Thirteenth Sunday In Ordinary Time

Reflection from Fr. Bernard Doré

For God, everything is possible. This week readings speak of God's power over sickness and death.

The First Reading from The Book of Wisdom tells us that God did not make death, nor does He rejoice in the destruction of the living. God created man to be immortal but only the envy of the devil brought death.

In The Second Reading St. Paul tells us that although Christ was rich, He became poor for our sake. As Christians, we have to be generous and charitable towards those in need.

The Gospel gives us two healing stories that highlight the power of faith and point forward to the cross. The main story concerns the daughter of Jairus. As Jesus is going to Jairus' home, he encounters a woman who had been afflicted with haemorrhages for twelve years. She believed all she had to do, was touch the hem of his robe and she would be well. And just as soon as she made contact with him, power flowed out from him and healed her. Jesus recognizes and praises her faith. As Jesus is speaking with the woman, the news arrives that the child has died. Jesus, confident and unafraid, continues to the house, puts out the mourners and raises the dead child back to life. Jesus the healer has power even over death.

These accounts are given to us in the Gospel so that our faith might be strengthened and that we, too, might be saved from death and brought to the fullness of life. Faith is not abstraction. Our faith rests in a person, the person of Jesus Christ. Faith is a conviction that with God, all things are possible. Faith is the means by which our human reason is elevated so that we can know the world, the way it truly is, charged with the grandeur of God. Faith will one day give way to sight and we will see God face to face for all eternity in Heaven.

Let us pray that The Lord will deepen and strengthen our faith.

I will praise you, Lord, for you have rescued me.

Letter from Bishop Tobin

Bishop Tobin has now signed a formal decree restoring the obligation to attend Sunday Mass in the Diocese of Providence, effective Sunday, June 6, 2021, the Solemnity of Corpus Christi. This means that Catholics, in observance of the Lord's Day and in fulfillment of the law of the Church, are once again obliged to attend Holy Mass on Sundays and Holy Days of Obligation, unless they are otherwise dispensed for some serious reason such as health conditions. Attending Holy Mass and receiving the Holy **Eucharist Sacramentally are serious** obligations.

Update: Normal Liturgical Practice

In light of updated health guidelines by the CDC, the Governor & RI Dept of Health, the following changes in procedure should be considered in our parishes. Visit **stpaulsfoster.org**.

Indoor Seating Capacity

Seating increased from 80% to 100%

Face Masks

Fully vaccinated parishioners are no longer required to wear a facemask indoors and outdoors.

Those who are not fully vaccinated should be asked to continue to wear a facemask indoors.

However, any form of discrimination should be avoided against those who are not fully vaccinated and those who do not use a facemask.

Continue to Observe the Following

Sufficient hand sanitizing dispensers should be made available at the vestibule of the church which can be used by parishioners upon entering. Parishioners should continually be encouraged to practice proper hygiene.

The distribution of the Precious Blood at Holy Communion to the lay faithful should remain suspended.
