Orchid Tip of the Month by Scot Mitamura

Happy New year everyone! I hope we all had a pleasant holiday season. In starting the New Year, it is good to know that we will slowly get out of our winter doldrums. Our shortest day of the year was December 21, and each preceding day will slowly begin to get longer until summer. This definitely affects the growth of our orchids and their care. Even though it has been a relatively dry winter so far, I have really cut back on my watering. The days are shorter, the cloud cover is much greater, temperatures have been cooler, and the most important is that we are having less trade wind days. I have noticed the greatest determining factor in how fast your orchids dry out is the amount or air movement you have. Even on a cloudy windy day, the orchids will dry out faster than a sunny day without our trade winds. These are all factors in managing your watering in the winter months. The biggest mistake for most beginners, is that they over water in the winter months. Fungus, such as Black Rot or phytopthera sp., can get into your collection and spread rapidly. I have found that it often affects orchids that have not been re-potted for over two years. The media breaks down and becomes mushy and sour, pH becomes more acid, old roots die and begin to rot, as the air spaces are all filled with roots. This becomes a perfect opportunity for the fungus to thrive, so try to re-pot most of your orchids every two years or so.

I re-pot all year long, trying to time it with new root initiations, especially with the mature orchids. With seedlings, you can re-pot almost anytime, as they have not set into their cyclical growth and dormancy patterns. One word of caution; avoid repotting before any Kona Storm, where we can have several days of heavy rain, with muggy





humid conditions. This is when Black Rot thrives. Whenever you re-pot sanitation is essential, work on a clean tabletop, sterilize all potting utensils especially pruners (with strong soap water or flame), and of course wash your hands. This will stop most of your orchid diseases such as viruses, fungus, and bacteria from spreading. It is also a good idea to resist the urge to water your orchids right away. Let them dry for a few days to let the damaged cut stems and roots heal. Water it the greatest spreader of diseases.



I'm going to make a New Year's resolution to spend more time with my orchids. I know if I do this my orchids will reward me with beautiful flowers the whole year! Happy growing!
