A Message from Our President

Aloha Kunia Society Members and Friends,

It was a new experience for me to be our speaker at our March general meeting. I am glad I had a chance to share with you some of the media selection and repotting techniques that I have learned from many fellow orchid growers in the past 15 plus years. Because of the higher elevation and cooler temperatures of Wahiawa and Mililani, where a lot of our members live, I recommended to those in attendance that growing Cymbidiums and Dendrobium nobile in this area could be a be a distinct advantage. The warm tolerant varieties of Cymbidiums may grow good in most parts of the island but the cooler growing ones (that are big and have some beautiful coloring) should do better in Mililani and Wahiawa. For some outstanding Cymbidiums, I have purchased some of my plants from Jennifer Snyder and Bob Harris of Orchid People in Kamuela on the Big Island. They were one of our stops for one of our Big Island Orchid Safaris in the past. You can find various types of Dendrobium nobile at orchid shows, Kawamoto Nursery and Penny's Orchids. Most of our Dendrobium nobile that you see for sale come from the Big Island nurseries where the temperatures get pretty cool. When they arrive on Oahu, many of the plants are full of buds and flower well. The longer they are kept, many of them decline in flower count. I think the cooler weather of Mililani and Wahiawa might produce some better blooming Dendrobium nobile then in other parts of Oahu.

I was able to attend the Windward Orchid Society's Orchid show the weekend of March 17, 18 & 19 at the King Intermediate School cafeteria. smaller venue, the society chose to have one orchid display sponsored by the Windward Orchid Society but with other societies invited to display their blooming orchids in this one big display. There was some discussion about promoting this concept for other shows on Oahu in the future. It was a lot of fun to meet and chat with many fellow orchid hobbyists that I had not seen for a while. I thought it was a successful show and I am glad I attended.

One of the plants we will be repotting is Maxillaria tenuifolia with the coconut cream pie scent. I have a giant plant that Bill Takamatsu will help me divide so we can have a whole bunch of plant divisions to plant.

Don't forget our upcoming May 6, plant sale at the former Dot's banquet facility and parking lot. Please look to possibly donate orchid plants (especially if they are blooming), backyard plants, items for our "white elephant sale," food and baked items. The main feature of the day will be the sale of blooming Phalaenopsis plants in bud, opening just in time for Mother's Day and beyond. We are in the process of developing our KOS membership so that we can once again have our beloved Annual KOS Orchid Show. Until then, we plan to conduct smaller fundraisers to meet our society's orchid education goals. Our officers and board of directors meet often, thinking of ways to sustain a successful orchid society. Please help when you can by supporting our education and fundraising efforts.
