NINETEENTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

Reflection from Fr. Bernard Doré

When we keep our eyes fixed on Jesus, we can weather any storm.

Elijah had a king and queen pursuing him, wishing him dead. Tired of being on the run, Elijah prayed for death, but God had a different plan for him. The prophet was told to wait and to listen for God's voice on the mountaintop. There, Elijah experienced the terrors of high winds, a raging fire and an earthquake. God was not speaking through those tumultuous occurrences.

Rather, the immense and intense God of all the universe chose to speak words of comfort to Elijah in the tiniest whisper, one that can only be heard if the listener has blocked out every other distraction. So often, God's people pray for signs and wonders, and we forget to listen for the tiny whisper or to see the miracles happening all around us.

Jesus was working many wondrous signs in the Gospel. Jesus walked on the water just hours after he fed thousands with five loaves of bread and two pieces of fish, with an abundance left over. When sighted by the Apostles from the boat, Jesus spoke familiar words of comfort, Take courage, it is I; do not be afraid.

Peter has his doubts and says, Lord, if it is you, command me to come to you on the water. If? Why would Peter doubt after all he has seen and heard? Jesus gives Peter the opportunity to come to him on the water. At first, all was well, as long as Peter kept his eyes fixed on Jesus. It wasn't until he was distracted by the dark of night, wondering how deep the water was and how high the waves were that Peter began to sink like a stone, needing Jesus to save him.

When we keep our eyes fixed on Jesus, we can weather any storm. The cross is our anchor in the stormy seas of life. Jesus continues to speak those same words of comfort to us when we are experiencing the storms of life: Take courage, it is I; do not be afraid. It is Jesus who will carry us across the stormy seas to the safe harbors of heaven.

That was the faith that helped the Apostle Paul to spread the Gospel near and far, to the Jews and to the Gentiles. In today's reading from the Letter to the Romans, Paul laments the refusal of fellow members of his Jewish ancestry to embrace Jesus as the Messiah. He experienced sorrow and anguish that some of their number could not be convinced to come to faith in Christ. Paul states that the Jewish people were given every sign from God – the law, worship, prophetic promises and patriarchs, and still some refused to believe.

The God of Jesus Christ is calling upon all of us to listen to his tiny whisper, and to see the signs of his love at work all around us. He encourages us not to be distracted by the storms of this world, but to keep our eyes fixed on Jesus, and through him, our salvation.

The Wonders of The Mass Priests—Angels on Earth

St. Alphonsus: The entire Church cannot give God as much honor, or obtain so many graces as a single priest by celebrating a single Mass. Thus, by the celebration of a single Mass, in which he offers Jesus Christ in sacrifice, a priest gives greater honor to the Lord than if all men, by dying for God, offered Him the sacrifice of their lives. With regard to the power of priests over the real body of Jesus Christ, it is of faith that when they pronounce the words of Consecration, the Incarnate Word has obliged Himself to obey and to come into their hands under the sacramental species.

St. Ignatius Martyr: Priests are the glory and the pillars of the Church, the doors and doorkeepers of Heaven.

St. Alphonsus: Were the Redeemer to descend into a Church and sit in a confessional, and a priest to sit in another confessional, Jesus would say over each penitent: "Ego te absolvo." The priest would likewise say over each of his penitents: "Ego te absolvo," and the penitents of each would be equally absolved. Thus, the sacerdotal dignity is the most noble of all the dignities in this world.

St. Ambrose says that it transcends all the dignities of kings, of emperors, and of angels. The dignity of the priest as far exceeds that of kings as the value of gold surpasses that of lead.

St. Cyprian said that all who had the true spirit of God were, when compelled to take the Order of priesthood, seized with fear and trembling. **St. Epiphanius** writes that he found no one willing to be ordained a priest, so fearful were they of so divine a dignity.

St. Gregory Nazianzen says, in his life of St. Cyprian, that when the Saint heard that his Bishop intended to ordain him a priest, he, through humility, concealed himself.

St. Ambrose, as he himself attests, resisted for a long time before he consented to be ordained.

St. Francis of Assisi never consented to be ordained.
