The Importance of Air by Brad Lau

When growing orchids, we think of water, sun, and fertilizer before air. Each of these is vital for orchids to grow and thrive. In Hawaii, we have good quality air with relatively higher humidity and temperatures. Many orchids naturally grow high in trees with more light and ample air flow.

Why is air so key? Moving air provides cooling when midday weather is hot and facilitates gas exchange through leaf pores. Air is important for disease prevention. After watering, extra moisture dries off through evaporation. Roots need air pockets for healthy growth.

Humidity is moisture that is carried by air and varies from 40 to 90+%. If you have more rain, live by the ocean, have heavy plantings, or have standing water nearby like a lily pot or pond, then you may have higher humidity. During cold spells or in the winter, humidity may drop. In Hawaii we do not worry about humidity but it is important. Morning dew can provide moisture to plants when water droplets in air condense.

Whether you hang plants in baskets or keep them on a bench, give them enough air space and gaps. Both light and air can be blocked if plants are too tightly packed on a rack. Disease and pests can easily spread if plants are touching.

If orchids are outdoors near landscape plants make sure to trim back anything that blocks good air movement from multiple directions since wind shifts. Even walls can trap air and create dead spots, especially in corners. Stale air contributes to reduced cooling.

Try out an area and see how the plants do but be careful and aware. Airflow allows plants to dry out faster after watering. Weekly heavy watering followed by letting the roots dry out before the next watering is a good practice.

I have many orchids bare root with minimal media tied to wood or plastic baskets. I find the absence of media allows plants to dry quickly, however more frequent watering will prevent over drying which can occur when windy or if humidity is low.

In Hawaii we are lucky that our weather is comfortable throughout the year and we can grow orchids outdoors or in open shade houses. We still need to respect that orchids are "air" plants and give them ample room to grow. If we do these things our plants will be healthy and reward us with strong growth and flowers
