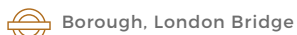
At its heart, DzFest 2026 asks a simple but urgent question: **who gets to define Algerian heritage, and how can communities reclaim the authority to tell their own stories?**

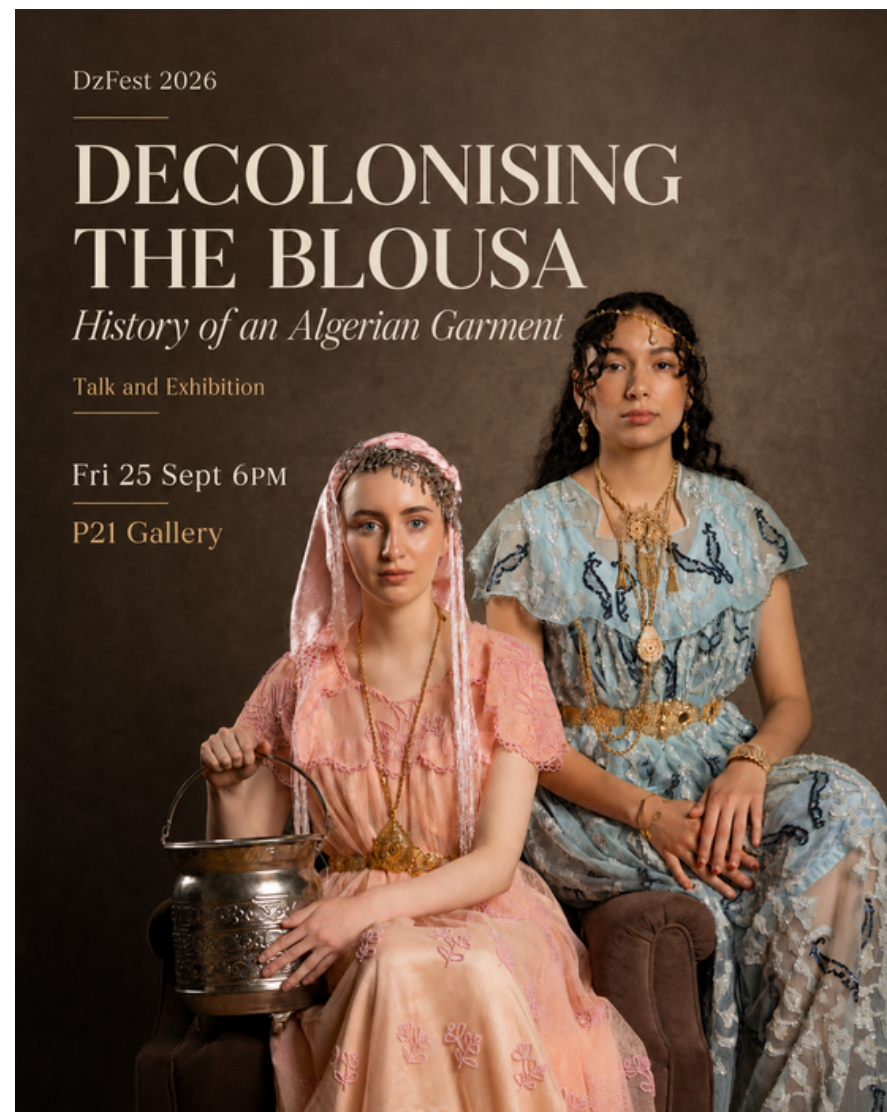

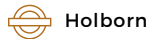

Ink and Ancestry: The Disappearing Face Tattoos of Algeria

Explore the history, symbolism, and digital preservation of Oucham [tattoos], the traditional facial markings of indigenous women across North Africa, in this ground-breaking session by researcher Yasmine Boudiaf.

For generations, these permanent geometric tattoos served as tribal identifiers, protective amulets, and sacred milestones of womanhood. Now on the brink of erasure, this ancient matriarchal practice is being revitalised through a modern lens.

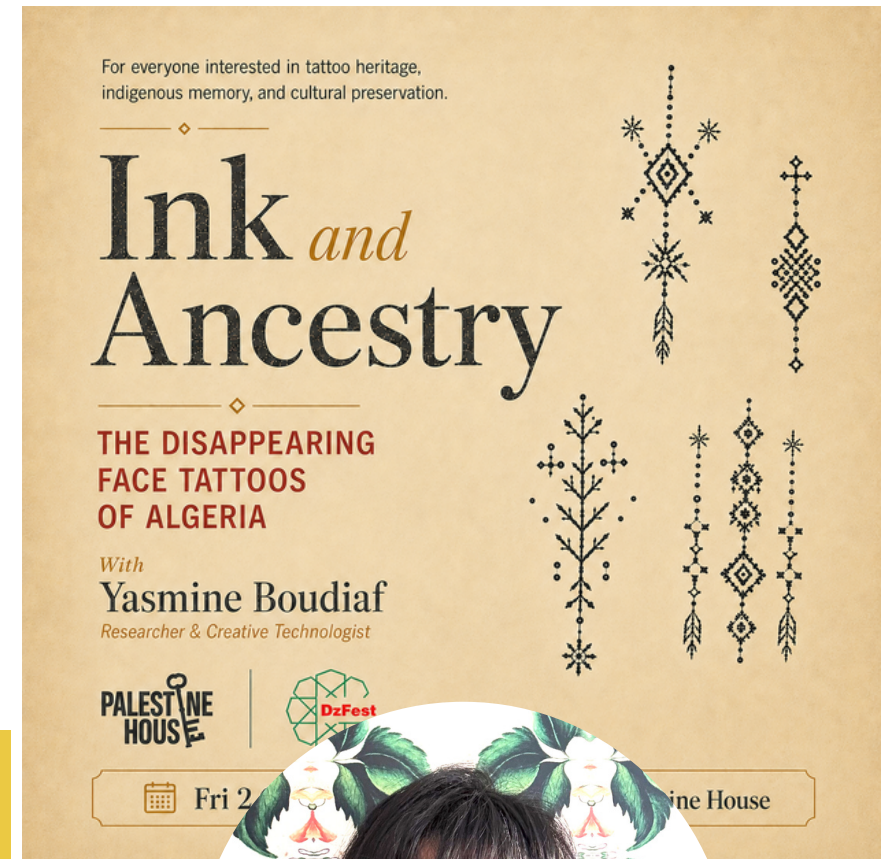
This session bridges ancestral tradition with modern technology, demonstrating how tools like artificial intelligence (AI) can be used ethically to archive indigenous memory, **protect data justice**, and **combat cultural exploitation**.

Yasmine BOUDIAF

An **Algerian creative technologist** and **researcher** based in London. She is a research fellow at UAL's Creative Computing Institute, a fellow of the Royal Society of Arts and previously at the Ada Lovelace Institute. She was recognised as one of **'100 Brilliant Women in AI Ethics 2022'**.

Her projects interrogate the impact of new technologies on cultural life using **anti-colonial approaches**.

Yasmine's project sits at the intersection of generative AI, intangible heritage, and decolonial practice. It responds to the urgent need to rethink AI infrastructures that rely on extractive data practices, high carbon footprints, and cultural appropriation.

Discover the history and polyrhythms of the frame drum—known as the bendir—the historical heartbeat of Algerian communal life, celebration, and spiritual devotion.

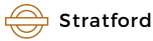

Algeria's Al-Andalus music legacy: **exploring Nouba music, Sana'a, Gharnati & Malouf** via history, performance, gender & decolonial debate.

DzFest 2026 presents a landmark conference at the University of East London, bringing together musicologists, researchers and master musicians to explore Algeria's classical musical traditions and their relationship with the heritage commonly associated with Al-Andalus.

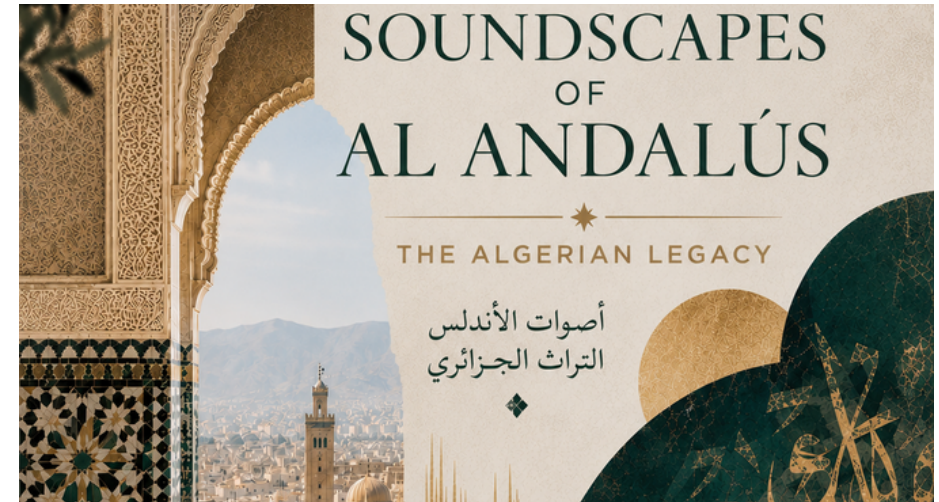
The conference will examine the Şana'a of Algiers, the Şan'a of Tlemcen [also known as Gharnati], and the Malouf of Constantine, while taking a critical view of simplified claims around direct Andalusian transmission.

Rather than treating origin as settled fact, the programme will explore how music, memory, migration and identity have shaped **these repertoires across Algeria and within the diaspora.**

Going beyond celebration, this event will challenge inherited narratives, **revisit assumptions around the Nouba**, and create a decolonial space for serious discussion on Algerian musical heritage, transmission and cultural memory.

By hosting this historical and cultural inquiry at the University of East London, DzFest draws on UEL and CMRB's diverse, community-centred academic environment to create an independent and decolonial space for indigenous, diasporic and transnational research.
