THE SOLEMNITY OF CHRIST THE KING

Reflection from Fr. Bernard Doré

Jesus the King becomes one with us to make us one with God.

Jesus' darkest hour became the hour of his great triumph. As Catholics, we celebrate the triumph of the cross, not the tragedy. As we honor Jesus' kingship on this last Sunday before Advent begins, we are contemplating his only throne – that same cross.

In the First Reading, Samuel describes how all the tribes of Israel went to David in Hebron and said they were his bone and his flesh and it was he who led them back to Israel. The Lord told David he would be a shepherd to His people. David made an agreement with the elders and was anointed king.

In the Second Reading, St. Paul explains to the Colossians that God has made them fit to share in the inheritance of the holy ones in light and that through the son we have redemption and forgiveness of sin. He describes Jesus as the image of the invisible God, the head of the church and in Him all things hold together.

In the Gospel, Jesus is mocked by the crowd as he hung on the cross. Above him was and inscription that read "This is the king of the Jews." One of the men being crucified with Jesus tells Him to save them and Himself, while the other asks that he be remembered when Jesus is in his kingdom. Jesus said in reply, "Amen I say to you, today you will be with me in Paradise.

Down through our history, thousands and millions of subjects have died for their kings. This was their duty when the needs or the defense of their countries demanded such sacrifices. They neither expected nor received much praise for it. But we Christians are serving Christ Our King who out of unconditional love for us accepted most cruel passion and death on the cross and saved us and won for us His Heavenly and Eternal Kingdom.

When Pope Pius XI instituted the Feast of Christ the King in 1925, he declared that "Jesus is the Universal King...! The rule of Christ the King will never end, every people, tribe, and nation will serve Him forever. It is the will of Almighty God to unite the entire Universe under His beloved Son, Jesus Christ, as King of heaven and earth".

Today let us sincerely renew our loyalty and obedience to Christ Our King and pray for the grace so that we remain always his loving, faithful and grateful subjects.

The Holy Eucharist Our All Our Refreshment

The malignant and violent fever which tortures the soul and draws us to evil is concupiscence. This passion is manifold; different persons burn with different kinds of fever. "Our fevers," says **St. Ambrose**, "are ambition, envy, anger and lust." The Holy Eucharist, however, is like a stream of water which quenches the fire that consumes us. Let the man who is infected with a passion frequently and devoutly receive Holy Communion, and he will soon find that the fire of his inordinate desires is being extinguished.

Our Physician

In this vale of tears our life is a continual warfare. We battle against the enemies of our salvation: the world with its doctrine and example, our own corrupted nature, and the archfiend of human souls, who, the **Prince of the Apostles** says, "as a roaring lion, goeth about seeking whom he may devour." (1 Peter 5:8). We receive many a wound in this conflict-as often as we succumb to temptation. Great is our need of a physician, and our **Physician is Jesus** in the Blessed Sacrament.

During Our Lord's earthly life, "He went about doing good, and healing ..." (Acts 10:38). These works of love He still performs in our souls through the Holy Eucharist.

Through the reception of this most holy Sacrament our souls are healed from the wounds of venial sin and those minor trespasses of God's law of which we make ourselves guilty every day. Through this union with Jesus, we became more **ardent** in our devotion, the fire of our love receives new fuel and bursts forth into flame, the spirit of penance is revived in our hearts and we perform acts of expiation which destroy venial sin.

Our Peace Offering

If, perchance, we have not only defiled our soul by venial sin, but have also burdened it with grievous offences against our God, it is again Jesus is the Blessed Sacrament who comes to our assistance, for He is our propitiation. Jesus has instituted this august Sacrament for the purpose of making an oblation of reparation to His Heavenly Father for the sins of mankind and to stay the avenging arm of Divine Justice. This Sacrifice places before the eves of the Most High the voluntary and bitter Passion and death of His beloved Son; therefore, it has the power of appeasing His just wrath, which has been incited against us by our manifold sins.
