THE BAPTISM OF THE LORD

Reflection from Fr. Bernard Doré

Today we celebrate The Feast of The Baptism of Our Lord Jesus Christ. This Feast speaks of The Importance and Greatness of The Sacrament of Baptism.

Jesus' baptism can be understood only in the light of His Cross. He needed neither, yet He accepted both for our sake. God's son had no sin to be washed in the waters of baptism. Nor did He have sins to be atoned for by way of sacrificing His life on the cross. He took upon Himself our sins and so was baptized for us, and was sacrificed for us. Jesus' public ministry begins with this great step of assuming our sins. That day in the Jordan, He was the representative of all the sinners of the world. And ever since, He represented us sinners till He had all our sins nailed to His cross together with His own body.

Baptism is essentially a "rebirth". Just as our biological birth makes us members of the human family, and children of a particular pair of parents, so baptism makes us members of God's Family, The Church. With our Baptism, We receive a new nature: the nature of the perfect man, Christ Jesus. To The extent we use this gift, we are able to rise above inclination to evil that lurks in each of us. When we use our new Christian nature to the full, we become more out-going, loving and Christ-like.

The whole purpose of our Christian Existence is to participate in the very life of our Lord Jesus Christ. We too are to hear those glorious words that we are God's beloved creatures. The same Holy Spirit that descended upon Jesus is given to us in Baptism and Confirmation. The same mission of doing The Father's will is ours. The same destiny- fullness of life-is at the heart of our calling. Jesus, in the waters of Baptism entered into the depths of our humanity. Through Baptism, we are all called to maturity, holiness, service, community, and generosity.

Today let us sincerely thank God for the great gift of Baptism and pray for the grace to live faithfully, according to our Baptism.

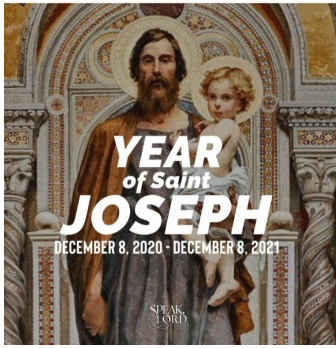
