ASSUMPTION OF THE BLESSED VIRGIN MARY

Reflection from Fr. Bernard Doré

Today, as we celebrate the Assumption of Mary into heaven, we reflect on how, in the end of her earthly life and assumption into heaven, we see the power of God. This same power that will one day lift us above a world of sin and into the fullness of union with him.

Mary shows us where we are going, what we are striving for. But we must remember that this was the end of a life completely devoted to love and service. Mary not only shows us the end goal, but she models for us how we should act in order to achieve that goal.

At the Annunciation, celebrated every year, Mary says in reply to the Angel Gabriel: I am the handmaid of the Lord, let it be done to me according to your word. Mary models for us how to say "yes" to God's plan for our lives. Even though she didn't completely understand what God was asking or how he would accomplish it, she chose to say yes. She was willing to put her faith and trust in God.

At the Visitation, recounted for us today in the Gospel of Luke, Mary expresses her gratitude to God, saying: My soul proclaims the greatness of the Lord; my spirit rejoices in God my Savior. Mary models for us how to live in God's grace by allowing his light and love to be magnified and proclaimed through our words and actions. Mary shows us that it is possible, even in the midst of trials and difficulties (traveling to see Elizabeth was no easy journey!) to rejoice in God. As Christians, we are called not to seek attention and glory for ourselves, but to use our gifts, talents and abilities in order to give praise and glory to God.

Finally, at her Assumption after Christ's death and resurrection, Mary is the visible sign of our own destiny. God has made us for himself and ordained that we abide with him for all eternity. But just as he won't force himself upon us in this life, so, too, he will never force eternity with him upon us. Like Mary, we must choose to say "yes."

As we celebrate this feast of the Assumption, may we set our sights on heaven, and make it our goal to settle for nothing less than that great glory. We ask today that Mary would intercede for us, that we would say "yes" to God's plan for us and allow him to shine in and through us. Then one day we will abide with him, and with Mary our Mother, forever.

Living the Liturgy

Inspiration for the week

Good mothers have a way of bringing their children hope. When we fall and hurt ourselves, our mothers can help us walk the path of healing. There is hope that we will get better and the trust that we have in mom's comforting assurance allows us to move forward. Mothers know instinctively what we need and what we are capable of doing. They can be one of our biggest cheerleaders in life, and even when facing despair, can point the way to a brighter tomorrow. Our Blessed Mother does precisely that for us today. As one closest to our Lord, she cheers us on with the hope of what life will be for all of us. Although given the unique distinction of being raised in both body and soul, she nonetheless points to our true eternal destiny. Achieving this inheritance overrides any disappointment and her intercession and example inspires us to pick ourselves up when we fall. Always a mother filled with grace and hope, she calls us to reaffirm our faith in God and in the gifts we have each been given as we persevere even in the midst of life's challenges and failures.



Sunday, August 15, we celebrate The Solemnity of The Assumption of The Blessed Virgin Mary, who already shares the promised gift of resurrection in Christ.

In our First Reading, The book of Revelation, we see a woman who gives birth to a son. The picture is applied to Mary, The Mother of Christ.

In The Second Reading, in his first letter to the Corinthians, St. Paul points out that Christ was the first to enjoy a risen life and that all who belong to him will share in its rewards. We can apply this reading most appropriately today to Mary.

In the Gospel Mary proclaims the greatness of her savior. Mary was, in many respects, like any and every one of us. She was basically an ordinary person. Her chief characteristic was her openness to God and to other people. Because she had this quality, she didn't take herself too seriously, she had no inordinately high opinion of herself, she thought of God and of others before she thought of herself.

The Immaculate and Ever Virgin Mother of God, preserved free from all stain of original sin, was taken up body and soul into heavenly glory, when her earthly life was over, and exalted by the Lord as queen over all things.' Mary was close to Christ on earth, she is with him now, body and soul, in heaven. In the light of the Assumption of Mary, it is easy to pray to her with new meaning. She found joy in God her savior. She was the lowly handmaid, who deeply worshipped God and was raised to the heights. From her position of strength, she helps the lowly and the poor find justice on earth, and challenges the rich and powerful to distrust wealth and power as a source of happiness.

Mary's Assumption is the anticipation of our own Assumption. To-day, let us pray to Mary with hope and confidence to follow her great example of obedience and doing God's will in our daily lives so that we too can participate in her Glory.
