you would think he was the only adult in the room. On a personal note, I felt Brother Toti was my confidant, my protector and defender. He was our fraternity buddy through and thin.

When he learned that I was interested in skiing, he offered to pick me up and off we went to Mountain High and spent the whole day skiing, just the two of us – bonding. Perhaps it was his appreciation for my loyalty and hard work as his secretary general or little president in those days of rebirth of our organization.

When I needed somebody to lean on and sought solace during the challenging days of my early marriage — to cool off — Brother Toti and Sis Racquel opened their apartment on Wilshire Blvd. for an overnight sleep over. The following day, we strolled along Santa Monica Beach to savor the breezy air of the Pacific Ocean.

Before we moved to Cerritos, he even inquired if there was a home for sale in my neighborhood in Norwalk. Perhaps, he and Sis Racquel wanted to be near me. But that didn't materialize. They remained in West Covina.

When I over-imbibed the spirit of cognac in one of his birthday celebrations in his West Covina home. Brother Toti didn't sleep and watched over me *hanggang akoy nahimasmasan*. I left at about 3:30 am — at the break of dawn.

He called me every now and then to ask me how I was doing. Kinukumusta si Myrna (my wife) and my son Denver who is also an APO alumni from Rho Gamma (Cal State of Long Beach) and affiliate of Alpha Kappa (USC). But when it was my turn how he was coping with his health condition because I heard it from the grapevine, he told me, "I am okay." He must be in denial. Despite his public persona, Brother Toti was a very private person. But if you talked about his grandkids or anything about APOGLA, oh boy, his pair of ears were wide open.

The last time, I saw Brother Toti was during our last December Affair at Hilton in Woodland Hills. When I caught a glance of him, I was so happy to approach him and we hugged each other like a long lost kin. Then Brother Domel took our picture together. If you have that picture Brod Domel, please share it with us. You were included in that photo.

Brother Toti, maraming nagmamahal sa iyo. Sa ating nakaraang camping nuong Memorial Day weekend, may isang brod na umiyak sa gabing yon dahil naalala ka. Ganyan ka kamahal ng ating kapatiran.

I salute you Brother Toti and Sis Racquel for your friendship. Patrick, Christopher, Emily and your children, I hope you all are coping well.

With the passing of Brother Toti, I just consoled myself with one my favorite scriptures, Ecclesiastes in the Old Testament: "There is appointed time for everything and a time for every affair under the heavens. There's time to be born, and a time to die. A time to plant and a time to uproot the plant. A time to kill and a time to heal. A time to weep and a time to laugh. A time to grieve and a time to dance. A time to hug and a time to let go of the embrace. A time to be silent and a time to speak. A time to love and a time to hate. A time of war and a time of peace."
