#### **COVID-19 Prevention Tips**

When out of the house wear maximum protection and avoid contact. Avoid anywhere public where there are people closer than 8 ft apart. If needed to go shopping, then wear a face mask and go as little as possible with the minimum number of people. Wipe down with disinfectant cloth on everything you touch – home door handles, car surfaces when you get home. Wash your hands well. If needed, change clothes, take a shower.

For those that have extended family in living areas — your protection depends on everyone following the same level of avoidance and protection. Otherwise, you are only as good as the least protected person who can spread it to others. If a person needs to keep working and is in the public, then minimize their exposure to the rest of the household as needed. Check temperature daily and monitor for any changes/symptoms.

While not everyone who gets infected does poorly, there seems to be no true way to tell who will do well or not and many who are infected do not realize they are before spreading it to many others. Therefore, assume that everyone could have it when going out, so keep your distance and be diligent/strict.

As of April 2, Hawaii had 285 positive cases and 2 deaths. Due to unknown information 115 cases have no determined reason for illness currently, which means we do not know how many are from community spread vs travel vs exposure to someone with those reasons. The stats will be different by the time you receive this.

For every 1 death announced and a 14 to 20-day delay in how the virus spreads, it can be estimated that about 1600 cases may exist, with doubling every 4-5 days. So, there could easily be 1000-3000 cases now or shortly in Hawaii if containment is not achieved. NYC had 300 cases that spread to 3000+ in two weeks.

Only by being very careful can we expect to be successful in reducing the number of people harmed. If you have time, I found this YouTube video of the 1918 Spanish Flu to be very helpful in understanding the danger of COVID-19.
