



Interring ashes

The ashes interment area is bordered with Hellebore, lavender, hebe, salix, daphne and euonimous plants - which should provide year round interest and appeal to people and insects alike. Although there are a few gaps where plants have not thrived, the flower border is doing pretty well, bolstered by our own compost. Eventually we hope it will become a low flowering hedge, providing a special place for ashes. We will always ensure that the area within the border is close mown.

We have already had four interments into this area of ashes with accompanying fused glass tiles installed on the Celebration of Life wall. The aim is to provide a beautiful and peaceful location for relatives and friends to inter and remember their loved ones - and also contribute to the costs of keeping the space beautiful.













Families could do some creative writing together with <u>AJ Freer</u>, author of the Little Spirit Mystery Series in the shade of our yews ...






or hear Nature Tales with storyteller Amanda Ling, painted here taking a little group around with tales of the animals who live in the Cemetery.





