FIFTEENTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

Reflection from Fr. Bernard Doré

All things come from God, belong to him, and should be used to give him glory, honor, and praise.

No matter how many advances modern technology affords to farmers, they face the same challenges and obstacles experienced by their ancient counterparts, not the least of which is the weather, something no one can accurately predict or control.

Isaiah compares the farmer's efforts to yield a bountiful harvest with that of the preacher and prophet attempting to sow the seeds of faith in the hearts of believers. God promises rain to moisten the ground, making it fertile and fruitful. As he gives us bread to satisfy our physical hunger, we are also given the living Word to answer our spiritual hungers.

The Apostle Paul described the process of cultivating growth in the faith to the groaning experienced by women in labor. We long to be set free from slavery to sin. In Christ, humanity has received salvation for the soul and the promise of the resurrection of the body. Paul, like the long-suffering farmer, willingly endured all kinds of suffering in order to plant the seeds of faith in the early Christian communities, giving them the promise of freedom and new life.

In his parables, Jesus often spoke in agricultural terms, making himself easily understood, as most people in his time had to live off the land. Like the farmer's seed, our faith must be nurtured and fed, protected and cared for.

And, just as the farmer separates the wheat from the chaff, and prunes his larger plants for a more bountiful harvest, we, too, must learn to separate the good from the bad in our own lives. We submit ourselves to the pruning, purging, and purifying of our sins so that we also may experience the glory of God in this life and in the next.

The seeds of our faith must be so deeply rooted in Christ and his Church that nothing can cause them to waste or wither – not the temptation to do wrong, not wealth or power, not pride or prejudice.

The farmer understands better than most that all things come from God, belong to him, and should be used to give him glory, honor, and praise. That is why the farmer always offered up the first fruits of the harvest as a sacrifice in thanks to God. When the Word takes root in our lives and our faith grows, we can offer ourselves back to the One who first gave all to us. We do so in acts of love for him and for each other. Just as Christ did for us.

God Listens to Everybody

A Message from Pope Francis

Everyone lives a life that is often inconsistent or a "contradiction" because people can be both a sinner and a saint, a victim and a tormentor. No matter what one's situation is, people can put themselves back in God's hands through prayer. "Prayer gives us nobility; it is able to protect one's relationship with God, who is the true companion along humanity's journey, amidst thousands of hardships in life, good or bad, but always with prayer."

In his main talk, the pope continued his series on prayer and reflected on the role prayer played in the life of David -- a young shepherd whom God called to become king of Israel.

David learned early in life that a shepherd takes care of his flock, protects them from danger and provides for them.

Jesus, too, is called "the good shepherd" because he offers his life for his flock, guiding them, knowing each one by name.

When David was later confronted for his terrible sins, he realized he had become a "bad shepherd".

He no longer acted like a humble servant but had robbed another man of the only thing he loved when he took the man's wife as his own.

"Saint and sinner, persecuted and persecutor, victim, even executioner," David was full of contradictions -- being all of these things in his life.

But the one thing that stayed constant was his prayerful dialogue with God. "David the saint, prays, David the sinner, prays," always lifting his voice to God either in joy or deep despair.

This is what David can teach the faithful today: to always speak with God, no matter the circumstances or one's state of being, because everyone's life is often marked by contradiction and inconsistencies.

People should tell God about their joy, sins, sorrows and love -- everything, because God is always there, and he listens.

Prayer returns people to God "because the nobility of prayer leaves us in God's hands."

Listen from your car

We will broadcast the Mass on 107.90 FM on car radios. Those who participate from the outside will be brought Communion if they choose to receive.

Wear a face mask

A face mask helps limit the potential spread of infection and provides fellow parishioners with a sign of assurance, we care for each other.

Maintain social distance

Keep a distance at least 6-feet from one another unless with household.

Holy Communion

Father and Deacon will sanitize hands before distributing Holy Communion.

Com forward with your face mask on, when presented with the Body of Christ, respond "Amen."

Remove mask; receive and consume the Host; and replace your face mask.

You may choose to not receive Holy Communion and make an act of spiritual communion instead.

My Jesus, I believe that you are present in the Blessed Sacrament. I love you above all things and I desire to receive you into my life. Since I cannot receive you sacramentally, come then spiritually into my heart. So that I may embrace you and unite myself completely to you. And never let me be separated from you. Amen .
