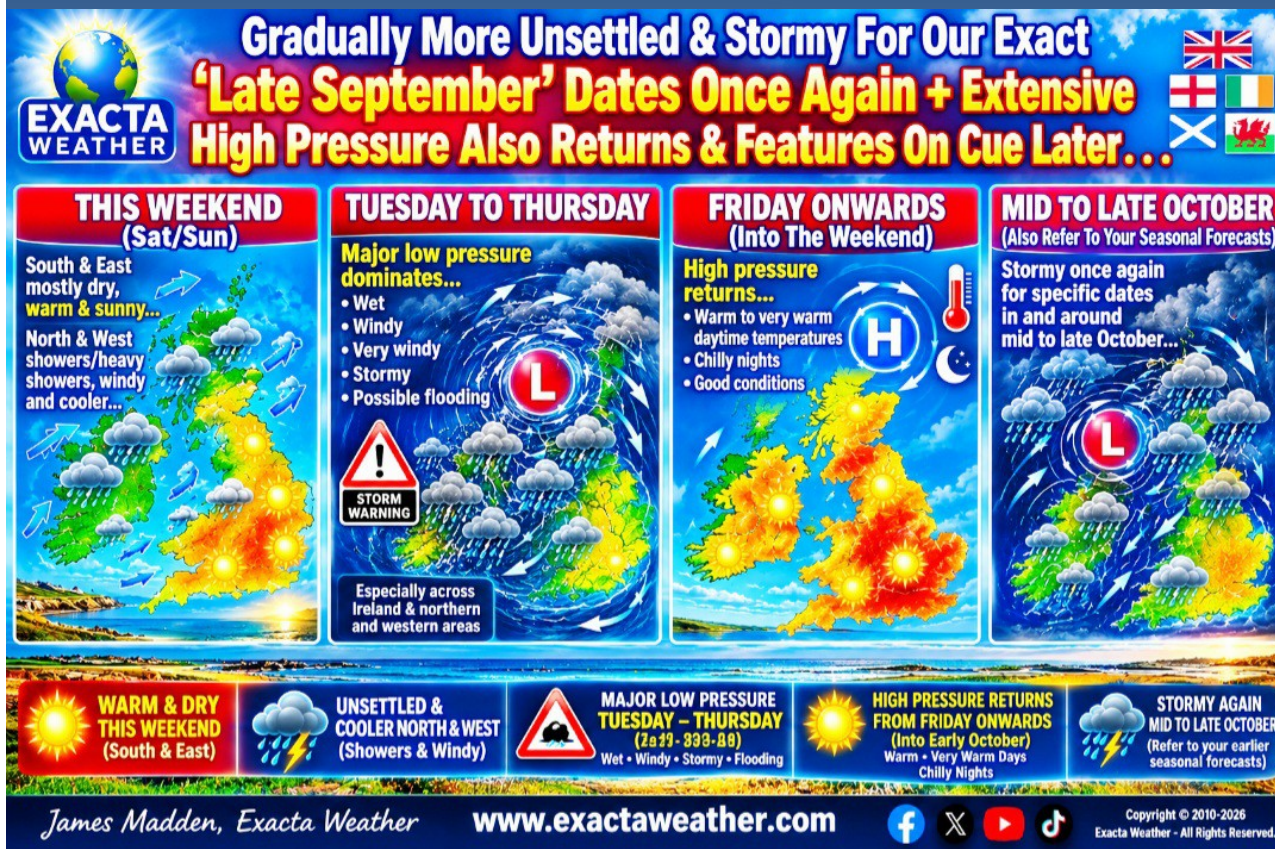


EXACTAWEATHER



Gradually More Unsettled & Stormy For Our Exact 'Late September' Dates Once Again + Extensive High Pressure Also Returns & Features On Cue Later . . .

Whilst many parts to the south and east of the country remain dry and warm this weekend, parts further north and west will begin to see more in the way of unsettled and cooler weather conditions developing with showers or heavy showers and windy conditions leading to heavier showers in these parts before clearing later and into Sunday/early next week.

Between Tuesday and Thursday, we will then see major low pressure dominating proceedings and bringing wet, windy or very windy and even stormy weather conditions and possible flooding across some large parts of Ireland and northern and western parts for our exact dates from several weeks ahead, once again, for in and around September 26–29 for this to occur.

The best of the weather will also remain in parts of the south and east in this same period, but it could also get or feel a bit breezy at times in some parts of the far south-west of the country.

From in and around next Friday and into the upcoming weekend, we will then see high pressure dominance returning during early October over an extended period across our shores and bathing us in further warm to very warm daytime temperatures but with some optimum conditions for chillier nights and the first ground frosts of the season.

Additionally, the expected high pressure in early October and further warmth but with chilly

nights, was also covered descriptively in the same several weeks ahead seasonal forecast for early October that also depicted the pending stormy weather to end September and the TWO previous high-pressure expected dates for the exact dates and duration in September once again (please check your seasonal/autumn reports).

It will also turn stormy once again for specific dates in and around mid to late October (also refer to your earlier long-range/seasonal weather reports for this too).
