Are you a good listener? Do you ever find yourself wondering how someone who you know well, can really think something so different from how you think? Maybe it is your crazy friend or family member spouting off at your family get together. Plenty of those conversations happen around politics. Maybe you feel like the lone voice of reason listening in on the hot button issues of the day or as you as read Facebook.

A conversation happens when at least two people talk and listen to each other, but it becomes a lecture when one person insists on dominating the exchange or will not really hear what the other person is saying. In many ways we have lost the art of civil discourse. When we do not agree we either shut them out of our life or shout over their crazy rant.

This happens in all areas of our life including church. In my work of redevelopment and transitional ministry I have led conversations about listening to God and listening to one another. I invite you to come and join me in the first workshop of practicing how we communicate with each other. We will talk through the basics of communication and practice having conversations about things we may not agree on. This is not about raising your blood pressure but learning how to navigate difficult conversations. **Thursday, April 22 at 7:00PM** we will have the first meeting of "Listening to God and Listening to One Another". If you are a classic interrupter bring along some \$5.00 bills because you will pay a fine for interrupting and/or not actually listening.

"Woman," he said, "why are you crying? Who is it you are looking for?" Thinking he was the gardener, she said, "Sir, if you have carried him away, tell me where you have put him, and I will get him." Jesus said to her, "Mary." She turned toward him and cried out in Aramaic, "Rabbouni!" (which means teacher).

John 20:15-16, NIV

I would imagine that Mary would be like any of us. Memories of time spent, and conversations shared with Jesus carried her through that quiet, holy Saturday. It would be too overwhelming to remember the horror of watching Jesus die on the cross. It would be better to remember her gentle and holy friend with all his wonderful words and deeds. That Holy Saturday was a necessary day of rest, but early the next morning she went to the tomb to take care of the tasks of proper burial.

But, when she arrived, Mary was distressed to be robbed of her last good-bye. As she was trying to make sense of all that took place, Mary heard her name. And, in hearing her name, she knew that the man standing before her was Jesus, risen from the dead. No longer did Mary feel lonely, forsaken or abandoned.

Easter does not return Mary and Jesus to the past, but instead, Easter opens a new future. In the time of sadness as well as joy, Jesus is calling your name, reminding you of his promise.

Listen closely to the passages of Holy Week and be ready to celebrate the Resurrection.



Catching up on business from 2020: Pipe Organ Proposals

I began my career in the Organ and Piano business on January 2, 1966. I was hired to manage the Organ and Piano Division of Carleton-Stewart Music in Mason City, Iowa. In early 1975 I began researching church organ manufacturers as what we were then installing gave us little variety. In this search I kept coming back to Rodgers, in Hillsboro. OR. Rodgers was one of the earliest builders of fully transistorized Church Organs. They came into being in 1958. We signed a contract with Rodgers in May of 1975. We received our first two consoles in June of 1975. One of those consoles was installed that fall in a church in Burt, IA and is still being used today in their worship service. Betty and I moved from Mason City to our present home Southwest of Northwood in November of 1978. We opened Dewey Kruger Music on November 2, 1981 and are now in our 40th year. When we opened our business both the Rodgers and Kawai franchises came with me. In 1966 Rodgers was already experimenting with interfacing their consoles with existing Pipe Organs. The technology to make this happen has evolved over the years to what we can offer in today's digital design. Many times when it is time to replace the existing console on a Pipe Organ there seems to be a wedge driven between a Rodgers Console and a Pipe Organ built console. This wedge is a bit of a moot point as they both perform the same function. The Rodgers Digital Organ, in addition to playing the Pipe organ, offers an enormous amount of Digitally Sampled Pipe Organ sounds in addition to the existing pipe work.

Rodgers Consoles became 100% digital-software based in 1990. Being software based allowed us to update certain systems in the console down the road. Today's Rodgers Consoles allow for software updates via USB and thumb drives. "We've come a long way, baby" I just had to insert that quote! Whether a Rodgers Console, the existing console or any other console to replace the existing console will key the Pipe Organ in the same manner. Steve Smith and I worked on this organ in the mid 80's. We spent two weeks re-soldering some dead notes (where the wire from the relay comes into the pipe chest and is soldered to the valve that opens when energized to let air into the pipe to make it sound). There were probably a dozen dead notes. These wire connections were re-soldered. We found in about half of these cases we could find no evidence of solder residue on the connection. This led us to believe that these connections had never been soldered. When we finished every pipe played and we put a final tune on the organ. We also fixed 2 or 3 small air leaks

in a couple of the pipe chests. When tuning the organ, at that time, I noticed the console had a couple of small issues. Since that time it has been on my bucket list to replace the existing organ console with a new Rodgers Console. I thank you in advance for taking the time to read this note. I've heard a quote that stated the Electronic Organ produces sound similar to a Moog Synthesizer. Bob Moog's Synthesizer came into being in the mid 1960's. To compare the Moog Synthesizer to today's Rodgers Consoles is a bit like comparing the space shuttle with a Model T Ford. There is simply no comparison. More organ notes to follow.

- Organ discussion
 - O History review of organ committee for benefit of Pastor Becky and new council members up to speed-- Current organ at FLC was installed in 1966. Celebrated 50 years of that organ in 2015. A committee was appointed to investigate restoration options for organ. Members began meeting in 2017. Lowell G, Tim K, Lisa H, Larry K, Loraine M, Jan M. They received proposals from 3 companies--Dewey Kruger, Wicks, and Grandall and Engen. The committee visited organs from each of these companies and traveled to Boone, Rochester and Minneapolis. Grandall and Engen--\$150,000 (restore pipes), Dewey Kruger--\$150,000 (augment most pipes with digital equivalent), Wicks gave 3 proposals--restoration with no changes \$150,000, \$185,000 with some enhancements, \$250,000 to do complete restoration, enhancements, and visual appearance enhancements. Wicks organs that the committee had heard and seen were by far preferred by the committee. Committee proposed to Council their recommendation for the top Wicks proposal. Council approved the recommendation. Also approved purchase of a used 3 console manual for the organ through Wicks.
 - O Meetings to hear proposals and vote on the organ restoration had been scheduled for March 2020 and were cancelled due to COVID closures
 - O Will need to reschedule these meetings when we are able to meet in person again. Perhaps early summer when we can meet indoor or outdoor as needed. Also need to reintroduce the topics to the congregation of the organ restoration committee process and next steps for Meeting 1: hearing the proposals from Kruger (20 min presentation and 10 min Q&A) and Wicks (20 min presentation and 10 min Q&A), Meeting 2: vote on Wicks proposal, Meeting 3: if needed, vote on Kruger proposal.
