### March 21, 2021 FIFTH SUNDAY OF LENT

### Reflection from Fr. Bernard Doré

Today we are called to remember God's faithfulness to us, his people. Mankind has rejected and betrayed God throughout history, and continues to do so today. In spite of this, God has never abandoned us. He continues to call us to turn away from sin and receive new life and salvation through his Son Our Lord Jesus Christ.

In The First Reading, The prophet Jeremiah tells a shattered people that God will not forsake them. The day is coming when he will make a new and more intimate covenant with his people.

The Second Reading speaks of the pain and anguish Christ endured during his life and especially during his passion. In this way He not only gave us an example but also became for us the source of eternal life.

In The Gospel, Jesus talks about his imminent death, how he fears it, yet desires it, for the hour of his shame will also be the hour of his glory. He talks also about how his followers will have to die to themselves. He foretells not only the kind of death, He was to die, but also gives us great insight into the meaning of His life, death and resurrection. Like the buried seed, His death would hold the promise of resurrection and new life. By submitting to a most cruel and humiliating death, Jesus would take upon His shoulders the weight of our sins and transgressions and open to us the gates of heaven. Never has the world known such unmerited, and unconditional love. And when we draw near to the cross of Jesus through the holy sacrifice of the Mass, we are embraced and renewed in that love.

Let us spend these last two weeks of Lent meditating upon the image of our crucified Lord, praying always that we might follow Him wherever He leads, being willing to serve and honor Him.

Inspiration for the week

How do we convince people that God's law is written upon their hearts? God is wedded to God's people. This is a simple and fundamental fact of life. Yet, many ignore this truth and carry on as if they, or humanity as a whole, are the center of the universe. As a grain of wheat has to fall to the ground and die in order to become what it really is, we too must die to our secular images and ideas of ourselves so that we can become who God really made us to be.
