In The First reading, The Book of Wisdom describes that the virtuous man is a sign of contradiction- not by his severity, but by his gentleness. Such a man is tortured and condemned by his enemies, but declared just by the wisdom of God.


In The Second Reading, St. James informs us that the wisdom of God is manifested by men who are peacemakers. Persons who have deep peace in their hearts will be known by the virtues of kindness and humility.

In the Gospel of Today, Mark describes that Jesus as the gentle servant whose death will result in life for all. Last Sunday, Jesus revealed to the disciples his mission as suffering servant of the Lord.

By his life and actions, Christ has turned our values upside down. He has shown us that true greatness is not a matter of power and respectability, but is to be found only in the service of others.

If we call ourselves Christians, we too must live a life of service, not seeking any reward. It is easy enough to give when we feel in a generous mood. It is hard to be always willing to serve when this means constant drudgery or when we meet with ingratitude. Perhaps we will be encouraged if we remember that Christ is with us in our service, giving his love to others through us. If we are asked to share his cross, we can be sure that we will also share in his resurrection.

Let us pray for the grace to follow the example of The Servant Christ in our love and service of our brothers and sisters in need.
