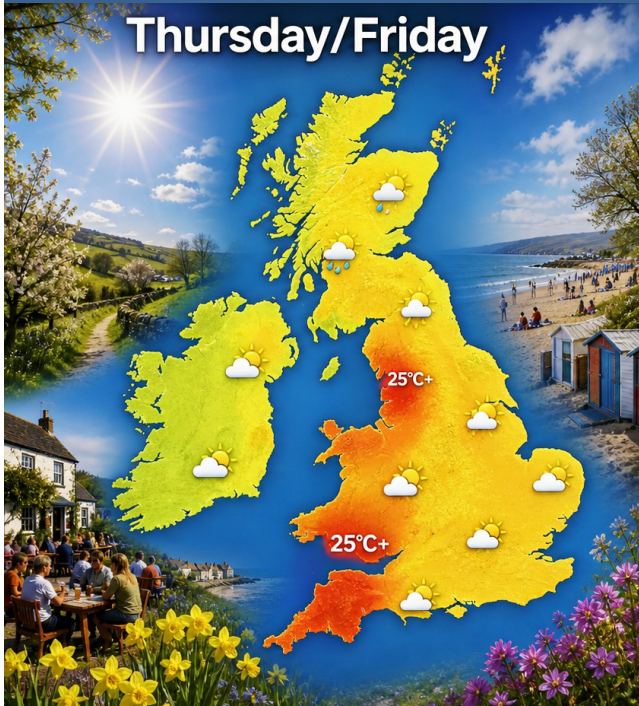


# EXACTAWEATHER



## From Very Warm (25°C+) To Much Cooler/Unsettled/Settled + Cold Enough For Wintry Weather Across Higher Ground Next Week & Warmer Later?...

The recent and prolonged and also expected period of dominant high pressure and settled weather across our shores "over weeks" on our part and within all of our much earlier reports culminated in some very warm temperatures for late April and early May in recent days and with several localities reaching or breaching the mid 20s during yesterday/Friday afternoon.

Unfortunately, this does also signal the end of this most recent and dominant weather pattern and a gradual cooling trend of overall temperatures and showers or heavy showers and even thundery downpours are likely to develop in places as we progress throughout today (Saturday) and also into Sunday, particularly in parts of the north and west and in the southern half of the country in central and southern regions.

However, this will then allow for a better Bank Holiday Monday overall with sunshine or sunny periods with variable cloud cover for some, and some showers in the far north and showers or thundery showers in parts of the far south could still exist at times on Monday.

Beyond this, and for much of next week, it will then be likely to stay changeable and significantly cooler than in recent weeks, with some very chilly to cold feeling evenings and mornings and with a mix of moderate to heavy showers or thundery showers for many that could even turn wintry or to snow across higher ground from Tuesday of next week and despite it being May and almost summer, but also in amongst some possible better weather days or sunshine as high pressure attempts to rebuild across our shores, particularly later in the week but unfortunately not in the long-term.

Additionally, this also ties in very well with our private and several weeks ahead forecast indicators for around the dates of May 5-7 for this type of scenario to occur or take more of a stronghold across our shores...

As covered above, Monday itself should be a largely better day overall for many and away from any developing showers in the far north and west and in parts of the far south, where some of these showers may also turn thundery once again.

This mix of showers, cloud and sunshine will then continue from Tuesday to Thursday for many, and it is also Tuesday when these wintry and snow showers will begin to form once again across at least higher ground in the far north and north of the country in parts such as the Lake District and Pennines.

Beyond this and for around the end of the working week and into the upcoming weekend, we will see high pressure trying to re-establish itself once again across our shores and possibly settling things down and also warming things up for a day or two, particularly in the southern half of the country.

However, this will more than likely only be temporary, if at all, as a battle between high (better weather days) and low pressure (unsettled weather days) and the positioning of the jet-stream looks and wants to continue quite erratically over the coming weeks and for the foreseeable as "we begin to pay for those earlier and expected high pressure rises of late and March and April" (exact wording in our several months ahead spring report for these dates).
