## May 15, 2022 FIFTH SUNDAY OF EASTER

#### Reflection from Fr. Bernard Doré

With help from Jesus, we can love the way he commands us to love.

As we continue our celebration of Easter, we are challenged today by the Lord's "new" command. He calls upon us to love one another. This commandment is already challenging. Jesus makes it even more challenging by commanding us to love one another the way that he loves us. This is not a love that most of the world would recognize. We are to love like the one who died for us and forgave us for all our failings and ingratitude. This is love that sacrifices and suffers for the beloved. To love like Jesus is possibly the greatest challenge we will ever attempt.

How would we be able to love in this way? We need the help of the Holy Spirit. It is only through grace that we are empowered to love others as Jesus loves us. We need help to live as we should.

Jesus offers us that help in the Holy Spirit. As we read the Acts of the Apostles in this Easter season, we see how the Holy Spirit gave powerful life and renewal to the early Church. He also brought love and unity to the assembly of believers. If we want to love as Jesus loved, we need to surrender to his new life and invite the Holy Spirit to transform us. The Holy Spirit can help us turn away from selfishness and learn to sacrifice for others. The Holy Spirit can adjust our values so that people are more important than possessions or wealth. Jesus saves us so that we can change. The Holy Spirit is his gift to us so we can live according to his commandment to love. Jesus tells us that this is the very sign that we are his disciples, that we love one another.

We proclaim in this holy season of Easter that Jesus is risen from the dead. In lives marked by love, we are signs that it is true.
