## TWENTY-THIRD SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

### Reflection from Fr. Bernard Doré

The First Reading of today's liturgy suggests that we carry a great share of responsibility for the salvation of our brothers and sisters. Our faith and our love above all, should be able to lead our brothers and sisters to God. Our experience of God should constitute an example for them to encounter and experience Him. God's love, God's care, concern and compassion should flow through our hearts and reach our sisters and brothers. If my faith and love, my lifestyle do not succeed to impress my fellow-travelers in life and do not bring them closer to God, I have failed my Lord and Master; I have failed as a Christian.

Our duty of bringing an erring brother or sister back to God (today's Gospel) stems from this great responsibility we have of working sincerely for his or her salvation. Any correction that is carried out with an air of superiority, and with a touch of judgment, can never win my brother back to God. Only a person who loves profoundly can rightfully dare to correct his brother. In addition it requires great humility and a special sensitivity of heart. The correction has to be carried out in private, with extreme discretion, and without any show of hypocrisy, pride or abuse of power, without any way doing violence to the person of my brother, without tarnishing his good name or honor.

In addition, to the duty and method of correction, the Christian motive for correction is love always, even when justice dictates correction. "Love is the one thing that cannot hurt (love) is the answer." As difficult as correction is, the corrector who is positively motivated by love can't do wrong. The worst is done by those who try to do good to their neighbors but do not love them. Christ's rules for correction are a lesson in love.

Today let us pray for the grace to look to Jesus, The Lord of Divine Mercy and Compassion and practice the virtue of

## The Real Presence of Jesus in the Holy Eucharist

Always stay close to our Lord, present in the tabernacle. Be completely absorbed by devotion to him there and never let go. ~ **Saint Bernadette**

**1324** The Eucharist is “the source and summit of the Christian life.” For in the blessed Eucharist is contained the whole spiritual good of the Church, namely Christ himself, our Pasch.” **137**

**1327** In brief, the Eucharist is the sum and summary of our faith:

### Catechism of the Catholic Church

My dearest friends,

My home is often empty. Very few of my friends come to see me and visit. And when they do, it is usually because of some obligation.

They rush around seeking wealth, health and pleasure and almost never stop to say 'hello', and to be with me, and maybe listen to me. I've given them so much and they don't even acknowledge the gifts, much less thank me for them.

I guess the only conclusion I can come to, is that either they don't love me anymore, or else they don't even believe I'm here.

It makes me sad and lonely and hurt—an no one seems to care. Love, **Jesus in the Tabernacle**

Most Catholics no longer believe in the real presence of Jesus in the Eucharist. if they did, they would often receive Him during the week and would frequently visit Him to praise, adore, thank, and petition Him for all their needs. Their reception of the Eucharist on Sunday is a mere cultural habit that produces little change in their lives. The reason for this is because of the most outrageous robbery in the history of Christianity—Satan has stolen our precious treasure of the Sacrament of Reconciliation.

We are all sinners, and because of the blockage of sin in our hearts, Jesus is unable to come in with all His peace, joy, love, and light to make us new, whole, and happy. Mary, in her frequent apparitions all over the world, has urged us to return to the frequent reception of the cleansing, healing Sacrament of Reconciliation. Pope John Paul II also has urged us to return to this beautiful sacrament.
